First Alumna President

MARY BROWN BULLOCK NAMED SEVENTH PRESIDENT OF AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE

The Board of Trustees named Mary Brown Bullock '66 the seventh president of Agnes Scott College on Jan. 25, and appointed her professor of history. Bullock, a China scholar, is the director of the Asia Program of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C., and a professorial lecturer at The Johns Hopkins University School for Advanced International Studies. An Agnes Scott alumna who received her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Chinese history from Stanford University, Bullock was director for 10 years of the Committee on Scholarly Communication with the People's Republic of China, through the National Academy of Sciences. Her husband, George, works in government relations; the couple has two teenage children, Graham and Ashley.

Director of Communications Sara Pilger interviewed Bullock about her plans for the presidency, which she will assume July 1.

Why were you interested in the position of president of Agnes Scott?

MARY BROWN BULLOCK: Agnes Scott College is one of the outstanding women's colleges in the country. It has the institutional strengths and resources to become a model for liberal arts education in the 21st century. At this critical juncture in the College's history, I was attracted by this challenge of intellectual leadership. I am especially excited about working with college-age students, whose idealism and energy keeps us all young.

How closely do you plan to work with the students? Would you like to teach?

MBB: Life takes interesting twists. When I left Agnes Scott my goal was to get a Ph.D. and teach Chinese history at a liberal arts college! I hope to spend some time in the classroom. I have enjoyed my teaching at Johns Hopkins but have also learned that it takes many forms. One of the joys of my work has been working with young women. I am sensitive to the transition from college to

the workplace which is also a part of the on-going learning process.

What past professional experience has prepared you for this position?

MBB: I bring the experience of an academic administrator, trustee, scholar and teacher.


My responsibilities at the National Academy of Sciences and the Wilson Center have been somewhat similar to those of a college dean. I work with faculty in all disciplines and have had considerable fund-raising experience.

A women's college education: how did it shape you and how can we build on its benefits for our women?

MBB: As time goes by, I realize anew how much I

A goal of growth

BULLOCK'S FIRST PRIORITY: TO BE ON CAMPUS, LISTENING AND LEARNING

Continued from page 1 gained from a women's college, so I was pleased to see in a statement from the Presidential Search Committee that there is a basic agreement about continuing as a women's liberal arts institution.

My years at Agnes Scott taught me much about the pursuit of excellence, the opportunities for leadership and the importance of friendship. I first found my voice here . . . and it has served me well as one of only a few women Ph.D candidates at Stanford and in Washington's male-dominated international relations community.

Today, however, I believe broader experiences in coed settings, such as in classes, internships, study abroad, and through cross-institutional settings, round out an education. In this dimension, Agnes Scott's Atlanta location gives it an advantage over other women's colleges.

How should we be preparing women to become leaders in the 21st century?

MBB: Women leaders need to be better prepared in the sciences, whether or not they pursue a formal career in science. Understanding the human and societal impact of current and future scientific and technological issues requires bridging the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences. A liberal arts

education has a special contribution to make here, and women have a special responsibility not to be bystanders or polemicists.

I look forward to working with the faculty in identifying new resources which can make these visions realities through programs already in the works, like the Science Center for Women.

What strengths do you see in Agnes Scott?

MBB: I appreciate Agnes Scott's highly qualified faculty committed to good teaching and academic excellence, the intellectually curious and lively student body, the hardworking staff that is dedicated to improving the prospects for the future of the College, the campuswide multicultural diversity, its fabulous location and lovely campus, its endowment per student (fourth largest in the country) and state-of-the-art technology recently put into place.

What do you see as the three most important challenges facing the College? What will be your top

MBB: Our first challenge will be to continue our renewal as a community of warmth, collegiality, intellectual vitality and good humor. Sally Mahoney is doing a splendid job as an interim president, and no one will benefit more from her success than I. Second, we need to increase

retention and enrollment. Third, I'd like to expand educational and professional linkages with the Atlanta community and beyond. My first priority, however, is to be on campus, getting to know faculty, staff, and students listening and

How can we strengthen the linkages that you mentioned as one of your challenges?

MBB: My background in international relations and Asian studies gives me a special commitment to enhancing Agnes Scott's exciting international activities, which should become the norm, rather than the exception. I hope that we will be able to make funding for these opportunities more easily available for both faculty and students.

Closer to home, Atlanta is a major corporate, financial, educational, technological, transportation and cultural center. Agnes Scott must continue to reach out to provide well-utilized two-way linkages with this dynamic community.

What about even closer to home? Decatur?

MBB: I hope to build on recent initiatives such as the Decatur Campaign and last nizing Agnes Scott and South Candler Street. We must continue to be a good neighbor.

How does your family feel about moving to Decatur?

MBB: After living in Washington for more than 20 years, moving a family (that includes an 80-pound dog) will not be easy. We are taking this one step at a time. As a family, we are ready for some new adventures. Our transition will be eased by relatives already living in the Atlanta area and we look forward to becoming a part of the Decatur community.

Blitzing for new recruits

ASC "TRAVEL BLITZ" PROMOTION WINS CASE AWARD IN ANNUAL JUDGING

gnes Scott College's "Travel Blitz '94" program received an Award of Excellence Lamong Institutional Relations Projects in the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) District III Advancement Awards Competition for 1995. The blitz was featured in the February CASE Currents, an institutional relations trade publication.

The offices of admission, alumnae affairs, development and public relations produced this coordinated program of institutional travel, Sept. 12-Nov. 10, to increase awareness of Agnes Scott College during "blitz" visits in the 15 population markets in the Southeast identified as prime locations for student recruitment. In addition to the admission efforts, representatives of the alumnae and development programs of the College visited the same cities and had the opportunity to enhance their respective outreach programs to different audiences within the same visitation period.

Visits to many of the cities were preceded by advertisements produced and placed by the public relations office. In addition, advance media work

was coordinated by public relations to promote admission's computerized interactive CD-ROM recruitment program.

The number of prospective students and parents attending admission's dessert and discussion function in Pensacola, Fla., increased by 175 percent from the previous year. Development representatives made 37 visits with individual major donor prospects. A total of 116 alumnae out of a pool of 1,229 attended alumnae functions. Ten new members joined the Frances Winship Walters Society (a planned giving club) and at least seven new potential donors were identified. Admission's innovative CD-ROM program resulted in eight media placements: Associated Press, USA Today, WCTV, WKRG-TV, Computer Currents, the Atlanta Journal/Constitution, Chattanooga's News/Free Press and the Pensacola News-Journal.


Travel and entertainment expenditures for the blitz were absorbed in the normal operating budgets of alumnae affairs, admission and development; the advertising budget for the project was just over \$20,000.

He provided a humane presidency during difficult times

MARVIN PERRY, FORMER ASC PRESIDENT, DIES IN CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA., DEC. 12

gnes Scott College President Emeritus Marvin Banks Perry Jr., 76, died Dec. 12 at Westminster-Canterbury of the Blue Ridge in Charlottesville, Va., after being diagnosed with

spindle cell cancer in October 1994. A memorial service was held Dec. 15.

from Agnes Scott College in 1982. He served on the boards of several institutions and organizations while in Atlanta and continued his community involvement into retirement, as a member of the boards of Sweet Briar College and the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy, and the Alumni Council of the College of Arts and Sciences of the University of Virginia. He was also a church elder.

During Perry's nine-year administration at Agnes Scott, the College raised \$750,000 in a comprehensive campaign, renovated three major buildings at a cost of \$500,000, implemented the Return-to-College Program, inaugurated merit-based scholarships and established a dualdegree program with Georgia Tech. The College also saw annual alumnae giving increase by 186 percent, and faculty salaries rise by 75 percent for full professors. Perry fully supported developing faculty governance and improving the insurance and retirement programs for all employees.

"The College was being buffeted by external factors that shaped his presidency," recalled Michael Brown, professor of history, "yet he provided a humane presidency under very difficult circumstances." A decline in the popularity of women's colleges and liberal education combined with inflation and declining enrollment were strong forces facing Perry.

Upon Perry's retirement, the ASC Board of Trustees designated \$500,000 of unrestricted endowment funds to support the merit scholarships begun by Perry. Each year two awards are given in his name.

Mary Alverta (Bertie) Bond '53 recalled Perry's words to his last graduating class: "Do well and do good." Bond believes that statement describes his presidency as well. "He did well by this College, and he did many good things for Agnes Scott people. He relished life and lived as a thoughtful, caring and considerate person."

Larry Gellerstedt, former chair of the board of trustees, remarked that the former president was "a classic scholar. He was a strong family man . . . He was a gentleman.'

Perry served as president of Goucher College in Towson, Md., from 1967 to 1973 and earlier served as dean of admissions for the University of Virginia. He taught at Washington and Lee University. Perry was a graduate of the University of Virginia and Harvard University, with degrees in English. He authored or co-authored books and articles on English and American literature. A decorated commander in the U.S. Naval

OLYMPIC UPDATE

ASC to host athletes, Irish visitors

Agnes Scott has finalized two agreements related to the Olympic Games to be held the summer of 1996.

The Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG) has contracted to lease Agnes Scott's sports complex July 6-Aug. 3, 1996, for use as practice and conditioning sites for Olympic teams in synchronized swimming, volleyball and soccer. The teams will reside in the Olympic Village in Atlanta.

In addition, the city of Decatur, with hosts the DeKalb Historical Society and Agnes Scott, will serve as the center of hospitality for the Irish contingent during the Olympics, which includes housing a small group of distinguished Irish visitors in the Anna Young Alumnae House. Negotiations are being finalized for housing sporting officials in residence halls.



IBM provides matching gifts

LAB'S COMPUTERS TAKE SOME—NOT ALL—PAIN OUT OF THE WRITING PROCESS

In a small room on the third floor of Buttrick Hall, students occupy most of the seven IBM computer stations. Several are typing, one is hunched over a notebook, and another is staring at a computer monitor with furrowed brow.

This is Agnes Scott's Writing Workshop.

Coordinated by the English department, the workshop is staffed by tutors who assist fellow students with writing assignments. Computers in the workshop were provided through IBM's matching gift program within the past three years.

Christine Cozzens, associate professor of English, said the computers play an important role in the tutoring process. "We do a lot of teaching to inspire the students to write and have technological expertise, so it's important that we have the best and the latest in the Writing Workshop."

With IBM's help Agnes Scott has beefed up its computer inventory at other sites on campus as well. During the first year of the matching gift program, Agnes Scott received 17 computers. In 1993, nine computers were added.

Last year, however, total contributions to the College from IBM employees did not meet the minimum needed to participate in the computer equipment

option. Instead, Agnes Scott received \$800 in cash toward its Annual Fund. The College's eligibility for the computer equipment option requires gifts from IBM employees for a calendar year to total at least \$5,000. If the gifts do not meet that total dollar requirement, the College will receive a cash donation in lieu of computer equipment. Altogether, contributions from IBM employees, totaling over \$10,000, have enabled the College to purchase \$56,000 worth of equipment.

"While the equipment donated by the IBM grant was an essential starting point, technology is moving so rapidly that it is important for us to improve the equipment the College has received through the gift program," noted Tom Maier, ASC's director of information technology services.

"Right now, we basically need to provide higher speed capabilities and multimedia capabilities. Information is more effective if it is a combination of words, sound, motion and animation. I'd like to see Agnes Scott explore these possibilities and go one step further from simple text to multimedia communications."

Maier noted that the latest gifts are a continuation of IBM's long standing commitment to computerizing Agnes Scott; IBM provided the first 25 campus computers in 1984.

"Great City" campaign

CAMPAIGN HIGHLIGHTS COLLEGE'S CIVIC CONTRIBUTIONS

The Sun Trust Corp. pledged \$7,500 and the Decatur branch of Nations Bank contributed \$5,000 in the 1995 Decatur Campaign, a new prong of the Annual Fund, which had helped secure more than \$23,821 in gifts and pledges by late January.

"Decatur & Agnes Scott College: Great City, Great College, Great Possibilities" was the slogan for the campaign that enlisted the help of a ninemember steering committee of Decatur community leaders who, along with ASC's development staff, solicited more than 100 businesses over a 10day period beginning Jan. 11.

Judy Turner, Decatur branch manager of Bank South, brought in the lead contribution from the bank. Twentyeight gifts and pledges were secured during the campaign (as of Jan. 27) with the average exceeding \$400.

Andrea Swilley '90, assistant director of major gifts, felt the campaign accomplished its dual goal of fund-raising and informing the community of ASC's contributions to Decatur.

These include:

- ASC supports a payroll of \$7.6 million and has an operating budget of \$20.3 million;
- ASC paid more than \$70,000 in property and sanitation taxes in 1993-94;
- 380 alumnae live and shop in the Decatur area;
- 130 faculty and staff members and 30 retirees live and shop in Decatur;
- The College makes available more than 50 affordable rental units in Decatur;
- ASC's Department of Public Safety provides additional police visibility to the community and offers safety courses

that are open to the public; and Swilley expects the campaign to reach its goal of \$30,000.

Gift Reporting

A new tax measure, which applies to all contributions to the College made after Jan. 1, 1994, requires Agnes Scott to provide "contemporaneous written substantiation" of gifts it received totaling \$250 or more.

According to the Council for Advancement and Support of Education's quarterly publication *Matching Gifts Notes*, "The substantiation must also tell the donor that for tax purposes, the deductible portion of the contribution is reduced by the value of the premiums or benefits received as a result of the gift. Further, the statement must include a 'good faith' estimate of the premium's value."

A donor may, at the time the gift is made, decline all benefits, keeping the total gift intact.

