"Crossings" and other works from the company's repertoire will be performed at 8:15 p.m., Jan. 27 and 28, and at 2 p.m. and 8:15 p.m., Jan. 29, in Gaines Auditorium.

"Crossings," commissioned in 1991 from New York choreographer David Roussève and composer/vocalist Ysaye Barnwell of Sweet Honey in the Rock, tells the story of a young woman's experience of love, loss and self-discovery in a challenging form that mixes dance, music and narrated text. The piece celebrates the crossing of paths in the relationship between a young African-American girl and her "Nana." "While the African rhythms are the glue that hold the piece together, the audience will also recognize the influence of the spiritual, children's game songs, gospel and rap music," says choreographer Roussève. The piece premiered in New York in 1992.

Tickets are \$12 for the general public and \$10 for non-ASC students, senior citizens and ASC faculty and staff. ASC students should claim their tickets at the information desk as soon as possible.

On March 12, the three-digit prefix of Agnes Scott's telephone numbers, 371, will change to 638. The last four digits (telephone extension numbers) will remain the same. For example, 371-6480 will become 638-6480. The main number of the College will be 638-6000. There will be no change in the WATS (800) line number.

Southern Bell will put an announcement on the old 371 telephone numbers for a limited time which will inform callers of the new telephone number.

The new telephone switch, located in the basement of Walters, will be operating on new outside cabling leading to each building on campus and then connected to the old wiring inside each building. Offices will continue to use present telephone sets for now.

Offices and departments are asked to begin thinking about how the phone number change will effect operations. Consideration is being given to ways to best communicate the change to campus publics, (for example, the creation of an announcement postcard.) PHI BETA KAPPA SPONSORS ECONOMIC LECTURES

"Déjà vu l' économie: British 'failure' 1890; American 'failure' 1990" is the topic of a public lecture sponsored by Phi Beta Kappa at 8 p.m., Monday, Feb. 7, in Buttrick G-4. The lecturer is Donald McCloskey, professor of economics and history at the University of Iowa, where he is also director of the Project on Rhetoric of Inquiry.

McCloskey asserts that America has not 'failed' economically, any more than Britain did a century ago. In fact, other countries have converged to an American and British standard of competence. The rhetoric of failure is startlingly similar in the 1890s and the 1990s, but it was and is misleading.

All students, faculty and staff of Agnes Scott are welcome to attend this public lecture and two classes which will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 8, in Buttrick G-4. From 9:25 to 10:40 a.m., McCloskey will lecture on "The Extent of the Market, Ancient and Modern," and from 10:55 a.m. to 12:10 p.m., he will present "Reading the Economy: An Anthology of Literature and Economic Life."

Students and faculty from the departments of economics, history and English are invited to join McCloskey and members of Phi Beta Kappa for lunch at 12:15 p.m., Tuesday, Feb. 8, in the Faculty/Staff Dining Room.

CONNECTION DEADLINE

UPS INCREASES SHIPPING RATES

On Feb. 7, new rates and service charges are scheduled to go into effect for United Parcel Service. The service change includes an increase in the weight limit from 70 pounds to 150 pounds per package. Rates for domestic ground shipping will increase approximately four percent. Rates for "next day" letters will increase to \$10.75 and "second day" letter rates will increase to \$5.75. Insurance will still be free of charge for the first \$100 declared value but each additional \$100 or fraction thereof will cost 35 cents.

UPS will begin assessing an additional handling charge of \$1 to all domestic packages in the following categories: articles, cans or pails not fully enclosed in a shipping container or not in an appropriate shipping container (i.e., corrugated cardboard) or packages that exceed 60 inches in length. UPS can be sent from the ASC Post Office and must be at the post office by 11 a.m. in order to go out that day.

ASC TORNADO ALERT PLAN

The tornado season in Georgia runs from February through June. Below is a guideline to follow before such conditions arise, and throughout "watch" and "warning" situations.

The Department of Public Safety monitors the National Weather Service on its police communications system. Once Public Safety receives information from the National Weather Service of either a "tornado watch" or "tornado warning" the following steps will be taken.

