Faith Fulfilled: Chapel Breaks Ground on Founder's Day

ore than 118 years after its founding by Presbyterians, Agnes Scott will see its first freestanding chapel begin to rise over the coming year.

While rain prevented taking shovels out to the May Day Dell, a spiritual groundbreak-ing was held in the McCain Library, Feb. 21 Founder's Day, for the new Julia Thompson Smith Chapel

Hal Smith joined the Board of Trustees in 1952 and served more than a decade as its chair. Before his death in 2003, he decided to honor his late wife with a chapel named for her-to reflect her faith in God, family and an Agnes Scott education.

A member of the class of '31, Julia Thompson was the oldest of six children born to Presbyterian minister William Taliaferro Thompson. The Smith's son Trustee Emeritus John Smith II, represented his late parents during the ceremony with a speech titled, "A Tribute to Love." While a woman of great faith, Thompson also believed in academic endeavor. "I was often reminded by my father that she was Phi Beta Kappa," Smith said.

Speakers at the ceremonies included Mary Brown Bullock '66, president emerita. A common theme in both Bullock's and President Elizabeth Kiss' remarks was the importance of informed faith

The proximity of the library, the new science quad and the chapel reinforces the longstanding connection of faith and learning, central to the Agnes Scott heritage of the reformed tradition, Bullock said.





carved in stone behind the audience, on the wall every student passes leaving the reading room-"The truth shall set you free." However, the college also recognizes the truth that dwells in the secular realms of literature, psychology, poetry and science, Bullock said.

Alongside its Presbyterian roots, Agnes Scott has a long history of tolerance. The former Thatcher Chapel, housed in a now demolished campus building, also faced east, Bullock recalled, providing a sacred space for Muslim students' pravers.

That respect for all spirituality is reflected in the declara-tion that while a Christian chapel, the new space will be welcoming to people of all faiths.

On one level, having a dedicated sacred space on campus, "honors the faith that animated our founding," Kiss said. "It convenes us as a community in an important way in times of great sorrow or great joy, it is natural for us to gather in sacred spaces," she said.

As a catalyst for conversations about faith and spirit, the chapel will "push us to ask the deepest questions," she said. Using an example from her own teaching, Kiss argued that "questions of faith, pursued in a spirit of open inquiry, enable us to think more deeply—especially about what it means to lead an honorable life.'

The chapel's contemporary gothic style was designed by Maurice Jennings + David McKee Architects of Fayetteville, Ark. The firm continues the work of the late Fay Jones, a renowned architect who apprenticed with Frank Lloyd Wright and designed the internationally-known Thorncrown Chapel in Arkansas.

While known for their design of religious structures, this will be their first to use brick as a dominant feature, to harmonize with the historic college buildings. For more detail on the chapel visit: www.agnesscott.edu/giving/p_chapel.asp

Also, the jewel-colored, stained-glass window designed by Joseph V. Llorens will have a new home in the chapel after years of storage. It was given by the class of 1952 in honor of Wallace M. Alston, the college's third president.

Trustee James D. Philips and his wife, Donna, made the lead gift for the gardens, which will be named in honor of his parents Davison Philips and Kay Philips '43. Other significant donors to the \$6 million chapel were present, including

William and Frances Graves '63, whose gift was in honor of Dean Emeritus C. Benton Kline Jr.

Robert and Mildred Petty '61 gave in honor of Vice President for Student Life and Community Relations and Dean of Students Gue Hudson '68. Jack and Jean Reeves '59, made a gift in honor of President Alston. Also recognized for generous gifts to the chapel were Pat Butler '28, William and Sandra Johnson '82 and Delores Yancey '58.

I was especially pleased to read of Rafael Ocasio's being named Dana Professor of Spanish. This brought back memories of when I was instructor of Spanish there in the early 50's. At the time I was a director of the Pan American Student Forum in the metro Atlanta area. I proposed having the group meet on the ASC campus. The idea was vetoed by the Dean of Students. She feared having the students contaminated by Latinos and Catholics. How inspiring to see this change. It is good too to see that the new chaplain fits the changing mores.

Melissa Cilley had more influence on my life than any other faculty member. An accident of scheduling changed the course of my life. The French class I might have taken came at the same hour as the Latin class I wanted. Someone suggested I begin Spanish instead. I was certified to teach both which I did for the greater part of 38 years. I served as president of both Latin and Spanish teachers' organizations in Georgia and as national president of the Spanish Honor Society as well as 10 years on the national committee of the Junior Classical League. I represented the American Classical League at an international conference of Classical Studies in Madrid because I speak Spanish.

we were given a liberal-conservative test. I scored 85 percent liberal. I know the questions would be different today, but I think I'd be 99 percent liberal now. Can't we get someone to make a new

Looking back at 2006 in the life of Agnes Scott College, there was no shortage of momentous events, but the one that impacted me the most was the passing of an Agnes Scott giant—Anne Register Jones '46.

In my senior year, I served as president of the Student Government Association. I was not a shy student or a mild-mannered SGA president. Dean Hudson would say that's an understatement and she'd remember the day in October 1993 that I had a brusque conversation with two college trustees about what should be the proper hierarchy on campus-students first and trustees near the bottom of the list. One of those Trustees asked Dean Hudson to arrange a meeting for all of us.

I will never forget my second conversation with Anne Register Jones '46. Patient and engaging, she gave me 30 minutes of her time that I didn't deserve and she became a caring mentor. Anne was an impressive woman, politically active in national and Georgia politics, and a powerhouse fundraiser for Agnes Scott. The opening sentence of her

led, "Anne Jones campaigned with Lady Bird Johnson and let her children eavesdrop on a telephone call from President John F. Kennedy.

Dinner at her house or a bouquet of camellias during exams-our unexpected friendship showed me the kind of woman and alum I wanted to be. When she could have easily dismissed me as rude and insignificant, Anne Jones' decision to make an investment in this undeserving student continues to humble me. She is the reason I write a

check every month to Agnes Scott. With her death last year, the college lost a tireless champion. My reflection on 2006 is dominated by a woman who, to paraphrase President Emerita Mary Brown Bullock '66, woke up every day asking what she could do for Agnes Scott. Ask yourself that same question today and I hope you answer it with a gift to the annual fund.

As strategic planning has been my No. 1 priority this year, I am delighted by the positive, constructive feedback we have received on the plan's first draft. Nearly 70 alumnae and friends sent detailed comments in response to our request for "SWOT" (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analyses. Let me close by sharing a few highlights from this spring

- Of the 407 Gilman Scholarships awarded by the U.S. Department of State for study abroad, five were won by Agnes Scott students.
- Continuing a grand tradition, 11 students, three alumnae authors and three faculty presented papers or posters at the Southeastern Psychological Association Conference.
- Twelve esteemed poets read on campus in March, representing winners of the Pulitzer, Pushcart, and Lamont Prizes and the National Book Award. All were contributors to the Alhambra Press Poetry Calendar 2007 (which included our own Professor Waqas Khwaja).
- The sky's the limit at Agnes Scott! Our Bradley Observatory belongs to the SARA consortium (now including Cero Tollolo Observatory in Chile) which gives our students full remote access to observatories around the world.
- History Professor Violet Johnson was honored by her alma mater, Fourah Bay College in Sierra Leone, as invited speaker at its Founder's Day Lecture. The college was founded 180 years ago as the first university in sub-Saharan Africa.

have selected her as one of two 2007 Outstanding Young Alumnae of the Year recipients, along with singer/songwriter Jennifer Nettles '97. (See story, page 4.)

After graduating with honor in biology from Agnes Scott, Hillyer received her M.D. in 1994 from Emory University School of Medicine. She completed her medical internship in obstetrics and gynecology at Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center in Chicago and later served as chief resident in Pathology at Emory University.