Students become historians

HISTORY CLASS PROJECT INCREASES STUDENT AWARENESS OF ALUMNAE ATTITUDES

In 1920, the year American women gained the right to L vote, Agnes Scott College was already shaking off its perceived Victorian finishingschool reputation, according to original research by students in American History 334/Political Science 332. Then-College President Frank Gaines expressed a sense of the ripple effect suffrage would have: "The enactment of the 19th amendment vastly increases the importance of the college education of women.'

Student researcher Janice Tschudi '96 discovered Gaines' quote and evidence—including a yellowed 1924 student newspaper editorial—that young women of the era soon enjoyed expansive career choices.

"Not many years ago, it was an easy matter for a college student to select her vocation. Today, however, there are five hundred different branches of professions open to women and the choice is not so easy," wrote Dorothy Keith '25 in the Agonistic.

This fall, Tschudi was among 11 students who submitted essays after learning about the history of women from the 1920s to the 1940s by researching the lives of women at Agnes Scott during that period. Digging through archives and conducting oral histories, she and other students tested varied

assumptions to discover that during those two decades Agnes Scott College was an institution already working hard to shape strong, independent-thinking women.

Assistant Professor of History Michele Gillespie initiated the research as an alternative to a more passive classroom lecture/study. Through workshops Gillespie introduced students to research materials in the archives, to standard research methods, especially oral history techniques.

Then, Gillespie notes, "Students experienced the excitement of working with primary materials, photographs, letters, newspapers, yearbooks, and other items that told the students about a past they were unfamiliar with. In a sense, my students became historians, actively researching, thinking and writing about the past."

Tschudi researched the women's movement and Agnes
Scott College from 1924 to
1929. Students explored other
subjects such as curriculum
development in relation to historical changes, the rationale
for the evolution of the athletic
program, race relations at
Agnes Scott during segregation,
and how gendered social expectations shaped student conduct
and career choice.

At Gillespie's insistence, students placed Agnes Scott

research within the larger context of women's history and American history so that projects were anchored to larger concerns of the course. "It was very important to me that these projects not be the histories of Agnes Scott College in a vacuum," notes Gillespie.

mily Curington '96 studied the effect of national Itrends on ASC curriculum. Comparing courses offered at the College, 1922-42, she found that by the early 1920s, the College had begun to broaden its curriculum, to extend beyond the education of future teachers and homemakers. By the mid-1930s Agnes Scott had abandoned courses in house furnishing and home sanitation to offer courses that would prepare women for a range of new concerns.

With the South strapped by poverty in the 1920s, the College instituted a course in social legislation to explore the function of the state as guardian of the public welfare. In the late 1930s, the College offered a course in economics of consumption which provided an academic approach to the national and international implications of the Depression and a practical component on consumerism. Curington noted that with national attention on issues of violence and crime-

and on the careers of gangsters like Pretty Boy Floyd—the College responded with a two-semester course in charities and corrections. Students visited philanthropic and penal institutions, then did actual field work during the second semester.

By 1930, 80 percent of the nation's social workers were women, according to Sybil Bennett '96, however, during the Depression women lost ground in that and other fields as the high rate of unemployment left men competing for jobs held by women.

Yet, Bennett and Allison Olson '96 discovered alumnae who took advantage of that window of opportunity for women, including Mary Ben Wright Erwin '25 "who tried various jobs before ending up at WSB-TV 'for 17 glorious years;" Frances Pauley, '27 a social activist who became a major force in desegregating Georgia; Evangeline Papageorge '28 who earned a Ph.D. in biochemistry and returned to teach at Emory medical school; and Sara Bullock '31, recruited to work for the fledgling NASA space program in theoretical mathematics where she remained until her retirement.

Ison conducted oral histories with four alumnae in preparation for her paper dealing with urban development and student interaction with the city. "I didn't know what to expect. All four of them were sharp and had a lot of humor. They had strong academic lives and varied cultural interests. All of them had higher degrees—one had a master's and the others had Ph.D.s. They had a lot of questions for me, which surprised me," says Olson.

"They were amused by the freedom we students feel entitled to. At that time, it was pretty progressive for them to take the street car and go downtown, to go to shops with hundreds of strangers. They were proud of the progress they had made compared with the stiffness of the lives of students in the late 19th century.

"I believe that what they were taught at Agnes Scott did make them capable of extraordinary ventures. Agnes Scott may not have meant to make such outspoken, strong women. But they did it. These young women would become more than the gregarious society wife, in part, because Agnes Scott gave them more."

According to Gillespie, students involved in the project forged bonds with the alumnae whom they interviewed.


Finally, says Gillespie, "Students came to recognize how their own experiences and actions at ASC will come to represent part of the heritage of the institution."



NEW POLICY TO ALLOW WEDDINGS IN CHAPEL

ather your rings, veils, bouquets and your relatives, ASC's Thatcher Chapel is open for weddings.

Following years of requests, The Rev. Paige McRight '68, chaplain of the College, has formulated a wedding policy that goes into effect this spring.

While occasional weddings have taken place on campus, no policy for use of Thatcher Chapel had been put in place.

After studying policies at other institutions, McRight formulated a policy that includes at least two sessions of pre-marital counseling. "I want to make sure that people don't enter into marriage lightly," she says.

Major points in the policy:

- ✓ Christian weddings conducted in accordance with the guidelines of the Presbyterian Church will be allowed.
- ✓ The chaplain will conduct the weddings but may invite a

bride's pastor to participate.

- The chapel is available to students, faculty, staff, trustees and alumnae of the College and their families.
- ✓ Requests will be handled by the bride through the Office of Campus Events and Conferences.
- ✓ Weddings may be scheduled during the regular academic year and at other times when the College is open.
- ✓ A fee of \$500 covers all services related to the wedding.
- Seating capacity is approximately 70.

While the chapel facility is booked through campus events/ conferences, McRight handles the scheduling of weddings.

Mystery shrouds Cartwright's legacy at Agnes Scott

"RAMONA WAS WELL KNOWN BUT LITTLE REMEMBERED, OR VICE VERSA," SAYS FRIEND

nder a veil of secrecy, Ramona Cartwright entered Agnes Scott College in 1955 and few bits of evidence of her presence remain.

I found no admission records, no record of registration, no grade records, no graduation record (although her name was reportedly called out at commencement), no pictures of her in the Silhouette, not even an alumna file exists for the fair-haired child of the class of 1958. Even so, she remains in the hearts of her classmates as THE one who turned the class around as sophomores and led them to win the Spirit Cup in 1956.

Remembered as a competent philosophy student, Cartwright was an avid participant in extracurricular activities, and even contributed to the Annual Fund and returned for her 35th class reunion. But since then, her whereabouts have been unknown.

"She seemed to change and became a bit of a recluse after she was jilted in marriage," observed an anonymous friend who was to serve as her maid of honor. "It was a sad turn of events when that dreadful George P. Burdell over at Georgia Tech left her standing at the altar. All that spunk and school spirit—and some of the life—was taken right out of her. The flower just wilted."

Mollie Merrick '57, associate dean of students, remembers when the Cartwright/Burdell engagement announcement appeared in *The Atlanta Journal/Constitution* and laments over the failed nuptials. "The wedding announcement never made it in the paper."

This was a truly sad turn for a woman so vivacious in her gogo days—going to every dance, leading the class in all sorts of dorm pranks.

"She participated in everything on campus, tennis matches, you name it," remembers Merrick. "She did everything well. She was perfect."

Cartwright could do no wrong. That's basically how classmate Pat Stewart '58 described her in *The Agnes Scott News* the year they graduated. "She was confident, but she had just reason to be. Under her influence, the drive and enthusiasm of the class of '58 gained direction. . . Ramona's influence

was felt and heard by all the school. Ramona's confidence gave extra force to our enthusiasm which was this year coupled with a deep, manifested love for Agnes Scott and developed into spirit."

Her scholarship was without question.

"I started getting papers from someone called Ramona Cartwright," during the 1950s, remembered Ben Kline, former dean of students and philosophy professor, in a centennial year interview with Allison Adams '89. "She would turn in papers in courses and I would turn in grades for Ramona and that was a kind of a big deal."

The mystery surrounding this '58er is enhanced by the fact that no one remembers exactly where she was from, not even her closest friend Martha Meyer '58.

"Seems to me she mentioned having a great aunt down near Cairo," remembers Meyer. "But, I can't be sure because her daddy was supposed to have been from somewhere like Savannah, so maybe she was from the coast. It's odd that I can't remember. Maybe I never knew."

But Meyer did know Cartwright as a fun friend who liked to troop with the gang over to Threadgill's Pharmacy for a soda (she even had her name carved in one of the booths), to the hockey field to watch a spirited game or to the gym to watch a swim meet. And she loved a practical joke. Meyer remembers one summer when she and Ramona were counselors at a camp in North Carolina, Cartwright could not resist the temptation to switch out the cold medication with red M&Ms. "People were lined up around the cabin for those cold pills," jokes Meyer.

Meyer suspects that Cartwright may have now retreated back to a cabin in those North Carolina mountains. But clearly Cartwright's friend is worried. "It's just not like her to be out of touch for so long."

Some people contend that Ramona Cartwright was made up by none other than her best friend Martha Meyer. But Meyer rebuts: "How could she be fictitious, she led us all in our class song the day of our graduation. I'd say that was about as real as you get."

ROCHE TEAM USES "WOMEN WITHOUT SHOES THEME" IN STIRRING PERFORMANCE

The works of Australian visiting artists Simi and David Roche were featured in the private inaugural dance performance "Pivotal Points," held in the newly refurbished, state-of-the-art Martha Wilson Kessler Dance Studio in Alston Campus Center, Nov. 3.

The performance featured the Roches as well as Ronin and Redfins, the "pick-up" dance company and five-member jazzrock ensemble from the University of Adelaide (U. A.) where both Roches are members of the dance faculty, and Agnes Scott's own Studio Dance Theatre.

Simi Roche set an original piece for the performance entitled "Women Without Shoes" based on a phrase from The History of Atlanta 1879 in which the only reference to the female population is as "pioneer babes" and "women without shoes."

David Roche is senior lecturer and head of the dance department at the University of Adelaide. Before that, he was a dancer with the Pearl Lang Dance Company and the Martha Graham Apprentice Company. He also founded and directed Florida State University's Dance Touring Theatre and taught at schools throughout the United States with the Alvin Ailey American Dance Centre.

Simi Roche is a tenured lecturer in dance at U.A. and coordinator for the touring program of the dance department. Having set nearly 40 pieces, Simi has built on her experience teaching and performing

modern dance in colleges across the United States, including Florida State and the University of Utah. Her dance experience includes work with Merce Cunningham, Bella Lewitsky, Martha Graham and Pearl

The Roches also taught a modern dance master class to experienced dancers in the Atlanta area during their fall residence at Agnes Scott.

The artists-in-residence program is made possible through an accumulated gift of \$368,800 from Richard and Martha Kessler. Martha Kessler is a 1969 graduate of ASC and has been a trustee since 1986.

The gift allowed a major renovation of the Martha Wilson Kessler Dance Studio this past summer.

IACKSONVILLE URBAN MINISTRIES STUDENT BRINGS MESSAGE IN SONG TO ASC'S TARA SPUHLER '96

hen Tara Spuhler '96, religious studies major, began working at Urban Ministries of Springfield in her hometown of Jacksonville, Fla., this summer, she never expected that one song could have such impact.

Drawing from her experience as a youth minister, Young Life program counselor, member of Agnes Scott's gospel choir, Joyful Noise, and the Studio Dance troupe, Spuhler worked with underprivileged children from the Jacksonville area. She helped combine drama, dance and music to encourage the children to develop alternative styles of worship.

More than 80 children, ranging in age from five to 12, were involved.

As part of the program, Spuhler asked the children to bring different kinds of music. "The only requirement was the lyrics had to be clean. I got everything from Michael Jackson to gospel music,' remembers Spuhler. "One boy, Jamison, brought in 'Shine,' a hit song that summer.'

Performed by the Atlantabased band Collective Soul, "Shine" was a top 10 single on the national Gavin chart, and the recording that included "Shine," Hints, Allegations and Things Left Unsaid, was in Billboard magazine's top 20. Spuhler was struck by the lyrics: "Heaven's little light gonna shine on me." She and the children created a pantomime band and sang the words to "Shine."

Later, the ASC student read the words of other Collective Soul songs, and was impressed with the group's messages, and decided to write Rising Sun Management Group about her experience and thank

The Secret of the True Shamrock

MY DISCOVERY VALIDATES THE CLOVER'S CLAIM TO BEING THE EMBLEM OF CHRISTIAN FAITH AND IRISH PRIDE

MOVING? ith all the controversies raging in the world today, one tiny issue in particular has long engaged my imagination, if not exactly my passion: What is the true and original Shamrock? Along with the Rose for England and the Thistle for Scotland, this lowly green sprig appears on the British coat of arms representing Ireland, all three springing from one stalk. The name shamrock is from the old Irish seam rog meaning three-leaved, yet there has been much debate as to whether the true and original shamrock is the common white clover, the wood sorrel or one of several other lesser known plants.

Even before St. Patrick is said to have made it famous by his analogy to the Holy Trinity, the shamrock was known in ancient Eire as a protection against evil spirits. Having grown up in Atlanta's Morningside area when it was a strong Jewish neighborhood, I was aware early on of the difficulty my friends had in perceiving our ideas of the Trinity as anything but polytheistic. The Sh'ma (Deuteronomy 6:4) emphasizing the ONE-ness of God, is central to their faith. In my concern

not to argue, but to present clarification of our concept, I began collecting metaphors for the Trinity—the shamrock being one everyone knows, but like all metaphors, breaking down in the end. (A parallel, after all, by definition, can only go alongside, never fully connect.)

