On Tuesday, January 15, as the UN deadline approached for the withdrawal of Iraq from Kuwait, church and school bells all over the country rang out at 12 noon calling people of faith to prayer for peace. The bell at Agnes Scott rang and will continue to ring each Tuesday at noon until the war is over, reminding us all to remember in our thoughts and prayers all those most dramatically impacted by the Persian Gulf situation.

Along with the ringing of the bell, the College Chaplain's office will hold a weekly prayer service for peace in the Middle East. This week the brief service will be held in the Chapel at noon on Tuesday, January 22. In

subsequent weeks the service will be at 10:25 a.m. on Mondays.

Plans are also underway to begin a support group for the family and friends of those serving or others at particular risk. This group will meet following the Monday Prayer Service and will be open to faculty, staff, and students of the College.

CHOOSING THE FUTURE Strategic Planning News

The Strategic Planning Steering Committee is committed to keeping the campus community informed of its actions and of the progress of the planning process in general. This insert in the Campus Connection will be reserved for planning process news and will be used as necessary by the steering committee or the task forces.

As stated before, the support and participation of the entire campus is critical to produce an effective portrayal of the issues faced in strategic planning. The planning process can only be successful when discussions are focused, participatory, and open. As input from all segments of the campus community is encouraged and invited, the task forces outlined earlier are committed to providing at least one open campus forum during this first phase of the process. Information on those opportunities for additional involvement will be forthcoming as the task forces begin meeting this week.

The first phase of the planning process should be completed by April 15 when the task forces will make their reports to the steering committee. In the second phase, the steering committee will provide further opportunity for campus-wide response to the findings of the task forces. Over the summer, the president will review all of these community recommendations and present a strategic agenda for the College which will be shared with the campus in the fall.

The result of this process should provide a "thematic umbrella" for the future of the College which will guide the various programs of the College. The College should gain a sense of direction about how it can adjust to and react to the strategic issues critical to its future prosperity.

Task Forces have been formed from names submitted by and to the steering committee and guidelines have been established for their work. Many of those who volunteered have been named to task forces. Outlined below is the charge for each Task Force and a list of its members.

Task Force A - Campus Climate and Communication

How communication and campus climate issues are handled is vital to the success of this planning process and to the College's sense of community beyond this introspection. To ensure that these are given the proper attention, the highest organizational level in the planning process is charged with determining, understanding, and suggesting resolutions for the issues that affect campus climate and communication. As it serves as this task force, the Strategic Planning Steering Committee is responsible for deciding how the planning process itself should be communicated so as to relate sincerity of purpose. In addition, it should determine the other issues that have an effect on the campus climate and address them in order to improve the campus community.

The Strategic Planning Steering Committee serves as this task force.

Task Force B - Academic Initiatives

Poised between some major but partly unrealized academic initiatives of the 1980s and suggested new programs for the 1990s, Agnes Scott faces important choices concerning its academic direction. Existing but underfunded options, like the programs described by the seven-point Centennial Academic Plan approved by the faculty, must be reassessed in the light of additional proposals and newly ascertained needs for the present and future. In order to recommend priorities for action, current and proposed initiatives will be reviewed, not in isolation, but within a strategic framework of centrality to college mission, competitive advantage over other institutions, impact on clearly limited resources, and effects on current departmental planning.

In the decade of the 90s, however, already predicted to be an "era of creative frugality" at best, proliferation of programs and efforts is untenable. At the same time, in an increasingly competitive environment, we must be willing to take risks, to seek initiatives that hold promise of attracting more students to Agnes Scott. To have any hope of success, these efforts should build on this College's present strengths and be adequately funded, even if, as is probable, all funding cannot be attained through reallocations.

Task Force C - Supporting the Faculty and Academic Support

The charge is a broad one: To be concerned not only with the issue of compensation and how it affects recruitment and retention of faculty, but also with the quality of life - the shared values and technical support that attract, motivate, and sustain a faculty with a strong commitment to its institution.

The task force will be recommending specific proposals in priority order, not compiling a wish list.

These proposals will be appropriate to the kind of college Agnes Scott wants to and can be, with full consideration of costs.



COLLEGE EVENTS COMMITTEE SURVEY RESULTS AVAILABLE

The results of the College Events Committee survey from last semester are now available at the circulation

desk of McCain Library.

