Agnes Scott Hall, or "Main" as it is popularly called, was named for founder Colonel George Washington Scott's mother. In the early years of the College, the entire institution was housed in Main. Today Agnes Scott Hall houses the President's office, which has been returned to Main; the Student Health Center; and the Dean of Students, Career Planning and Placement, and Financial Aid offices, in addition to the student rooms.

Perhaps the most exciting feature of Main's renovation is the specially hand-cast bronze bell that was purchased for the bell tower, which has been empty for reasons unknown since its construction.

Rebekah Scott Hall, named for Colonel Scott's wife, is home for the admissions office and is the temporary location for the student activities and chaplain's offices. In addition to the student rooms on the upper floors, Rebekah contains the splendid Rebekah Reception Room, a conference room and Victorian parlors.

In both Main and Rebekah, the extensive renovations have blended modern convenience with period decor to create a quality environment in which to work and live.