One summer night, I was on my hands and knees with a flashlight, looking for a dropped contact lens on the lawn. There, appearing like small dewdrops in the grass, the clovers among the fescue, I was astonished to discover were all folded up like little people praying—two leaves together like small hands and the third bowed head-like over them. Fascinated, I began sneaking up

on other plants sleeping there

in the dark and realized there

are many others besides the

well-known mimosa that close up at night. The sorrel, in fact (oxalis), folds up like an umbrella, all three leaves symmetrically downward

> Yet if you go into a florist and ask for a shamrock, you will most likely be given the sorrel, a large, spindly, daddy longlegs-looking creature

along the stem.

with the three lobes of its leaves squared off as if cut by shears, and bearing small white, or pink or lavender or yellow trumpet-shaped blooms.

My discovery seems to vindicate the clover's claim to being the true emblem of Christian faith and Irish pride. Can it be that Patrick himself, or the ancients before him, were aware of the nocturnal piety of this common but indispensable plant, and so honored it over its

fellows for reasons beyond that of convenient trilogy? Oxalis, though some varieties are tart and edible herbs, contains a potential poison. Its uses are largely ornamental and derivative. Clover, on the other hand, is not only a forage crop for creatures of the field but a food for humans in the form of its honey. As a legume, it enriches the soil with necessary nitrogen, and it provides children with graceful and chainable blossoms for crowns and "jewels," and even occasional "luck" with a rare four-leaved find. (Let us be cautious of wishing luck, however; the word comes from "Lucifer" and connotes a reliance on chance).

Furthermore, the clover's blossom itself is that form known as composite—separate florets clustered in community, appearing as one flower. And even the individual lobes of the cloverleaf are not triangles so much as perfect little hearts, our symbol for love.

One layman's humble discovery in the dark proves again that some of our most profound insights may occur to us on our knees!

unlight streams through a glass ceiling at the offices of the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG), illuminating a set of distinctive Olympic banners. In addition to solar energy that gives brightness to the building, there is a sort of energy that permeates every hallway there—the Olympic spirit.

The spirit is especially apparent when listening to three Agnes Scott alumnae who are part of the team making the Olympics in Atlanta a reality. Susan Carr '72, Jennifer Parker '85

and Susan Kelly '92, all agree that being part of the Centennial Olympics is an opportunity they are glad they haven't missed

They belong to the 900-person staff working to make the Olympics happen. They will complete their jobs in the summer of 1996, when more than 10,000

athletes from almost 200 nations converge for the Games.

As program manager for sponsor services, Parker develops and implements programs that recognize or showcase the national and international sponsors' involvement in the games. She secured her job three years ago after a persistent

T was working at Northern Telecom when several people from that company left to work with ACOG. After six months of writing letters, making telephone calls and never giving up, I got the job," she explains. Kelly and Carr also campaigned

for their jobs. Their initial temporary positions as contract employees led to full-time staff positions.

As paging coordinator and telecommunications assistant, Kelly remarks that friends and family are impressed with her involvement in an internationally recognized project. Her responsibilities involve testing venue sites to develop the best methods of communicating during the games. The communications systems will include cellular telephones, radios and pagers.

"The liberal arts education at Agnes Scott College really prepared me to go into any field," says Kelly. "All of the subjects, especially language, prepared me to handle this job."

Carr notes that her college-level French was helpful when she was faced with translating technical documents from Albertville but admits that she relied heavily on a French dictionary of

Even more important than specific language skills, Carr says that her Agnes Scott education taught her how to "look at a situation, pick out the important details and move forward," a skill which is beneficial as manager of financial administration-technology.

Parker credits Agnes Scott with instilling a true "can do" attitude.

"Our professors, the lecturers who spoke to us, everyone associated with Agnes Scott, taught us how to dream big things," explains Parker. "Working with the Olympics means that we have to create and implement programs which have never been done before. There is no one to teach us how to do our jobs, so we have to be self-starters who aren't afraid to try something new.'

For Parker, trying something new meant spending 33 days during the Winter Olympics in Lillehammer, Norway, helping representatives from the Atlanta Committee host special events to promote the Atlanta games."

She brought back experience, memories and souvenirs, including Olympic lapel pins traded Nancy Kerrigan and the bobsled team from Jamaica!

Annual Fund Update

Gifts totaling \$142,013 were made toward the Annual Fund goal of \$1.2 million during the months of February and March. Alumnae have contributed \$403,844 to the total with 27.68 percent participation through April 14. The spring phonathon raised a total of \$38,629 which includes \$24,127 raised during the alumnae phonathon from 455 alumnae pledges

The remainder of the estate of Virginia Fleming Prettyman'34 was donated, totaling \$100,000, and a \$10,000 annuity was established by an annonymous alumna. The College also received \$7,000 through the Georgia Foundation for Independent Colleges from the Rich Foundation and the Atlanta Foundation.

Gifts received for scholarships include: \$68,000 from the Lettie Pate Whitehead Foundation for annual student scholarships; \$21,000 donated anonymously toward the Carolinas Scholarship Fund; and \$10,000 to the Annice Hawkins Scholarship fund. Rockwell International also donated \$5,000, matching Barbara Frink Allen's gift.

As of March, \$27,751 had been raised toward the Decatur Campaign.

Ketchin Talks About God

ALUMNA AUTHOR BRINGS THE STRUGGLE OF FAITH AND LEARNING TO CAMPUS

outhern writer Flannery O'Connor once made a startling observation: "By and large, people of the South still conceive of humanity in theological terms. While the South is hardly Christ-centered, it is most certainly Christ-haunted.'

Fifth generation Southerner and author Susan Ketchin '70, explored the intersection of religion and intellectual life in the works of contemporary Southern writers and great writers from the past, in late January at the invitation of Agnes Scott's Committee on Faith and Learning.

The program entitled, "Talk About God In Southern Story & Song,' included Southern gospel singing and readings from Ketchin's book The Christ-Haunted Landscape, Faith and Doubt in Southern Fiction. Through stories and interviews, the book shows the imprint of "old-time religion" on the artistic vision of 12 contemporary writers from the American South.

The program began with

an informal "coffeehouse" with Ketchin singing, playing guitar and discussing the roots of Southern literature and music.

With readings from her new book and conversation, Ketchin addressed the Agnes Scott community including a gathering of trustees, during a convocation in Woltz Reception Room of Rebekah Scott Hall. "I'm especially happy to be talking at a convocation since I cut so many of them when I was at Agnes Scott," she began.

Poking at herself and the audience with gentle humor, Ketchin admitted, "I am a recovering Calvinist—one day at a time. I am also a passionate reader of fiction and I have found along with many others that the mythic visions of writers such as William Faulkner, O'Connor, Katherine Ann Porter and Walker Percy have provided profound insights into and provocative questions about my own life, serving as both balm and torment to my Southern soul." She discussed the influence of the Civil War on Southern religious thought

and addressed the tension that exists between faith and artistic vision. O'Connor described it as a struggle between her identities as a Southerner and a Catholic: "The writer must wrestle with it like Jacob wrestled with the angel until he has extracted a blessing.'

Ketchin discussed her quest to understand a faith "embedded with questions" and full of paradox, and she spoke of contemporary Southern writers who willingly stayed with that paradox of faith, who struggled with its potent contradictions, who courageously lived in its mystery. "For some, religion has served as a prism through which to interpret human experience, for others as a target for satire. In all cases, the fitting metaphor for their anguished struggle with issues of faith and doubt, of religious and aesthetic integrity, has been that of a crucible Like Hazel Motes in Wise Blood, we are pursued relent-lessly by the wild, ragged figure of Christ. .

At a lunch time gathering, Ketchin talked about fiction writing as an act of faith, and

entertained questions about the "saintly outlaws" that populate Southern fiction.

Ketchin is an associate editor in fiction for Doubletake Magazine, Duke University, Durham, N.C., and a member of The Tarwater Band.

INTERIM OBSERVATIONS

In recent weeks I've been privileged to give Mortar Board's "Last Lecture," one of the pleasures of the year's end at Agnes Scott. I began with what I said in the first days after my August arrival: This is a fine place. I'm glad I came.

As in that lecture, I want to report on an eventful year, share observations about campus climate, relay updates in the academic and administrative reviews, launched in 1993-94, and alert you to some external concerns of note.

I view the campus climate as remarkably positive. There is

the pleasure of a continuing commitment to excellence in program and in relationshipsamong students, faculty and staff—of the College with its extended family and external communities. We've become accustomed to celebrations, to community appreciation of little victories and to acknowledging individual and institutional achievements. I'm told of a renewed sense of mutual support, of heightened trust in a campus proud of the diverse perspectives and backgrounds woven into our College tapestry. I sense an Agnes Scott on the move, a college confident of bringing to fruition a practical and multiyear plan to achieve an enrollment aligned to our capacity for 750 students. There is openness to a future envisioned by new presidential leadership that will be shaped in dialogue between Mary Brown Bullock '66 and College constituencies.

As the academic review comes to a close, an important strategic document emerges which is framed by the convictions of faculty, students and staff who responded to the Trustees' challenge to sharpen the College focus. Review Chair Terry McGehee,

professor of art, and her colleagues have articulated a set of institutional values which will serve as touchstones for programs that build on faculty strengths, College heritage and institutional location. There are no gimmicks to the plan, simply the rigor of a focused liberal arts curriculum as preparation for an uncertain world. The committee's work proposes to teach students the art of connecting across curricula. The committee recognizes and makes space for the many forms of teaching in which our faculty engage, balancing traditional courses and seminars with forms of teaching that utilize collaborative learning through independent study, guided research and internships. They advise modifying the academic organization to balance disciplinary agenda with multidisciplinary opportunities to advance pedagogy and evolve programs. The committee has worked with existing structures of faculty governance, building a base for continuing faculty attention to evolving educational issues. The committee has come to its work with discipline and dedication, and its report is a gift for our future.

The administrative review, chaired by Assistant Vice

President for Finance Karen Roy, has engaged faculty, staff and students to reconsider how we do the business that supports our educational mission. That committee has reviewed day-to-day activities against the yardstick of student-c entered service, for example, revising hours of operation and methods of responding to suggestions. They have undertaken collaborations to clarify administrative intention and simplify procedures, for example, reconsidering our goals and arrangements for summer programs. In the spirit of the review, College officers have encouraged teamwork to heighten the effectiveness of College presence in the broader community. One such effort was "Travel Blitz," a new approach to development, alumnae and student recruitment activities, recently honored with a CASE (Council for the Advancement and Support of Education) award. That award is shared among the staff and our many alumnae collaborators. Also in the spirit of the review was the consolidation of administrative functions among three College officers. This streamlining heightened administrative effectiveness, played to the strengths of the three incumbent officers, and made possible a substantial resource reallocation to academic activities. During this presidential

transition year of active introspection and internal accomplishment, we have noticed external circumstances likely to impact the College, our students and their families. The good news is that the Southeast will produce a greater number of college graduates. Georgia, in particular, has supported its aspirations through the HOPE grant programs for college students and through focused attention to K-12 education. Agnes Scott earns public trust by serving the public interest in partnership with other not-for-profit and state-funded institutions of higher education. The bad news is that concern with public debt, especially at the federal levels, raises practical concerns about affordability and access for well-prepared and talented students of modest means As an institutional member of several educational associations we monitor this situation closely and participate in constructive efforts to advance student and family interests. We suggest you do the same.

hen an Agnes Scott sophomore called me in 1992 seeking career advice, naturally I was flattered. I was in my second year as publications director at a small South Carolina college and my third year out of Agnes Scott, and here was Josie Hoilman '94, thinking about an editorial career and looking for a mentor. Me? A "mentor"?

We talked for an hour or more about internships and entry-level editorial positions. Then the conversation drifted. Josie caught me up on the news of my former professors. I told her stories about the pranks my friends and I had pulled as students. We discussed parietals and how she and other students felt about them.

It was almost like being there.

We stayed in touch via phone and letters. During her senior year, I helped her put together a résumé geared toward writing and editorial work. We talked frankly about how an interview is perceived from the interviewer's chair.

In return, Josie gave me a real sense of what life was like at Agnes Scott, a connection with my alma mater that

alumnae publications could never offer. I was deeply grateful for this, because the distance between my home and the campus kept me from visiting often.

After graduating, Josie quickly landed a job as an editorial assistant with a local magazine. She wrote me later, "All your suggestions for a job like this were exactly right!" When I moved back to Atlanta a year ago, Josie and I finally met face-to-face. I realized what a valuable longdistance friendship ours had been over the past two years. When I tell other alumnae about Josie and me, they often respond with their own, similar anecdotes. In fact, students and alumnae have been "hooking up" informally for years. With the advent of fax and electronic mail, a new level of convenience has come to these connections.

