Hard Calls for 90s Medical Professionals

PIEL '40, GILLEY '77 AND WEAVER '60 DISCUSS THE ETHICS OF MODERN MEDICINE

ow, we can't allow anyone to die," says Carolyn Forman Piel '40, a retired pediatric nephrologist and research professor emeritus at University of California, San Francisco. With the coming of kidney transplants in the early 1960s, ethical dilemmas have become commonplace and reflect the dramatic change in Piel's field since she entered medicine in 1946. Prior to the time when kidney transplants became possible, nature took its course among children born without kidney function; they were allowed to die. "Unfortunately, many parents [today] insist on doing everything to save a child's life. But there are difficult questions to consider, 'Will the child be able to exist normally?' 'What will be the quality of its life?' All of us are going to have to decide how much technology we can afford," in terms of real costs as well as emotional costs.

Piel's concerns mirror those of others in health professions, where wrestling with arduous ethical questions is as routine as a daily vital signs check. As often as not, the answers to many ethical interrogatories fall somewhere in the gray areas, neither black nor white.

For Beth Mason Gilley '77, a pediatrician affiliated with East Tennessee Children's Hospital, her attitude toward "extraordinary" intervention and its cost has changed completely since her residency at Memphis' LeBonheur Children's Medical Center (1987-90). The ASC graduate admits she was jaded in those days when vast amounts of public money were expended on pulling children of teenage (often drug-using) mothers "from the clutches of death" only to place them in less-than-ideal homelife situations. However, "when you pulled back from resuscitating a baby that was dying in front of you, you didn't know how its life would turn out." At best its future was shaky.

Today, the Knoxville resident and mother of two says she sees the long-term perspective a bit more clearly. Some babies will always have problems, she acknowledges, but it's impossible to be cognizant of a newborn's potential. Some will fight off severe illnesses and live normal, healthy lives.

The public as well as the private costs of health care are staggering, but the repercussions of an ailing America that postpones or goes without medical treatment are just as costly, if not more so.

Physician's assistant Myra Glasure Weaver '60, who serves a low-income, largely Hispanic clientele in Austin, Texas, sees what happens when people try to survive without health care benefits. Her patients are homeless teens or low-paid and uninsured workers who live at or below the poverty line and who "fall between the cracks of Medicaid and Medicare." Because they cannot afford care, many postpone seeing a doctor until their problems are severe. At that point, help is sought through a hospital emergency room.

About 50 percent of these cases are not emergency situations and are referred to the Blackstock Family Health Center, where Weaver serves. Weaver and the clinic attempt to form an ongoing relationship with patients to prevent health problems from becoming severe. Prevention, she stresses, should be the goal of both the individual and the over-

all health-care system.

Weaver believes all humans have a right to receive health care, a conviction backed by her faith and service as a Presbyterian elder. She also endorses the medical team approach, practiced at Blackstock. Midlevel practitioners (such as physician's assistants and nurse practitioners) stretch health care dollars that enable medical practices to see more patients, more affordably, she explains.

Success for SHARP! Women

SUMMER SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS PROGRAM GAINS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

roject Kaleidoscope (PKAL), a national reform effort to strengthen undergraduate science and mathematics in the liberal arts setting, named Agnes Scott's SHARP! Women project one of 29 "Programs That Work.

"Your program exemplifies the PKAL vision of what works in undergraduate science and mathematics ..." said Jeanne L. Narum, PKAL director, in a letter announcing the designation. In conjunction with the recognition by PKAL, SHARP! Women's Director Patricia Mcguire White '74, assistant dean of the College, was invited to outline the program at a conference of the National Science Foundation, Feb. 24-26, in Washington, D.C. Only three schools out of the 29 recognized as "Programs That Work" were selected to make presentations. "They were interested in knowing what we're doing, why it works, and why we think it's successful," comments White. Through this sharing aspect, other institutions will have models for comparison and adaptation to help strengthen

and reform their own programs.

The ASC SHARP! Women summer program consists of ongoing ASC faculty research projects. "It was basically research work," says Natalie El-Jourbagy '95, an ASC chemistry major and SHARP! participant. "When I went in the lab room, I didn't know how the day would end—whether I'd find something or not. That's what made it so exciting.

SHARP! Women began in the summer of 1990 as a small pilot program with two ASC faculty and two ASC students. In summer 1991, high school participants were added. This past summer, the program brought together for six to eight weeks six high school teams (consisting of one faculty member and two rising 10th, 11th, or 12th grade girls) for three weeks and 15 ASC students for six to ten weeks. The ASC faculty, students and high school faculty received a stipend for their work; high school students received an honorarium.

"I think it was a great experience for us," comments Darby Beach '94, an ASC astrophysics major. "I really enjoyed learning about image processing. That's something I wouldn't have had a chance to do otherwise

"One thing that is unique about SHARP! Women," remarks White, "is that all the participants are involved in the research. It allows students to see what research is about. They collect data and interpret it. High school students love it. They like learning with the teacher who hasn't previously done this research project [either]. ASC students have an undergraduate opportunity to be involved with research, which is needed. It's one thing to learn information in class and another to apply it. The high school teachers take things back to the classroom, having an effect on all of the students they teach."

The number of people being affected is impressive. In four years a total of 28 ASC students have been involved, 20 of them still in college, one a research assistant, four in graduate school and three in medical or dental school. One SHARP! Women student has expressed plans to become a teacher because of her experience with the program. Some 27 high school students have participated over the past three years; 63 percent of these students are still in high school. Thirty percent are in college and express a desire to pursue studies in sciencerelated fields.

The summer 1994 SHARP! Women Program is being sponsored by an anonymous gift of \$67,000

'The program in general has been a lot of fun to work with and has been very successful in introducing women to science and maintaining that interest. Everyone involved has benefited," says White.

What I have not been able to accomplish is the renovation of the heart of the institution—its spiritual and educational life,

although strides have been taken with the appointment of a chaplain and the addition of new programs such as Global Awareness, women's studies, the MAT, and the Scott-free Year 5. But I am heartened by the fact that these issues are being addressed under the board's direction by the faculty, staff and students at Agnes Scott, and I trust that these most important aspects of the College, the very reason for our existence, will be strengthened and focused in the years to come so that Agnes Scott College can be the leader in women's education that it has every opportunity and obligation to be

New Pre-med Certificate Program

SPECIAL PREPARATION NOW AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS SEEKING ADVANCED HEALTH PROFESSION DEGREES

gnes Scott College will offer a new one-year post-baccalaureate program beginning this summer that prepares women for medical school, veterinary school, and other allied health professions. This new Post-Baccalaureate Pre-Medical and Allied Health Professions Program (Post-Bac Pre-Med) helps women who are college graduates wishing to change careers acquire the necessary courses for medical school or other professional specialties in the growing health-care field.

With intensive classes, laboratories, seminars and internships, the Post-Bac Pre-Med program is individually tailored based on the student's prior academic experience and may be completed in one or two years, depending on previous academic work and

individual circumstances. A certificate is awarded upon completion of the 36-40 hour program. During the glide year between taking the Medical College Admission Test and matriculation into medical school, students may take additional courses to enhance their preparation for professional or graduate school.

"This was part of the whole science center emphasis that came out of the College's strategic plan of 1991," says Sarah R. Blanshei, dean of the College. "We were looking at the program holistically, at the pre-college programs (Futurescape and SHARP!Women), the retention programs and the post-baccalaureate program, and a master's in science which we've decided not to go for right now. We decided

instead to put this pre-health certificate program in place. There are a number of programs like this elsewhere but there isn't one at a women's college in the South. We knew there was a need for it because women had been coming to us for some time for this type of study."

As a women's college, Agnes Scott is uniquely aware of the barriers many women face, both in studying science and in changing careers. The program also includes monthly seminars encompassing women's health issues, medical ethics, clinical practice and health policy.

Application deadline to begin the program in June is May 15. For more information, contact the director of special programs at 638-6184.

Interim President To Be Announced

SEARCH FOR PERMANENT PRESIDENT IS UNDERWAY

The Agnes Scott
College Board of
Trustees plans to name
an interim president to serve
the College from July until
the appointment of a new
president, according to a
March letter to the ASC
community from Presidential
Search Committee Chair
Clair McLeod Muller '67.

The Search Committee's recruitment efforts for a permanent president "will be concentrated in May through July; followed by screening, reference checking and preliminary interviews beginning in August," Muller wrote in the letter.

The committee has engaged Academic Search Consultation Service (ASCS) of Washington,

D.C., to assist in the permanent search. In mid-April, two ASCS consultants — Christine Young and Samuel Spencer—began conducting forums and focus groups with various constituencies of the College.

Young is a graduate of Wellesley, a former professor and former acting president of two women's colleges, who has overseen 40 presidential searches since 1987. Spencer, senior consultant with ASCS, is president emeritus of Davidson College and a trustee emeritus of Agnes Scott.

In addition to on-campus discussions, ASCS and the committee will seek input from alumnae during Alumnae Weekend on April 30 and will schedule meetings with the larger alumnae clubs throughout the country during the next few months.