Currently chief medical officer of the American Red Cross Blood Services, Southern Region, Hillyer is also an assistant professor of Pathology at Emory. She is a member of the medical staff of Grady Memorial, Emory University, Crawford W. Long, and the Children's Healthcare of Atlanta hospitals

A former Honor Court president and a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board, her zeal for academia and research remains strong. She has co-edited textbooks and written numerous book chapters and many peer-reviewed journal articles. In 2003, she coauthored a landmark article in the New England Journal of Medicine that proved that West Nile virus could be transmitted from person-to-person via blood transfusion. As a result, all blood donations in the United States are now tested for West Nile virus. In 2003 Hillyer received the "Partners in Public Health" award from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for her role in the discovery of West Nile virus transfu-

sion transmission.

tial percentage of blood donors are HIV-positive. "Often, these countries do not have the resources to test their donated blood for HIV, and sadly, the most common blood recipient in Africa is a 2-year-oldchild (due to the high prevalence of malaria in Africa)

Hillyer is also nationally respected for her work in the transfusion of safe and appropriately selected blood to children with sickle cell disease. At the American Red Cross in Atlanta, she directs a program called "Partners for Life," that provides the safest blood possible for both adult and pediatric sickle cell patients. This patient population includes some of Georgia's most underserved citizens.

Hillyer, however, says she's just begun. Because of the required years spent in medical school and residency, physicians don't really start their careers until after 30 years of age

"I love what I do," Hillyer said. "I believe I am on a career path that hopefully will allow me to have a positive influence in the lives of many people-my family, my friends, my patients, and my global family-for years to come."

Aiding more than one generation

Nell London '97 has dedicat-ed more than six years to saving a generation of Atlanta's urban children, one mother at a time. That drive resulted in her selection as this year's recipient of the Alumnae Association's "Service to the Community" award.

Through her highly successfully Welfare-to-Work program, Londor

but also instill the importance of meaningful work in their children.

> Bette O'Connell, a former student of London was a homeless single mother with a growing daughter. London helped them move into an extended-stay hotel-often paying their weekly rent. Eventually O'Connell completed Welfare-to-Work which led to a job at Grady Memorial Hospital. London aided the family further by helping raise funds to send O'Connell's daughter to West Point Academy.

'My efforts through Welfare-to-Work have really been about saving a generation of young people, London said. "If I could help impoverished mothers break free from the welfare system and learn to help themselves, I knew their children would directly benefit from their mothers' achievements.

London's program (often compared to boot camp by its graduates) taught welfare mothers the skills to go after better jobs-how to use a computer, what to wear to job interviews and, most importantly, build self-confidence.

Although always inclined to help others, London began to seriously consider how to work for real change during her time at Agnes Scott.

"Agnes Scott really woke me up to all of the ills of the community through the research and projects I did for my classes," London said. "My research on the welfare system and teenage pregnancy, in par ticular, really affected me.

"Dr. [Brenda] Hoke was my mentor. She really inspired me to reach out to the community, London said. "She was a role model whose work helping welfare mothers obtain cars really motivated me to see if I could help out. While the Welfare Reform Act of 1996 was hailed as a success in getting the able-bodied off the dole and back to work, London found it a call to action. In an effort to churn Americans out of the welfare system, London believes the legislation unfairly forces young mothers into the workforce with little or no job skills "I really became outraged by the consequences of the Welfare Reform Act and became determined to help offset the negative effects it would cause for young mothers," she said.

the 2005 hurricane season led her to start a new project. London organized Project First Step Outreach, Inc., a nonprofit designed to provide among other things, support services and homeownership opportunities. Under its "Adopt-A-Family" program the organization helps displaced families devastated by hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Wilma to obtain short-term and long-term supportive services and housing. London organized support for these families, which is provided by community partners including local churches. The program has expanded beyond Atlanta to orga nize relief efforts for these displaced families throughout Georgia and into Alabama.

"You've really got to have a passion to do this kind of work; you have to be willing to do it for free—to have a heart for other people," she said.

Real Rocket Science

While they may not know her name, there are a lot of fighter pilots grateful that Mary Pensworth Reagor '67 became a

mathematician She invented a software program that compresses highly complex programming into a processor light enough

for installa-

tion on fighter aircraft. The practical result allows the pilot to have one less crucial worry-about crashing, especially under fire

doctorate at the University of Texas and Texas Christian University, respectively. That led to a productive career with nearby aerospace giant, Lockheed Martin (formerly General Dynamics) Reagor began creating mathematical models and programs in the days when computers ran on punch cards, not silicon chips.

Reagor sees beyond the ordinary perception of mathematics as dry numbers shuffling into their appropriate places as "right answers." Taken far enough, numbers and their outcomes can explain a lot about the universe and most of its creatures. Also, she relishes the challenge of breaking ground in a discipline that was the choice of some of history's greatest minds.

"It's only impossible until it's not," is one of her favorite sayings. So in spite of her natural grounded demeanor and tendency to credit teams instead of herself, Reagor's work eventually thrust her into the spotlight.

The application, named the Reagor-Lynn method, was recognized by Lockheed Martin with a 1997 NOVA award, given by the company's chairman of the board at a ceremony held at the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum. At the time, the concept was hailed as "a major technology breakthrough ... with virtually unlimited military and commercial potential applications.

In 2002, Reagor was named one of 33 Lockheed-Martin Technical Fellows, the company's effort to establish a "brain trust" of its most gifted employees who could mentor and pass on their knowledge before retiring. She was the only woman so honored. In 2005 Women in Aerospace awarded her its Outstanding Achievement Award for Technical Excellence. She and husband, Fred met at Georgia Tech and have two daughters, Mary Kathryn and Ericka. Both Mary and Fred still enjoy tutoring high school and college students. In addition to her commercial work, Reagor also taught college math for eight years. Reagor has been an invited speaker at Agnes Scott on several topics, most prominently, the need to encourage more women to pursue careers in math and science.

In 2005, she became a co-investigator on a \$12 million grant funded by the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) in Africa and South America. Partnering with the American Red Cross, Emory University and the American Association of Blood Banks, Hillyer has trained physicians from around the world to improve blood safety in Kenya, South Africa, Mozambique and Guyana.

"The goal is to assist these countries in improving their blood programs, in order to significantly decrease HIV transmission via blood transfusion," Hillyer said. In some African countries, a substan-

Nettles Wins Grammy This Year

When Jennifer Nettles '97 and Olivia Roller '97 were matched as first-year roommates, they worked out a deal early on: if Nettles would sing, Roller would type her papers.

It worked out well for both. Nettles is now a Grammy-winning performer, known for getting fellow Scotties backstage passes when they flash their signature class ring. She received a Grammy Award this year for her duet "Who Says You Can't Go Home," with rock singer Jon Bon Jovi. Her band Sugarland was nominated in 2006 in six categories at the Country Music Awards, winning "Top New Duo or Vocal Group." In 2005, Sugarland was voted "Favorite New Artist" at the American Music Awards. Adding to her list of achievements, Agnes Scott will name Nettles Outstanding Young Alumna for 2007, an award she will share with Dr. Krista Hillyer '88. (See story, page 1.)

While at Agnes Scott, Nettles formed Soul Miner's Daughter with guitarist Cory Jones. The buzz from that collaboration started a following in the Southeast, and they were favorites down the street at Eddie's Attic and the 40-Watt Club in Athens. In 1999, the Jennifer Nettles Band formed, they already had enough national recognition to play Sarah McLachlan's festival, Lilith Fair, the same year.

But four years ago, Nettles joined her most successful band yet. Country band Sugarland, a trio including Kristen Hall and Kristian Bush, broke out,

crossed over and went platinum. Hall left the group last year to concentrate on songwriting, but Nettles and Bush continued, performing at the 2006 Grammy Awards show. A sound-check thumbs up from former Beatle Paul McCartney was a thrill.

A Douglas, Ga., native, Nettles began performing as a child in school and church. Her music echoes soul, country, folk and rock and blues—and continues to evolve.

"Sugarland's music tells a story that people can relate to on a really human dayto-day level," she says on her Web site. "But they're fun stories. They're light stories. It's music that's not taking itself too seriously."

"In my own singer/songwriter work, I did more of that kind of self-exploration, a little bit more processing of life on a heavier scale," Nettles writes. "Sugarland is more for the sake of fun, and people relate to our energy on stage. Everybody has a collective good time."

Sugarland is touring this spring with Kenny Chesney. The Bon Jovi duet hit No. 1 on the Billboard Hot Country Singles chart and No. 23 on the Billboard Hot 100 chart. In addition to the Grammy nomination, the video won a CMT Music Award in 2006 for "Collaborative Video of the Year."