In summary, most respondents felt that the College Events Series (CES) is an important part of the academic program, providing the major cultural events and speakers for the College in addition to providing an important service to metropolitan Atlanta. Suggestions included considering the CES in the budgeting process in order to provide a subsidized or even free cultural opportunity to students. Most felt the series should be free to students but not to faculty, staff, or the general public.

The current programming format was seen as favorable, but should possibly include less chamber music and more speakers, dance, and theatre. Diversity of historical periods and styles, including some programs from non-Western/non-Eurocentric traditions, women and minorities, all received many more positive than

negative responses.

The reasons for poor attendance given most often were too many demands on one's time, raised or high ticket prices, the distance from the campus for many faculty and staff, no big names to attract an audience, inadequate publicity, low morale on campus, and too many activities in Atlanta and on campus.

PUBLIC SAFETY CONDUCTS RACE RELATIONS COURSE

On Friday, January 18, the ASC Department of Public Safety presented a law enforcement training course on race relations. The course combined lecture, practical exercises, discussions, and role playing to identify and encourage creative resolutions to race relations problems.

Officers from ASC, Mercer University, the City of Avondale Estates, and DeKalb Community College attended the course. Dr. Carole Morgan of the North Central Georgia Law Enforcement Academy monitored

the course on behalf of the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council (POST).

As a result of having successfully completed the on-site evaluation, as well as the instructor training course at the academy, POST awarded Officer Charlotte York her Instructor's Certificate. Officer York joins Sgt. Gregory Scott and former Lt. Amy Lanier in reaching instructor status. Sgt. Curtis Parrott will undergo an on-site evaluation in March in order to receive his certificate.

I. Eligibility:

II. Priority (in order):

- 1. All classes
- 2. College events (intercollegiate/intramural)
- 3. Students
- 4. Faculty/Staff
- 5. Alumnae/Trustees

III. Costs:

1. Students, faculty, staff, trustees, and their families - no charge

2. Alumnae and their families - \$50 yearly (includes two guest passes and use of the Woodruff Building, track & field, and tennis courts)

3. Conference guests - part of conference fee

4. Passes for trustees and alumnae will be distributed and fees paid at the Department of Public Safety.

IV. Availability:

Open hours are posted in the building and can be changed. The building is closed when the College is not in session.

V. Methods of Use:

**1. Agnes Scott ID cards must be presented by college students, faculty, and staff.

2. Alumnae and trustees must present their passes and a driver's license.

3. Family members without the primary user present must present their family pass and a driver's license.

** IDs will be checked this semester after class hours.

VI. General Rules:

- 1. Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
- 2. If you do not have proper ID and/or pass, you will be refused admittance.

3. You must be 16 year of age or older to use or be in the weight room.

- 4. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
- 5. Proper dress is mandatory in order to use the facilities. Proper dress means gym shoes, shorts, shirt, sweats and warm-ups. Swim wear only for the pool.

6. Towels will not be distributed. Bring your own.

7. Lockers can only be used on a day to day basis. If you put a lock on a locker, please remove it when you leave. Otherwise, the lock will be removed for you.

8. No bare feet permitted anywhere other than the pool.

This building is not open when the College is closed. This includes all holidays and vacation periods during the course of the academic year.

The College reserves the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities in case of violation of regulations.

<u>Primary users</u> are students, faculty, staff, alumnae and trustees. All primary users with the exception of alumnae and trustees will have the same color plastic pass. Alumnae and trustees, who have no college ID, will have another type of pass for identification.

OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR USE OF TRACK & FIELD AND TENNIS COURTS

I. Eligibility:

1. Students and two guests.

2. Faculty, faculty families and two guests per faculty member (emeriti & emeritae included)

3. Staff, staff families and two guests per staff member (retired staff included)

5. Trustees, trustee families and two guests per trustee

III. Costs:

1. Students, faculty, staff, trustees, and their families - no charge

2. Alumnae and their families - \$50 yearly (includes two guest passes and use of the Woodruff Building, track & field, and tennis courts)

3. Conference guests - part of conference fee

IV. Availability:

Dawn to dusk while the College is in session.