Nominations from of the College will be considered. All comments and suggestions, both written and oral, will be treated as confidential and will not be shared beyond the committee. Anonymous Gift to Fund SHARP!Women Summer 1994

\$67,000 anonymous gift to fund the SHARP!Women summer program at Agnes Scott lead a group of gifts totaling \$157,750 that were given to the College recently.

The SHARP! gift will fund the award-winning program (see page one) designed to give high school girls, high school teachers, college women and ASC professors collaborative hands-on research experience in the areas of science and mathematics. SHARP! will mark its fourth year this summer.

A \$66,000 gift from the estate of former psychology professor Katherine Omwake was given to supplement a scholarship in her name. Omwake served ASC for 43 years.

John M. and Martha Boone Shaver '41 made a stock gift valued at \$24,750 which is being used to establish a scholarship in memory of her parents, Dr. and Mrs. E.B. Boone Jr.

A portion of a centennial gift given by Louise Isaacson Bernard '46 was used to purchase a gate for the Lawrence L. Jr. and Mary Duckworth Gellerstedt '46 Track and Field and for other materials and equipment for the Woodruff Physical Activities Center, valued at \$25,000.

"They'll Always Be With Me"

HOLLY BENNETT RIELLY '77 HAS SURVIVED THREE KIDNEY TRANSPLANTS WITH HELP FROM HER BROTHER AND SISTER

n the night before surgery would write my will, a love letter to my husband, and a letter to my family. Luckily I never needed them, recalls Holly Bennett Rielly '77 This was a soul-searching pre-lude to Rielly's third kidney transplant on Dec. 9, 1992 Although her first two transplanted kidneys, donated by her brother and sister, are mere silent occupants

of Rielly's body today, to the recipient they remain as evidence of her siblings' love. The realization of that love

and the past experience of two transplants helped pull Rielly through her third—this organ was rescued from a cadaver. "I was optimistic and considered myself lucky for [making it] through what I did," explains Rielly. "I am an optimistic person anyway.

During the wait between kidneys, Rielly went through bloodcleansing dialysis three days a week. "Since I have diabetes, it complicates things," says Rielly. "I can only wait about a year for a kidney while using this dialysis treatment." Dialysis cleans the blood, but not as well as a kidney. For some, the transplanted kidney functions 20 to 25 years, but diabetes shortened Rielly's kidney life to about six years. So while her outlook remains positive, Rielly feels some ambivalence about enduring a possible fourth transplant: "I don't know if my body could endure it."

The third transplant, done in Pittsburgh, was preceded by a six-month wait—a virus kept Rielly from receiving the first available kidney. "I was heart-broken about being rejected."

But within 10 days another strong, more compatible kidney was available. With it came the introduction of the new drug SK-506 into her system. An immuno-suppressant, SK-506 is designed to prohibit the body's immune system from attacking the (foreign) transplanted organ. "Hopefully with this drug, I'll do better longer," says Rielly, who had some nurses training just prior to her first kidney transplant.

Aside from the obvious physical challenges a transplant presents, the cost factor is staggering. In the dozen years since her first transplants, the cost has

risen from \$36,000 to \$97,000. In 1970, to Rielly's advantage, the National Kidney Foundation of Georgia (an organization in which Rielly is active) convinced the U.S. Senate to accept renal patients on Medicare.

Rielly has stood three times at the precipice between life and death and survived. From this perspective she has accepted the experiences as opportunities for spiritual growth. "My belief in God is much stronger now. He's not going to let me down." She feels as though God won't give her more than she can bear.

Rielly, who has gained so much time and life from donated organs seized the opportunity to turn the tables "of a sort" six years ago when her husband died and Rielly ensured the donation of his organs. Upon her husband's death and with the donations of her two siblings, 15 people have been kept alive. "I would like to thank my family for their unending love and support. What greater support could they give than my brother and sister donating their organs. They'll always be





An April 26 editorial in the "Agnes Scott News" bemoans the negative effects of the "new" rushed cafeteria dining on students' manners: "When we stop and think after such a meal, what have we really gained besides a little time? We have not added anything to the enjoyment of others, or to the general atmosphere of the dining room, or to the health of ourselves."

DUNWODY '52 OFFERS PHYSICAL, EMOTIONAL SUPPORT

To a terminally ill patient living at home, a kind word, a listening ear or a

word, a listening comforting presence will go a long way toward making that difficult experience easier. Ann Herman Dunwody '52 does just that through Hospice of Central Georgia, centered in Macon. The hospice program — from the Middle Ages versions that were way stations for weary travelers —

evolved into today's version that offers support and assistance (physical, social, emotional and spiritual) for those on the journey from this life to the next.

As a hospice advocate,
Dunwody's activities include
friendly visits, errand running,
supportive help to the patient
and the patient's family, and
emotional counseling for the
patient's family and friends up

to one year after the patient's death.

Dunwody has been a volun-

teer since the program's inception in July 1983 with the help of a seed grant from the Medical Center of Central Georgia. Dunwody says her own personal experience with a dying family member motivated her to volunteer. "My mother had died of cancer. It was not long afterward."

was not long afterward that I began reading about the hospice movement. I saw the need and when our program got started in Macon, I volunteered for the first class of advocates. When they talked about the program I thought, 'This is something I could do.' Having gone through the experience, I thought I could help others who were going through this."

Mead '82 Chooses Home Birth

BABY BORN IN SOFT GLOW OF CANDLELIGHT

organ Holliday Mead came into the world on Nov. 2, 1993, in his mother's own bed, amidst the glow of candles and flashlights, with his father, a midwife and attendant (both neighbors) on hand for the delivery. "I wanted to give my baby the chance to come into the world in the best possible environment—at home surrounded only by those who love him the most," said mother Susan Mead '82 of her home birthing experience in Floyd County, Va.

Despite some complications that required the new mother to be hospitalized for two days, Mead considers the experience a very positive one and says she never lost confidence in those she selected to attend at the birth. She expressed her gratitude at finding a doctor who accepted her choice and was willing to backup the midwife as necessary. She quickly adds that Baby Morgan was never admitted to the hospital. Rather, he and his father stayed with Mead as visitors.

"The only thing I might do differently is to be closer to the hospital," says Mead, an assistant professor of sociology at Radford University. "We live 30 minutes away, but we have friends who are much closer. Next time, I might decide to have the baby at their house just in case."

Mead's decision to have her child at home was based on her overall lifestyle as part of an alternative community that focuses on being closer to the land and life's natural cycles. Mead's home, with no electricity, required the light of candles and flashlights at the 9:35 p.m. birthing of Morgan. The bottom line, concludes Mead, is that, "It is nice and important to have the technology at our fingertips if we need it, but we have gotten away from using our intuition and innate abilities to do what our bodies were designed to do.



Senior Class Campaign Surpasses 50 Percent

CLASS OF 1994 BREAKS RECORD IN SENIOR CLASS GIVING

s the class of 1994 prepares to graduate, it continues to leave its mark on Agnes Scott College. As of February, over 53 percent of the class (64 women) had contributed to the annual Senior Class Campaign. If all pledges are collected, the class of 1994 will contribute over \$7,300 to the annual fund. The 53 percent participation marks the highest level since the senior campaign began in 1989. Over the last five years, the participation rates for graduating classes have averaged only 32 percent, and the classes of 1992 and 1993 saw participation drop to 20 percent and 24 percent, respec tively. According to Molly Dohm, assistant director of the Annual Fund, who oversaw this year's campaign, the attributed to a change in the way the senior campaign was conducted. Previously, the "campaign" consisted of one letter sent by the vice president of development and public affairs to all seniors in March of their final year. The letter and the enclosed pledge card requested a donation to the annual fund with little explanation of what the fund was or why it existed. The resulting participation levels fell far short of those experienced by comparative institutions such as Randolph-Macon Woman's

College or Hollins College. Last year, Dohm conducted research on colleges and universities with populations and giving programs similar to those of Agnes Scott and determined that many students did not understand the importance or function of the annual fund. She concluded that involving students in the annual drive made the process more accessible to the very individuals the campaign is designed to reach. Armed with this information and a list of seniors, Dohm met with then Vice President for Development and Public Affairs Bonnie Johnson and Dean of Students Gué Hudson. Together, the three selected student leaders whose interests and participation recommended them as candidates to ject. Seniors Britt Brewton and Tiffany Goodman were selected as co-chairs of a committee consisting of LePret Dickinson, Julie Dykes, Ginger Frix, Laura Horne, Elena Paras, Jackie Postma, Sara Sabo, Cristina Santana and Nancy Zehl. According to Goodman, participating in the campaign was an enjoyable experience because it was easy. "Molly was well organized and efficient," says Goodman. "She wanted to be finished [with the bulk of the work] by Thanksgiving, and we were."