The young women were Agnes Scott graduates intent on coming together to "advance the interests of dear old Agnes Scott." "Visionary young enthusiasts" is how they described themselves two years later in the Aurora. On commencement night, May 24, 1895, the "association came into existence: with Mary Barnett 1893, president; Anna Irwin Young 1895, vice president; and Mary Mel Neel 1894, secretary and treasurer." (The alumnae house is named for Anna Irwin Young who later taught mathematics at the College.) How was the focus of their

energy organized? Activities of the new association were centered around three themes—scholarships, ongoing educational experiences, and the desire to be the "nucleus of union and energy for all interested" in the furtherance of Agnes Scott. The organizers set a dues structure for themselves and then doubled the dues the first year. A scholarship was given for the 1896-97 academic year by these women who described their ideas as "large but with small means of carrying them out." From the beginning they wanted other women to share in the Agnes Scott educational experience and planned to "pay the tuition each year of as many people as its funds will permit." To raise additional funds for scholarships they sponsored a musical and held bazaars. By the sixth year the association was meeting

Continuing educational involvement of the members was another focus. Reading lists were distributed by the alumnae association to those far and near who chose to involve themselves in the reading circles. Through these reading circles the members believed

the tuition of one day student

each year.

they would become "truer, nobler women."

For 100, years, guided by numerous alumnae presidents, involving over 10,000 members, the focus of the Alumnae Association has remained centered on supporting Agnes Scott.

Scholarships and financial support for current students of the College are supported through the Annual Fund. As of March 1995, the percentage of alumnae giving for the year is higher than the previous year, though the total amount of the gifts is less than 1994. Reunion class observances provide a special opportunity to give above and beyond the Annual Fund gift.

Today alumnae serve on the Alumnae Association Board of Directors in a number of chairing positions. Educational programs are offered to graduates both on the campus and during chapter meetings. Professors from the College visit distant sites to engage alumnae in educational presentations and discussions, often providing suggested resources for study prior to the meetings.

In 1995, as in 1895, the "nucleus of union and energy" for Agnes Scott alumnae is the Alumnae Association. The association adopted a Strategic Plan in 1994 and is now proposing changes to its constitution and bylaws in order that the goals of the Strategic Plan may be implemented more effectively.

Today the Alumnae
Association activities include
encouraging prospective students
to enroll (supporting the admissions office), serving on a career
advisory board, and mentoring
students in their career choices.
Through the "exam care-basket"
project the student/alumnae
connection is strengthened
further.

The young women who formed the association in 1895 asked for time to remedy their "youth and small number." The enthusiasm of Agnes Scott women through the hundred years has not waned. In this centennial year of the Agnes Scott Alumnae Association, let us celebrate those women of the past and pledge our continuing service and financial support to Agnes Scott, that we too will be a "prologue to the future."

A Year of Transition

INTERIM PRESIDENT SALLY MAHONEY REVIEWS HER WORK AT AGNES SCOTT

ince August 1994, Sally Mahoney, senior associate provost emerita of Stanford University, has served as interim president of Agnes Scott College. On June 30, Mahoney will step down when Mary Brown Bullock '66 assumes the duties of the seventh president of Agnes Scott College. Mahoney has been named interim president of Mount Mary College in Wisconsin.

W hat was your first perception of Agnes Scott? SALLY MAHONEY: My first perception was of hearing the tower bell ring and going out to the gazebo to find everybody in the College taking the time to greet me. That was an enormous and heartfelt welcome and it was from everyone, not just one set of people. That said to me that building community, which I take to be a very important institutional value, was not going to be an exercise in building but in reinforcement.

And how has your sense of the College grown or changed? SM: I thought Agnes Scott was good and I will come away with the feeling that it is better than good. We have a lot of truths to tell about our accomplishment and our commitment continuously to improve. Part of that truth is a welcome that is respectful of common aspirations in individuals and in group differences. And part of that truth is a commitment to trust in the community and its honor system.

How would you evaluate your own "interim" experience? SM: One of the things that made it possible for me to be effective from the beginning was that there was a clear agenda here and everyone and every part of the College knew it. There was an academic review and an

administrative review. Those reviews always had as their purpose to find focus, reaffirm and rearticulate the values of the institution and build from that. There wasn't a question of what I was supposed to do here beyond the daily things. Sometimes an interim president is asked to hold a place together and wait for the permanent leader to get started. That wasn't the task here and that is why the Board wanted someone with an array of experiences and skills.

My agenda included giving members of the Agnes Scott community, faculty, students, staff, alumnae and others in the community who are stakeholders with us, a sense of ownership in the future of the College. Inside the College we got better at candor and at seeing the College in comparison with other institutions. We reduced the sense of mystery about things and got better at open and fact-based discussion.

W hat role did you have in supporting candor in the College


SM: I think what I may have done is give people permission. I wanted to hear. I was willing to engage. This enabled people to speak and to ask for clarification, to be free about disagreement and to understand that not all disagreement is disagreeableness.

What do you believe is ASC's greatest asset? SM: It's the quality of the College's students and faculty as well as the relationships between faculty and students. The relationships are shown in a variety of ways such as student/faculty collaborations that go on in biology, chemistry and psychology and in faculty involvement with student issues. An example is the work that Mortar Board did with diversity this year and the role of faculty, especially the part Instructor Jo Bradley played in that. The work between students and faculty here is enormously important.

How can Agnes Scott build upon the academic and admin-



SM: In bringing closure to the academic review, we fully appreciate that it has been done in such a way that it has further empowered faculty governance.

The academic review was not simply some independent committee that when it closed its tent its agenda would dissolve and never be heard of again. The values and proposals of the review have created plenty of room for building. It's a good foundation document.

Most of the administrative review had to do with quality service—that is, with efficiency and effectiveness-on a student-centered campus. Its emphasis on collaboration and cross-constituency team work will have a long-term effect in the way the College works. However, this review didn't really focus on student life as a functional area. So I think that is where we have our next opportunity for self-analysis and consideration of possibilities for improvement.

The College will move forward with this agenda, which I've discussed with Mary Brown Bullock, along with whatever other ventures our new president wants to propose.

What will you take with you from Agnes Scott? SM: This year at Agnes Scott reaffirms that I enjoy the task of leadership.

Searching for patterns of the mind

PROFESSOR/STUDENT RESEARCH TEAM STUDIES RELATIONSHIPS AMONG REACTION TIME, MEMORY SKILLS AND READING COMPREHENSION.

om Hogan, chair of the psychology department, enjoys giving Agnes Scott students the opportunity to "participate in unique research experiments." Last fall Hogan enlisted Sara Wolfe '95 and Karin Ford '96, as a part of the class Psychology 324 (cognition and brain processes) to conduct experiments dealing with the relationship of reaction time, memory skills and reading comprehension.

Wolfe appreciated the opportunity to work one-onone with a professor and to conduct her own research. "Even though the research was mainly his idea," said Wolfe, "we actually got to give input as to what factors might be causing [the results]. Ford also enjoyed the active role she played in completing experiments. "I had a lot of responsibility," she said.


For the past six years Hogan has tapped two to four students to work on this cognitive research project. He said the students, "get a lot of experience carrying out experiments in terms of dealing with participants in the study. And it obviously helps them to have the research background on their curricula vitae."

In order to determine the relationship between shortterm memory, reaction time and reading comprehension, Hogan devised three experiments conducted with the help of 22 students from Agnes Scott's general psychology classes. The first experiment required students to read a passage and mark the word they were reading at the end of two minutes. Next, they answered 30 multiple-choice questions to test their reading comprehension. One month after the first experiment, the subjects completed a shortterm memory test.

Hogan, Ford and Wolfe hypothesized that faster readers would exhibit shorter reaction times. They also theorized that those with good reading comprehension skills would have better short-term memory

The results of their experiments supported these hypotheses, but also led to an unexpected conclusion: shortterm memory of sentences relates to reading speed as well as to reading comprehension. However, they could not determine whether short-term memory affects reading speed or whether the practice of reading improves the shortterm memory.

While many studies have been conducted on reading

comprehension, Hogan said there is always more to learn about the process of reading and how to teach reading.

This is especially important to Wolfe, who wants to be a kindergarten teacher after graduating.

"I really understand the

cognitive process and how much a child can remember."

She looks forward to using her research experience with Hogan to find creative and effective ways to improve her future students' long-term memory.

Travel blitz '95 plans to repeat first-year success

A tree takes root in Garden for Peace

ASC'S RESPONSE TO THE OKLAHOMA BOMBING TRAGEDY.

he distance between Agnes Scott College and Oklahoma City shrank from 800 miles to as close as a television on April 19, when the explosion of a

Ryder truck chock full of fuel oil and fertilizer ripped a nine-story gash in the facade of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. When the smoke cleared in the Oklahoma town, the state—indeed the nation—found itself staring at the crumbled concrete grave of 167 people and dealing with an emotional wound even more tremendous than the 8-foot-by-30-foot crater that lay at the base of the Murrah building. As horrific as this scene may have been, the more frightening reality for most Americans emerged in the faces of those accused of the treacherous

act—other Americans. Oklahoma City's response to the tragedy has been a case study in

compassion and diligence. On campus, the ASC community came together, May 1, for a memorial service and tree planting in the Garden for

Peace (a part of the Alumnae Garden adjacent to the Anna Young Alumnae House). The Rev. Paige McRight '68, Agnes Scott chaplain, officiated at the ceremony

"We had the service at the request

of members of the staff and student body,' explains McRight. "We felt it was important to recognize the loss in Oklahoma and to celebrate the efforts of those who responded to the relief efforts. We wanted to note that peace is important and that vio-

lence can't have the last word."

which included a reading of Psalm 121 by Marley Maupin '97 from Enid, Okla., and excerpts from the poem "A Prayer for Children" by Ina Jones Hughs '63 (see complete poem in Agnes Scott Alumnae Magazine Summer 1995). Those gathered took turns shoveling earth onto a newly planted Cherokee Princess Dogwood.

Minke named athletics/P.E. chair

SEARCH FOR "PERSONAL TOUCH" LEADS ST. JOSEPH'S STAFFER TO AGNES SCOTT

ext month Starlyn Minke, senior women's administrator/compliance coordinator of the athletic program at St. Joseph's College, will become Agnes Scott's first chair of athletics and physical education.

"I was looking for a small liberal arts college with an excellent academic program," Minke said of her decision to join the ASC faculty and staff. "In the larger programs, you lose the personal touch."

While at St. Joseph's, Minke has been responsible for administration of athletic contests and contracts and for compliance with all rules and regulations governing the Northeast Women's Athletic Conference, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the regulations of the college which is located in West Hartford, Conn. During that time Minke also served as head coach in two sports, volleyball and

Prior to that she served as assistant to the athletic director at Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Mass., and as a graduate teaching assistant at Kent State University in Ohio where she earned a Master of Arts in Physical Education. Her undergraduate degree is from the University of Wisconsin.

Minke's responsibility here will be to chair both physical education (an academic department) and athletics (a function of the dean of students). "Star Minke impressed me as being unique in articulating the differences and similarities between athletics and physical education," notes Dean of the College Sarah Blanshei. "I think she is uniquely qualified to be the first chair."

Minke will help with recruitment of student athletes and will work with the College as it explores the possibilities of joining a conference (like the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference) or "creating a conference" for women's colleges.

"It would require a lot of work. But it would be fun," said Minke.

Dean of Students Gué Hudson is pleased that the College was "able to hire someone of Starlyn's caliber. She has had experience at Mount Holyoke and St. Joseph's, and has taken St. Joseph's program from beginning level to a competitive program. I am hopeful that will happen here."

Alumnae develops leaders in Atlanta's "at-risk kids"

hen Angela Scott '85 completed her study in physics at Agnes Scott College, everyone expected her to enter the scientific world. Yet today, Scott is pursuing a master's in public administration and coordinates FutureForce, a two-year-old program aimed at developing leadership skills in "at-risk" Atlanta students between the ages of 12 and 19.

Some 250 students have already benefited.

Through enrichment activities, community service projects, discussion groups, networking opportunities, field trips, out-of-town retreats and award presentations, Scott, a wife and mother of two, is guiding the youth of Atlanta toward leadership and responsibility.

Meeting with staff, training volunteers and dealing with students' problems are among her daily tasks. Admits Scott: "My ear is glued to the phone all day." Occasionally, her job takes her beyond the confines of the office to allow her to do her favorite work: making direct contact with students.

Students have traveled to such places as Rock Eagle and a ski resort in Crested Butte, Colo., to improve self-confidence in fun surroundings.

But not all of her tasks are as pleasant. "Visiting incarcerated students and having to go to funerals of children that I've had contact with is hard," Scott solemnly

admits. "Knowing that they're there [incarcerated] and I can't do anything to help."

Scott entered this profession sort of indirectly. During her high school and college years, she volunteered with Program Reach Out, counseling young girls with unstable families, and at Georgia Regional Hospital, caring for severely retarded children. One summer, while working as a designer of fundraising projects, Scott joined the EXODUS/Atlanta Cities in Schools projects, the parent organization of FutureForce. "They liked me and I've been coming back ever since," Scott boasts.

The FutureForce coordinator attributes much of her success and stamina to her alma mater. Making the transition from an all black high

school to a predominantly white college posed some problems for her. "Rejection became a daily part of life. I didn't feel it from the faculty but from my peers, so my comfort zone [was tested and eventually] expanded.

P.A.C.T. draws strength from collaboration

CUSTODIAL STAFF GETS NEW INSIGHTS, OPPORTUNITIES IN PROGRAM DESIGNED TO IMPROVE JOB SKILLS AND ENHANCE WORK RESPONSIBILITIES.

ith Total Quality
Management (TQM)
concepts in efficiency

services staff has worked hard to
stay a step ahead.

As a result, the staff members have improved their work performance and confronted sagging morals

Last year, the Office of the Physical Plant hired independent consultants Roesel Kent and Associates to help make improvements in the operation of the custodial department. From these suggestions emerged the Positive Action Custodial Team (P.A.C.T.).

