

Layli Miller-Muro '93

Founder of the Tahirih Justice Center and Senior Advisor to the CEO

Layli Miller-Muro is the founder of the Tahirih Justice Center and Senior Advisor to the CEO. She established Tahirih in 1997 following her involvement in a high-profile case that set national precedent and revolutionized asylum law in the United States. Fauziya Kassindja, a 17-year-old girl who had fled Togo in fear of a forced polygamous marriage and female genital mutilation/cutting, was granted asylum in 1996 by the U.S. Board of Immigration Appeals. This decision opened the door to gender-based persecution as grounds for asylum. Using her portion of the proceeds from the book Miller-Muro and Kassindja co-authored about the case, "Do They Hear You When You Cry?," Miller-Muro created the Tahirih Justice Center in 1997 to serve immigrant survivors of gender-based violence seeking safety and justice.

Since 2001, Miller-Muro has led Tahirih in its service to more than 30,000 women and children, growing the non-profit from a staff of six to over 100, and expanding its offices from Greater DC to Houston, Baltimore, Atlanta, and the San Francisco Bay Area. In recognition of its sound management and innovative programs, under Miller-Muro's leadership, Tahirih won the Washington Post Award for Management Excellence and gained recognition for its innovative use of probono services in the Stanford Social Innovation Review. In the past year she has stepped down as CEO, assuming the role of Senior Advisor to the CEO.

Prior to joining Tahirih as Chief Executive Officer, Miller-Muro was an attorney at the law firm of Arnold & Porter, where she practiced international litigation and maintained a substantial pro bono practice. Prior to joining Arnold & Porter, she was an attorney-advisor at the U.S. Department of Justice, Board of Immigration Appeals.

Miller-Muro is a frequent lecturer and has appeared in numerous news outlets including CNN, Fox News, The New York Times, NPR, The Wall Street Journal, and The Washington Post. She lives in the Washington, DC area with her husband and three children.

Student Commencement Address

A new tradition began in 2019 at Agnes Scott College — a student address as part of the Commencement ceremony. In response to a request from the senior class and long-standing interest from students and the college community, the college held its first Commencement Student Speaker Contest for graduating seniors, coordinated by the Center for Writing and Speaking. Interested seniors were invited to deliver their proposed speech before a panel of students, faculty and staff, who then invited one student to speak at Commencement.

Senior Gift Campaign

The Senior Gift Campaign is a time-honored tradition that gives the senior class the opportunity to express their gratitude to the college by making a gift to The Fund for Agnes Scott, the college's annual fund. The Banners

The banners represent student organizations and activities, important components of the Agnes Scott experience. Members of the respective organizations designed the banners.

The Presidential Medallion

The Presidential Medallion, which Leocadia I. Zak wears today, was a gift from an anonymous donor prior to the centennial of the college. It was first presented to President Ruth Schmidt at the Founder's Day Convocation on Feb. 24, 1988. This symbol of the Office of the President, reflecting a tradition rooted in the Renaissance, is worn on ceremonial occasions.

The medallion and chain were designed and executed by Georgia State University Professor Richard Mafong. The silver and gold medallion is a round, open link with a crossbar bearing the word "President." An orb-like piece bears the name and founding year, "Agnes Scott College 1889," and from the seal of the college, the Latin "In Fide Vestra Virtutem in Virtute Autem Scientiam," from II Peter 1:5, which translates to, "Add to your faith virtue, and to virtue knowledge." The medallion is linked to the chain with a five-pointed star disk, a symbol also borrowed from the college seal. The chain consists of 22 oval disks to accommodate the names of Agnes Scott's past, present and future presidents; 22 open oval connecting links; and 46 purple and milky iridescent stones.

Academic Regalia

The ancient lineage of academic apparel began when universities were first founded in Europe in the Middle Ages. Students and teachers, considered clerics, wore robes and cowls, or hoods, similar to those of the monastic orders to which many of them belonged. Over time, for distinction in their regalia, universities adopted bright colors and different designs for gowns and hoods. In America, academic costume has been in continuous use since the founding of the first Colonial colleges. As in Europe, innovation was spontaneous and uncontrolled until 1893, when an intercollegiate commission recommended the uniform code that still governs academic regalia today.

The design of the gown indicates the wearer's highest degree. The bachelor's gown, simple and usually black, is distinguished by long, pointed sleeves. The similar master's gown has oblong sleeves squared in back and arched in front. The more elaborate doctoral gown has velvet front panels and three chevrons on each sleeve. Velvet in a color other than black indicates the field of study in which the degree was earned. Some universities have adopted a distinctive gown color, such as Stanford's red and Emory's blue.

Many symbols appear on a hood: The width of the velvet trim designates the level of the degree, the color of the trim indicates the major field of study and the lining denotes the institution that granted the degree. The distinguishing feature of the cap is the gold tassel worn with the doctoral robe.

Some colors and institutions that may be represented in the academic procession of the faculty today are:

Arts, Letters, Humanities: white
Divinity/Theology: scarlet
Laws: purple
Music: pink
Philosophy: dark blue
Science: golden yellow
Duke: Duke blue and white
Emory: blue and gold
Harvard: crimson
Oxford: red and blue
Stanford: red
Yale: Yale blue

During commencement, students wear—in addition to the formal hoods that signify their degrees—a variety of cords, stoles, and pins representing the honors, affiliations, and achievements of their academic career. These symbols cover both academic and extra-curricular activities, and students wear them with pride.

Commencement Etiquette

Commencement exercises are a formal academic ceremony. Guests are asked to respect the dignity of the ceremony, graduates and other guests by adhering to the following guidelines:

- For the health and safety of all in attendance, you must wear a face covering over your mouth and nose at all times, except while drinking.
- We request that while on campus you maintain a safe distance from those around you unless they are family members.
- No videotaping of the speeches is permitted.
- Cellular phones should be silenced to help ensure that all guests can hear and enjoy the graduation activities.
- During the reading of the names of the graduates, guests should be considerate in their applause so that all names can be heard clearly and the ceremony is not disrupted.
- Please remain at your seat for the duration of the ceremony including the conferring of degrees and until after the recessional. Please do not block the aisles or passageways by attempting to greet or take photos with graduates.
- For safety purposes, all walkways must remain clear; therefore, strollers and large bags are not permitted in the guest seating area.