At the beginning of fall semester, a letter from Brewton and Goodman was sent to all seniors. Each committee member was then assigned a small list of seniors to contact personally. To further involve the class, the committee held a kick-off party, "Senior Study Break," on Sept. 29, 1993. The class was treated to snacks, episodes of "Beverly Hills 90210" and "Melrose Place" as well as a presentation from Holly Markwalter '86, alumnae fund chair, cousin of Marianna Markwalter '94. During January, the Alumnae Board hosted an appreciation party for those who have pledged. At the end of the year, a thank-you party will be held for the committee members and the up-to-date list of participants will be recognized at the annual "Senior Dinner' sponsored by the Alumnae Association.

The campaign's goal of 75 percent participation matches the goals set by the 25th and 50th reunion classes. While the goal has not yet been met, Dohm says that the class of 1994 is doing very well compared to the other challenge classes. Last year's 50th reunion class saw 73 percent of its class donate while the 25th reunion class came in with a 51 percent participation. —Teresa Marie Kelly '94

Giving Society Formed

ASC ALUMNAE AND FRIENDS ARE AMONG THE 90 CHARTER MEMBERS

ore than 90 alumnae, faculty, trustees and I friends of Agnes Scott have become charter members of the Frances Winship Walters Society. The new giving society is named for Walters a member of the class of 1896 and a trustee for 17 years who because of her own generous bequests has been called "the second founder of Agnes Scott.

While opportunities for membership in the society are ongoing, charter membership closes Dec. 31

Founded earlier this year, the Frances Winship Walters Society is designed to recognize those who support Agnes Scott through planned gifts such as trusts, bequests, retirement accounts or charitable life income plans, explains Jean Stroman, director of planned giving for the College.

According to Stroman, just as the College benefits from these gifts, donors may benefit in various ways: tax-free income, estate tax savings, income tax deductions and capital gains avoidance.

"Too often, generous gifts entrusted to the College have gone unrecognized because they came at the end of the donors' lives," explains Stroman. "The Society provides a way for us to thank donors during their lifetimes."

Among charter members of the society is Belle Miller McMaster '53 who gave a deferred charitable gift annuity. "We decided this would be a great way to plan for our retirement and provide a significant gift to the College," she says.

Stroman encourages friends of the College to add their legacies to that of Society namesake Frances Winship Walters whose dream was for Agnes Scott to become an institution equal to any woman's college in the nation. Her many gifts, which ranged from a scholarship to building construction, culminated with a bequest at her death in 1954 of \$4.25 million—more than doubling the endowment at that time. Today Frances Winship Walter's gift is worth almost \$150 million.



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An Actress Quakes

NANCY CHARLES '65 CHEATS DEATH NEAR THE CITY OF ANGELS

can't say my life flashed before me at 4:31 a.m. on ▲ Jan. 17, but part of my mind was searching for the rewind button. I am a professional actress and live with my husband Michael and 7-year-old son Will in Santa Monica, Calif. It was in that early hour that the earth literally moved under our feet—or our beds

At the first loud BANG of the 6.6 Northridge earthquake, Michael and I shot up in bed. "It's an earthquake," I said. No kidding. We remembered later that we both sat there for a few seconds, thinking it would stop as it had in the powerful Landers quake the year before. But this one didn't. It ebbed only momentarily, then rolled and shook. My husband leapt up to get Will from his room, only to be thrown to his knees by the vibrations. (He sustained rug burns from the crawl down the pitching hallway.) Will shot out of his room crying and clung to my husband. We huddled in a door jamb as the shuddering alternated between "reasonably violent" and "unreasonably violent.

We heard glass breaking in the kitchen and living room, pictures flying from the walls, and bookcases crashing. Will sputtered and whimpered and Michael and I, in the face of gross evidence to the contrary,

kept repeating, "It's all right, Will. It's all right." The house was pitch-black from power failure. As we shook and prayed and clung to each other, I devoutly wished I had heeded earlier earthquake survival advice. There we stood: no shoes ... no flashlights ... scanty night wear. When our building had been rattled like a can of Tinker Toys for nearly a full minute, we scrambled in the dark for clothing. Dressing proved difficult. Our child was Super Glued to us. As we raced past the kitchen to the front door, Michael, now holding our son, wondered, "Why does Will smell like Scotch?" The liquor cabinet was in puddles and shards.

Outside, the neighborhood was flashlighted and Walkmanned to the max. I met some neighbors for the first time since moving to California two years ago. It became a sort of "High and the Mighty" bonding experience, everybody comparing experiences of life on the edge. Smoke billowed from the grocery store two blocks away. A kind of New Age masseuse from the next door could be heard: "We must think positively. We can change the future if we try. We can eliminate future quakes with our minds." O.K

After two hours of warmth and reassurance and everyone accounted for, survivors reluctantly straggled back inside, not-

ing debris to be dispatched tomorrow, and wall cracks, like ominous fingers, silently warning. Some slept in cars in the open; Michael, Will and I all climbed in bed

together and dozed between aftershocks. Later, we would find a pay phone that worked and call relatives to assure them we were alive and well and possibly reconsidering our career goals. Often that first day, we would catch each other staring into space, trying to perceive order in the aftermath of a 6.6 Richter quake.

Over the next three days, adrenaline pumped with each new tremor as we cleaned and reorganized—a job usually reserved for invading relatives. The apartment looks grand, utilities are once again in service, and hot showers are a daily occurrence—at least for the grown-ups. (Will reveled in the absence of THAT nightly ritual.) In fact, it is probably the children who adjust most readily in these situations. Only hours after the initial quake, Will, on his way to the bathroom, asked matter-of-factly if we thought there might be a 5.0 aftershock

while he was in there. If so, he wouldn't shut the door so he could seek the safety of a door jamb.

But for me, something has changed fundamentally. The earth—that orb so dear to the poet's heart, kissed by the Pope, seen from space as so touchingly and beautifully alone—had been shaken. Everything seems more tentative and precious now. But I must confess, in the middle of the chaos, when our very lives shook like thunder, the thought that passed through my mind was, "Where's my lipstick?" Ah, Vanity. One great propelling force of mankind. Or at least of one actress cheating death near the City of Angels. And not a locust in sight ... yet.

The Alumnae Association Board's strategic planning consultant had some valid points: We don't take sufficient pride in our accomplishments. We receive financial support from 41 percent of our alumnae. We're able to attract 700 to our Alumnae 'Weekend festivities. These are significant figures. So why don't we feel good about it? What keeps us from touting our achievements?

Do our constant efforts to seek a higher standard make us forget that we are already very good? Is it because we, as women, have been conditioned not to brag on ourselves or claim credit? What makes us seem to focus on our shortcomings instead of our triumphs? How can we allow ourselves to take sufficient pride?

When we look at Agnes Scott in relation to all institutions of higher learning which face the same demographic changes and budget constraints, only then do we realize how fortunate ASC is to have the alumnae support, financial resources and renovated physical plant that we enjoy.

The achievements of our alumnae are made clear to me each time I sit down with the Awards Committee to select

recipients of the Outstanding Alumnae Awards. As the committee works through files and nominations (roughly 50 names per year) a powerful combination of pride and humility overwhelms the group. The accomplishments of the women who have passed through these gates inspire each of us who has shared the same collegiate

experience.

It should be a surprise to no one that our levels of participation are high—both in giving and in attendance at Alumnae Weekend. Over the last five years our average participation in the Annual Fund has been 41 percent, ranking ASC above the national average for private liberal arts colleges and about midway on a list of schools with whom we compare ourselves. If all the alumnae who have ever given to the annual fund contributed in one year, we would have 76 percent participation and lead the nation! That would really give us reason to feel sufficient pride.

Their senior class campaign for the annual fund has already reached 51 percent; their goal is 75 percent. Perhaps they will help us reach that dream of being the top college in the country in percentage of participation! In their midst we will also find talented, intelligent and thoughtful women who will make us very proud. Watch for them; they will be coming your way soon—and will give us reason to feel more-than-

have spent many volunteer and teacher days leading non-profit organizations through the strategic planning process, emphasizing the importance of self-evaluation and of writing down in a systematic plan all the hopes and dreams of an organization.

Two years ago, as I became president of our Alumnae Association, it seemed terribly important to me and to the association board that we develop a strategic plan for the association, which would dovetail with the College's own strategic plan, set two years ago. We have covered much ground thanks to the encouragement and financial support of President Ruth Schmidt, the tireless efforts of Lucia Sizemore and her staff, the wise counsel of Faye Allen Sisk and her Strategic Planning Committee and to the insightful feedback of alumnae from across the nation. As we gather in late April for Alumnae Weekend, we will share the plan which will take the association into the next century.

Yet as I write this final article, my reflections are centered more on Agnes Scott's ability to educate the whole person, to shape many women to come as it has shaped us. Even now as I relay the importance of strategic planning, I know that a good plan requires flexibility, that is, change. The specific manner in which a plan is implemented or the degree to which it is implemented will depend upon the willingness of our successors to

ask tough questions, to admit their strengths, work on their weaknesses and push forward toward positive change. I have believed this for a long time, and I have experienced the richness of self-development through a personal difficulty of the last year.