P.A.C.T., a 10-member group that has taken an active role in improving the operations of the custodial staff, is made up of lead workers from both shifts; one elected member from each shift; three volunteers; one rotating member; Victoria Lambert, manager of campus services; James Ojeda, custodial supervisor; and Elsa Peña, director of physical plant.

As one of its first actions, P.A.C.T. changed the way jobs are assigned to the 19-member custodial staff. Rather than have their supervisors assign jobs, a job lottery determines assignments. "There's less friction, less griping," said team member Earnest Sanford. "No one can say there's favoritism."

Right now, the entire custo-

dial staff is in the process of learning the most efficient and effective ways of doing various jobs. P.A.C.T. members, who meet weekly, are standardizing the per-

formance of certain duties as well as testing new methods and

equipment. Students have noticed P.A.C.T. changes, including the addition of central garbage cans on each floor of the residence halls. With students bringing trash to the central cans, custodial

workers have

fewer receptacles to gather. Custodians are also testing new floor mats in several campus buildings in order to determine the most effective choice for each area.

This new way of running the custodial department has encouraged staff members. "It makes me feel good to know we are doing something to influence other people, doing something to better ourselves, the department, the physical plant, the whole cam-

pus," said Sanford.

Many P.A.C.T. members express a renewed sense of pride in their work and the image of the custodial staff. "I jump on

other people if I see they are not doing something up to par," said team member Travis Nolley.

Elmira Pierce, a P.A.C.T. member who has cleaned the alumnae and president's houses for nine years, "drew" the library in the job lottery this year. Because she had never used a floor polishing machine, she enlisted the help of Corrie Cash, another custodial staffer, to teach her how to use it. "I thought I'd

better sneak a little practice," said Pierce. This kind of self-motivation proves the real success of P.A.C.T.

Peña is impressed. "They feel

very proud—P.A.C.T. gives them something that belongs to them. They feel that they can make a difference."
P.A.C.T.

values teamwork.
Solutions to most problems have come through group brainstorming.
Ojeda said P.A.C.T. has given people "a chance to voice opin-

ions. They're learning things, and we get a chance to learn from them, too." Rather than being charged with making decisions concerning the custodial staff, Ojeda plays the role of collaborator: "When it comes to the P.A.C.T. team, I'm just one of the members."

Recently the group made a presentation to inform the Building and Grounds
Committee of the board of

trustees of P.A.C.T.'s progress.

"That was a challenge," said team member Horace Stephens, of the presentation. "It was quite an experience just to see the people sit listening to you. We caught their attention because we did so well." Elmira Pierce enjoyed the experience for a different reason. For her, the presentation meant the opportunity to do something in the board room besides clean it up.

According to Lambert, "the whole concept behind P.A.C.T. is to empower people who haven't had much power . . . by allowing them to be part of the decision-making process and showing them we'll act on [those] decisions"

By looking for creative solutions to problems, P.A.C.T. has created a more efficient and fair work schedule, purchased new products that better serve their needs, and created a positive work environment.

P.A.C.T. members have earned accolades from the College administration. "I'm delighted with [P.A.C.T.'s] effectiveness," said Vice President of Finance and Development William Gailey. "I have a tremendous amount of respect for what they have done."

The entire campus benefits from these changes because, said Pierce, "this is a team working together for the good of Agnes Scott."

Tower Council sets 'lofty' goal for each member

UNIQUE FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE SEEKS TO RAISE AT LEAST \$1,000 FROM EACH OF 70 DESIGNATED ALUMNAE.

he Tower Circle Committee, an organization with "lofty ambitions," derives its name from the tallest building on campus, the Agnes Scott Hall bell tower.

The committee, made up of current and former trustees and alumnae, is unique among the College's many fundraising committees in that the goal of its seven members is to raise a minimum of \$1,000 from each of 70 designated alumnae and friends of the College.

The committee was formed last October as a means of increasing volunteers' involvement in fundraising and personalizing Agnes Scott's fundraising activities, said Anne Schatz, manager of stewardship.

"As donors are contacted personally we have the opportunity to educate them about what is happening on campus, to hear their concerns and to thank them for their giving," said Schatz.

Annual Fund group reorganized

COMMITTEE TO MEET QUARTERLY TO UPDATE FUNDRAISING APPEALS.

he Annual Fund Advisory Committee, comprised of alumnae volunteers, was reorganized in March. The committee will take on a more active role in the College's fundraising planning by meeting four times a year with the Office of Development to discuss the Annual Fund's programming, phone and mail appeals, reunion giving and personal solicitations. "The development office felt that under the previous struc-

ture volunteers had less ownership of the committee. [With the reorganization] we want them to have more input into the methods we use to solicit donors," said Sarah Cave, acting director of the Annual Fund. Confirmed members of the advisory committee include Mary Madison Wisdom '41, Anne Diseker Beebe '67, Claire West '90, Marilyn Hubbard '70, Anne Curtis Jones '79 and Katherine Stubbs '67.

In other Annual Fund news, reunion classes were recognized during Alumnae Weekend for outstanding giving to the Annual Fund. The class of 1975 raised the largest amount, \$59,796; the class of 1945 had

the highest percentage of participation, 69 percent. The class of 1960 was also recognized with a 62 percent participation rate.

During the Annual Fund Phonathon April 10-12, students received 339 pledges, with alumnae contributing \$16,957

The 1994-95 Senior Campaign raised \$7,250 in pledges. Fifty-five students pledged to the Annual Fund for a total participation rate of 48 percent.

100 Years Young

The Alumnae Association celebrated its 100th anniversary during this year's weekend festivities. Lowrie Fraser '56, president of the Alumnae Association, provided alumnae with a brief history of the organization's founding, centered around the themes of "scholarships, ongoing educational experiences and the desire to be the nucleus of union and energy for all interested in the furtherance of Agnes Scott." A time line of the first 37 years of the association is excerpted from Fraser's speech.

1895 - Six women meet in the library of Agnes Scott Institute to form the Alumnae Association. Mary Josephine Barnett '93 was elected as its first president.

1901 - The first Annual Fund drive helps raise funds for a new gym.

1906 - Birmingham, Ala., alumnae form a chapter.

1913 - The association established a loan fund for juniors and seniors.

1916 - Mobile and Chattanooga alumnae form chapters.

1917 - ASC Board of Trustees elects the first alumnae members, Bessie Scott Harman, Inst. and Mary Wallace Kirk '11.

1921 - An Alumnae Register, predecessor to the alumnae directory, is printed and distributed to 1,200 alumnae.

1922 - The Alumnae House is dedicated and named for Anna Irwin Young '95, making it the first alumnae house in the South and the second in the nation.

1929 - Orlando, Charlotte and Richmond alumnae form chapters.

1932 - Alumnae Association chapters begin to use "moving pictures" of campus scenes to encourage interest in Agnes Scott.

MARION LEATHERS KUNTZ'45 Distinguished Career

he has received medals and professorships, recognitions of accomplishment for distinguished scholarship,

and she is about to publish her sixth book, but Marion Kuntz found her greatest satisfaction as a mother. "I love being a



mother," she says. "That's still my most important career." She married during her senior year at Agnes Scott. One son came after 18 months, another four years later; it would be 17 years before she resumed her academic life.

A divorce and the need to establish a career outside the home brought her back to school. The same year she received an M.A. in Latin and Greek from Emory University, her youngest son graduated from grammar school and her oldest from high school. "We grew up together and graduated together," says Kuntz.

She holds a Ph.D. in renaissance studies in Latin from Emory. Since 1966, she has been on the faculty of Georgia State University. For 10 years, she served as chair of GSU's foreign languages department. The uni-

versity has recognized her research in 16th century Venetian studies with Fuller E. Calloway, regent and research professorships.

Her routine is rigorous. She teaches 10 hours a week; doing research accounts for another 90 hours. Since January, she has written six major papers and almost completed a book on Dionisio Gallo, an unknown French prelate attempting reform in the 16th century Catholic Church. She discovered his writings while researching in a Venice archive.


Kuntz has been offered opportunities at other universities. "But I've been lucky," she says. "After college, both my sons settled in Atlanta." Now there are five grandchildren underfoot. "I have a wonderful life."

MEMYE CURTIS TUCKER '56 Distinguished Service to the College

emye Tucker has had a lifelong relationship with Agnes Scott. "I feel like I've been involved since 1922," she laughs. "My mother was a graduate (Mary Freeman Curtis '26) and I grew up inside all her memories of the College. I always knew I was going to school there."

In 1972, Tucker became president of the Agnes Scott Alumnae Association during a time of enormous change at the College. President Wallace Alston retired that year and the director of alumnae affairs had died. What Tucker assumed

would be a figurehead position soon demanded her full attention and she resigned other responsibilities to attend to it.



From 1974 to 1978, she was an alumna trustee. For the past erator for the panel of the annual Agnes Scott Writer's Festival. Through it she has helped bring top contemporary writers to the campus. An accomplished poet with an M.A. from Columbia and a Ph.D. from Emory, both in English literature, Tucker has occasionally taught at the College since 1968. In 1993, she was honored with the first Agnes Scott Distinguished Alumna Writer award and last summer she was John Ciardi Scholar in

Poetry at The Breadloaf Writer's Conference in Middlebury, Vt.

But this alumnae award had particular significance, reminding her of her family's long involvement with the College. In the audience was Tucker's father, 91-year-old Dr. Walker L. Curtis, who had courted her mother while she was a student at Agnes Scott and he was a medical student at Emory.

Distinguished Community Service

or Patricia Webb, community service has been international. As a medical researcher on viruses for the U.S. Public Health Service, the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the graduate of Tulane University Medical School has worked in remote corners of the world on some of the most difficult and dangerous diseases of this century.

From 1955 to 1961 Webb worked with the U.S. Army Medical Research Unit in Malaysia. She then joined the Mid-America Research Unit in the Panama Canal Zone. There her work centered on the Machupo virus, the causal agent for Hemorrhagic Fever. Her studies took her to Argentina, Bolivia and across Central America.

She returned to Atlanta in 1976 to work in the CDC's



famous environmentallyenclosed heart lab after the first Ebola outbreak, then moved to

Sierra Leone to work on Lassa or Hemorrhagic Fever, in Africa.

"It's pretty nice to be paid to go to all these different places," said Webb. "But it was difficult in the field." Her last research position was with the CDC's laboratory in Fort Collins, Colo., where using bed bugs, she investigated the possibility of transmission of AIDS through insects. "Fortunately, it doesn't seem to," she said.

Since retirement in 1987, she has lived in Kilcreggan, Scotland.

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PARTING WORDS

Bittersweet memories of college life

AT GRADUATION, ALUMNA SORTS THROUGH FOUR YEARS TO PRESERVE FRAGMENTS OF LIFE AT ASC.

oday I must pack four years into boxes. I must sort through multicolored memories, through letters, photographs and papers, toss some onto the pyre and place others in my own time capsule.

Artifacts from my first year include a Black Cat dress that reminds me of a smaller self; the picture on my ID card that identifies another person. On my finger I wear the fossils of my sophomore year. Faded pajamas chronicle the craziness of my junior year's capping activities. In many ways I have documented the events of my senior year with the enthusiasm that a new mother employs recording the "firsts" of her baby.

Yet as I review the past four years, I realize it has been difficult. My personal evolution includes discovering what it means to be a woman and weighing how people respond to me as an African American. Sifting through the years, I realize that there are moments I am not certain how to archive and there are faces I may or may not choose to keep in my album. There are things about Agnes Scott that I will exclude from my book

but not from my memory.

What will I do with the

What will I do with the hieroglyphics a professor wrote me in the margins of my papers? Her comments did only pertain to that particular assignment, but the words remind me of her obliquely offensive remarks made throughout the semester—the references to me as "the class's only African-American representative" which I attribute to her lack of tact. I will exclude her from my archives since most of my professors have been demanding and supportive.

I have purposely lost the scrolls students received in introductory foreign language lab to help improve our Spanish—the bingo cards with pictures instead of numbers. I refused to put a single chip on the cardboard grid after I saw a jet black face with watermelon lips look up at me from one of the squares on my card. Although the assistant said that *negrito* was just an expression, I felt maligned by the caricature and will not preserve it.

I will, however, remember a silver-haired woman who stopped by my room one day. She did not seem uncomfortable with my race although I,

who had just showered, was uncomfortable being clad in only a towel. She had sterling memories of the time she spent at the College. We talked about how I had rearranged the furniture and about our families. I only wish that I had had the forethought to take her picture—it would have had a place in my archives.

Helen Friedman Blackshear '31

Blackshear poet laureate

ALABAMA WRITERS' CONCLAVE NAMES ASC GRADUATE THE STATE'S TOP POET

ighty-four years of Alabama history are etched on the welcoming face of Helen Friedman Blackshear '31. This month another line of history was added when the Montgomery resident was named Alabama's poet laureate by the Alabama Writers' Conclave. Between Elderhostel trips to Mexico and Poland, Blackshear returned home to discuss her life's work, reflected in her teaching, her marriage and her writing, which has fetched her nearly 50 state and national awards in the past five years.

Blackshear traces the origin of her interest in poetry to Georgia Poet Laureate Robert Loveman, her great uncle, who shared a house with her family in Tuscaloosa, Ala. Blackshear says Loveman taught her "to see things, to use my eyes to look at things differently." At his encouragement her eight-year-old observations took shape into poetry. Then came the influence of her high school teacher Wanda Detlie. "When I found she liked poetry, I wanted to write poetry that she liked

The spark that Loveman and Detlie gave was disciplined by Agnes Scott's own Emma May Laney, an indomitable force in the English department from 1919 to 1956 whom Lest We Forget author Edward McNair described as "the most powerfully influential person who has ever taught at Agnes Scott."