Nettles' friend and classmate, Liberty Chance Claar-Pressley remembers the first time she heard Nettles' song, "Baby Girl," on the radio. "I was driving down Chamblee-Tucker Road and it came on the country radio station. I immediately knew who it was, Jennifer's voice is just too distinctive to miss," she said.

"The lyrics of 'Baby Girl' are Jennifer's life—and near future—which made it all the more poignant. I cried huge tears and called my partner to tell her to turn on the radio. From that moment on, I heard that song everywhere and I still tear up when I hear it. I sing it to my daughter as a night-time song and she walks around singing, 'Love your baby girl.""

"I have yet to see her perform without her ring on," says Claar-Pressley. "Jennifer's wearing of her ring is one of the reasons I nominated her for this award; she has always shown loyalty to Agnes Scott and the opportunities it provided her."

Refocus in Leadership, Reunion Events

Successful reunions start and end with details—what will be accomplished when, where and by whom—with the goal of happy memories and strong reconnections.

Recognizing the planning and time required by alumnae and staff to organize reunions, the alumnae and development offices have worked to simplify the process.

"We are introducing a completely new program called "Reunion Boot Camp", said Director of Alumnae Relations Kim Vickers '87. The oneday event is scheduled for 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday, May 19 for all class officers and volunteers with reunions years ending in threes and eights. "It will deal with every aspect of reunion planning and giving," Vickers said. "We can help classes accomplish in one day what previously had taken months of meetings and teleconferences."

Also, key college staff in alumnae relations, development and catering will be on hand to help classes select campus spaces, party menus, reunion giving goals and more. Planners hope this event will become a favorite for reunion classes for years to come and simplify reunion duties.

Consequently, the Anne Register Jones Leadership Conference will move to fall; this year's event will be held Nov. 2-3 to coincide with Family Weekend.

"Since leadership is such a multifaceted concept, we thought it would be useful to pick a particular area or skill set as a theme," Vickers said. "This year we are centering on networking and negotiating."

Speakers will include Sara Laschever, co-author of Women Don't Ask: Negotiation and the Gender Divide. (www.womendontask.com) and Janet Hanson, founder of the global women's network, 85 Broads (www.85broads.com).

One of the key premises of Laschever's book is that women cheat themselves by failing to stand up and do the necessary back-and-forth with their employers to ensure a fair salary. According to the book, studies show that by not negotiating a first salary, an individual stands to lose more than \$500,000 by age 60. Considering that men are four times more likely to negotiate their first salary, the gender gap in pay could be a sign that women need to speak up more when it comes to their wages.

Hanson's group originally sprang from a group of influential women leaders at Goldman Sachs and has grown to a powerful global network that now includes undergraduate women, including Agnes Scott students.

"85 Broads connects women across geographies, generations, academic institutions, and cultures. We are more than a community of 16,000 women," Hanson says. 85 Broads is an organization that believes women get things done— intelligently and morally.

Both Reunion Boot Camp and Leadership Conference will have complimentary registration for alumnae leaders. "However, in order to fund two separate events and provide great speakers and catering, we will no longer be able to reimburse for alumnae travel," Vickers said. "We hope to focus our resources on producing quality conferences, in order to give our alumnae something worth traveling to."

Taken to Khartoum, Nazer was sold to a wealthy Arab family as a domestic slave.

What's worse, she lived in almost complete isolation. The near complete denial of human affection to which she was subjected is perhaps the most tragic aspect of her story.

In 2000, Nazer was sent to work for a Sudanese diplomat's family in London; she escaped with the help of other Sudanese. Eventually she was granted asylum after great controversy that challenged the authenticity of her story.

Human rights organizations estimate that more than 14,000 men, women and children were abducted and forced into slavery in Sudan between 1986 and 2002.





Hope in Afghanistan Starts With Teaching Next Generation

In her home in Kabul on the eve of her 29th birthday, Asiyah Sarwari '99 realized that when her birthday arrived she would be the age her father was when he became a refugee.

"He was the father of a fat, bossy, blackhaired 2- year-old (me) and his life became something else, something he never imagined or wanted," Sarwari said. "And here I am, back in Kabul, at the age that he left."

Long before she came to Agnes Scott, Sarwari knew she would one day return to Afghanistan. "I remember shyly telling a cousin, 'I want to be a lawyer and go back to Afghanistan to fix it.' I was 11. Some wrong turns here and there, but I'm back to the goals of an 11-year-old, which is a good thing," she said.


Agnes Scott played an important part in Sarwari's path back to Kabul. As a senior, she participated in The Atlanta Semester: Women, Leadership and Social Change. During this program, she interned at the International Rescue Committee and developed a summer employment program for refugee youth. The organization admired what she accomplished and offered her a full-time position as a job developer. She started work the Monday following graduation and stayed about a year.

Over time, Sarwari saw her passion was working with refugees. Then she realized many of them needed legal help she was not equipped to offer. She was working on plans to take a year off before law school to work at an Afghan refugee camp in Pakistan. Then Sept. 11 occurred. Although it would be more difficult given war and terrorism, her desire to help the Afghan people was still strong.

Sarwari's Uncle Abdullah Osman researched and told her if she would work for free, he could get her a job teaching English to orphaned youth. While at ASC, she and Leah Thompson '00 taught English as a Second Language to Kurdish women, so she felt she could help. Through a program called the Return of Qualified Afghans (RQA), she received a plane ticket to Afghanistan and a



Brooklyn Is Not Just a Borough **26 Miles Through the Heart of New York**

For anyone, finishing the New York City marathon is an achievement. For Jill Siegel '89 though, it represents a victory over a disease that nearly killed her.

Siegel finished the November marathon in about six and a half hours, less than two years after preeclampsia's rapid onset resulted in the emergency Caesarian delivery of her first child, Brooklyn which was followed by stroke, coma and 98 days in the hospital. Afterward, she needed another three months of full-time, five-days-a-week rehabilitation to help her regain the ability to walk and talk.

Siegal says her experience illustrates the general lack of knowledge about preeclampsia. She trained and ran the marathon not only to raise money, but also awareness for the syndrome that kills nearly 76,000 women annually. The disease affects only pregnant or postpartum women and their children, it occurs in an estimated 5 percent of all pregnancies. As the "cure" for the mother is often to deliver the child, many of those infants die as a result of premature delivery.

In Siegel's case, her obstetrician noticed irregularities in a routine urine test and ordered hospitalization as a precaution. Although under a doctor's observation in an excellent facility, preeclampsia and HELLP syndrome (Hemolysis, Elevated Liver enzymes, and Low Platelet count) shut down her organs and her mind—Siegel remembers nothing about Brooklyn's delivery. What should have been a joyous arrival of friends and family to greet her daughter turned into nearly a deathwatch. Her neurologist later told her she was "the sickest person to leave this hospital alive."

Obviously, Siegel made it and by the end of her run raised more than \$12,000 for the Preeclampsia Foundation, a cause she has become fervent about. Siegel has returned to work as a consultant, but anticipates running another half-marathon soon to continue fundraising. A former Scottie tennis team member, she says she was a casual runner before her experience—she jogged mostly to control her weight and to pick up her tennis game. In covering this year's New York City marathon, editors at *Runner's World* found Siegel's story outstanding enough to include it in a "survivors" story.

The rest of Siegel's story and 21-month slog to recover her life and make it to the finish line is remarkable. The Web site she and her husband created is touching and well-informed. Spelman President, Holt Charge Class of 2007

A cknowledging the environment of optimism so often experienced in higher education, Spelman College President Beverly Daniel Tatum encouraged Agnes Scott College's class of 2007 to "maintain the discipline of hope."

Tatum delivered this message of optimism to 190 graduates and about 2,000 family members,

friends and faculty from the Agnes Scott community during the college's 118th commencement ceremony.

"As you move on, you move away from the hopeful structure that schools like Agnes Scott provide," Tatum said. "I would like to suggest that you need to maintain the discipline of hope. I use the word 'discipline' intentionally.