- As soon as the Atlanta metro-area is identified as a "watch" area, Public Safety
 will notify the Dean of Students office and begin notifying residence halls by
 way of senior residents, residence assistants and the hostess, if one is on duty.
 Building captains will be notified so they are aware of the existing conditions.
- 2. If DeKalb County is placed in a "warning" status, Public Safety will activate the Emergency Call List to the appropriate areas. Also, one officer will circulate campus in a patrol car with the siren activated while the other officers move through the buildings, advising persons to move to the lowest level staying away from windows. Building captains will assist officers in the administrative/academic areas of their buildings.
- 3. As soon as the "warning" status has been lifted for this area, officers will begin building to building notification since it is likely that the power will be out due to the storm. Please stay in the designated evacuation areas until there is official notification by either TV, radio, an officer or a building captain that the "warning" has been lifted.

In preparation for severe weather the Department of Public Safety encourages each office area to maintain a flashlight and a battery-operated portable radio (both with fresh batteries).

The Department of Public Safety has started the Building Captain Program which is designed to expedite evacuation during emergencies. A selected group of faculty and staff members will be assisting ASC police officers in evacuating buildings in case of a tornado, fire or bomb threat. In order for everyone to become familiar with their respective building captain, a list has been provided.



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
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

PUBLIC RELATIONS REPORTS RESULTS OF "CAMPUS CONNECTION" SURVEY

The "Campus Connection" survey results are in! The responses showed that the "Campus Connection" has become an important channel for communication to the campus with 71% of the respondents citing it as their primary source of information. Nearly that number (69%) read it entirely each week, with the majority of the remaining respondents reading only the announcements that apply to them. The following are among the highlights of the survey:

- The most requested change was the addition of a question and answer column (28%), followed closely by additional personal news (24%).
- Over-half (55%) of the respondents recycle the "Campus Connection," with 48% keeping it for at least a week.
- Students would prefer to have more informative announcements (34%) and are willing to use a form for submissions (40%).
- Faculty responses favored brevity (65%).
- Nearly all of the hourly staff respondents read the "Campus Connection" entirely each week (88%).
- Salaried staff respondents want more personal news and a question and answer column (45% each).

Several comments and suggestions were offered. Many of those concerned distribution patterns on campus. COLLEGE CHANGES OVER TO DIFFERENT CALLING PROCEDURES

The change over to the new telephone system has occurred. The new prefix for all College numbers is now 638. Other changes in phone service are:

- Local calling: The access code 9 has not changed. There will be no change in the
 dial tone when 9 is dialed, however, no pause is now required. Just dial 9 and
 continue dialing without waiting.
- Long distance calling: Long distance calling has been changed, however, authorization codes will remain the same. All calls off campus (local, directory assistance and long distance) are made with a single access code which is now 9, not 8.
- To make a long distance call, dial 9 + 1 + area code (including 404) + the number, wait for recall (second) dial tone, dial the authorization code.
- To make an international call dial 9 + 011 + country code + city (route) code + number, wait for recall (second) dial tone, dial the authorization code.

ITEP EXPANDS IN BUTTRICK HALL

ITEP plans call for additional space devoted to instructional and faculty development purposes in Buttrick Hall. The language lab will be expanded into other rooms, the satellite room must be larger, and high tech space for faculty to develop computer programs must be designated. The ground floor of Buttrick appears to be the best location for these needs. Another possible use of the space is the development of a faculty/staff lounge.

The proposed move is subject to zoning approval by the city of Decatur in May. If approved, the renovation of the house and the move could be completed by July 1.

In other physical plant news, the city approved the paving of the gravel lot by the physical plant building at a meeting on Monday, March 21. The paving of that lot will begin at the completion of spring semester.

In its last two meetings, the Strategic Planning Committee has addressed communication and retention issues.

With a focus on communication, chairs from the Academic Standards, Curriculum, Administrative, and Academic Review Committees attended the March 8 meeting to discuss ways to improve communication among the key committees of the campus. The same group will be assembling once a month to ensure an overlap of news and committee actions. Minutes from each committee will also be shared with the attending chairs. A meeting between the Strategic Planning Committee and Rep Council is also proposed for April. Other communication improvement measures that were discussed included the possibility of a "classes-canceled" retreat in the fall to bring the campus together to address common issues.

