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

When I felt like I would never get to study abroad because of financial reasons, they worked hard to find me scholarships and make it happen."

After spending a semester in Ghana, she returned to campus with a fifth language (Twi, a principal language in Ghana) and a love for studying cultures. Today, she is using her sociology and anthropology major to make a difference in the world. Having won a Fulbright Fellowship, Helen is pioneering the Fulbright English Teaching Assistantships program in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia. From there, she'll be working with Teach For America in Washington, D.C. "Agnes Scott inspired me to find my passion and showed me taking a risk would be worth it."



Any Agnes Scott alumna will be able to name at least one professor who had a lasting impact on her life. For Jennifer Russi, that professor is Eleanor Morris. "She pushed me to think more deeply. She also pushed me to apply for an internship at The Carter Center. I didn't go to her. She came to me. Having that kind of support from a professor like her—this impressive academic and someone I really look up to—was critical."

Professor Morris' encouragement had profound benefits. Interning with The Carter Center's Democracy Program, Jennifer has helped educate workers in nongovernmental organizations from all over the world about human rights and observed elections in Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire. "These experiences have been amazing, but they're not something I could have done if I'd gone to school somewhere else. The support I got at Agnes Scott was instrumental. Anything I do going forward is building off that strong foundation."



Since discovering the space program as a child, Sarah has had a passion for astronomy. That passion took her to Agnes Scott, where it turned into a love for astrophysical research. While organizing fast-a-thons during Ramadan as president of the Muslim Student Association and leading the Religious Life Council, Sarah pursued intellectual challenges that produced an impressive research resume—she worked in observatories in West Virginia and Arizona, published findings on blazar microvariability and presented research to the American Astronomical Society. "That wonder, that constant 'I don't know,' that need to figure out why something is—that's what drives me. Agnes Scott gave me a taste for research, and now I can't get enough of it." Agnes Scott also gave her the confidence to pursue her graduate degree at Florida International University, where she's the only woman in her program. "I'm proud to be a woman in the sciences. Going to Agnes Scott brings out a confidence that you never knew you had in you."




THE SMALL REVELATIONS OF What Liz Hartnett '08 learned on the stage.

You need obstacles to have breakthroughs. For Liz Hartnett, acting while a student at Agnes Scott presented challenges that allowed her to grow as an actor and as a person. "Performing with an all-female cast opens up roles you don't typically get as a woman." Her senior year, she played Casca in *Julius Caesar* and surprised herself. "You're a female actor building this male character, watching him develop. There are all these small revelations that come from trying to understand what the character tells us about human experience in general."


For Liz, that experience gets to the heart of an Agnes Scott education. "This is the whole idea of a liberal arts education—to expand our understanding of what it means to be a human being. Beyond the craft of acting, I learned that drama is always doing that. It's a facilitator for thinking deeply, for creativity, for collaboration. At its base, it's communication."

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




CONNECTIONS & COLLAPSE Agnes Scott prepared Galina Alexeenko '01 for the world of work—even when that work meant saving the world.

In 2008, the world economy was on the verge of collapse. As a senior economic analyst at the Federal Reserve Bank in Atlanta, Galina Alexeenko had a front-row seat to one of the biggest social challenges of our time. "Agnes Scott makes you really care about things, and once you care about things, it's very difficult to just stand by and do nothing." Working closely with Atlanta Federal Reserve President Dennis Lockhart, she found she was well-prepared. "The world is interconnected—everyone was learning that in 2008. But it's what I learned at Agnes Scott. It's a mindset I've carried through my career."

Galina's intellectual flexibility earned her a new position writing and coordinating speeches for Lockhart. "My career hasn't followed a clear path, but Agnes Scott prepared me for every step that brought me to where I am—and I'm quite proud to be part of an organization that genuinely cares about the lives of the American people."







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



Our groundbreaking Women's Global Leadership Initiative will position Agnes Scott as a resource in the worldwide movement to promote women's leadership and tackle the challenges facing girls and women at home and abroad. A new certificate program will give students opportunities to interact with women leaders, study abroad and put their knowledge and skills to work through service-learning projects.

[\$1 million] Public Health Program

Agnes Scott's partnerships with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Emory's Rollins School of Public Health enable our students to conduct cutting-edge research and pursue master's level course work. equipping them to make meaningful contributions to a healthier world. We offer a major and a minor in this exciting interdisciplinary field.

Agnes Scott's commitment to sustainability has garnered regional and national attention. Modeled on the college's highly successful Center for Writing and Speaking, the Resource Center for Math and Science will promote intellectual engagement beyond the classroom. Agnes Scott's NCAA Division III athletic programs have produced championship teams and Player and Coach of the Year award winners. We recently fielded Georgia's first varsity women's lacrosse team. Beyond promoting "Scottie Spirit" on campus, our athletic programs attract strong scholar-athletes and build our local, regional and national reputation.

McCain Library remains the heart of the Agnes Scott educational experience. Today's academic environment poses new challenges for libraries, especially in the area of technology. Keeping McCain Library up to date will provide the foundation for excellence in teaching, learning and research.