"Like regular exercise is a discipline, so is the maintenance of hope. The more you do it, the easier it gets—like establishing a regular pattern of exercise, it requires a certain amount of willpower," she added. Agnes Scott President

Agnes Scott President Elizabeth Kiss exemplified her own brand of discipline presiding over her initial commencement for the college at the conclusion of her inaugural year. Kiss noted that she first met Tatum during a visit to Mount Holyoke when it was announced Tatum would leave the venerable New England women's college for the presidency at Spelman.

The college also conferred an honorary doctor of laws degree to Bertha "B" Merrill Holt, a 1938 Agnes Scott graduate, and an honorary doctor of science degree to Tatum.

Holt was one of the first women to serve in the North Carolina House of Representatives. First appointed in 1975 to fill an unexpired term, she continued to serve Burlington/Alamance County, N.C. until 1994. Holt earned her bachelor's degree in 1938 from Agnes Scott, studied law at the University of North Carolina and earned her L.L.B. degree from the

Major Women on Major Issues: Inaugural Symposium Hosts Feisty Leaders



"Stand Up, Speak Up" Panelists Address Global Women's Issues

What do an English professor, a veteran legislator, former slave, reproductive rights activist and an environmental researcher have in common? For about two hours on April 20, a lot. Five women from intentionally disparate fields were asked to join President Elizabeth Kiss and moderator Professor Elizabeth Hackett for an inaugural symposium titled, "Stand Up, Speak Up: Empowered Women Empowering Others." They were:

Patricia M. "Trish" Anderson

A common theme was while women continue to receive messages that their opinions, votes and work are less valuable, they are inherent problem solvers, especially on issues that affect their families. Therefore, having more women in positions of power can solve problems on a larger scale.

Women in dire circumstances can devise incredible ways around a problem, Bahri said—she's seen it while working among HIV-AIDS afflicted women in India. "Solution-based minds produce solutions in what seems like a hopeless situation.

"It's a way out of a world that has been cynically imagined for us," Bahri said.

After watching her mother scrub floors for a living, Ross determined at age 4 "that I was going to make my living with my brains."

In the '60s, Ross became pregnant while in high school. At the time, it was typical to be expelled and few mothers came back after giving birth. Her parents sued the school system to allow her to return. It was a powerful illustration "that it was possible to take on a very powerful institution and win," Ross said.

For several decades, women focused on attaining

The panelists covered topics from sex workers in Asia to providing clean drinking water in Africa to the stagnation of American discourse. While no problems were solved in 120 minutes, "Come let us reason together," is the best first step, Holt said, quoting the book of Isaiah. political office, Holt said.

Now, the power of business in America may have superceded the government, Holt said. Therefore, she feels women "need to aim for getting on the board." Holt said post 9/11 arguments for isolationism encourage xenophobia. Study abroad and reciprocal international student programs are something to be encouraged.

"You break down barriers by knowing people on a person-to-person basis," she said. And having military and diplomatic personnel who are fluent and informed on other languages and cultures is crucial, especially during war. "There's not enough translators and it's getting people killed," she said.

Agnes Scott Mourns Virginia Tech Tragedy

Although the shootings at Virginia Tech on April 16 Awere 400 miles away, shock and grief arrived quickly on the Agnes Scott campus.

Thirty-two people were killed at the Blacksburg, Va., university. Most were students, murdered by classmate Seung-Hui Cho, who later killed himself.

At Agnes Scott, a convocation of remembrance and a Sunday candlelight memorial vigil were held. Students sent their sympathy and solidarity to Virginia via a huge handmade card that read "Today we are all Hokies." It

Editor's note: This e-mail was received in reply to the announcement by the Randolph-Macon Woman's College's Board of Trustees that the college would become a coeducational institution as of Fall 2007.

My eyes teared up as I was watching the news report about Randolph Macon Woman's College this weekend. I took great comfort in the knowledge that Agnes Scott is growing and won't have to face this kind of a crisis anytime soon, and I hope never.

As an educator and parent of an only child, her education has been my greatest interest and concern during her formative years. I can remember vividly the end-of-year conference with her preschool teacher, Marje Rahn of Aldersgate Methodist Church's preschool program. Mrs. Rahn began the conference explaining to me all of the skills that Rachel had masteredcolor identification, letter identification, number identification, counting to 10 and others I'm sure. I was only half listening because I was aware of her knowledge of these skills already. But then she said, "And there's no one in the world who loves playing dress-up

was signed by nearly 500 students, faculty and staff. "By the time the card was sent, I don't think I could have found a space for one more signature," said Kimberly Watt '09, who made the card, rounded up signatures and organized the vigil. "That was a great feeling, knowing that we had completely filled up this card with messages of hope and support." The front of the card featured 33 stars, one each for those murdered and the gunman. As a community, the college grieved. However, at least two ASC students had friends at Tech who were killed, said Dean of Students Gué Hudson. And the first victim, Ryan Clark, was a Georgia native and a counselor at Camp Big Heart, where Hudson's son had attended. "[Ryan] was just an outstanding young man," Hudson recalled at a service held in Maclean Auditorium on April 18 attended by about 150 people. There were readings from the Old and New Testaments and the Koran, followed by remarks by President Elizabeth Kiss, Student Government President Nancy Thebaut '08 and Professor Rafael Ocasio.

And like most campuses, Agnes Scott re-examined its own ability to deal with catastrophe. Although a crisis plan has been part of the college's public safety procedures for years, its protocols and communication plans were reviewed. In June, the college hosted a previously planned flu pandemic preparedness conference for all Atlanta-area colleges and universities.

For someone raised in a culture of electronic hyper-communication—e-mail, cell-phones, blogs, Facebook and television—Watts said it was a reminder of the importance of real empathy.

"It isn't just up to the administration to make a campus community welcoming and all-accepting," she said. "So often we get caught up in our own lives, in tests and grades and projects and everything else—we tend to forget about those around us," she said. "But by taking a few minutes to reach out to others we can hopefully begin to prevent other such outbursts of loneliness and hate."

more than Rachel L'Heureux and no one who likes looking at herself in the mirror more than Rachel L'Heureux." I started crying. This woman knew

my child like I did. She clearly sat watching her grow and observing her passions. I cried because I felt reassured that she was in the hands of another adult who viewed her as a complete person. But I also cried because I was saddened by the knowledge that this kind of total commitment to helping young people grow is a rare commodity in our educational system. I was skeptical that she would continue to be afforded that kind of insight from her teachers.

Agnes Scott College provides me with the same sort of comfort in that you seem to know my child and what makes her respond eagerly to learning and life. You may or may not realize that ASC was not her first choice. Your generous scholarship offer was the deciding factor in her attendance. She accepted it reluctantly and was determined to transfer to another school after only a few weeks there. By

October of her first year she began to form some bonds with the other young women on campus and decided to try to stick it out, at least through her first semester. Those bonds with the other young women, and most particularly with her professors could not be severed now for any reason. She is fully enmeshed in her life at Agnes Scott and is a very strong advocate for women's colleges. I don't worry about her safety or her happiness. I know that she is in good hands - hands that are preparing her to think deeply, live honorably, and accept the intellectual and social challenges of our time.

I cannot express adequately the gratitude I have for the role you are playing in her life, Agnes Scott College, but I am forever grateful.

The President's Corner



Community Strengthens Us

What creates and sustains a community? This spring Agnes Scott has been blessed with several occasions where students, faculty, staff and alumnae gathered with a sense of shared purpose and belonging. Some were joyful and some were solemn, while others evoked richly mixed emotions. But all revealed the distinctive warmth and engagement that binds the Agnes Scott family across generations, and beyond our campus roles.

On April 20 some 2,000 people (including a recordbreaking number of Alumnae Weekend participants) gathered on campus for a splendid inauguration that combined the pageantry of a formal academic procession with creativity and fun. That evening, a crossgenerational mix of alumnae, faculty, staff, students and friends danced until midnight in Evans Hall.