I had planned to share what remained of our teenage sons' rearing with my husband, to bring closure to our muchenjoyed careers, then to move to the mountains together to grow vegetables, ride horses, raise Golden Retriever puppies and marvel at the sunsets. This was our "strategic plan" for later life. But it was not to be. With June came some unexpected terrifying words and finally-admitted truths, bringing to a tragic and unnecessary end 25 years of shared experience. Faced with a life-plan that was no longer viable, I leaned heavily on the love of family and friends as I confronted the fears and uncertainties one faces when shaken to the inner core. I asked tough questions about myself and my needs, sought out answersthough some were painful, celebrated the positives of my life and began to glimpse at a revised dream that is healthy and whole. While family and friends continue to provide me with the foundation of love and concern, Agnes Scott and other life experiences are giving me the mindpower and heart-power to forge ahead down a new trail.

As I leave the association as its president, I am proud of all our hard work to put together a sound strategic plan. Yet what speaks to me the loudest at this time in my life is the richness of the Agnes Scott experience that ignites in each of us a deep, lifelong desire to grow and learn. Thank you, Agnes Scott; you taught me to seek truth and to demand answers; you have, therefore, helped me to change through easy times and hard

Agnes Scott has again surpassed its Annual Fund goal, set at \$1,204,125 for 1993-94.
Gifts received totaled \$1,219,173, exceeding the goal by \$15,048.
Excluding bequests, gifts totaled \$1,104,034, up from \$1,027,173 for the 1992-93 school year.

Alumnae contributed \$730,504 toward the 1993-94 total, surpassing their goal of \$625,000 by \$105,504. The percentage of alumnae giving was 38.1 percent, only slightly lower than the 1992-93 participation

The ASC Annual Fund is an essential source of unrestricted funds for the College operating budget. These funds support daily operations such as student scholarships, library resources, salaries, energy costs, general physical plant maintenance, campus programs and other important activities.

Interim President Named

SALLY MAHONEY, FORMER ASSOCIATE PROVOST AT STANFORD, TO SERVE ASC

Sally Mahoney, senior associate provost emerita at Stanford University, has been appointed interim president of Agnes Scott College, Board of Trustees Chair Joseph R. Gladden Jr., announced Aug. 11. Mahoney will assume her duties on Aug. 22.

Building on a history of stability, yet moving to meet the needs of a changing and vital institution for women, the Trustees appointed Mahoney, who brings 30 years of experience in private higher education, to prepare the College for the arrival of a new president pext year.

arrival of a new president next year.

Mahoney held a variety of administrative posts at Stanford in the years after she joined the university's dean of students staff.

She moved into the provost's office to lead the academic support and student services programs. She secured a \$450,000 annual commitment of univer-

sity funds for classrooms, served as university registrar, chaired the committee of deans concerned with undergraduate policy, and was involved in Stanford's widely-reported strategic planning process to reduce expenses while enhancing accountability and effectiveness. Other areas of responsibility included residential education, fund raising, faculty appointments management, admissions and financial aid, and faculty committees on academic policy.

Gladden expressed delight in Mahoney's selection. "Agnes Scott is currently engaged in a number of important projects that will build on our traditional strengths to sharpen the focus of the College to educate the leaders of the 21st century. Sally Mahoney brings a wealth of experience to lead us through this process. We are delighted that she will be with us."

Mahoney shares Gladden's vision. "There are aspects of Agnes Scott that resonate with my own experience," she said. "I think that we can come quickly to work together, laying creative foundations for transition to permanent College leadership. I am grateful for the opportunity to make a leadership contribution to ASC at so important a time."

A 1961 honor graduate of San Francisco College for Women with a degree in English, Mahoney pursued graduate study in English at Stanford as a Woodrow Wilson Fellow in 1961-64. She received an M.S. in management from the Sloan Program at the Stanford Graduate School of Business in 1993.



\$100,000 WILL AID CATALOG AUTOMATION

In June, the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations of Jacksonville, Fla., announced approval of a grant of \$100,000 for Agnes Scott College to help fund the McCain Library automation project. Automation of the library holdings catalog, which will cost an estimated \$300,000, is one component of the campus-wide \$5.1 million Information Technology Enhancement Program (ITEP), which will provide a comprehensive computer network throughout the College and link ASC with institutions around the world.

The Foundations award grants to educational, cultural, science and religious institutions, that demonstrate financial strength, with a preponderance of gifts in 1994 being directed toward private higher education, hospice, healthcare, religion, public television and secondary education.

The Foundations have awarded ASC grants in the past: a \$100,000 grant in 1989 during the Centennial Campaign for renovation of the Dana Fine Arts Building, and a \$50,000 grant in 1977 for renovation of the board room in McCain Library. The most recent grant will be put to use in the 1994-95 fiscal year.

In addition to this grant for

ITEP, the College earlier received a \$1 million grant from The Lettie Pate Evans Foundation, Inc., and a \$75,000 grant from The Tull Charitable Foundation, Inc., of Atlanta. Both The Coca-Cola Company and IBM Matching Grant Program have provided computer systems for ASC.

Astrophysical Intern

WHITE ONE OF 12 STUDENTS IN SMITHONIAN PROGRAM

Jenny White '95, of Stone Mountain, Ga., was one of 12 students selected nationwide for a summer research intern program sponsored by the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass.

White spent 10 weeks analyzing data from satellite-borne X-ray telescopes to determine the brightness, energy level and distance of X-ray objects seen near the center of the Miller Way galaxy.

Admission Update

FIRST-YEAR CLASS UP AFTER "FOCUSED" RECRUITING

The entering class of first-year students for fall 1994 stands at 150 as of July 28, up from 139 at same time last summer. The yield for this fall's entering class thus far, figured from the number of applicants who become enrolled students, is 43 percent. Last fall's yield was 39 percent. In 1967 the yield was the highest in 25 years, 70 percent.

Acting Director of Admission Stephanie Balmer suggests this fall's large entering class is the result of purposeful recruitment methods employed by the admission office. "We have produced a much more focused approach in the recruitment of students seeking a private education. The personalization of the recruitment efforts on the part of the admission staff has again played a significant role in this year's success."

Slightly less certain are the head counts for Return-to-College students and transfer students who make fall college decisions later in the summer. Current response levels indicate that numbers for both of those groups should hold constant in the coming year.

Travel Blitz'94

ASC STAFF TO VISIT ALUMNAE, STUDENTS, CORPORATIONS IN 15 CITIES

The development, alumnae and public relations offices are joining efforts with the admission office in a 15-city blitz of the Southeast during September, October and November. During two- to three-day visits, development staff will be visiting individual alumnae and making calls on corporations and foundations in appropriate cities, as well as co-hosting alumnae meetings with the alumnae office staff. The admission office will be attending college fairs, making high school visits and hosting dessert and discussion gatherings for potential students and their parents. The public relations office is proposing a two-week print advertising campaign to precede the visits.

The purpose of the ASC travel blitz is to coordinate efforts of the outreach programs of the college in cities which have traditionally produced a strong admissions pool.

The 15 cities, targeted by the admission office, are Atlanta, Chattanooga, Columbus, Jacksonville, Knoxville, Macon, Memphis, Miami, Nashville, Orlando, Pensacola, Tampa, Thomasville/Tallahassee, Tri-Cities (Tn.) and Valdosta.

ASC Re-accredited

SACS REAFFIRMS COLLEGE'S "FIRST-CLASS" STATUS

gnes Scott College received notification on July 1, from the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, that the SACS Committee on Criteria and Reports has "recommended reaffirmation of accreditation" with a request for a follow-up report from the College by May 1, 1995, addressing the visiting committee's recommendations.

"We are glad that we have been reaffirmed in our accreditation but we were not surprised because we are a first-class institution," says Sarah R. Blanshei, dean of the College.

"Of the original 18 recommendations that were made to the committee, our responses to five of them [submitted May 15] were satisfactory. We still have 13 to address.
"Many of the 13 recommendations were

identified in Agnes Scott's own Self Study."

The committee made recommendations in the areas of institutional purpose; planning and evaluation; undergraduate completion requirements; undergraduate instruction; criteria and procedures for evaluation; scope and accountability; student government, student activities and publications; student records; organization and administration; administrative organization; financial resources; and facilities master plan.

"They will be keeping a close eye on us because they felt we had not addressed some of the recommendations that were made in the past," adds Blanshei, who chaired the College's Self Study Steering Committee.

To the 13th International Congress of Anthropological and Ethnological Sciences in Mexico, D.F., from July 29 to August 4, 1993, she presented, "La Tenencia de la Tierra en Oaxaca, Mexico. Conclusiones, Preliminares sobre el Impacto de la Reforma a la Ley Agraria." Rees presented on April 22-23, 1993, to the Society for Economic Anthropology in Durham, N.C., "Household Dynamics in Crisis: Women's Work, Migration and Craft Strategies in the Central Valleys of Oaxaca, 1960-1990." March 10-12, 1993, she presented "Mi Tierrita: Land Tenure and Use in Oaxaca, Mexico" to the Society for Applied Anthropology in San Antonio, Texas.

