The Agnes Solution provides a merit scholarship of \$15,000 each year for four years to GA students who qualify for the GA HOPE Scholarship, or to other domestic students who have a 3.6 high school GPA and a 1300 SAT (Math and Critical Reading) or a 29 on the ACT. In addition, these students receive \$3,000 for an internship, study abroad, or mentored research experience after their sophomore year.