"She was quite strict but she had a way of letting us

know what parts were good and what parts were not acceptable without crushing our creativity," recalls Blackshear. "[She also] taught me how to get things out of people. Later on when I was teaching creative writing I used her methods—having people sit in a circle and read and then pointing out first the good things. .

While Laney became Blackshear's teacher-mentor, Robert Browning became her muse. Attracted to "his intellectualism and sarcasm," she says she hungered for the "realism that he showed.

Her first two published poems were about her Georgia alma mater. "A couple of years after I was married [to William Mitchell Blackshear], we didn't have enough money to make our car payment; I was afraid we were going to lose the car and I said, 'Maybe I can sell a poem. I had gotten an invitation to a reunion. Not only did I not have the money to go, I didn't want to go. I wanted to remember college the way I thought of it. I [wrote the poem 'Reunion,'] published it in Good Housekeeping and got \$35 for it. That made our car payment. A couple of years later I published 'On Leaving College,' "a poem she wrote on the night before her graduation from ASC.

After leaving ASC and receiving a master's degree from the University of Alabama, Blackshear set her writing aside for nearly 35 years while she taught and raised a family. Her first book, Mother was a Rebel, about her growing-up years in Tuscaloosa, wasn't published until 1965. Since then she has published another book of essays, Southern Smorgasbord; Creek Captives, stories for children based on Alabama history (for which she received a Freedom Foundation Award); a book about her father's family, From Peddler to Philanthropist: the Friedman Story; and three books of poetry, individual poems of which have appeared in more than a dozen poetry reviews nationally.

She has been active in the Creative Writers of Montgomery for 20 years, the Press and Authors Club and the American Association of University Women. She has served as an officer of the Alabama Poetry Society (and Poet of the Year in 1986) and in the 72-year-old Alabama Writers' Conclave.

I have tried all my writing career to keep it simple," says Blackshear, an admirer of intellectualism, who loathes "things written to impress. If it comes from the heart and you really mean it, it will come across.'

CHALLENGING COURSES, SAFE PLACE OFFERED TO WOMEN ARTISTS

he magnolia branch is weighted down by a knapsack, giving the artist an unobstructed view of a magnificent blossom.

The artist, Julia Beeman '55 of Mineral Bluff, Ga., smiles as she explains that this is her first time working with watercolor. She admits that the best aspect of watercolor is the ability to correct mistakes. "I'm glad that it is easy to make changes because it's also the first time I've painted without first drawing the image," Beeman adds.

Beeman was among the 71 participants in Agnes Scott's Summer Studios Program. From June 17 through 25, the students and their professional artist instructors experienced different media including watercolor, encaustic, beadwork

computer graphics and theatre. "We don't want our program to be typical, we want it to be an allows students to get involved in the creative process," explains Myrna Lubin, director of special programs for ASC

The Summer Studios Program attracts a mix of ages, backgrounds and experiences. In the "Watercolor and the Visual Journal" class, the students included Anna McPherson, an Agnes Scott student who took the class during the summer because it isn't available during the school year. Another watercolor student, Jo Hunsinger '55, says she enjoys painting with oils but has always

wanted to learn how to work with watercolor.

The is the third year Agnes Scott has offered Summer Studios to enable serious students of the arts a chance to experience a variety of topics in visual arts, music, theatre and creative writing. Anne Kaiser of Atlanta says she registered for the "Watercolor and the Visual Journal" class because she's always kept a written journal and she's always been interested in watercolor. "When I saw journal-keeping and watercolor combined I found the courage to sign up," says Kaiser.

A safe environment that encourages students to take risks is one of the program's objectives, says Lubin. Classes are small (the watercolor class had five students) because there is a greater spirit of camaraderie in the small group, Lubin adds.

The watercolor class was taught by Miriam Karp, an Atlanta painter whose work has been exhibited widely both locally and nationally

Watercolor is a very forgiving medium," says Karp. She challenges her students to take chances since mistakes with watercolor can be rubbed out, painted over or even left in the painting. "In fact, some of the best work I've seen with watercolor is usually an accident," she adds.

The format of the class is more than just teaching watercolor technique and telling students to paint. Instead, Karp has the students produce a visual journal of their week at

Agnes Scott. Using small, postcard size pads of paper, the students work around the campus, painting what they see—the whole context or scene, an individual piece of the scene and a close-up of the individual piece.

Hunsinger worked in the garden within the Dana Fine Arts Building on one day. Her visual journal included paintings of a segment of the garden, an individual flower and even one of her classmates as she sat painting.

In addition to "Watercolor and the Visual Journal," studios and workshops offered were: Pop-Up Books; Waterbase Monotype; Introduction to Computer Art; Art Therapy, Children and Disabilities; Book Art; Monotype; Advanced Computer Art; Encaustic and Dimensional Beadwork. Students of the theatre enjoyed three workshops and two public seminars offered by the Omaha Magic Theatre, a cutting-edge multi-disciplinary performance ensemble of artists.

'Our instructors are all professional artists who are recognized as experts in the field and in addition to having Atlanta-based artists we have instructors from New York, Seattle, Nebraska and Maryland," says Lubin.

The key to Summer Studios' success is original topics and qualified instructors. As Lubin says, "We want to offer stuff you don't get anywhere else.

n June 2, Agnes Scott's Interim President Sally Mahoney announced that seven regular staff positions—six people—would be vacated" due to an unexpected shortfall in the enrollment goal.

Our retention projections and our projections regarding out-of-state entering students are tracking as projected. But we expect to be at 135 full time equivalent students (FTE) (20 less than the 155 FTE planned) by the opening of school," said Mahoney at an address to the faculty and staff.

The shortfall was in the projected number of entering Georgia students. "The budget impact is \$325,000 to \$350,000. Our obligation is to enter the new fiscal year with a balanced budget plan," said Mahoney. "The impact is largely in professional staff functions and it involves people whose work is of high quality and honored."

The president's office lost an administrative assistant position (which was currently vacant). Personnel reductions included one position (the director of special programs) from the office of the Dean of the College Sarah Blanshei; two (the coordinator of student activities and the

assistant director of health services frozen until January) from the office of Dean of Students Gué Hudson; and three (manager of community relations and special events, part time editorial assistant in publications, coordinator of class activities from alumnae affairs) from the office of Vice President for Finance and Development Bill Gailey.

The decision to vacate positions was made after Mahoney and officers met with the budget work group consisting of Associate Professor of History Katharine Kennedy, Professor of Biology Harry Wistrand and then-Student Government Association Treasurer Jennifer Langston who reviewed options which also included salary freezes (across the board) and/or program cuts. Twice in the past five years (in 1990-91 and 1994-95) the College had frozen salaries (but in 1994 offered 2 percent raises after the monies became available). As part of the normal budgeting process, changes have occurred each year in the way monies are allocated and spent. Among the concerns expressed by Mahoney was the protection of faculty positions and the salary pool (at 3.5 percent) for faculty and staff. Members of the budget work

group agreed that the circumstances required an unpleasant solution and the unanimous decision was to vacate staff positions. "In our discussions we did not talk about which positions would be eliminated," said Kennedy, who noted those decisions were shouldered by the officers. But she said, there was "real sorrow felt for our loss of valuable people."
After Mahoney made her

remarks, she opened the meeting to questions which ranged from how the Georgia HOPE program had affected first-year enrollment to why the College had chosen staff reductions over drawing further on the endowment

for operating monies. While HOPE (Helping Outstanding Pupils Educationally) increased its grants to \$1,500 for qualifying Georgia students enrolling in private colleges this year, its offer of full tuition, book allowance and mandatory fees for B-average Georgia high school graduates entering state-supported institu-tions this fall had a clear negative impact on Agnes Scott's entering Georgia student enrollment which was down 35 percent.

ASC operating budget (tuition contributes 34 percent; room and board contributes 10 percent; the annual fund, 6 percent). Mahoney noted that the board of trustees had actually increased the endowment contribution to the 1995-96 operating budget. It was pointed out that compared with the use of endowment by other colleges, the ASC percentage is high. (According to figures from Higher Education Data Sharing Consortium, among liberal arts class I colleges, in 1994 endowment provided a mean of 11.4 percent of the operating budget compared with 37.8 percent allowed that year for

Agnes Scott.) By late-August, enrollment among Return-to-College Students was up (a head count of 28 this year compared to 10 last year) and overall head count was at 182 (a head count of two more than last year). "We increased applications and we increased quality (this year's entering class scored an average 40 points higher on the SAT than last year)," reports ASC Director of Admission Stephanie Balmer. Preliminary fall 1995 total FTE figures were 535 compared to 534.38 for fall 1994.

The 1995 figures are affected by the inclusion of 7 Japanese

by the inclusion of 7 Japanese exchange students and German exchange students who are enrolled for one semester only. Dean of Students Gue Hudson '68 notes that although this fall's total FTE numbers are comparable to last fall's, the figures are a bit misleading. The College was not able to reach its goal of 155 new students, so a sustained solution (greater num-ber of full time equivalent stu-dents) remains illusiye. "We are developing new market strategies and trying for increased geo-graphic distribution," notes Hudson, "in an attempt to enroll more first-year students'

I'm not the same

I KNOW WHAT IT IS LIKE TO BE A WOMEN COMING OF AGE IN THE 90's

oodbyes are so hard. The ones I said to family and friends when I left my home state of Alabama just four years ago were poignant. I parted ways with people I had known since childhood, and college pals and professional associate friendships I had made in Mobile over 16 years. Though travel had taken me to other parts of the country, I had never actually lived outside of Alabama, never more than 60 miles away from my hometown of Atmore. For me, going away to college at age 33 (that is to say, taking the job as assistant publications manager at Agnes Scott), was far more traumatic than going away to college in Mobile at 18. Ending relationships, leaving projects unfinished and packing every dang book I'd collected in my lifetime, made the baggage, both real and emotional, much weightier.

But I arrived here with memories, books and boxes in June of 1991, hopeful and enthusiastic, just a couple of months before the class of 1995 arrived. And I struggled, as they did, with new geography, buildings and people, learning that first October what Black Cat was, and remembering, as I had learned at 18, how

simultaneously frightening and exciting a new place can be. As time passed, the distance to Atlanta from Decatur became less of a journey; the words Buttrick, Main, Rebekah and Evans worked their way into my vocabulary; the faces of faculty, staff and students became almost as familiar as the ones I had left behind.

grew fond of this place and looked forward to seeing the students daily, attending their Blackfriars productions, succumbing to solicitations for every organizational fund-raiser, helping them through difficulties with stern professors, receiving fun little gifts and greetings at Christmastime, hearing about their spring breaks and formals, listening to the rumble of music on the Quad or the crack of a softball bat on the field behind the library, and even standing and chatting in the familiar cafeteria line with students who chugged Cokes and downed bagels as they rushed off to class.

So many of those same faces lined up with caps and gowns this May and processed from Dana to the same end as thousands before them—graduation and the real world. I was proud of them and felt as if I had

completed a journey with them. For I am not the same woman I was when I first came here. I think I know better now what it is like to be a woman coming of age in the '90s, and I understand the social, political and economic challenges she faces Both they and I have worked and grown from our individ-

Sharon Maitland-Moon responds to disaster

AIDING VICTIMS OF ANDREW, INIKI & OKLAHOMA BOMBING

haron Maitland Moon '80' uncharacteristically turned on her radio April 19 as she worked in her Richmond law office. Her "unusual" action became fortuitous as news of the bombing at the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City began to filter in over the airways. Moon, a past director of the Young Lawyers Division of the American Bar Association, immediately placed a call to current Young Lawyers Chair Mike Bedkey of Tampa, Fla., to advise him that President Clinton had declared a state of emergency in Oklahoma City, activating the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Under an agreement between the Young Lawyers and FEMA, members of YL's Disaster Legal Services Division (DLSD) agree to provide free legal assistance for victims of federally declared disasters. According to Moon, the Young Lawyers mobilized within 24 hours of the bombing. "A perfect example," says Moon, "of how Disaster Legal Services

Moon, who received her law degree from the University of Richmond in 1988, began her work with the Young Lawyers almost immediately after law school. She was appointed a director of the division for 1992-93 (one of six directors who advise the chair) with the responsibility of overseeing seven substantive committees, including the DLSD. "I had just begun to understand what all my

committees were responsible for when Hurricane Andrew hit," says Moon, referring to the September 1992 storm that devastated Dade County, Fla., and turned out to be the costliest natural disasters to-date in American history (surpassed only by the January 1994 Northridge, Calif., earthquake). "I had to quickly learn what to do when disaster strikes."

When Hurricane Andrew struck, Moon was renegotiating a more efficient working agreement between the Young Lawyers and FEMA. As a result, she knew exactly what her organization was required to do. Moon called members of the Young Lawyers outside the disaster area-most people don't realize that lawyers in the disaster area are victims themselves—in Jacksonville, Orlando and Tampa. When getting to the disaster area proved nearly impossible, Moon arranged staffing for a hotline that victims could call when phone service was restored. Once the immediate issues of food and shelter were resolved, survivors of the disaster faced numerous legal problems. Some had lost Social Security and Medicare cards and, most important in South Florida, proof of citizenship. Within weeks of the disaster, residents whose homes or apartments were destroyed or rendered uninhabitable were receiving past-due rent notices.