Very different emotions marked our campus commemorations of the terrible tragedy at Virginia Tech, as our community gathered to share shock and grief. Hundreds of us signed an oversized handmade sympathy card that read, "Today we are all Hokies," to express solidarity with the Tech community. We mourned as victims' names were read aloud at a candlelight vigil. And we reflected on the fragility of life and the terrifying darkness that can seize a human spirit, as we took comfort in the timeless wisdom of readings from Christian, Jewish and Muslim scripture

Twice this spring—as part of inauguration festivities and at our annual Community Day-the campus gathered to volunteer in our hometown. In April roughly 70 students, staff, faculty and local alumnae spent a Saturday on projects ranging from planting a fragrance garden at the Decatur Recreation Center to clearing invasive plants with Trees Atlanta to sorting clothes at Hagar's House. And in May almost 150 staff, faculty and trustees rolled up their sleeves to paint, water trees, plant flowers, fill care packages for homeless families, visit elderly patients, work at an animal shelter and do other tasks to benefit our wider community. It was gratifying how much we accomplished together in a few short hours. But many participants said what made the day truly special was the fellowship of working side by side with colleagues from different parts of campus.

Finally, two occasions struck me as especially meaningful. Each, in a different way, embodied the best of the Agnes Scott spirit. On May 2, hundreds gathered in Gaines Chapel to celebrate the life of Mollie Merrick '57, who served her beloved alma mater for 41 years in the dean of students office. Two weeks earlier, Mollie was given a standing ovation when she came to campus straight from her hospital bed to receive the Outstanding Alumna Award for Service to the College. At her memorial service, the crowd wore pink to honor Mollie's long struggle with breast cancer, we celebrated her graciousness, know-how and boundless affection for generations of Agnes Scott students.

As we looked back with love and gratitude at Mollie's life of service, we also gathered this spring to create our future. Many people-alumnae, trustees, parents, faculty, staff and students-have helped shape the college's new strategic plan, "Engaging a Wider World." A summary appears in this issue of Main Events. A series of forums was held to allow comdiscussion sticks in my mind. Seated around the circle was a cross-section of the campus community-staff from facilities and dining services, administrative assistants, lab technicians, administrators, faculty and students. Nearly everyone spoke up with questions, concerns and suggestions because they had important issues on their minds-living wage, fair trade, workplace accountability, transparency of college governance and curricular innovation. They expressed their views with passion and eloquence. While not everyone agreed, everyone listened and learned. As I looked around the circle I felt overwhelming pride at the spirit of engagement. This was Agnes Scott at its best: in this together, bringing our talents, gifts and insights to shape a bold and inspiring vision for the college's future.

The class of 1957 won the coveted Reunion Cup as well as the trophy for the highest dollar amount given to all funds. Class fund chair Margaret Hill Truesdale '57, class president Sis Burns Newsome '57, vice president Margaret Minter Hyatt '57 and their committee raised a recordbreaking \$244,584 for the annual fund and achieved 90 percent participation. As of April 30, participation had reached 92 percent.

Led by fund chairs Genet Heery Barron '47 and Doris Riddick Berry '47 and reunion chair Virginia Brown McKenzie '47, the class of 1947 held three calling sessions from the college's offices. They encouraged classmates to attend the reunion and also make a gift to the annual fund. The gifts began pouring in and by their reunion at Alumnae Weekend a record-breaking 94 percent of the class had made an



annual fund gift. As of April 30, they had achieved an unprecedented 96 percent participation.

McKenzie showed her true grit after noticing that gifts were not arriving as quickly as she thought they should. She traveled from Alpharetta to Decatur to chat with the local postmaster-she told him her class was working very hard to raise funds for the college and it was quite important that the business reply envelopes (sometimes held at the post office for counting) reach Agnes Scott in a timely manner, in particular, the Friday before reunion weekend. The Reunion Gift Fund allows incremental gifts to this special fund over three tax years (2006-2008), thus achieving a tax advantage for the donor. It also potentially allows larger gifts, because they are spread over an extended cally to the Reunion Gift Fund, plus all gifts the class makes to the 2007-2008 annual fund.

The annual fund is a vital part of maintaining Agnes Scott's high academic and aesthetic standards. As the fund is unrestricted and immediately expendable, it is an important revenue stream that provides approximately 6 percent of the college's operating budget. This year's goal for the annual fund was \$2.266 million.

at the time, so I taught the class for her. Ayse had wanted to do a study on time perception, and we honored her interest in this subject. We decided to study the effect of experience with computers, instant messaging and nearly virtual access to all kinds of information on the Internet on time perception because we'd noticed that it seemed these devices had changed our awareness of the passage of time. We found that those participants with a great deal of expertise and experience with computers and 'instant access' technologies made significantly fewer errors on a time estimation task than did less experienced participants. Dr. Carden passed away before we'd had a chance to finish our study and write it up for publication. We all miss her and think of her often. She was the inspiration for this research project.

Ross agreed there seems to be a growing tendency to use war and violence in conflict, personally and globally.

"I'm not a turn the other cheek kind of girl," Ross said. However, fighting for years for various causes has taught her "anger will eat you up before it ever reaches the person you're angry with.

Another form of forgiveness would be to address the vast disparity in the standard of living between developed nations and those struggling to overcome war or natural calamity.

"Half the world lives on \$2 or under a day," Anderson pointed out. She had recently returned from a two-year assignment in Kenya. "We must focus on enacting the solutions that have been shown to work and voting for the

Nazer listened closely and answered carefully when called upon; a native of Sudan, she's only spoken English for a few years, after being granted asylum by the British government.

When asked her opinion on the most pressing problem for women, Nazer's answer illustrated the inequities Anderson had raised and underscored that all problems are relative

"Survival," she said. "The work I'm doing is a challenge for me," Nazer said. "Circumstances made me speak out. I believe now I am doing something bigger than me.

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Memorial Held in Gaines Chapel for Mollie Merrick '57

n an early May afternoon, hundreds of women and men joined in a chorus of "God of the Marching Centuries" that rose to the roof of Gaines Chapel.

No one knows how many times Mollie Merrick '57, associate dean of students emerita, sang the college hymn—first as a student, and later during a 41-year career at Agnes Scott. So it was a fitting conclusion to her May 2 memorial service, full of her friends' recollections of "Mollie moments.

A slight woman with a bright smile, Merrick came to the college as a student and less than two years after graduation, she was hired by her alma mater; she never worked anywhere else. She died Saturday, April 28, from complications from breast cancer.

A native Floridian, Merrick loved travel and theater, said Gué Hudson, vice president for student life and community relations and dean of students. Merrick sometimes combined both in road trips to see several productions over a weekend. She also delighted in meeting and arranging the itineraries of some of the college's esteemed speakers who visited over the decades. Her home around the corner from campus included photographs with Alistair Cooke and Charles Kuralt.

In her professional capacity, Merrick was known for her sage ability to plumb the personalities of new students when matching up crucial first-year residence hall assignments.

"Her intuition matched the most unlikely pairs ... who later became lifelong friends," said Cheryl Granade Sullivan 70 at the memorial service. Merrick also had a prodigious

few years, Merrick always sent encouragement and "attagirls" to the student editors, said The Profile adviser Wendy Cromwell.

Merrick was always among the first to renew her subscription every year.

"When they were submitting their newspaper contest entry for the first time since the '90s, we needed one key issue, which we didn't have enough copies of. The students called Mollie, who hand-deliv ered the needed issue and some encouraging words,

Cromwell said.

The Profile went on to win the "most-improved," award in that year's contest.

But the ground rock beneath her curiosity and buoyancy was a deep faith and quiet habit of acting on her Christianity, said eulogist, The Rev. James D. Newsome.

"Mollie's journey of faith was as profound and vital as anyone's I know," he said.

"Her faith was not, 'Do as I do'-it was 'Let's explore the wonderful possibilities that God has created for us,"' he said

While Merrick left no immediate survivors, generations of children will remember her if for no other reason, the Christmas stocking they pull out each year.

"Each one was fatter and wider than the last," he said noting this caused some debate and envy around the mantel at Christmas. > and her enormous heart." April and May are some of the campus' busiest months, including the annual Alumnae Weekend, which fell the week before Mollie's death.