REGINE REYNOLDS-CORNELL, Adeline Arnold Loridans Professor of French and department chair, was hon-

ored recently at a performance of an operetta dedicated to her, which was written and performed by French majors and minors in the presence of the Consul General of France and the Cultural Attache of the French Embassy. She participated in round-table discussions at the Sorbonne, Paris, May 26 and June 2, sponsored by the Societe d'Etudes de Seizieme Siecle. Reynolds-Cornell attended a colloquium on the Guises, June 3 and 4, sponsored by the same society, at the University of Reims. Reynolds-Cornell published a book review on Old Comedy in the French Renaissance in the May edition of The French Review.

Turning Points

A PERSON'S INFLUENCE CAN EXTEND FURTHER THAN EXPECTED . . . EVEN TO THE DOORS OF COLLEGE

he woman sits shyly across the desk from me. Her baby girl gently bounces on her knee; a son squirms in the chair next to her. In Spanish, I ask for the documents which verify her address and authorization to work in the United States. She digs in her handbag for the papers.

My friend told me you have employment services here. I have two children and my husband is in Mexico. I want to work as a

housekeeper.

She describes her difficult reality very matter of factly. I try to avert my sympathy that surfaces as pools rimming my eyes. My mind wanders to a more personal situation 14 years ago when my mother, Cila, a new arrival from the Philippines, was in the same "seat" as this young woman, though in Chattanooga, Tenn., amid the sound of crying babies and the fetid scent of building mildew.

We would like to help you Mrs. Balais, but you have to be 55 years old to work at Senior Neighbors. We could use your help as a volunteer.

Mother's broken English was peppered with pride: "I can't work for nothing Mrs. Raymo. I have two girls.'

While Mother's job search continued, the family took refuge in an old church nursery.

Cila cleaned the church in return for God's and the priest's help. For two months, as she dusted every pew, I explored the dark corners behind the altar and welcomed the compassionate eyes of an onlooking Jesus. My sister stayed at my mother's heels or slept between the pews drawing an occasional blessing from Father Rudissill. The mysteries of the dark church fed my imagination; I created spirit playmates and guardians.

Mother soon found us a small, dilapidated house on Eleanor Street where she used her magical green thumb to grow a flower garden out front. This was our home for about

A turning point came in

1980 when a petite, whitehaired Virginia Wing Powe arrived at our house in her big car. She gave Mother a job. Power and her husband lived in a beautiful home surrounded by a "Garden of Eden." Many good things began there—a new life, a new love for existence. My sister and I delighted in playing

there while Mother worked. Mrs. Power introduced us to Mother Goose, to learning of many kinds, and to Agnes Scott College.

She was a recipient of an ASC Outstanding Alumnae Award and her award hung at

the foot of the stairs. I stared at it often. In 1990, with the help and encouragement of the owers, I found myself at t doorstep of her alma mater. I too became a "Scottie," walking on the same brick walkways, becoming familiar with the same old buildings, memorizing the ghost stories about Main and Dana, and loving the view from my Rebekah window. Professors became mentors and friends. I would have four years of limitless, never-ending growth that began between those church pews in Chattanooga and in the Powers' Garden of Eden.

My thoughts return to my

own work of today, to the voice of the woman I am interviewing. She is looking for her Garden of Eden T feelings are familiar to me and in recognizing them in this cycle of life, I'm back where I started, but this time I'm sitting on the other side of the social worker's desk. We review job leads and I give her three referrals.

She is my last client for the day. I will look forward to the ride home, the time to think in traffic, to count my blessings.



FOUR ASC GRADS HONORED FOR OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENTS

Juliana McKinley Winters '72 Distinguished Service to the College

A lawyer, political leader and loyal alumna, Juliana Winters has served Agnes Scott in a wide variety of capacities: class

president, president of the Washington, D.C alumnae chapter, president of the alumnae association and member of the College's board of trustees. During her tenure as alumnae association president, she wrote memo-

"president's columns" in alumnae publications, short essays that were gems of brevity, clarity of thought and wit—characteristics she has demonstrated in all her collegerelated positions.

In 1987, Winters helped establish the "Distinguished Centennial Lecturer" program at Agnes Scott, with the post filled by former First Lady Rosalynn Carter, a friend

of Winters.

After graduation from Emory University law school in 1977, Winters worked for 10 years in the U.S. Department of Transportation and at the Civil Aeronautics Board. In 1987, she returned to Atlanta to continue her career in aviation law at the Federal Aviation Administration.

Virginia Milner Carter '40 Distinguished Career

In 1990, at an age when many women retire, Virginia Carter became national sales director and vice president of one of America's largest insurance companies. She trains 8,000 sales representatives in 45 states and 5 Canadian provinces, and has under her supervision more than 100,000 people.

After service with several small insurance companies and a stint with the Navy in World War II, Carter helped found an insurance marketing company in 1977. It grew steadily until 1987, when it merged with Primerica Financial Services, one of

the nation's largest financial services companies.

Throughout her career, Carter has been a primary supporter for her four children, adroitly juggling her responsibilities as business leader and mother.



She has also found time to be an active member of her church and a dedicated alumna of Agnes Scott, serving as a church elder and hosting reunions for her classmates. Writes one alumna, "Virginia uses her college experience in business and her business experience in the service of her college."

Susan Elizabeth Lowance '55 Distinguished Career

Combining academic discipline with business practice and theory, Susan Lowance directs the program for senior executives at Massachusetts

Institute of Technology, among the nation's most prestigious such seminars. She also directs MIT's year-long MBA for executives.

American business schools are conducted by men. She is the first woman to hold the position she occupies at MIT, where enrollment of women in both programs remains at only five percent.

Before assuming her current post, Lowance served for 10 years as director of the Smith College management program, offering management development for women executives only. Both at Smith and MIT, she finds that her tasks include marketing the program to employers and trying to increase the enrollment of women participants.

Virginia Love Dunaway '56 Distinguished Community Service

One of seven "women of achievement" in Memphis, Virginia Dunaway has solved a glaring problem, despite apathy and ignorance surrounding her. She is founder and executive director of the Memphis Food Bank, a clearing house that, by the time of her retirement in 1991, was annually distributing five million pounds of unsalable but wholesome, usable food to 300 charitable feeding programs across the Mid-South.

Dunaway married while at Agnes Scott. Following graduation, she and her husband moved to Memphis, where she reared two sons and, at

times, worked in her physician husband's office. In 1977, Dunaway became a VISTA volunteer assigned to the Metropolitan Inter-Faith Association. When MIFA sent her to a training session on food banks in 1980, she immediately saw how valuable such a facility could be for Memphis.

Persuading wholesale distributors, processors, retail stores, brokers and warehouses to cooperate with the new food bank, she raised funds for its operation and worked out procedures for collection and distribution.

Resigning in 1991 because of additional family responsibilities, Dunaway now works part-time as a consultant for the Second Harvest National Food Bank Network, monitoring food banks across the country.

In addition to her work in helping feed the nation's hungry, Dunaway has served as an elder in her church, participated at the presbytery level as an educational consultant, been a teacher's aid and hospital volunteer. Currently serving on her church's congregational care committee, she looks forward to participating in a new church program for homeless women and children, scheduled to begin next year.

Multi-hued Gifts for God

ASC ALUMNA HAS DEVOTED HER LIFE TO USING ART TO TELL THE GOSPEL

argaret "Peggy" Van Hook Swayze '47, a petite woman, uses a cane to balance herself as she walks carefully, although with a sprightly step, across the Agnes Scott quad. She hasn't been on campus in 47 years and marvels at its changes—the gymnasium is now the Alston Student Center, the stables are gone and to her surprise, there is an entire building devoted to art, Swayze's own passion and lifeblood.

Since leaving Agnes Scott, Swayze has used her art as a means of "telling the story of the Lord." She has painted, sketched and sculpted depictions of Adam and Eve, the Psalms, the Old Testament prophecies of Isaiah, Moses and the Ten Commandments, parables, the miracles of Christ and other Biblical stories in oils, stained glass and wood. Much of her stained glass (the artist's dominant medium), housed in St. Anne's Episcopal Church in Atlanta, is contemporary and strikingly colorful in its narrative. With each window, Swayze often shares her personal insight—bringing a degree of uniqueness to standard scriptural interpretations.

The Rev. John Rabb, rector of St. Anne's, agrees. "Her art is very expressive and gives a powerful image to each story." He points out a nativity window in which Swayze included a mother cat and kittens in the manger scene. "Every time I see that I see a regeneration of life that is not often captured in art."

Using an abstract expressionist style, Swayze has fashioned stained glass for 21 churches across the country. At St. Anne's, a church designed by her architect husband, she has created the majority of the sanctuary windows. Swayze and her husband were among St. Anne's founding members more than 39 years ago.

Each glass work takes about six weeks to com-

plete, depending on the complexity of the design and installation, and can cost as much as \$30,000.

