

But from 1857, when he was only 9 years old, until his death in 1908, "Blind Tom" delighted and astounded audiences all over the world with his ability to play any musical piece on the piano after hearing it only once and without benefit of musical training.

A gentle soul with an even more beguiling talent, "Blind Tom" captivated those who sought rational explanations for what they saw. Musical prodigy or gifted mimic? Genius or medical mystery? Today he would be called an autistic-savant. Those who witnessed his performances could only say he embodied the spirit of a higher power.






## CHITRA DIVAKARUNI AUTHOR READING