V. Methods of Use:

- 1. Facilities will have a lock on the gates. Lock the gate when you enter or leave the facilities.
- 2. Fain entrance with a key issued in the following manner:

a. Student - part of registration

b. Faculty, staff, alumnae, and trustees from the Department of Public Safety beginning September 1 of each year.

3. Plastic or laminated passes will be issued with keys. These are to be hung on the boards at the track and tennis courts while you are using the facilities.

VI. Keys and Passes:

- One plastic colored pass and one key will be issued to the primary user (i.e. student, faculty, staff, alumna, or trustee) Alumnae and trustees will have a different color pass for identification since they will not have ASC IDs.
- 2. If a family pass is required, one will be issued (non-plastic) for the family at initial registration. Names of all family members will be listed on the back of the pass.
- 3. Guest passes will be issued at the initial registration.

VII. General Rules:

- 1. Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
- 2. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
- 3. The locks on the gates will be kept locked at all times.

- 4. The priority for the use of the facilities will be strictly observed.
- 5. Public Safety officers will patrol the facilities.
- 6. Passes are to be displayed at all times by the users and their guests.

These operating procedures do not cover the summer months when the College is not in session. The College reserves the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities in case of violation of regulations.

FOUNDER'S DAY SYMPOSIUM ON FAITH AND LEARNING PLANNED

New Dialing Procedures for Japan and Mexico

The Japanese and Mexican public telephone companies have introduced new dialing procedures for calling Tokyo and Mexico.

Effective immediately, 23 wards of Tokyo will change to 8-digit telephone numbers from their current 7-digit numbers by adding a "3" to the beginning of the exchange identity. The new procedure for Tokyo is as follows: international prefix ("011"), country code ("81"), area code ("3"), exchange identity ("3"XXX), subscriber number (YYY). There will be no change to telephone numbers that already use a 4-digit exchange identity. Also, the dialing procedure used to reach mobile phones will not change.

All of Mexico has transferred to the International Dialing Plan. This will require callers to dial the international prefix ("011"), followed by Mexico's country code ("52"), prior to the city code (XXXX), and the subscriber number (YYYY).

Calls placed to either Tokyo or Mexico without following the new dialing procedures will be directed to a recording.

MONDAY BLUES GONE BAD



Public Safety Announces Tornado Watch/Warning Plans

The Department of Public Safety monitors the National Weather Service on the police communications system. Once information is received about either a tornado watch or warning, the following steps will be taken:

 As soon as the Atlanta area is identified as a "watch" area, the office will notify the Dean of Students and begin notifying residence halls by way of senior residents, resident assistants, and the hostess if one is on duty. During normal business hours, administrative offices will be advised of the "watch" and asked to pass the information on to other employees.

If the DeKalb County area is placed in a "warning" status, the office will activate the emergency call list to the appropriate areas. Also, one officer will circulate through campus in a patrol car with the siren activated while the other officers move through the buildings, advising persons to move to the lowest level,

staying away from windows.

3. As soon as the "warning" status has been lifted for this area, officers will begin building to building notification since it is very likely that the power will be out due to the storm. Please stay in your area until you have gotten official notification by either television, radio or an officer that the warning has lifted.

In preparation for severe weather, the Department of Public Safety encourages each office area to maintain a flashlight and a battery operated portable radio.

As the April 15 deadline for task force reports nears, the SPSC again encourages everyone to review the progress of the task forces thus far and to note the opportunities for participation as listed in the reports below.

Alumnae Association Task Force

The Alumnae Board has begun exploring its own long range planning by developing goals in its annual retreat on March 2. The Alumnae Board will continue to act as the Alumnae Association Task Force until the College's planning process is complete. At that time the Alumnae Association will evaluate its role in implementing the strategic plan that the College formulates.

Task Force A - Campus Climate and Communication

Task Force A, also the SPSC, has devoted its last three meetings to devising a set of values that the campus environment at ASC should espouse. These involve how we treat each other, how decisions are made, and effective campus communication, among others. The values will be shared with the campus community in an insert in the March 28 Campus Connection and will be discussed in two forums open to the entire campus. The first of these is April 5 at 10:25 a.m. The second is April 12 at 2:15 p.m. Both will be held in the Alston Campus Center's Lower Lounge.