Eventually, landlord-rentor conflicts gave way to problems

with insurance companies and contractor fraud. "All in all," says Moon, "we provided legal services to Andrew's victims for over a year."

Hot on the heels of Hurricane Andrew, came Hurricane Iniki, which decimated the Hawaiian Island of Kauai. "We had to fly lawyers over every day from the big island (Oahu)," says Moon. "It was a logistical problem of how to pay for the airfare. We eventually worked out a voucher system with FEMA."

In the three years since Andrew and Iniki wreaked their havoc, numerous large-scale natural disasters have continued to make headlines from coast to coast. In California, floods and fires were compounded by the Northridge earthquake. The flood of 1994 in Georgia, Alabama and Florida was sandwiched between the historic Midwest floods of 1993 and their recent, milder, descendants. Throughout this period, Moon has served in an advisory capacity for the YL's Disaster Legal Services Division. During her tenure as a YL director, Moon helped revise the Disaster Legal Services Agreement that her agency had with FEMA. The new agreement, signed into law July 1993, has a statutory basis, says Moon. "Public law requires FEMA to provide legal services. Still, our function as lawyers has become easier with the revamping of FEMA." The federal agency, which came under fire for slow responses to hurricanes Hugo and Andrew, has undergone a considerable re-organization since James Lee Witt was appointed director. "Those of us in disaster services have seen a substantial change in the energy and focus of FEMA since James Lee Witt arrived," notes Moon. According to Mary Hudak of the public affairs office for the Atlanta Regional Office of FEMA, "We now put a majority of our resources into planning and response for all hazards.'

Although Moon's year as a director of the 170,000-member YL ended in 1993, she continues to function as an unofficial adviser to Disaster Legal Services while working for the law firm of LeClair, Ryan and Joines. "You might say I've been a statesman. I train bar organizations on how they should respond to a disaster."

The process pulls together in one document the work of the Office of Alumnae Affairs and the Alumnae Association with a different kind of "bottom line" assessment than other offices consider. Our achievements, although in some ways quantifiable, are more feasibly measured on a "good will and commitment" barometer. Highlights of the year ending June 30 include:

• Alumnae Leadership Conference 1994 brought more than 120 alumnae leaders back to campus for training and updating about the College.

• The names of 1,700 alumnae willing to serve as career resources for students were gathered from surveys of four reunion classes given by the Office of Career Planning and Counseling during eight Alumnae Weekends.

• Fifty-seven class presidents sent fall letters which were mailed between Oct. 1 and Dec. 31, 1994.

• Sixty-eight alumnae chapter meetings were coordinated through the alumnae office with the "Chapter Chat" newsletter serving as a link for ideas and feedback among chapter leaders.

• The 430 Exam Care Baskets, sold and assembled this year, raised \$1,800 for the Student Government's Student Development Fund.

• Last August a reception was held to welcome new M.A.T. students into the Alumnae Association; new students were treated to an orientation trip to the World of Coca-Cola Museum followed by a picnic in the Alumnae Garden to meet members of the Young Alumnae

Chapter; in a February "Study Break" performance, alumna Fran Brodnax Franz '75 portrayed Decatur's Civil War heroine Mary Harris Gay, and valentines were delivered to student boxes; African-American students, alumnae, faculty and staff became acquainted through "Witkaze Connections"; a tea honoring the senior class was held Alumnae Weekend; a graduation dinner welcomed the seniors into the Alumnae Association as did a party, sponsored by the Decatur Alumnae Chapter, for international students and their families following Baccalaureate.

• Continuing education opportunities were provided through the fourth annual "Progressions" seminar in November on women's health issues and the January seminar, "Women and Social Change."

• A tote bag, campus landmark note paper and an ASC historic buildings cotton afghan were new alumnae gifts introduced this year.

• The Office of Alumnae Affairs supported development's fundraising efforts resulting in 40 percent of alumnae contributing a total of \$656,820 to the Annual Fund.

• During Alumnae Weekend 1995, the College celebrated 100 years of alumnae service to Agnes Scott with over 500 alumnae attending.

• In June the Alumnae Board held a retreat to evaluate programs of the past year and plan for 1995-96. New goals include increasing alumnae giving and percentage of giving, implementing a communications/ technology plan, enhancing the College's image worldwide, and involving more alumnae in the work of the association especially in admission outreach.

With the coming of a new president and the beginning of a new year for the College community, there is much to celebrate as we begin to build the framework for next year's annual report. Don't miss out on the fun; get involved today!





President Mary Bullock on a Season of Change

had forgotten the beauty of Agnes Scott's gardens and the tall, old trees which grace its grounds. They have been tended well in the nearly 30 years since I graduated.

Walking across the campus in idyllic autumn weather, it occurred to me that the task of leading a liberal arts college is not unlike that of tending a beautiful English garden. How do you know if the soil is rich enough? What do you do to improve it? Is your design appropriate to the site? Or, as a Chinese proverb puts it, shui-tu fu-bu-fu? Will you adapt to the soil and the water?

What makes a lively but harmonious garden, where each individual flower, plant or tree enhances the overall scene? How do you decide the proportion of hardy perennials, always re-seeding themselves, with more delicate annuals, which may change from year to year? Which colors and in what quantity? Is the effect most pleasing with the blues and purples together, or with splashes of red and orange in their midst?

What makes one garden's beauty remembered while others are forgotten? A sense of relationships, a discerning eye for the core and the periphery, and openness to creative bursts of innovation make a good gardener, a good liberal arts college, a good Board of Trustees and a good college president.

In January 1995, Agnes Scott's Board of Trustees announced my selection as the seventh president of Agnes Scott College. During the spring and summer, I was kept abreast of campus happenings by Interim President Sally Mahoney and Board Chair Joseph R. Gladden Jr. Although I remained in Washington, D.C., until August, I am honored to write the introduction to this year's Annual Report.

In this season of change, Agnes Scott College revised its academic curriculum, worked with an interim president, selected a new president, and enjoyed extraordinary community support. Agnes Scott's Board of Trustees provided the continuity and leadership necessary to guide the College through these major transitions in governance. As a result of effective leadership at all levels, the academic year 1994-1995 was one of significant accomplishment.

The spirit of the 1995 Agnes Scott Academic Review Report is found in the

appreciation of intellectual relationships and the willingness to explore new juxtapositions of disciplines. "Connected Learning" is the distinctive theme.

Connected learning embraces programs such as Global Connections and the Atlanta Semester and pedagogies such as quantitative reasoning across the curriculum. All are linked to an eloquent new statement of values:

- ✓ a commitment to women,
- a commitment to teaching and
- ✓ a commitment to the liberal arts,
- a commitment to an appreciation of diverse cultures and
- ✓ a commitment to a community that values justice, courage and integrity.

The Academic Review process included a faculty, staff and student committee, scores of public hearings, position papers, and a final review and vote by the full faculty. It resulted in the weeding out of 79 courses, the creation of 46 new courses for a net course reduction of 33. The number of majors dropped from 36 to 26, the departmental structure was pruned, four new interdepartmental "conferences" were created, and additional recommendations are under consideration.

As a result of the self-study Agnes Scott had undertaken in connection with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the faculty also approved two important new evaluation mechanisms—student evaluation of faculty and periodic (five-year) reviews for tenured faculty.

In addition to the academic changes, the college completed a parallel Administrative Review which examined the ways in which the College operates. It recommended and implemented numerous customer service improvements and cost-saving changes.

his transitional year was marked by the gracious leadership of Interim President Sally Mahoney. Bringing to the Agnes Scott community more than two decades of leadership experience at Stanford University, President Mahoney tended our college well during a year of sometimes difficult transition. She chose to "celebrate" Agnes Scott's successes, no matter how small or individual. "Don't hide your light under a bushel" was her refrain. She recognized the pursuit of excellence everywhere. She reached out to

Decatur and Atlanta. The new Decatur Campaign and the creation of the South Candler/Agnes Scott National Historic District were highlights of this effort. Future presidents will need to emulate President Mahoney by encouraging Agnes Scott's renewal as a community of civility, collegiality, intellectual vitality, warmth and good humor.

The success of Agnes Scott is dependent upon the annual generosity of its alumnae and many friends. Not just financially, but as a way in which we keep in touch with how we are meeting society's needs. Our yearly rating in U.S. News & World Report is based, in part, on the percentage of our alumnae givers. That percentage was 40 percent in 1994-1995, well below such schools as Hollins, Rhodes, Sweet Briar, Randolph Macon Women's, Converse and Davidson.

The legacy of giving has been strong here. Please help us next year by encouraging at least one alumna friend who rarely or never gives to make a contribution. Our goal is 45 percent—but wouldn't it be great if we could go over the 50 percent mark?

aken as a whole, the seeds for a I robust and distinctive curriculum, for a self-renewing faculty, and for an effective administration have been sown. In embracing these, I look forward to providing ongoing leadership which will make the liberal arts at Agnes Scott College more "connected"—more interdisciplinary, more local and more global, and more scientific. We now have the promise of vigorous hybrid growth. To think across the disciplines keeps us from becoming too narrow or pedantic, alerts us to questions of significance, and trains us for critical thinking in the new millennium. The real test for all these reforms will come in the immediate years ahead—in the implementation, the time-consuming cultivation.

Autumn has now become the Advent season. I am fortunate to be here as the seasons change, as we approach a new year. On behalf of myself and all fellow alumnae, I am grateful to those quiet but dedicated souls, within and without the institution, who nurtured Agnes Scott College during this long leadership transition.

November 3, 1994

■ Australian visiting artists Simi and David Roche participate in the private inaugural dance performance in the new, state-of-the-art Martha Wilson Kessler Dance Studio.

November 12, 1994

■ Agnes Scott hosts the fifth "Progressions" seminar, sponsored by women's colleges for their alumnae in the Atlanta area and focusing on health-care issues for women. More than 40 women attend.

November 30, 1995

■ The College celebrates Bertie Bond Day, recognizing her 34 years of service to the College. Mary Alverta "Bertie" Bond '53 served as secretary to the board and assistant to the president. She is later honored with emerita status in both positions.

December 12, 1994

■ President Emeritus Marvin Banks Perry Jr. dies of cancer in Charlottesville, Va. Perry retired in 1982 after serving ASC for nine years. He is memorialized on Founder's Day, Feb. 22, 1995.

December 30, 1994

■ The market value of the College endowment stands at \$212 million.

January 11, 1995

■ The first ever Decatur Campaign, "Great City, Great College, Great Possibilities," kicks off. By campaign's end, the total raised is \$28,821.

Prince Albert of Monaco tours campus with other members of the International Olympic Committee. Agnes Scott College will host the kick-off event for the Cultural Olympiad's Olympic Summer Festival June 2-9, 1996, part of the 100th anniversary celebration of the Olympic Games.

June 1995

■ The College bids farewell to the Presser Dogwood. For years its flowering branches brought beauty to Presser Quadrangle but age and disease caused a decline in the tree's health. The dogwood is replaced by a Kousa dogwood planted on Arbor Day, February 17, 1995.



ASC Alumnae Chapter, where there was a large membership. Over the years, Hardy set aside funds for a scholarship for students from her home county, Coweta, Georgia. After her death in 1988, the College was notified of a bequest which established three new funds: a onetime gift of \$25,000 to fund the Romola Davis Hardy Classics Scholarship; \$16,000 per year in perpetuity toward funding the Hardy Chair in the Classics, and an additional \$74,000 each year designated

VIRGINIA F. PRETTYMAN

rettyman, class of 1934, focused her study of 18th-century English literature on poetry and the art of William Blake. After earning her degree, she completed a master of arts at University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and returned to

ASC to teach English for two years. Following doctoral studies at Yale in 1943, she became an instructor at Smith College, then moved on to become a professor of English at Wellesley College until her retirement in 1974. After her death in 1986, Agnes Scott received a generous estate gift of almost \$200,000 designated for general support of the College. Almost 10 years later, in 1995, the College was again the beneficiary of Prettyman's estate planning, this time receiving the corpus of a charitable remainder trust established in 1976. The gift, totaling more than \$100,000, was applied to the most pressing needs of the College, including the "Language Across the

uring the 1994-95 school year, Agnes Scott said thank you to several valued members of the Board of Trustees as they concluded their active service to the College. JoAnn Sawyer Delafield '58, Katherine A. Geffcken '49, James R. Lientz Jr. and Douglas W. Oldenburg were recognized at their last Board meeting, May 5, 1995, then they rotated off the Board at the end of June, completing 41 collective years of service. The Board also recognized two other long-time associates of the College, Mary Alverta "Bertie" Bond '53 and Hal L. Smith, in late 1994.

For her 11 years of active leadership and direction for all aspects of the College, JoAnn "Joie" Delafield of New York, N.Y., was honored by her peers with a resolution of appreciation for significant leadership on the academic affairs, development and nominating committees; she served as a member of the Presidential Search Committee this past year.

Katherine Geffcken joined the Board in 1975, and during her 20-year tenure served on various committees. She was cited for her work on the academic affairs, buildings and grounds committees and the committee guiding student affairs. She is a member of the faculty of Wellesley College in Wellesley, Mass., where she teaches classical languages.

James Lientz Jr., president of NationsBank in Georgia, served a two-year term on the Board, beginning in 1993. With his financial expertise, Lientz proved to be an excellent resource for the audit and investment committees of the Board; he also offered valuable insight into the overall direction of the College.

Doug Oldenburg, president of Columbia Theological Seminary, a neighboring Presbyterian institution of higher learning which traditionally holds a seat on the Agnes

Scott Board of Trustees, served on the faith and learning committee and the student affairs committee. His eight-year term began in 1987.