Also members of the Strategic Planning Committee have personally invited several members of the campus community to attend one of two half-day "Welcoming Allies" workshops sponsored by the National Coalition Building Institute (NCBI) on March 27 and 30. The groups invited include the Academic and Administrative Review Committees, FEC, the Presidential Search Committee, Academic Standards and Curriculum Committees, and student leaders. These workshops are a result of the committee's search for ways to address the crisis of spirit on campus and to build coalitions among campus members for the advancement of the institution and benefit of the college community.

Retention was the focus of the March 22 meeting, with the Student Enrollment Group attending as well. Results of the 1993 survey of students who withdrew from the college before completing their degree provided some interesting insights. (Over 70 were surveyed.) When asked to list their reasons for leaving the college, the answers receiving the most votes were financial reasons and lack of a specific major, such as interior design, nursing, business, and education. The aspects the respondents liked most about ASC were the academics and faculty, and friends. When asked how things were different here from what they expected, the respondents reported, among other things, having fewer social functions and the liberal, feminist, lesbian atmosphere. Over half of the respondents rated the stress level as high, citing academics and self-imposed stress as the reasons. Two-thirds of those responding have enrolled in public institutions. The survey had a 40 percent response rate. Citing self-reported GPA figures, 15 students had a 3.0 or higher. Nine had below a 3.0.

Short-term and long-term retention measures were discussed, with several ideas earning warm receptions, including creative and light-hearted ways to increase the interaction between faculty/staff and students in the dining hall. The group enthusiastically supported the inclusion of more personal news, a Q/A column, and the return of announcing employment anniversaries in the "Campus Connection," strong suggestions from the recent survey. The return of focus group funding, even enough to sponsor a spring '94 event, was also received well.

As always, the campus community is invited to suggest issues to be discussed by the committee or recommend ideas. The next expanded meeting on April 5 will focus on the SACS report, if it has been received, and a follow-up on the Self-Study recommendations. ASC OFFERS NEW POST-BACCALAUREATE PROGRAM

Agnes Scott is now offering a new one-year post-baccalaureate program beginning this summer that prepares women for medical school, veterinary school and other allied health professions. The new Post-Baccalaureate Pre-Medical and Allied Health Sciences Program helps women who have graduated from college and wish to change careers acquire the necessary courses for application to medical school or other professional specialties in the growing health care field.

An intensive program composed of classes, laboratories, seminars, and internships, the Post-Baccalaureate program is individually tailored based on the student's prior academic experience. It may be completed in one or two years, depending on previous academic work and individual circumstances. A certificate is awarded upon completion of the program. During the glide year between taking the MCAT and matriculation into medical school, students may take additional courses to enhance their preparation for professional or graduate school.

Courses offered this summer for the program include Chemistry 101 and 102 and Mathematics 118, all four-hour courses. These courses are open to any of our students or other interested undergraduate students in the Atlanta area, in addition to the new Post-Bacclaureate students. Tuition for a full course load of 12 hours this summer will be \$3,240. Students taking less than 12 hours will be charged \$270 per credit hour. Housing will be available.

Q: Why is Walters being closed next year and Hopkins opened?

A: Walters Hall will not be used next vear as a residence hall due to budgetary and energy saving measures. The Budget Work Group asked each area of the College to recommend budget cuts for the institution and this was one of many that was approved. While the Budget Work Group recognized its popularity with the student body and its prime location on the quad, Walters is in need of many repairs and improvements which would require large blocks of time to accomplish. The building will be closed to take care of deferred maintenance issues and to make it more energy efficient.

Painting, roof repairs, floor treatments, modifications for handicapped accessibility, energy efficient windows, etc., will be done during the year. The repairs and improvement costs will not come from the operating budget of the College. Hopkins, which has been air conditioned in the last several years, will be opened to give students additional space.

"PRINCETON REVIEW" GIVES ASC GOOD MARKS

Agnes Scott College appears on prominent lists in the 1994 edition of "The Princeton Review: The Best 286 Colleges." Out of 61 categories ranking the top 20 schools within the 286 reviewed in the book, ASC makes 14 of those lists, including number one in "beautiful campus" and "dorms like palaces."

Other appearances by ASC in the book include "professors bring material to life" (ranked second), "best quality of life" (ranked third), "great college towns" and "town-gown relations are good" (seventh and fifth respectively), and "professors make themselves accessible" and "students happy with financial aid" (ranked eighth and ninth respectively). Within other top 20 lists, Agnes Scott could be found among "students never stop studying," "happy students," and "things run smoothly."