"This is my gift from the Lord to the people. I'm just a tool and I'm grateful for it," she says of her work's inspiration. "The Lord has never falled me."

While at Agnes Scott, Swayze studied psychology and art and eventually earned a certificate in interior design from Parsons School of Design in New York. She continued to study art techniques at New York University, the University of Georgia and Georgia State University.

"When I was at Agnes Scott they offered the very best in education but not a lot of freedom of thought," remembers Swayze. "Back then it was much more structured than it is now but the quality of education was deeper and wider than any I had experienced before. Maybe that is partly where I learned my discipline."

That's how she describes herself as an artist—disciplined—much like a carpenter. Her regime: work for a couple of hours in the morning, break, then work for a couple of hours in the afternoon. Swayze pursues her work deliberately not waiting for "motivation" or "inspiration" each day—once an idea takes root she tackles it head on until it's completed.

Outside of her work for the church, Swayze also freelance designs using mosaic and breeds whippets and Afghan hounds with her husband and daughter. But being an artist is all Swayze has known. She recalls the time her grandmother placed her in her lap and told her matter of factly that God loved her and she would grow up to be an artist. "I always believed what she told me. Knowing what I was destined to do has made life a little easier," she laughs.



Don't Dare Duggan

ASC ALUMNA COUNTS HER OUTDOOR EXPERIENCES AS A PLUS WITH HER JOB WITH THE SCOUTS . . . "BOY SCOUTS" THAT IS

The things I'm most proud of have originated on a dare," says energetic Duggan Lansing '83, director of public relations for the North Atlanta Council of the Boy Scouts of America. When the Alabama native set out to look for a job in 1985, following a brief and "frightful" foray in retail sales, she caught wind of the Scouts job.

"I was interviewing with an ad agency and asked them what type of volunteer work they did. The interviewer said they did some work for the Boy Scouts. He paused and said, 'They're looking to hire a PR person, but, never mind, they're looking for a bright young man with a journalism background.' That was all it took," remembers Lansing, "I felt I'd been dared."

To apply for the job, she took her first name, Nancy, off her résumé. "I made Agnes Scott College as small a type as possible, and listed every outdoor experience I ever had," explains the tall, rangy woman who has climbed Mount Rainier, run five marathons, and done her share of skiing, rafting and SCUBA diving. "I was set afire by the fact that they thought only a male with a journalism major could do the job." Competing with three men, Lansing began a push for the PR job, chipping away at management's resistance, arguing: "I may not be an Eagle Scout; I may not be a journalism major, but I can write; and I have an objective view of the Scouts.'

She sold them.

"When I started out eight years ago, my job was strictly communications and public relations," Duggan says. "Right now, 50 percent of my job is public relations and the other 50 percent is fund-raisers. Each year I've asked for a little more . . a piece of a banquet . . . the annual golf tournament."

This summer Duggan and her husband, John, who also works for the Scouts, spent eight weeks in Blairsville, Ga., at scout camp. Duggan was the business manager.

"She has been a tremendous asset to the scouting movement," says Penny Jones, director of support services for the Atlanta Area Council, "and she brings a fresh approach to it. She hit the ground running."

hen Duggan isn't promoting the Boy Scouts or planning her next adventure, she and John volunteer. She spends one night a month at a women's shelter; together they spend frequent Sunday mornings preparing breakfast for the homeless at First Presbyterian Church of Atlanta. Duggan is also active in the Junior League of Atlanta, recently organizing the entire recycling effort for Super Bowl 1994. "I think the Junior League needs more women who have climbed mountains and run marathons. I think it's full of women who can but haven't."

The never-say-dare Lansing leans forward to listen carefully to questions before answering with candor, her expressive hands punctuating responses. Her husband is gentle stillness and strength, the perfect foil for her spark and hyperactivity. Explaining his wife's appetite for adventure, John says, "She does the things she does because she is absolutely terrified of being vanilla."

Whatever her choices, they have never been boring.

The Mount Rainier climb, instigated in 1987, included Lansing and five companions who were part of a group of two dozen climbers. They covered 10,000 feet up the slope the first day. After eating an early din-

ner, the guides sent everyone to bed to resume climbing early the next morning. They slept on shelves (three to a shelf) built in the wall of a "smokehouse-type building—it smelled like dirty, old socks."

The next day, a guide monitoring the health of Lansing and the others, thought Lansing showed signs of altitude sick ness. Lansing rallied, continued the climb, and was on the first rope team that took the summit later that day. "I ran across the crater to the box [where a log book of climbers' name is kept], exhausted but adrenaline pumping, and signed the book. dedicated the climb to Mama. I think I spent most of the descent sliding down on my butt." Within hours she was planning her next challenge—a marathon.

ansing's sense of adventure grew, in part, out of her rural upbringing on her family's Midway Plantation, a working farm named for its position on the Alabama River midway between Mobile and Montgomery. There, near the town of Catherine, Nancy Duggan Childers learned to drive by age 11, "as soon as I understood about shifting gears and could see over the steering wheel"; command the family workhorse, Dammit; hunt alongside her father; and water ski on the bordering river.

Perhaps it was also this upbringing that prepared her for the challenges of her junior year of high school.

She attended Chatham Hall, a girls' boarding school in Danville, Va., and that fall her mother died. Suddenly Lansing was forced to handle homesickness and grief. She remembers being propelled through the period by a larger-than-life

teacher—Claudia Gallant.

"She looked like Mama Cass
Elliott and put a new perspective on everything. This is a
woman who described drinking
a flat Coke and made it sound
like an out-of-body experience."

She encouraged the students to keep journals and make lists of outlandish things they wanted to do before the end of time. Climbing a mountain, going on an Outward Bound trip, running a marathon and having twins were all on Lansing's list. So far she's done all of these, except the twins. While Duggan and John are expecting their

first child in October, they haven't given up on the notion of twins in the future.

The wish list grows and certainly Lansing hopes to greet each challenge with the spirit and humor that she did in her first Atlanta marathon. "I kept looking behind me every couple of miles and saw this woman. She was at least 70 years old, white hair, wearing support hose and tube socks. She paced me for at least 13 miles and finally stopped to go to the bathroom," Lansing laughs. "I didn't stop. I was not gonna let her pass me."

Remembering 1993-94

IN A YEAR OF CHANGE, AS AGNES SCOTT BEGINS TO REDEFINE ITS ROLE AS A WOMEN'S COLLEGE

or Agnes Scott College, the 1993-94 school year was a year of transition and a year of development. President Ruth Schmidt, after more than a decade of leadership, retired and a search committee began the task of replacing her. Numerous guests on campus added insight and texture to students' lives and education. The College was recognized nationally by several publications. And faculty, in the intimate campus atmosphere, continued to inspire and encourage students.

Here is a brief, chronological look at the year's highlights.

JULY

1—Market value of the College endowment reaches \$204.6 million; the College receives a "AA-" rating from Standard & Poors and an "Aa" rating from Moody's Investors Service. ASC is placed among the nation's elite education institutions in credit ratings.

10—Ayse Carden '66, professor of psychology, completes her guest lectures at Kinjo Gakuin University as part of the exchange program between the Japanese institution and Agnes Scott.

AUGUST

18—Six students complete degree requirements for the Master of Arts in Teaching Secondary English, the first master's degrees awarded by ASC. 27—In the class of 1997, two newcomers. Anne Mitchell and Susan Molinaro, are fourth-generation Scotties. 31—Six hundred students enroll for the fall semester, including 27 graduate students and 22 Scott-Free Year 5 students. Three of the graduate students are men—the first admitted to a degree program at ASC. Students find a renovated bookstore, a renovated snack bar and a meal card system instituted by the new food service company, ARA Services.

SEPTEMBER

Money Guide, produced by Money magazine, ranks Agnes Scott 65th on its list of 100 best buys in college education in the country. This is up from 80th in 1992 and 86th in 1991.

6—Jocelyn de la Cruz, associate professor of history at Trinity College of Quezon City, Philippines, arrives on campus to spend the academic year at ASC.

7—Kyoko Fujimori, professor of English at Kinjo Gakuin University, becomes the third faculty member to teach at ASC as part of the faculty exchange program between the College and its sister institution in Nagoya, Japan.

7—President Ruth Schmidt announces

7—President Ruth Schmidt announces her retirement, effective June 30, 1994,

following a Board of Trustees resolution affirming her presidency and calling for a significant academic review.

18—At the Alumnae Association's Annual Alumnae Leadership Conference, the Alumnae Garden is dedicated as the first collegiate "Garden for Peace." 20—The annual U.S. News & World Report ranking of colleges and universities again lists Agnes Scott in Quartile Two of the national liberal arts colleges. 22—Mexican writers Silvia Molina and Maria Luisa Puga, guests of the Cultural Olympiad, participate in the CHIMO Convocation, an event that highlights ethnic diversity at the College.