Center for Writing and Speaking

At the Center for Writing and Speaking, student-to-student conferences on writing and speaking assignments extend and multiply the intellectual engagement of the classroom and help students of all majors and abilities grow as writers, speakers, teachers and leaders.

Bridge to Business

Agnes Scott, in partnership with the Georgia Institute of Technology's College of Management, offers a three-week summer program that introduces our students to the world of business. While providing students with the knowledge and technical skills necessary for the modern business world, the program will also whet their appetite for business school and increase their awareness of business opportunities in Atlanta and beyond.

[\$500,000] Educational Technology

To prepare young women "to engage the intellectual and social challenges of their times," the college must provide the technology necessary for digitally innovative teaching and learning. In addition to installing a wireless backbone that will enable high-speed access from all parts of campus, Agnes Scott will renovate select classrooms and learning spaces to support student-centered learning and 21st-century instructional practices.

Capital Projects:

\$41 million total

Agnes Scott alumnae have a deep attachment to the buildings where they spent their formative years, and we're committed to maintaining those attachments while meeting the needs of a vibrant living and learning community in the 21st century. The capital improvement projects in this campaign will allow the college to preserve the iconic buildings that define our campus. But they will also allow us to continue demonstrating the same forward-thinking commitment to sustainability that made us home to the first LEED-certified building in Decatur.

[\$15 million] Historic Rebekah Hall

The college will renovate the residential floors of Rebekah Scott Hall and transform the ground level into a stateof-the-art enrollment suite for recruiting students. An essential part of this transformation is the consolidation of key student services under one roof. This will provide convenience and easier access for prospective as well as current students.

[\$15 million] Campbell Hall

The renovation of Campbell Hall will create an innovative "living-learning" community with academic programs and high-tech classrooms on the first two floors and the college's first suite-style residences on the upper two floors. This plan will allow Campbell to house up to 96 students, an important consideration given Agnes Scott's goal to increase enrollment.

[\$11 million] Creative Arts Facilities

As part of its Creative Arts Master Plan, the college will modernize





QUESTIONS. ANSWERED.

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Q A At Agnes Scott, we are committed to being good stewards of our resources – including your gifts. Here, we address some common questions regarding the college's finances and plans for the future. If you have other questions, please ask!

Q † These are challenging times for liberal arts colleges. Does Agnes Scott have a sustainable business model?

A | The Roadmap to 2020, Agnes Scott's strategic financial plan, establishes specific financial principles and goals to ensure that the college remains financially strong and well positioned to serve its core mission. The Roadmap includes benchmarks for increasing enrollment and retention, improving facilities, reducing and controlling expenses, and paying down debt. It also includes a timetable for lowering the college's endowment spend rate so we can continue to build the endowment and preserve intergenerational equity.

Q | Is a single-sex institution like Agnes Scott viable for the 21st century? **A** | Absolutely. Agnes Scott has broken enrollment records several times in recent years and is attracting students from around the world. Moreover, new research clearly demonstrates the continued value of women's colleges. Alumnae of single-sex schools earn more graduate degrees and develop more self-confidence and leadership skills than their peers do. Agnes Scott regularly outperforms much larger institutions in the production of Ph.D.s, CEOs and in the number of fellowships awarded our graduates.

Q | Given its large endowment, why does Agnes Scott need to raise more money? **A** | Agnes Scott's endowment is worth \$258 million* today, which is healthy for a college of our size and ranks us among the top 60 nationally. However, our endowment per student is half that of some of our peer and aspirant institutions. For us to continue to recruit and retain high-quality students and faculty, provide a 21st century liberal arts education, support students with financial aid and offer innovative programs, we must ensure our endowment's growth through fundraising as well as sound investing.



Q | What will \$100 million achieve?

A | The Greatness Before Us campaign will help raise Agnes Scott's national and international profile as a premier liberal arts college for women. It will support many of the initiatives outlined in Engaging a Wider World, Agnes Scott's strategic plan for 2014, which was developed under President Kiss' leadership. And it will build on the momentum of the historic Bold Aspirations campaign completed under the leadership of President Mary Brown Bullock '66.

Most important, this campaign will enhance the educational opportunities available to the gifted young women who come to Agnes Scott and will support the work of professors across the curriculum, inspired and dedicated teacher-scholars whose commitment to student learning and success mirrors that of such iconic faculty as Professors Pepperdene, Frierson, Sims, Carden and Chang.

Q | What is the current cost of tuition, room and board?


A | The total yearly cost of attending Agnes Scott is \$42,345.** In spite of the rising cost of providing the premier educational experiences our prospective students expect, we have increased tuition only modestly (less than 3 percent per year) for the past several years. Yet it costs the college nearly twice the amount we charge for tuition to provide an Agnes Scott education. This gap makes private donor support all the more critical to our continued success.

Q | I want to make an endowed or expendable gift in support of one of your campaign priorities. Do I still need to give to The Fund for Agnes Scott? **A** | Absolutely!