Task Force B - Academic Initiatives

co-chaired by Sarah Blanshei, Linda Hubert, and Gus Cochran

This task force pursued its charge initially by listening to the views of faculty, staff, and students as expressed in an open forum and by reviewing materials from earlier planning efforts. Currently, our discussions are focusing on several academic models and institutions that illustrate those models. For example, a "theme" model would retain the broad curricular coverage of a classical liberal arts college, but focus its resources and shape its image to emphasize its distinctive strength(s). Another model would feature special programs such as a MAT or Masters in Liberal Studies degree. An emerging emphasis in our discussions and another model is that of partnerships with other institutions, academic, cultural, corporate, etc. Seeking to estimate the consequences of any initiative has led us to question carefully the extensive investment required by some models, such as the work study (co-op education) model.

Task Force C - Supporting the Faculty and Academic Support

co-chaired by Sarah Blanshei and John Pilger

Task Force C is charged with studying ways of supporting the faculty and the academic programs of the College. The Task Force drafted a series of questions (see Choosing the Future, vol. 2) in order to focus the work of the group and to guide discussions with College constituencies. This task force has held two open forums and has met with part-time faculty members. Meetings are also planned with the Director of Personnel Services to discuss faculty benefits and the Director of the Library to explore ways that it can better meet the requirements of faculty and students. All the meetings of this task force have been designed to give insight into the needs of faculty in all stages of their careers as they teach and carry out their scholarly endeavors.

Task Force D - The Quality of Student Life

co-chaired by Gué Hudson and Rosemary Eberiel

The Quality of Student Life task force has completed seven open sessions with the following groups of students: students from each of the residence halls, African-American students, international students, and RTCs. A final open forum for this task force will be held on Monday, March 25, at 10:25 a.m. in the lower level of the Alston Campus Center.

Task Force E - Enrollment Management and Financial Aid

co-chaired by Terry Lahti and Art Bowling

The task force on Enrollment Management and Financial Aid has held two open forums for the community to discuss such issues as how ASC is being promoted to prospective students, perceptions of ASC in relation to the reality, maintaining the academic quality of entering students, how messages are given about financial aid, and the implications of having a sizeable endowment. The members of this task force have divided their efforts into three main areas: marketing (image and reputation, positioning, and strategies), financial aid (viability of continuing to meet 100% of need, possibility of changing the mix of financial aid and scholarship funds, the number and amount of need-based and non need-based awards), and diversity (pursuing it in our enrollment efforts and support structures for retaining students).

Task Force F - The College Economy and Infrastructure


co-chaired by Gerry Whittington and Kathy Kennedy

CHOOSING THE FUTURE - HOW SHALL WE LIVE?

Task Force A, the Strategic Planning Steering Committee, has held several sessions during the planning process on the issues of organizational culture, campus climate, and communication. Efforts have been directed at producing a set of statements which would ideally characterize the Agnes Scott environment. The following statements represent a synthesis of the task force discussions and will serve as a basis for further discussion at the open forums held Friday, April 5, at 10:25 a.m. and Friday, April 12, at 2:15 p.m. Both will be in the lower level of the Alston Campus Center.

DECISION-MAKING

After larger institutional goals are in place, we should delegate decision-making when appropriate and not concentrate this responsibility in upper levels. We should assure the advance consultation of those who will be affected by our decisions. We will communicate decisions clearly with the understanding of who is responsible for their implementation. Finally, decisions must be related to fiscal realities.

RISK-TAKING

We should create a climate at Agnes Scott that encourages creative thought and informed risk-taking, as there are alternative ways to achieve goals and objectives in our diverse environment. Although risks should be taken in order to obtain success, the reality exists that some risks may produce results unacceptable to the community.

STANDARDS

When the College and its individuals undertake an action, it should be done with the best effort possible, with attention to detail, and in an atmosphere of cooperation and mutual support. We should strive to avoid duplication of services and utilize resources in a coordinated approach to achieve distinction in what we value.

HOW WE TREAT ONE ANOTHER

The people of ASC and the divergent viewpoints they represent are its most important resource. For that reason, we will recognize the importance of individual opinions and be appreciative and respectful of those, especially when decisions are being made. We should also strive for an environment which encourages directness and trust and which values a sense of humor.