OCTOBER

1-Virginia Moreland, former head of reference at Georgia State University, joins ASC as College librarian. She replaces Judith Jensen, who retired in June. 8—Barro Rojo, Mexico's premier contemporary dance company, offers a master class sponsored by ASC and the Cultural Olympiad. The ensemble's performance in Gaines Auditorium is the first in a series of Festivals of the Americas. 15—As part of the Information Technology Enhancement Program (ITEP), the Mac Lab-with eight new Macintosh computers and other equipmentopens in Dana 215. Additional upgrades include a new IBM-compatible computer system for students and a 22-station interactive learning center in Buttrick Hall.. 29—The Department of Theatre and Dance announces the residency of internationally recognized choreographer Jane Comfort. Comfort choreographs a new piece for the Studio Dance Theatre, which premieres April 21-22, 1994, in the production Dancexpressions '94

NOVEMBER

1—The Office of Admission hosts Great

Scott! Agnes Scott's largest fall overnight event for high school juniors and seniors taking a closer look at ASC. 20—Agnes Scott's Chapter of the National Coalition Building Institute (NCBI) hosts the Decatur Cluster of the Atlanta Project for diversity training. 30—Bonnie Johnson, vice president of development and public affairs, leaves Agnes Scott. Effective Jan. 1, 1994, she becomes executive director for development and assistant dean of the Emory School of Medicine.

DECEMBER

1—Vice President for Business and Finance William Gailey assumes the duties of acting vice president for development and public affairs.

6—The Strategic Plan Monitoring and Revision Committee holds its organizational meeting. The goal of the committee is to make planning an ongoing process rather than a series of one-time efforts. The new committee replaces the Strategic Planning Steering Committee and Task Force.

9—The National Endowment for the Humanities awards the College a \$152,041, three-year grant for language departments and individual humanities disciplines to develop a language-across-the-curriculum program.

28—Nineteen students and two faculty members spend 13 days visiting St. Petersburg and Moscow in Russia as part of the 1993-94 Global Awareness Program.

JANUARY

A new legacy gift club, the Frances Winship Walters Society, is established to recognize alumnae and friends who make a planned gift to ASC.

19—Rep. John Lewis of Georgia's Fifth Congressional District speaks at the annual convocation in honor of the Rev.





receipt of several large gifts including a grant of \$100,000 from the Arthur Vining Davis Foundations to help with library automation, a gift of \$25,000 from the estate of Josephine Larkin '39 and an additional \$25,000 donation from William H. Hightower

and Elinor Hamilton Hightower '34 for the scholarship fund named for Mrs. Hightower. 30—Giving to the Annual Fund during 1993-94 fiscal year totals \$1,219,173, surpassing the goal of \$1,204,125. The percentage of alumnae giving reaches 38.1.

1993-94 Giving Report

Alumnae giving to the Agnes Scott Annual Fund in 1993-94 totaled \$731,533 (excluding one-time bequests), surpassing our goal of \$625,000 by over \$105,000. Total alumnae giving to the Annual Fund, including \$79,139 in one-time bequests, reached \$810,672. Alumnae contributed more than 65 percent of the Annual Fund grand total of \$1,219,173.

Corporations and foundations contributed a total of \$284,164 to the Annual Fund. They were among the 3,913 donors who

supported the College in 1993-94 contributing a total of \$1,965,847 to all funds.

Alumnae participation reached 38.1 percent. Agnes

Scott is most appreciative of the tremendous response received from donors whose generosity continues to ensure that funding needs are met.







he Annual Fund is now a half century old! Thanks to the continued and enthusiastic support of alumnae, friends, corporations and foundations, the Annual Fund has contributed millions of dollars to the operating budget of the College over the past 50 years.

The Annual Fund's phenomenal growth testifies to the power of the combined efforts of dedicated women.


In 1944, Margaret Ridley '33, President of the Alumnae Association, and Mrs. Crawford F. Barnett '32, alumnae representative to the Board of Trustees,

recommended to the Board that an annual gifts program be established to defray alumnae expenses and provide support for the College.

On May 26, 1944, the Trustees established an "Annual Fund Campaign." This program became the nucleus of the present-day Annual Fund.

As we begin to celebrate our fiftieth birthday, it is only natural that we look back not only over the past half-century, but also over the past year.

During fiscal year 1993-94, the development division began several new initiatives. Among these were the formation of



the Frances Winship Walters Society, an intensifying of the Senior Class campaign, and the institution of a personal solicitation effort by members of the development staff and Trustees.

These initiatives enabled the College to surpass its goal of \$625,000 in alumnae giving and an overall goal of \$1,204,125. Gifts to the Annual Fund provide the foundation of support for academic excellence that is the hallmark of an Agnes Scott education.

Combined with tuition and endowment income, gifts allow Agnes Scott to cultivate and nurture the high standards

that have been our tradition.

The Annual Fund ensures the excellence of academic programs, provides library resources and underwrites financial assistance programs for students who might otherwise be unable to attend Agnes Scott.

Decatur Campaign Kicks Off in January

COLLEGE SEEKS TO RAISE \$30,000 FROM BUSINESSES IN THE DECATUR COMMUNITY

gnes Scott College plans a first-ever push to raise unrestricted dollars from the Decatur business community in January 1995 during the "Decatur Campaign." Chaired by attorney and ASC Trustee Clark Candler, the campaign will point out the positive economic impact of Agnes Scott on Decatur and will raise \$30,000 from businesses and foundations. The 10-day fund-raising campaign will be kicked off with a breakfast on campus in mid-tolate January

"We realized that there were no unrestricted gifts to the College from Decatur businesses. For a college of our size and caliber we thought that very unusual," notes Andrea Swilley '90, assistant director of major gifts. "So we decided to organize this campaign tar-

geting the community. Committee Chair Candler estimates that the economic impact of the College on the community is substantial, noting the many goods and services ASC purchases in the community. "I am looking at this campaign not just as a money raiser but as a renewed effort to reestablish ties to the community. There has been a perceived isolationist mentality between Decatur and Agnes Scott but we want to remind people of our mutually beneficial relationship. Developing money is only part of the focus.

Decatur business owner Lyn Deardorff '84 describes the campaign as one step among many efforts the College has made to reach out to the community, yet she believes its significance will be measured by its success at

engaging both on a continuing basis. "I don't see this as a negative situation," says Deardorff, owner of Final Touch Gallery and Books, "but a lack of aware-

ness, perhaps, a silence on each side. I consider this campaign as Agnes Scott attempting to cross over and establish an ongoing relationship with the Decatur business communitywhich now must reach out, as well. The side-walk runs both ways."

In the past, says Swilley, the College has received monetary gifts from individual businesses in Decatur, "but this is the first time for the College to undertake a unified campaign targeting Decatur. Decatur was included in the original metropolitan Atlanta campaign launched in 1908 and responded with gifts of \$25,000, representing 10 percent of the overall, Atlanta-wide goal. The Decatur Campaign will be a yearly addition to the existing fund drive.

ACKNOWLEDGING WOMEN'S INFLUENCE AS HEALTH CAREGIVERS—PAST AND PRESENT

omen have moved quite naturally into health care fields because they were the earliest health care providers, explained Valerie Fennell, an associate professor in anthropology at Georgia State University. Fennell discussed the subject in a keynote address which opened this year's Progressions Seminar on "Women's Health Issues," held Nov. 12, at Agnes Scott. The seminar, attended by 45 women from the Atlanta area, was hosted by Agnes Scott and sponsored by 16 women's

Fennell noted that women, as collectors of plants and herbs and preparers of food in antiquity's gathering/hunting societies, were the primary providers of

sustenance for their families and villages. In this sense, women were the first caretakers and as keepers of the fire for their communities, the first chemists.

Fennell contends that men were not primarily involved in healthcare until it "evolved" into a wage earning occupation. With

that transition came the move away from herbal remedies toward chemical/synthetic remedies. "The wisdom that began with women moved to men who controlled chemistry and the women in health care.

write this shortly after a College memorial service Leelebrating the life of Stephanie Rothstein, the Agnes Scott sophomore from St. Cloud, Fla., killed early Friday evening, Sept. 23, in an automobile accident in Florida. Our Oct. 17 ceremony of reflection and remembrance was made special by the presence of Richard and Lisa Rothstein, Stephanie's parents, of Stephen Graves, her pastor and the person who introduced her to Agnes Scott, and other members of her extended family. They joined with basketball teammates and other students, with faculty, coaches and staff,

in a ceremony of prayer and commentary, poetry (some of Stephanie's own), slides and photographs which reminded us of the places and people, many of them present, who had been so important in Stephanie's life.

At the service, Acting Director of Athletics Cheryl Appleberry and Coach Nancy Rast announced that a plaque bearing Stephanie's poetry and a picture of her on the basketball court would be displayed permanently at the Woodruff Physical Activities Building. We were able to announce that AT&T had made its \$10,000 scholarship for Stephanie the foundation gift of a scholarship in her name. The College has agreed to find funds to match that gift. We were also able to announce that sophomore Hillary Spencer of Pensacola, Fla., and first-year student Jennifer Phillips of Gainesville, Fla., who had been injured in the accident, were in stable condition. The celebration brought healing closure to a tragic accident that tested and strengthened the Agnes Scott

In recent years Agnes Scott has been blessedly free from such tragedies. Stephanie's is the first residential student death since 1978. The unfolding events beginning the night of the accident are witness to care and professionalism among staff and faculty, to generosity of spirit as all members of the community reached out in mutual support to one another, and to reserves of faith on which we drew in trying to comprehend the events.