The 286 schools reviewed as the best schools in the country were determined by surveying 40 independent college counselors, rankings from US News & World Report, and Money magazine. Once those were chosen, nearly 40,000 students at the 286 schools were surveyed. Their responses make up the results printed in the book.

COMPUTING SERVICES MOVES TO WALTERS

Computing services' offices have moved to the newly renovated basement space in Walters Hall, the former location of the post office and bookstore. After classes are over, the Academic Computing Center will be moved from the library to this same area providing students with 24-hour access to the center. The Winship Satellite is not involved in the move. With the new phone system each staff member may be called directly and messages may be left. However, all trouble calls should be routed to ext. 6320 in order to receive prompt attention. Watch for the announcement of an open house in the next few weeks.

LEGISLATURE INCREASES HOPE GRANT

By action of the Georgia Legislature the HOPE grant for eligible students has been increased from \$500 to \$1,000 per year. Additionally, students are now eligible for all four years of education. The grant is no longer restricted to the first and sophomore years. Students are encouraged to write their legislators to commend their actions. Constituent opinions are important to legislators and will affect future votes on educational funding.

BREAD FOR THE WORLD LETTER WRITING CAMPAIGN PROVIDES FUNDS FOR FOOD PROGRAM

The department of Bible and religion is sponsoring its fifth annual Bread for the World Letter Writing Campaign. This 1994 offering of letters is called "a child is waiting" and seeks to guarantee full funding of WIC (the special supplemental food program for women, infants and children). Full funding would serve an additional 3 million women, infants, and children who are not currently getting benefits. The campaign is seeking to include full WIC funding as part of any health care reform bill. Those interested in supporting this work should come by the tables in the Alston Center during community hour on Friday, April 15, and write a letter (it only takes 90 seconds!) Additional reading materials will be available on the tables about this campaign and Bread for the World's work.

DANCEXPRESSIONS '94 SLATED FOR APRIL 21-22

Two professional dancers of Pilobolus Dance Company will be in residence at Agnes Scott this month. They will set an existing Pilobolus work which will be modified and restaged for Agnes Scott dancers. One of the dancers, Jude Woodcock, was in residence until April 7. CAMPUS SAFETY REPORT

The Agnes Scott College Department of Public Safety is a state authorized law enforcement agency. It is a service-oriented organization whose primary function is to protect life and property on the Agnes Scott College campus and in the surrounding neighborhood (jurisdiction extends 500 yards beyond the boundaries of the College, O.C.G.A. 20-8-2). Its officers are state certified, giving them powers of arrest, and they have had experience in a variety of other departments such as Decatur, Atlanta and DeKalb County.

Since becoming a state certified law enforcement agency in 1983 the department has reported campus crime statistics to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (O.C.G.A. 35-3-36). Data is sent to the FBI (O.C.G.A. 35-3-33) which publishes these statistics in the nation's Uniform Crime Report. According to the Campus Security Act of 1990, all institutions receiving federal funds were required to compile, publish and distribute these figures beginning Sept. 1, 1992. To comply with the federal law, the statistics, as well as appropriate policies and procedures, have been published and distributed twice during the academic year to the campus community in the 'Campus Connection.'

The Strategic Planning Committee 1994 has received the written report from the

SACS team that visited the campus in January.

The peer review team made 18 recommendations to which the College must respond in writing by May 15. Though it would be unrealistic to expect that all recommendations could be complied with by that time, SACS does require that a response stating how we will implement them be drafted for each recommendation. The Strategic Planning Committee has referred the recommendations to the appropriate groups or offices for a response. Those are due to the committee by May 1.

The SACS report also lists 34 suggestions for our improvement. While these have merit and many of them were uncovered by our own self-study, SACS does not require a

response.

The full SACS report has been shared with the Board of Trustees, Presidential Search Committee, and the Academic Search Consultation Service, as well as the chairs of the Academic Review, Administrative Review, and Faculty Executive Committees. The Alumnae Association and SGA President have also received copies. All faculty, administrative staff, Rep Council members, and class presidents have received the list of recommendations and suggestions.

Prior to receiving the SACS report, the committee reviewed the self-study recommendations and suggestions and found that many of those were in progress, some even completed, such as the adoption for 1993-94 a consistent annual reporting format that

relates to specific departmental goals and the mission of the College.