"She was so glad to celebrate her 50th reunion," Hudson said. As it turned out, Mollie accepted the award for Outstanding Alumna for Service to the College, albeit in a wheelchair. Hudson read her acceptance remarks. The campus had earlier bestowed an unofficial award by naming the café in the Alston Campus Center, "Mollie's Grill. Hudson, the last speaker at the memorial service, called Mollie the model for all who worked in the dean of students office. She thanked her longtime friend and mentor "for letting me walk with her during her nine-year battle with this disease," her voice breaking. "I learned a lot about faith, grace, organization and determination.

Transplant Wing Not Quite as Scripted as "ER," Nurse Says

any days, Joy Carter '01 rises at 5 a.m. and doesn't sit down again for at least 12 to 14 hours. But half days go fast, taking care of her patients in the transplant wing of Atlanta's Piedmont Hospital.

A biology major at Agnes Scott, Carter kept pushing academically after graduation; she earned her nursing degree in 2005 and was soon employed.

Piedmont and Emory University Hospital are home to the only two liver transplant programs in Georgia, she said.

"There are many more people waiting for organ transplants than there are available organs," says Carter. "It's not like on (the TV show) "House" when Dr. House needs an organ for a patient, he just walks down the hall to find a dying patient to harvest organs from. When a person gets sick enough they are evaluated for transplant surgery—a process that is very lengthy.

TV gets some things right, but a lot of things are compressed or created in the service of drama, she said.

"While we do keep a quick pace, test results are not instantaneous like they are on 'E.R.' or 'House," Carter says. "All of the nurses pitch in, though, and help out with patients; it's a very tight-knit group.

Different organs arrive different ways, but Carter says surgeons often travel to pick up the organs themselves.

"Other times, though, organs are shipped or flown to us," she says. "Kidneys, for instance, usually show up on ice in a big brown box. We literally put the box onto the stretcher with the patient as they are taken into surgery.

While surgery time varies considerably, they're generally longer if patients receive more than one organ at a time. There may be other challenges, as well.

"Pre-surgery complications include mismatches in blood work or problems with organ procurement," says Carter. "During surgery bleeding and difficult anatomy-especially for obese patients-can make the process more difficult. After surgery, organ rejection is common. Patients go on a strict regimen of antirejection medication."



Joy Carter says her work in the transplant wing is rewarding enough to justify tough hours and the demands of nursing school.

Carter usually begins each day by prepping one or two patients for afternoon surgery. She also assesses patients and cares for those with complications.

Although Carter knew she wanted a career in medicine, she said the skills and depth of knowledge required surprised her

"Nursing school was a lot harder than l thought it would be," she says. "Although I learned how to study hard and speak well at Agnes Scott, I still found it to be very difficult." She graduated from Georgia Baptist College of Nursing of Mercer University.

Carter praises Sandra Bowden, professor emerita of biology, for guidance and support in finding her career.

"I've kept in touch with Dr. Bowden over the years," says Carter. "She has always encouraged me to work hard and realize my goals.

With nurses in demand, high Carter could have gone anywhere. She Piedmont chose based on a friend's recommendation and has not been disappointed.

"We all have to work together to make the process work," she said. "I get to interact with a truly great group of people." The unit has nearly doubled in size since she started, she adds.

Satisfaction also comes from seeing the impact nurses can have on a patient's care, and by extension, their life

"When I can tell

that I've made a difference in someone's day, even if it's a small difference, I know my efforts were worth it," she says.

Despite a rigorous schedule, Carter has a simple but effective health principle that she applies daily: Take time to properly care for yourself.

"Not only is it a good way to be an example to your patients, you'll feel a lot better and last a lot longer," says Carter. "I recommend foot massages-they're great!'





Inaugural Davis UWC Scholars Arrive

he three first-year students blend easily walking with their peers across Agnes Scott's Woodruff Quadrangle, offering no hint of the several superlatives they afford the college

As the first and only Davis United World College Scholars affiliate in Georgia in its debut year, Agnes Scott welcomes not one, but three program participants to campus

Edwige Tia from Burkina Faso and the Lester Pearson United World College of the Pacific, Zamachiza "Zama" Mahlobo from South Africa and the United World College-USA and Catharine "Kate" Martella from Tennessee and the United World College of Southern Africa each started classes at Agnes Scott this year.

Students participating in the program usually complete their last year or two of high school at a United World College campus, then move on to a Davis-affiliated college for their undergraduate studies. The Davis United World College Scholars Program provides scholarship support for 1,100 current participating students from around the world to attend 76 American colleges and universities

Alston Campus Center Spices Up Menu, Activities

From iPod parties to commissioned graffiti, the Alston Campus Center is looking a little more audacious. Upgrades in dining, fitness and computer and social networks are part of an overall push toward a livelier campus vibe. The graffiti, a mural by a professional whose medium is spray paint, is in the Cyber Café.

Dean of Students Gué Hudson '68 kicked off the first Alston iPod party the evening of Sept. 5, encouraging students to take a half-hour study break on "Wind-down Wednesdays" to come out and share their iTunes.

Student activities is sponsoring monthly TGIF parties with live music and an all-call invitation for staff and faculty as well as students. The popular "Movie on the Quad" has returned, opening this term with "Shrek the Third."

The former Mollie's Grill is now Mollie's Bakery and Café, offering lighter salads, wraps and paninis in addition to the usual burgers and fries. That includes the eclectic "Great Scott" salad—mixed greens, grapes, pistachios, pears and cranberries. The décor also leans now more toward coffeehouse with couches and room to sprawl and talk.

"We looked at a lot of different configurations," said Associate Dean of Students John Lucy. "The one we settled on allowed the creation of a great new space that brings together student organizations, student life offices and student traffic."

The Hub will be upgraded with a sharper projection system to make indoor movie night a lot more vivid.

Following lunch or dinner, students and the community can hike up to the third floor where new Life Fitness machines, yoga mats and exercise balls await, in response to student suggestion. Previously, some workout equipment was housed on the front, ground-floor sunroom, some felt a little exposed trying to work out, so the new location not only provides a workout getting to the third floor, but also more privacy.

Another big, long-awaited plus is the new wireless Internet connection for students; the move will make cables and USBs history, as those with a wireless-ready computer will be able to log on instead of plugging in. That will soon include residence halls and some outside areas, too. Part of the network is a suite of new Mac computers available for work and play in the Cyber Café. A Mac bar is also planned for the Black Cat Café.

The Alston improvements are part of the college's longterm strategic plan, including a major goal to "Enhance Scottie Spirit." The effort not only seeks to increase and spread the word about socializing on campus, but also to make it easier to embrace the cultural, social and business opportunities that our hometowns of Atlanta and Decatur offer. A Great History and Future for Women's Leadership at ASC

www.inite in the press a lot recently. Women have achieved several new "firsts," including the first Speaker of the House, president of Harvard, presidential front-runner, dean of a major medical school (Duke), and elected president of an African country (Liberia).

At Agnes Scott, we are proud of our long history of educating women leaders. Our alumnae include some notable firsts: the first woman ordained as a minister in the Presbyterian church (Rachel Henderlite '28), the first woman Chief Justice of the South Carolina Supreme Court (Jean Toal '65), and the first woman to chair a financial regulatory agency, the Commodities Futures Trading Commission (Susan Philips '67), to name a few.

Over the past year, I've had the pleasure of meeting several of these pioneers and many other Agnes Scott women, young and young at heart, who are making a mark on their world. At Alumnae Weekend we honored women for stellar achievements in applied mathematics, global health, community development and country music—proving once again that the answers to Agnes Scott's admissions theme, "Who will you become?" are as exciting and diverse as Agnes Scott women themselves.

One important avenue for leadership is service to alma mater, through which Agnes Scott women support the college's ongoing efforts to transform women's lives. In April we honored Mollie Merrick '57 for her tireless generosity in mentoring students and shaping campus culture. Our reunion classes also demonstrated amazing leadership. The Class of 1947 surpassed all participation records achieving a 96 percent participation rate in their reunion gift to the Annual Fund. And Mollie's classmates from the Class of 1957 not only achieved a 94 percent participation rate, but also the largest-ever class gift contributed by living alumnae to the Annual Fund-a quarter of a million dollars. These levels of participation and giving make an enormous difference to Agnes Scott, from our rankings to our daily operations.