At each event there was the need to ponder Stephanie's death and also to inform the community about Hillary and Jennifer. We encountered Stephanie, herself, in the wonder and wisdom of her poem which Professor Christine Cozzens had saved from a firstyear class, a poem which Dean Gué Hudson read at Stephanie's funeral in Florida. College, typically, is a place for the young, for energy that comes from anticipating almost infinite possibility. Whatever vulnerability there may be is not usually a point of focus. The loss of a student and the serious injury of two others shakes and tests a college. Agnes Scott's response has been one of faith and impressive community support.

PARTING WORDS

Embracing This Precious Life

JUST BEFORE THE BIRTH OF HER FIRST CHILD, CELIA BOOHER '84 FINDS A REMINDER OF HER OWN MORTALITY

y daughter turns one today. As I reflect on Ther first 12 months, I remember all the wondrous and strange events that filled my life a year ago.

I was preparing to bring my much-anticipated firstborn into the world and, at the same time, fearing that I might orphan the child. Four weeks before Elizabeth was born, I found a lump in my right breast. Assuming it was a byproduct of pregnancy, I casually mentioned it to my doctor who asked me to wait while she called a specialist to arrange an appointment.

As I tried to adjust to pending parenthood. I w now a potential cancer patient, a most pitiful sight as an obviously pregnant woman visiting the Breast Cancer Care Center.

I was lucky to have many positive influences in my life during this time. My husband and family were very supportive. Also, I was involved in an exciting new business that had opened to rave reviews two weeks before my child arrived. Yet even though I had plenty to occupy my mind, I still had "what if" thoughts of my sickness and potential desertion of this child, and I constantly felt a restless pressure to do something—anything—to restore my life to order and peace.

My frustration and fear mounted as I was told many tests and procedures could not be done during my pregnant state, or for months following childbirth as my body careened through early motherhood. I pursued every possible path of discovery: the breast ultrasound was inconclusive; the needle biopsy indicated the tissue was benignbut that test was extremely unreliable.

It was not until six months later, when a mammogram revealed that the mass had di appeared completely, that my months of dread drained away like the clogged milk valve

which had produced the lump. My most astounding realization was that this type of experience is common. I recall a friend who couldn't get together with me over a holiday because of a lumpectomy, a neighbor who missed a play group due to a needle biopsy and, perhaps the most frightening, a co-worker's wife who breastfed her child for almost a year before she discovered the

strange sensation in her breast was something to worry about.

Now as I count my blessings, I not only clutch my precious child to my chest in a loving embrace, but also put my hand to my breast for yet another self exam. I cannot claim to be a cancer expert, but I have had a brush with the disease. My prayers go out to the community of women who battle this ruthless intrusion into their lives, and I foster a fervent hope that my daughter will not have to live with these fears.

LAUGHTER, TEARS AND MEMORIES OF 34 YEARS AS ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT

he Woltz Reception Room was crowded with a chorus of close to 300 well-wishers who bid farewell to Mary Alverta "Bertie" Bond '53 on Nov. 30 after her 34 years of service to Agnes Scott. For 24 hours, the campus celebrated "Bertie Bond Day," and after a program

of reminiscence and proclamations, Betty Scott Noble '44 read a resolution from the Agnes Scott Board of Trustees naming Bond "Assistant to the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees Emerita." Bond

served as assistant to three consecutive presidents of the College, beginning with Wallace Alston.

"I have given a few parties during my days at Agnes Scott, maybe one thousand, but I have been outclassed," Bond responded to the group with a slow grin. "I want to thank you for this. Described by Sally Mahoney, interim ASC

president, as her "guide to the mysteries of Agnes Scott," Bond was remembered by administration, faculty, students and alumnae as a woman of integrity and "elegant discretion." House mates Kate McKemie and Kathryn Manuel, both retired ASC faculty members, noted with humor that over the years Bond was so guarded with the inner workings of the College that "we learned more from the students than from Bertie.

Anne Jones Sims, representing the class of '53, presented Bond with a gift from "class members, their daughters and faculty." The ASC Student

Government Association read a resolution from the students that honored Bond for her years of service, her role as confidante and adviser to the Social Council.

Professor of English and Chair Linda Hubert '62 thanked Bond for being Agnes Scott's muse of

memory and for "touching five decades of Agnes Scott life." Hubert also said, "We know what we will miss with your retirement.

Hubert also remarked at Bond's low-key chuckle while Dean of Students

Gué Hudson recalled her first encounter with Bond in the fall of 1964: "I won't forget those eyes, those eyes that say, 'Don't mess with me, Darlin'

Hudson teased further, then said, "I have waited 34 years for this," to which Bond retorted, "Watch your manners.

In the end, after an Agnes Scott chorus honored Bond with two songs and after Mahoney pre-

also helped develop the actual activities in the various cities. Advertisements were placed in local area newspapers prior to the arrival of the Agnes Scott team in most cities. Based on ads designed by the Council for Independent Colleges for its national campaign, the Agnes Scott ads featured alumnae from the targeted cities whose activities in the community reflected the various ways a liberal arts education prepares one for life and service in the real world. If only space and timing had allowed us to use everyone!

Like a farmer planting seeds, we will not see the results of these efforts for some time. However, immediate enthusiasm for the program has made a difference. Alumnae have had more personal interaction with the College in geographic areas not regularly visited and admission has had outstanding groups of prospective students in several meetings. During this year of transition, it is important for Agnes Scott to find new and synergistic ways to use the resources of the College most effectively as we build our new future together. Counseling/Multicultural Affairs Center Opens


ONE OFFICE NOW PROVIDES THE SERVICES OF COLLEGE CHAPLAIN, PERSONAL COUNSELOR AND NEW MULTICULTURAL AFFAIRS ADVISOR

I'm here to help students sort out direction in their lives," says Karen Green '86, multicultural affairs advisor. "I want to be a bridge builder—to help students learn to understand their empowerment through coalition building."

Green is a member of the Center for Counseling and Multicultural Affairs (CCMA), a new clearinghouse for students seeking advice on a variety of concerns. Depending upon their area of interest, students have access to the advi-

sor of multicultural affairs, personal counselor or College chaplain.

The center, located in Winship Hall, opened in September. "The center has helped



go to get a counselor and it has helped the professional counseling staff to feel cohesive," says Gué Hudson '68, dean of students.

While the chaplain and personal affairs counselor have been long standing positions at ASC, the multicultural affairs component is new to campus.

Green was previously director of multicultural affairs at Hamilton College and prior to that was the director of student activities and housing at Agnes Scott. She is now studying for a master's in theology at the Candler School of Theology at Emory University, in addition to advising the College on multiculturalism and diversity.

"The National Coalition Building Institute and Racism Free Zone have done some great work [on campus] but there is still room for other avenues to challenge the community concerning the develop-

ment of multicultural issues. I will work with all students including the dominant culture. They, too, have a part to play in this process—to be

informed and held accountable once they have been informed," Green says.

Shirley has been a personal counselor at the College since 1987. She works with students on an individual basis and in group workshops concerning stress reduction, test anxiety, relationships, family issues, self-esteem, etc. "This is an opportunity to create a counseling center that provides more services and meets whatever needs the students may have," says Shirley.

The politics of gender in 17th century science is a recurring theme in Potter's writing and in lectures at Amherst, Brown, Duke and Stanford universities and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where she has been a visiting scholar in women's studies.

Castleberry's '38 Tour of Duty

AS AN ARMY LIEUTENANT COLONEL CASTLEBERRY WORKED ON CLASSIFIED NUCLEAR ASSIGNMENTS

In the '90s, the armed services is male dominated. In the '50s it was even more so. That fact didn't intimidate Frances Castleberry '38—she signed up for the Army in 1951 and didn't retire until she was a lieutenant colonel 20 years later.

The military was not Castleberry's first career choice. After receiving an English degree from Agnes Scott, the native Atlantan left to teach at a high school in McCormick, S.C. She later returned to Atlanta to accept a position at Grady Hospital as a payroll supervisor and then moved on to the YWCA to work as a recreational leader.

Bored with her "monotonous lifestyle" Castleberry says, "I felt I needed a change." The Army was a viable option because she said it would give her a chance to see different places. "So, at age 34, I went into the Army as a captain."

Basic training took place at Women's Army Corps (WAC) Center at Fort Lee, Va. Along with 30 other women she learned to be a soldier in six weeks.

"I remember we had to take an exam and one of the essay questions asked us to describe the social, economic and political differences between England, Germany and France. I didn't think I did very well. The next day, Miss Jackson asked me to read my paper in front of the class. I thought it must be the worst answer, but it wasn't. What could have been an inconsequential incident to someone else was *very* important to me."