In keeping with its discussions of enrollment and retention concerns, the committee heard the report from Millennium Communication Group on the marketing study on behalf of the admission office. Also, the Strategic Planning Committee has met with Rep Council to discuss student ideas regarding retention issues. In that meeting, plans were made to have similar interactions with the Strategic Planning Committee and other campus committees on a regular basis.

The next meeting on May 3 will focus on reviewing draft responses to the SACS

report that must be completed by May 15.

ASC DEDICATES THE MARTHA WILSON KESSLER DANCE STUDIO ON APRIL 29

Agnes Scott has received an accumulated gift of \$368,800 to establish the Martha Wilson Kessler Dance Studio. The fund provides for facilities and program enhancement over the next five years. The Kessler Dance Studio will be dedicated at 4:30 p.m., April 29, in the main dance studio in Alston.

The gift from Richard and Martha Kessler is in honor of Martha, a 1969 graduate of Agnes Scott and a trustee since 1986. The gift will be used to equip the main studio to make performances possible by adding a lighting and sound system, teasers and tormentors, a new marley floor and motorized shades. The funds will also be used to purchase instructional equipment including video recording equipment, tapedecks and CD players, pilates and two new studio pianos.

Of the remaining portions of the gift, \$100,000 will be allocated to the College's endowment for the program and the balance will be used to provide residencies by visiting artists, ballet and modern dance accompanists, commissions of choreographic works and student internships.

As a result of the gift, changes in the dancer program began last fall with the residency of Jane Comfort, New York choreographer, who has worked with Merce Cunningham, Maggie Black and Janet Panetta. She set a new dance for Agnes Scott's Studio Dance Theatre titled "Pretty Is As Pretty Does."

Congratulations to Lavlage Courie, Leigh Locker and Karen Shuman for receiving the designation of honorable mention in the recent 10th Annual Mathematical Contest in Modeling sponsored by the Consortium for Mathematics and Its Applications. AGNES SCOTT HOSTS SWIMMING AND SUMMER CAMPS FOR DECATUR COMMUNITY

For the sixth summer, Agnes Scott is opening its athletic facilities to the Decatur community by providing membership to the pool for the whole family and offering basketball and soccer camps for youth. The day camps are from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

The Agnes Scott Summer Swim Program, open to Decatur area residents, features family and open swim schedules, lap swimming and daily swim classes. Classes will be offered from skills levels 1-7 of the updated American Red Cross certificate swim program in three-week sessions beginning June 13. There is a limit of eight people per class in order to ensure personal attention. Classes are \$48 each three-week session. Costs for regular pool members vary according to the number of family members. Area residents and visitors may use the swimming pool on a drop-in basis during family, open swim and lap swimming pool hours. No membership application or fee is required but it costs \$4 per person per visit.

Agnes Scott will also host girls and boys basketball camps beginning June 27 along with one co-ed camp beginning June 13. Each scheduled camp will be for one week. The girls' camp is open to grades 5-12 and the boys' camp is open to ages 6-18. The cost is \$125 per week and includes lunch. The co-ed basketball camp is June 13-17 and is open to ages 7-17. The cost is \$110.

Soccer camps will also be offered at Agnes Scott beginning June 20. The girls' camp is June 20-24 and is open to ages 8-19. Boys ages 13-19 are invited June 25-29. The cost is \$170.