By reaching out to support the next generation of women leaders, Agnes Scott women are helping to build a better world. I am proud that our Board of Trustees Chair, Harriet King '64, just received Emory University's inaugural "Mentoring for Leadership" award for her efforts to cultivate leadership skills in other women. It is vitally important that all of us continue to support women leaders so that we may go beyond "firsts" to a world of true equal opportunity for women and men. An article in the June 2007 issue of Foreign Affairs entitled "Let Women Rule" underscores this point, arguing that if we had a critical mass of women in positions of governmental leadership around the world, we would have less corruption, more transparency and more effective efforts to resolve conflict.

Two exciting programs at Agnes Scott are committed to building women's leadership skills and opportunities. The revamped Anne Register Jones Leadership Conference, to be held Nov. 2-3, will provide training in networking and negotiating from notable speakers and experts. And the college's new signature initiative, a Center for Women's Global Leadership, just received a \$50,000 planning grant from The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. This initiative will begin to take shape over the coming year as a "think-and-do tank" linking the liberal arts to efforts to address women's global challenges and to help girls and women become creative and committed global citizens.

Agnes Scott Joins Presidents Climate Commitment

In September, Agnes Scott joined colleges and universities across the nation in a leadership commitment to environmental sustainability by becoming a charter signatory of the American College and University Presidents Climate Commitment.

"The fight against global warming is one of the central challenges of the 21st century," said Agnes Scott President Elizabeth Kiss. "Colleges and universities have a special obligation to tackle this issue because by doing so we model environmental responsibility for the next generation."

By joining the initiative, Agnes Scott pledges to gradually eliminate greenhouse gas emissions campus wide. Key components include a full inventory of emissions within 12 months and setting a plan in place within two years (with a target date and interim milestones) for becoming climate neutral.

ASC will take immediate steps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and will incorporate sustainability into the curriculum and overall educational experience. For more information, see www.presidentsclimatecommitment.org.

The college also announced the appointment of Susan Kidd '78, MAT '07, as senior adviser for sustainability. Kidd begins Oct. 1 as she completes the R. Howard Dobbs Sustainability Scholar-in-Residence position at Emory University.

Kidd has more than two decades of experience in the environmental field and served most recently as senior vice president for the Georgia Conservancy. She also holds a master's degree in environmental Georgia Public Television: John E. Maupin Jr., of Morehouse School of Medicine and William D. Underwood of Mercer University. The trio was filmed before a live audience on Oct. 5. The show is scheduled for broadcast at 1 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 21, and 7 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 23.

'o7 Graduate Awarded Fulbright Scholarship

Julia Charles '07 of Myrtle Beach, S.C., was awarded a J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship to study in Slovenia. Her Fulbright research will focus on U.S. cultural influences on the Eastern European state.

"I will be examining the role of American popular culture and English language in Slovenia since the end of World War II and in turn, how Slovenes engaged these Western influences into the shaping of their national identity," she said. Charles earned her bachelor's in history and French at Agnes Scott.

The award is contingent, among other criteria, upon obtaining a research clearance from the host country.

Administered by the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board, money for this scholarship is made possible through funds appropriated annually by the U.S. Congress, and, in many cases, by contributions from partner countries and/or the private sector.

Fulbright recipients have become heads of state, judges, ambassadors, cabinet ministers, chief executive officers, university presidents, journalists, artists, professors and teachers. Fulbright alumni also include 36 Nobel Prize winners.

Bevier Joins ASC Board

Pamela J. Bevier '61—professor, rancher, businesswoman and esteemed public health researcher—was elected to the Agnes Scott College Board of Trustees during this spring's board meeting.

Class of 1957 saw "golden opportunity"

Four years ago, the class of 1957 thought they had set some ambitious sights for their 50th reunion. This spring they finished with triple their goal, an enviable 94 percent participation rate and \$245,249 raised for the annual fund.

While annual fund gifts are crucial to the college's wellbeing, the hidden dividend for the class of 1957 was finding about 30 "lost" classmates and having nearly 70 percent of the graduating class come back for their golden reunion, said Sis Burns Newsome, outgoing class president. After five decades they were spread over 22 states and abroad. The class traveled from all quadrants of the country—and in

the case of Emiko Takeuchi,

Yokahama, Japan. Several attendees had not been back to campus since graduation, said current class president, Nancy Brock Blake. That included Millie Hillard of Arkansas who found out just a week before the reunion that she'd be able to come. Fund chair Margaret Hill Truesdale labored diligently to coordinate efforts from her home in California.

During the search to find all the class, they discovered another unique record—according to the late Mollie Merrick '57, their class sent 19 Initial plans were to raise \$80,000, but they knew the round figure \$100,000 sounded better, Newsome said. The class reached their goal a year ahead of their anniversary, but kept pushing until days before Alumnae Weekend. Along the way, a few class members found unique ways to honor the past and future of Agnes Scott.

Elizabeth Ansley Allan is the namesake of Elizabeth Ansley Flake, class of 1923. Flake had willed Allan a sheaf of old-style Coke stock certificates, now yellow with age after being folded away, never redeemed or sold.

to out-of-state visits, a handwritten letter-writing campaign and a monthly e-newsletter compiled by Class Secretary Jean Price Knapp all went into a memorable reunion and giving that in some cases was sacrificial, Newsome said.

The overriding theme was the idea the college's mission and history has affected generations. It was especially apt, given the high legacy daughter count. "We have drunk from wells we did not dig, we have rested beneath trees we did not plant," was a proverb they employed often, Newsome said.

Another powerful aspect Newsome said she'd recommend to any class planning reunion and anniversary fundraising is inclusion—creating a true class effort, rather than a committee-driven effort.

In all, 70 classmates and their guests turned their reunion into one of the biggest parties of Alumnae Weekend, Blake said. Including guests, the class of 1957 had 100 attend their 50th reunion party. Newsome said she was moved by her classmates' faith in giving.

"It touches my heart because it shows ultimate trust in the college," Newsome said. "That includes some in our class who had been away for 50 years."

Their goal was not to beat other classes, Newsome said.

"We were competing with our best selves," she said. "Our mantra to other classes would be, 'Do your best!""

Chapel On Target for Opening in Spring

While the May Day Dell is now a construction site of cranes, rebar and concrete, the steel skeleton of the new Julia Thompson Smith Chapel is rising and so far, ahead of schedule to open next spring.

The bones of the chapel give a clear idea of the how the brick-clad gothic arches will anchor the far end of the science quad. The front entry faces the brick sidewalk between Alston Campus Center and Bullock Science Center.

Some of the beams will be brick-clad and continue as a design element that pierces the interior of the church. The substantial overhang and sharply peaked roof blend well with the college's century-old collegiate Gothic architecture.

While some excavation was required, the dell retains its shadow and mild sense of remove, given the trees that remain and the site's gentle slope.

Progress is currently on target for the goal to open next spring.

"Watching the chapel rise is exciting," said John Hegman, vice president for business and finance. "It's going to be such a focal point for the whole campus."

The Julia Thompson Smith Chapel fulfills a longstanding wish for a freestanding place of worship. It will be a Christian chapel, welcoming to people of all faiths. The project has been shepherded for more than a decade by Gué Hudson, vice president for student life and community relations and dean of students. It is named for Julia Thompson Smith '31, wife of the late Hal Smith who joined the college's Board of Trustees in 1952 and served as chair for more than a decade. The chapel is designed by Maurice Jennings + David McKee Architects of Fayetteville, Ark. Jennings was a partner of the late architect Fay Jones, known worldwide for Thorncrown Chapel in Eureka Springs, Ark.

Kiss Elected Duke Trustee

ASC President Elizabeth Kiss was elected to Duke University's Board of Trustees, effective July 1.

Before becoming president of Agnes Scott, Kiss was the founding director of Duke's Kenan Institute for Ethics and an associate professor of the practice of political science and philosophy. The Kenan Institute for Ethics is a university-wide initiative at Duke that supports the study and teaching of ethics and promotes moral reflection and commitment in personal, professional, community and civic life.

During her tenure at Duke, Kiss held several leading roles. She was interim director of the Center for Genome Ethics, Law and Policy, co-director of the Humanitarian Challenges at Home and Abroad program for first-year Duke students and a member of the Executive Committee of the Academic Council.