Bertie Bond was named Administrative Assistant to the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees Emerita following her retirement late last year after 34 years at College. She had served with four presidents and the Board of Trustees.

On Nov. 3, 1995, the Board recognized 23 years of service by Lawrence L. "Larry" Gellerstedt Jr., bestowing on him the title of Trustee Emeritus. He was a member of the Board from 1969 through 1992, acting as chair from 1979-1989 and serving the College invaluably during his term (see the "Parting Words" tribute on page 24).

The Trustees also recognized and bid farewell to three retiring faculty members at its spring 1995 meeting. Christabel P. Braunrot completed 19 years with the College in the Department of French and was honored with the title of Associate Professor Emerita of French. Jack L. Nelson was named Professor Emeritus of English upon his retirement, following 33 years of inspirational teaching in the English department. Edward C. Johnson, named Associate Professor Emeritus of Economics, also retired in June 1995 after 30 years of teaching and dedicated service.

Gellerstedt Has "Had a Vision for ASC's Future"

sk any Agnes Scott administrator to recall those indelible moments of working with Lawrence L. "Larry" Gellerstedt Jr., and you'll likely hear about his brisk, early morning phone calls.

"Bertie ... Larry," is how
Mary Alverta "Bertie" Bond '53,
presidential assistant and secretary to the Board of Trustees,
recalls the opener for many
8:30 a.m. conversations with
Gellerstedt, long-time Board of
Trustees member—including
10 years as chair—and staunch
volunteer for numerous Agnes
Scott College projects and
fund-raisers.

It's as if he'd been working through complex problems, tossing around creative solutions, making lists of questions, and then waiting impatiently for the world around him to wake up and stumble through the day's first cup of coffee.

"He's very clear about what's important to him," notes Bonnie Brown Johnson '70, former vice president for development and public affairs, who has raised money with Gellerstedt at both Georgia Tech and Agnes Scott. She says that it's "hard to imagine any-

one who has done more for any institution. He was willing to involve himself for the good of Agnes Scott at a substantial personal sacrifice."

For years, Gellerstedt, CEO of Beers Construction Company in Atlanta, has efficiently juggled a strong commitment to higher education, particularly for women, with his devotion to his family, his flourishing business and the city of Atlanta. He understands the value of philanthropy and has given generously of his money and time. "Civic rent" is how he describes the motivation behind his philanthropy, which has included leadership for the High Museum of Art, the United Way, Central Atlanta Progress, the Atlanta Botanical Garden and Agnes

Of course, his Agnes Scott roots run deep, with wife Mary Duckworth Gellerstedt '46, daughter Gayle '71, and father Lawrence Sr., all having served as Board members here. The Agnes Scott track and field complex bears his name.

Last month, the College honored him as a trustee emeritus on the very day he reached the age of 70, which is the mandatory age for that title. The

emeritus status also requires a minimum of eight years of service—Gellerstedt has given nearly three times that, chairing the Board during campus construction and renovation in preparation for the Centennial Celebration. His influence has been felt on several ASC committees, including two presidential search committees.

"He pushed us to be better, appreciated our heritage and had a vision for the future," notes Bond. "And he raised money with a vengeance, as

well as giving his own," leading a \$3 million campaign to renovate Campbell Science Hall and a \$35 million capital campaign.

ASC Board Vice Chair Anne Register Jones '46 used to marvel at Gellerstedt's accomplishments. But soon she was receiving those early morning phone calls. "After my first telephone conversation with him, I knew," she recalls. "He doesn't waste time talking. The 'goodbye' sometimes comes before you are ready."

thinking that fund raising was not one of her strong suits. "But, through my experiences with the phonathons, I felt comfortable asking people for money because I believe in Agnes Scott. I also think it helps that I'm a good organizer and am capable of getting people to look at goals and clarify plans. Jones works directly with Sarah Cave, acting director of the Annual Fund. Together, they hope to reach a goal of 45 percent alumnae participation in the 95-96 campaign which seeks to raise a total of \$1,094,125 for the Annual Fund. "We feel

The College also wants to up its standing among other women's colleges in alumnae giving. The Higher Education Data Sharing Consortium report for 1993-94 indicated a range of alumnae giving from a high of 47 percent to a low of 27 percent among the group list. Cave feels that she and Jones make an effective team. "Anne is very organized and goal oriented. We both want this to work and to be different and creative in our efforts. We are always looking for new ideas and bouncing ideas

off each other.

"She is that wonderful sort of typical ASC graduate," Cave continues. "When spring, Jones admits to women graduate from Agnes Scott, they go on to be leaders. Anne took that ideal and incorporated that into her life not only in her career but also with in the structure of Agnes Scott as a volunteer.' RACISM FREE ZONE, HONOR COURT DISCUSSED

Racism Free Zone is a three-year-old organization that is working to establish a safe and trusting environment, recognizing the worth of all individuals and the value of their difference.

As the president of Racism Free Zone, Rhiannon Gerald '97 tries to set a standard for all students. "I make it a point to do something every day for RFZ. Some days I just brainstorm for ideas of things that could improve RFZ, and other days I research current events that are connected to the organization. I want to show [the student body] that with hard work, things will get done and changes can be made."

Gerald's goal for Racism Free Zone is to make it a more prominent and active organization on campus by promoting ASC's cultural diversity. She wants to emphasize to the ASC

community that Racism Free Zone is not an organization exclusively for African Americans, but for everyone. Gerald hopes that ASC faculty and staff members, as well as students, will become involved.

Also, Gerald has modified the Racism Free Zone Declaration and plans to establish a tradition of having staff, faculty and students re-sign the declaration each year to re-affirm their commitment to a racism-free campus. Already this year, RFZ has been successful in moving the declaration from the basement of Buttrick Hall to a more prominent place in Alston Center's Scottland Yard.

KARA MOORE '96 Honor Court president Hometown: Shelbyville, Ind. Major: Physics

"The Honor Court is not a campus police force," says Honor Court President Kara Moore '96. It is the judicial body of the Student Government Association, designed to uphold and protect the Honor Code, which she says, "is necessary to maintain the atmosphere at ASC that enables students to grow spiritually, intellectually and socially." Moore feels the Honor Code helps create an environment in which ASC students can trust their peers. Without it, she feels students wouldn't be as free to grow and express themselves.

As a member of Honor Court for four years, Moore has been preparing for the presidency since her first year. Moore praises her fellow court members, characterizing them as "good thinkers and sympathetic listeners. There is a strong feeling of unity within the group, and it shows in their cooperation, thoroughness and clear communication."

As Honor Court president, Moore says she has learned diplomacy and gained listening skills. She feels that she is now a more focused and disciplined person who can "effectively communicate with people across the board."

Moore hopes students will take the Honor System with them after they leave ASC, and continue the promotion of the values that it stands for in the "real world."

Holt Stumps for Women in Beijing

"WOMEN HAVE SAME PROBLEMS ALL OVER THE WORLD. IT IS ONLY A MATTER OF DEGREE."

ithin weeks of celebrating birthday 79, Bertha B Merrill Holt '38 was in Beijing with a delegation from the Commission on Women in North Carolina, attending, primarily, the NGO (non-governmental organizations) portion of the Fourth United Nations Conference on Women.

She returned from the conference with telling observations on the world of women, beginning with the South African delegation who climbed to the upper level of a crowded Olympic stadium—with suitcases in tow—and sat in the aisles near her during spectacular opening ceremonies

Holt later saw women conferees encircle Tibetan women protestors, successfully blocking Chinese security guards.

She and passengers riding on a leaking bus "raised our umbrellas," during a downpour. Waiting in the rain outside a conference space in Huairuo, she held out her umbrella to shelter several drenched Chinese young people (many of whom worked as translators) "Pretty soon," says Holt, "other women began holding their umbrellas over these children."

Of particular interest to Holt were the plenary sessions on health, education, poverty, the treatment of girl children and domestic violence. "Most countries of the world do not educate girls," she laments. "Among the worst problems is genital mutilation, and in

armed conflict, women often become victims of violence and

Women's rights and women's issues have also been at the heart of Holt's 20-year career in the North Carolina legislature. paigned hard for the Equal Rights Amendment (which lost by a single vote). She helped gather state support for shelters for women who experience domestic violence and she helped secure funding for displaced homemakers

Holt was also part of a 31member women's caucus in the North Carolina legislature which last year pushed through a marital rape law that "cleanly removed the spousal defense. Before that, in North Carolina the defense to forcible rape was marriage. Some men in the state senate claimed that tampering with the old law would break up the home, a contention Holt found laughable. "When we were debating the bill, I said, 'If you do not give women a legal defense they may take things into their own hands.' This coincided with coverage of the [John] Bobbitt trial. I was quoted on Public Radio. This law was my swan

A worthy adversary of gender discrimination throughout her life and career, Holt began to battle on the side of women soon after her own graduation from the University of Alabama Law School (1941). She recalls having interviewed

with several law firms refusing to hire women as lawyers. 'They told me, 'If you want to take a secretarial course, we

could hire you as a legal secretary." Holt prevailed, finding work in Washington, D.C., as an attorney for the Department of Interior and the U.S.

Early in her career she noted that laws, and lawmakers who execute and interpret the law, affect all aspects of life from economic development to the arts. With the idea that "politics can bring about change," she began working as a volunteer, eventually serving as president of the Democratic Women of Alamance and vice chair of the Alamance County Democratic Party and the North Carolina Democratic Executive Board. Beginning in 1974, she became the first woman to serve her district as a state representative

Integrity, which Holt carefully guarded throughout her public life, along with the liberal arts training received at Agnes Scott, "supplemented by my professional training as a lawyer, has enabled me to form a basis for decision-making that was so necessary in creating sound legislation." By 1980 she was chosen chair of the legislative ethics committee; she also served twice as chair of the constitutional amendments committee and chair of the appropriations committee. It was through that experience, and through serving as chair of

Former North Carolina Representative Bertha B Holt has made a career of being "the first woman" to assume numerous responsibilities on the state level in both politics and religion, including the first woman to serve as senior warden on the vestry of the Episcopal Church in North Carolina (daughter Harriett Whitley '66, has since served as senior warden). She has helped cut a clear path for women of later generations. (Granddaughter Allyson Whitley '91 and two sisters Tade Merrill Lampley '44 and Evelyn Merrill Daniel '53 are alumnae of the College.)

the finance committee of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina, that she felt the weight of the power of appointed and elected bodies, power that must "be carefully used."

Back in 1978, the Alumnae Association gave Holt the Outstanding Alumna Award for Community Service; today she continues to take seriously those community responsibilities, serving on numerous boards in a half dozen community organizations including the Salvation Army, the Board of Adolescent Pregnancy

Prevention of North Carolina, and the State Executive Committee of the Democratic Party.

It may not come as a surprise that she ruffles at The Wall Street Journal's describing the recent U.N. conference on women as "a Junior League shopping trip.' The end result of this will be what we make of it,' insists Holt.

"What impressed me most about this conference is that women have the same problems all over the world. It is only a matter of degree.'

• Improve lines of communication and facilitate accurate transmission of news about the College and the association;

 Be set up in such a way that alumnae who volunteer to serve the College through the association will be able to use their time productively.


The flow chart that you see on this page is the result of our efforts. As you can see, we are serious about involving more alumnae at a wide variety of energy and time-intensive


Others will continue to provide support to alumnae, and to ask for their support to the College.





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The tapestry of a life well-spent

JULIA THOMPSON SMITH, LONG-TIME FRIEND OF AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE, DIES IN EARLY DECEMBER.

Julia Thompson Smith '31 died on Dec. 1. A woman whose deep faith informed the commitments of her life, Smith was a long-time friend and benefactor of Agnes Scott College.

In the fall of 1994, reflecting on her involvement in the College, she remarked, "As I look back across the tapestry of my life, I can see the hand of God at work in so many places now though often I was not aware of it at all at the time."

Those who look at Agnes Scott today and in the years ahead will see the loving hand of Julia Smith at work in many ways, especially through the gifts she and her husband gave to endow the chaplaincy and the chair for free enterprise held by Professor Edmund Sheehey.

Daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. W. Taliaferro Thompson, Julia Smith was born in Petersburg, Va., in 1911 and graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Agnes Scott in 1931.

Generous with her resources of both money and time, her service in the Atlanta community extended far beyond her involvement with the College. She served First Presbyterian Church of Atlanta for over 60 years in a wide variety of ways, including as a Sunday School teacher and Meals on Wheels volunteer.

For many years, including three as president, she was asso-

ciated with the Child Service Association, now Families First. Other community service included membership on the Board of the Student Aid Foundation, the Junior League of Atlanta, the Colonial

Dames of America and the 20th Century Study Club.

She is survived by her husband, Hal L. Smith, trustee emeritus of Agnes Scott, who served as chair of the Board of Trustees, 1956-1973, by her children John E. Smith II and Claiborne S. Jones, four grandchildren, two brothers, W. Taliaferro Thompson Jr. of Richmond Va., and D. Gregg Thompson of Miami Shores, Fla., and a sister, Mrs. Ben Lacy (Anne) Rose '38 of Richmond, Va.

From time to time, fortunate people find their lives blessed by the presence of a truly gracious and generous spirit. Julia Thompson Smith was one whose deep commitment and hope-filled vision blessed many lives. I am grateful to God for the grace of her life, for all that she meant to those she loved and to this College, and especially grateful to have been privileged to know her and to glimpse, even if only briefly, her vision of the tapestry of her life, shaped and formed in faithful response to God's guiding hand.