COMMUNICATION

Communication at ASC should be targeted to the audience most affected and, when possible, be done informally. It should also be timely, concise, and purposeful. Meetings will only be called when face-to-face communication is required; meetings deemed necessary require advance preparation (agenda) and summary actions (follow-up).

CITIZENSHIP

ASC has an opportunity and a responsibility within the larger community to foster partnerships and alliances to improve individual and institutional citizenship. Successful promotion of ASC can combat feelings of isolation and can be mutually rewarding to both the community and the College.

DIVERSITY





Scenes for two movies, NBC-TV's The Nightman and Universal Studios' Fried Green Tomatoes, will be shot here in the coming weeks.

CAMPUS SAFETY REPORT

The Department of Public Safety is charged with the responsibilities of life safety and property security services. Our department is a state authorized law enforcement agency and must maintain compliance with the rules and regulations of the Georgia Peace Officer Standards and Training Council. Georgia Code section 20-8-2 provides the power of arrest to our police officers within their jurisdiction (college property and 500 yards beyond).

Our department is staffed by police officers who are certified by the state of Georgia. All officers have had previous police experience with other metro-area law enforcement agencies such as the Atlanta, Decatur and MARTA police departments.

OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR USE OF THE WOODRUFF BUILDING, TRACK & FIELD AND TENNIS COURTS

I. Eligibility

- 1. Students and two guests
- 2. Faculty, faculty families and two guests per faculty member (emeriti & emeritae included)
- Staff, staff families and two guests per staff member (retired staff included)
- 4. Alumnae, alumnae families and two guests per alumna
- 5. Trustees, trustee families and two guests per trustee

NOTE: THESE FACILITIES ARE NOT OPEN TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC

II. Priority (in order)

- 1. All classes
- 2. College events (intercollegiate/intramural)
- 3. Students
- 4. Faculty/Staff
- 5. Alumnae/Trustees

III. Costs

- Students, faculty, staff, trustee and their families no charge
- 2. Alumnae and their families \$50 yearly (includes two guest passes and use of the Woodruff Building, track & field, and tennis courts)
- 3. Conference guests Included in conference fee
- Passes for trustees and alumnae will be distributed at the Department of Public Safety.

IV. Availability (Woodruff Building):

Open hours are posted in the building and are subject to change. The building is closed when the College is not in session. (This includes all holidays and vacation periods during the course of the academic year.)

Availability (Track & Field and Tennis Courts): Dawn to dusk while the College is in session

V. Methods of Use (Woodruff Building):

- **1. Agnes Scott ID cards must be presented by students, faculty and staff.
 - 2. Alumnae and trustees must present their passes and driver's license.
 - 3. Family members without the primary user present must present their family pass and driver's license.
- ** IDs will be checked this semester after class hours

Methods of Use (Track & Field and Tennis Courts):

1. Facilities will be locked. When entering and leaving, lock the facilities.

- 2. Keys are issued during the following times:
 - a. Students Class registration
 - b. Faculty, staff, alumnae and trustees Beginning Sept. 1 at the Department of Public Safety
- Plastic or laminated passes will be issued with keys.
 These are to be hung on the boards at the track and tennis courts while you are using the facilities.

VI. Keys and Passes (Track & Field and Tennis Courts):

- One plastic colored pass and one key will be issued to the primary user (i.e. student, faculty, staff, alumna or trustee). Alumnae and trustees will have a different color pass for identification since they do not have ASC IDs.
- If a family pass is required, one will be issued (nonplastic) for the family at registration. Names of all family members will be listed on the back of the pass.
- 3. Guest passes will be issued at the initial registration.

VII. General Rules:

- Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
- 2. If you do not have proper ID and/or pass, you will be refused admittance.
- You must be 16 or older to use or be in the weight room.
- 4. Children under 16 must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
- Children under 16 are permitted to swim during the last two pool hours on Monday and during all pool hours on Saturday and Sunday.
- Proper dress is mandatory when using the facilities.
 Proper dress includes gym shoes, shorts, shirts, sweats and warm-ups. Swim wear is required while in the pool.
- 7. You must bring your own towels.
- Lockers can only be used on a day-to-day basis. If you put a lock on a locker, please remove it when you leave.
- Bare feet are not permitted other than in the pool area.
- 10. The gates will be kept locked at all times.

The College has the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities if regulations are violated.