Bullock Joins Emory University Faculty

Agnes Scott College President Emerita Mary Brown Bullock '66 has been named visiting distinguished professor of China studies at Emory University in the departments of history and political science. She began her appointment this fall and will focus her teaching on contemporary China, U.S.-China relations and Western science and medicine in China. Bullock led Agnes Scott for 11 years before departing in August 2006.

"Professor Bullock's expertise in Chinese science and medicine will provide a welcome and vital bridge between Emory's great strength in the health and biomedical sciences and our fast growing excellence in East Asian studies," said Emory College Dean Robert Paul.



"Now I truly believe that international understanding and peace are not just utopia, they are a matter of mutual knowledge and tolerance," she added.

And although Mahlobo, Tia and Martella are the first three Davis United World College Scholars to know many of the same faculty and staff."

And Vickers knows that being a Davis affiliate college puts Agnes Scott among prestigious company. "We are among a group of only 76 schools—including Harvard, Princeton and Johns Hopkins," Vickers explained. The program scholars are committed to building cross-cultural understanding across their campuses and around the globe in the 21st century. A pilot program

21st century. A pilot program began in 2001 at Colby College College of the Atlantic, Middlebury College, Princeton University and Wellesley

The program was launched by longtime British patron Lord Louis Mountbatten. After he was killed by IRA terrorists in 1979. Mountbatten's nephew Prince Charles assumed responsibility as champion of the cause. Following the Prince in this role were Queen Noor of Jordan and Nelson Mandela in South Africa. Mandela has lived to see his children and grandchildren participate in the UWC Swaziland campus. Students are chosen annually through rigorous national competitions conducted by indigenous, voluntary committees. Winners are awarded places and scholarships at whichever of the UWC schools can accommodate them Philanthropist Shelby Davis became involved when he met UWC students at the U.S. campus in New Mexico in the late 1990s. Davis generously endowed 100 full scholarships to allow selected Americans to go on full scholarships to these UWC schools around the world. Through this association developed the Davis UWC Scholars Program at American colleges and universities.



United World College Scholars to attend Agnes Scott since it was named an affiliate, 1987 alumna Kimberly Vickers was the first ASC student to come to campus as a UWC scholar more than 20 years ago. Now director of alumnae relations at Agnes Scott, Vickers played a key role in securing her alma mater's participation with the program.

The UWC "movement" has evolved from the original idea of German-born educator Kurt Hahn, the founder of Gordonstoun and Outward Bound that teach young people self-reliance who first presented the UWC idea at a 1956 NATO meeting in Paris. s one of the smiling official faces of Agnes Scott's administration, Betty Derrick '68 is the soul of decorum and knows her protocol. In towngown relations and as a liaison between students and administration, her style is even-handed with a sense of humor. In August, Derrick retired as special assistant to the dean of students, which was a second career; she had previously retired from BellSouth as an assistant vice president

As a student in the mid-'60s, though, Derrick was known as one of campus' best pranksters, unleashing elaborately orchestrated jokes on everyone from her roommates to then Dean Benton C. Kline.

Birmingham Attorney's Career Earns Her "Lawyer of the Year"

A s a partner in the all-woman Birmingham firm of Crew & Howell, Wendy Brooks Crew '80 runs a lucrative practice as a lawyer board-certified in matrimonial law, often hired by other attorneys who know she's worth every penny.

And the first case she argued in a 10-day federal court trial resulted in a \$4.78 million verdict for her client, at the time the largest ever in the district.

However, some of her most memorable cases involved clients who couldn't pay a retainer, many of them children. So it didn't come as a surprise to her friends (and Richard, her husband of 20 years) when Crew was honored in June as Lawyer of the Year by the Family Law Section of the Alabama State Bar. Crew also serves as president of Children First the Foundation, an umbrella organization that selects and funds a variety of children's causes, from after-school and mental health services to a

recently created death review board.

Right out of Cumberland School of Law Crew entered the nonstop machine of juvenile justice, handling 30-40 abuse and neglect cases a day working for the Legal Aid Society. She once represented a teenager who had stabbed her mother's common-law husband to death; Crew successfully argued for leniency, given the family's history.

College, London.

"The 'victim's' family, who realized she would be walking out on probation, vaulted the bar and beat me up," Crew said. After bailiffs pulled them off, she was taken to the hospital for broken ribs.

Crew was also attorney for the Birmingham women's health/abortion clinic that Eric Rudolph nail-bombed in 1998, killing security guard Robert Sanderson and maiming nurse Emily Lyons.

And in 2002, Crew represented a lesbian client who wanted to reclaim custody of her children. Although she lost, the case became a flashpoint when "Ten Commandants" former Alabama Supreme Court Chief Justice Roy Moore's opinion included language that inflamed not only the gay community, but also a lot of straight voters. He implied homosexuals were not fit to parent. "That was one of the most rewarding cases I've worked on," Crew said. "I think it kept him from being elected governor of Alabama." (Moore was defeated in the 2006 Republican primary.)

Growing up in Montgomery, Ala., in the George Wallace era,

Wendy Crew saw a lot that illustrated the blatant and subtle methods of discrimination. Through her legal aid work, she also knew the holes in the child welfare system.

The Children First Foundation of Alabama aims to effect real change for thousands of the state's children least likely to see justice: foster children, the mentally ill, juvenile offenders, and children who die prematurely.

The foundation's annual budget (nearly \$50 million last year) comes from proceeds from the Master Settlement Agreement, a legal compact between the states and major tobacco compa-

nies that pays states an annual amount based on the number of cigarettes sold. An estimated 85 cents of the total cost per pack goes to pay for the agreement.

The Foundation's discretion and oversight means that the money goes to causes that can make a dent in the misery level of children in a state ranked 48th nationally overall in the index of children's welfare, according to the Annie E. Casey Foundation's 2007 Annual Report.

"The number one indicator of adult criminal behavior is truancy," Crew said. " If we determine the reasons—often times dysfunctional families, improper diet, absent parents—we can address the cause with early money for parenting skills classes, respite care for overwhelmed parents, access to nutrition programs and tutoring and keep the problems from escalating to the inevitable criminal behavior.

"We have these children become productive, tax-paying citizens rather than state inmates. Politicians that run on a 'lock them up and throw away the key' platform basically throw money at a problem while not attempting to fix the problem," she said. One of Crew's favorite targets is wrong-headed bureaucracy. She recalls her case involving an eight-month old child with meningitis, whose parents skipped town with the money from community fundraiser intended to pay medical bills. The child's condition was severe, now she was a toddler—"and she didn't have anyone to buy her socks and toothpaste," Crew said.

A couple that tried to become her foster parents met a stone wall of government resistance. In order to make them foster parents, the state would first have to assume custody and would inherit her medical bills. The state refused.

"So she was literally growing up in Children's Hospital," Crew said. The child was more than two years old when the courts granted custody to the couple, soon after terminating rights of the biological parents.

In terms of children's rights though, the landmark was probably the 1991 consent decree resulting from a lawsuit against the Alabama Department of Human Resources. When an 11year-old's parents lapsed on their utilities repeatedly, child protection services removed him from his home. But since 11-year-old black males were hard to place in foster care, the state stuck him in a psychiatric hospital, for \$600 a day, Crew said. "They could have paid their utilities for four

months at that rate," Crew said. The larger issue however, was the state had no

back-up plan when it removed children and found no appropriate place for them. The result was 16 years of federal oversight, just recently lifted, for the state's care of "multiple needs" children.

Outspoken and a natural storyteller, Crew is the first to admit theatricality is a gift in court "and I enjoy getting paid for something I like to do." A sense of drama is something she admired in one of her favorite Agnes Scott professors, Jane Pepperdene, who never lectured, but passionately infused her transfer of literary knowledge. In fact, Crew says she turned down two theater scholarship offers to become an ASC English major.

"I still have my Chaucer book, and I wouldn't trade going to Agnes Scott for anything," Crew said. Coming from a "real Old South" background of private schools and debutante balls in the governor's mansion, "my father thought I was going to a finishing school," she said. "But my mother knew differently."