ASC FACTS SPRING 1994

- 1. The Presidential Search Committee has engaged the Academic Search Consultation Service to assist in the presidential search. This firm has dealt with 300 college searches, many of them at women's colleges. Drs. Christine Young and Samuel Spencer will be working with Agnes Scott on this search.
- 2. Kay Lawther Krill, ASC class of '77 and president of Carroll Reed, and Sally Skardon, ASC class of '70 and senior vice president of NationsBank of South Carolina, were named to the ASC Board of Trustees in January.
- 3. The National Endowment for the Humanities has awarded the College a \$152,041, 3-year grant for language departments and individual humanities disciplines to develop a language across the curriculum program. Dr. Ingrid Wieshofer will direct the program.
- 4. There are 560 students on campus this spring. Of that number, 23 are graduate students, and 18 are Scott Free Year-5 students. ASC will confer its first graduate degrees in May as the Master of Arts in Teaching is awarded to 10 candidates.
- 5. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) 10-year reaccreditation process is nearing completion. A peer committee visited in late January to review all aspects of the college, and the report of that committee was received in early April. The recommendations and suggestions contained in that report are being studied, and a response will be prepared so that our reaccreditation can be considered at the June meeting of the Commission on Colleges of SACS. A response will be prepared by the Strategic Planning Committee.
- 6. The Class of 1994 has received a record 53% participation toward its senior solicitation campaign, the highest ever achieved by a senior class.
- 7. The College has undertaken an administrative review simultaneous to the Board-mandated academic review, with a final report due to the Board of Trustees in May of 1995. An Administrative Review Committee has been established composed of six administrative members, four officers, two faculty members, two students, and one trustee liaison, with Karen Roy, Assistant Vice President for Finance, serving as chair.
- 8. The trustees have approved a covenant with the Synod of the South Atlantic of the Presbyterian Church, (U.S.A.), to formalize the relationship between the two and recognize the founding of ASC by Presbyterians in 1889. The Synod is expected to approve it in September. The new covenant will allow ASC to maintain its independence.
- 9. Cathy Benton, acting director of athletics, has been named director of athletics.
- 10. The Office of Admission is creating an interactive multimedia presentation that prospective students will have the opportunity to view in their high schools and homes. This innovative recruitment effort allows students to view video, photos, and text on and about the College. As one of a handful of colleges utilizing multimedia for recruitment, Agnes Scott hopes to reap many benefits from this cutting-edge technology.
- 11. Allison Olson received a Goldwater Scholarship, a scholarship for students demonstrating potential for scientific research (science, math, engineering). This scholarship is for \$7,000. She is a rising junior, biology major. She has worked as a research assistant at Emory and will be involved in research at Michigan State University this summer. Out of 1400 applicants, 250 students received awards.
- 12. Jennifer Jenkins has received a Fulbright Scholarship. She will study next year in Franklin, Germany. Jennifer is an international relations major who is an accelerated graduation candidate. She has been very active in international studies, traveling to Russia, India, and throughout Europe.
- 13. The Office of Admission hosted a record number of scholarship semi-finalists at Scholars' Weekend February 20-21. A total of 184 students attended the competition and competed for merit scholarships ranging in value from \$6,000 to \$17,000 annually.

- 14. The SHARP! Women program has been funded for the summer of 1994 by an anonymous donor. Assistant Dean of the College Patricia White who directs the SHARP! Women program was invited to the National Science Foundation Invitational Meeting to describe SHARP! The program has been identified by Project Kaleidoscope as an exemplary program.
- 15. An NCBI (National Coalition Building Institute) workshop titled "Welcoming Allies" was held in March for members of the Strategic Planning '94, Presidential Search, Academic Review, Administrative Review, and Curriculum Committees.
- 16. The Global Awareness Program focused on Russia this year, with 19 students spending ten days in St. Petersburg and three days in Moscow during inter-session. Next year's program will be to Japan.
- 17. On February 21, final conversion was completed in the development office to a new software system, Benefactor. The new system will give the department greater speed and efficiency and increase capabilities for report generation and tracking.
- 18. A new legacy gift club, the Frances Winship Walters Society, is being established with charter memberships accepted until December 31, 1994. It recognizes alumnae and friends who have made a planned gift (bequest, trust, annuity, insurance) to ASC. Ninety-five members have signed up so far.
- 19. ASC co-hosted its third annual Progressions seminar in November. A committee of women's college graduates produced the program "Facets of Leadership," that examined women's various roles of leadership. The Fall '94 program will focus on women's health issues.
- 20. The Alumnae Association Board of Directors adopted the association's new strategic plan in January. The plan was approved by the Executive Committee of the Board on April 7 to be recommended to the Board of Trustees for approval. It will be presented during Alumnae Weekend.
- 21. The Alumnae Association in cooperation with faculty involved in the Women's Studies program presented a continuing education program on women's creativity in early February. Over 30 participants explored women's creativity in the arts and sciences through lecture, a hands-on book arts workshop, a performance of early keyboard music by women composers, and a panel discussion.
- 22. Dr. Shirley Malcom, head of the Directorate for Education and Human Resources Programs of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, visited Agnes Scott on February 16. She is recognized nationally for her role in promoting the advancement of women, minorities, and the disabled in the sciences.
- 23. Three faculty members have recently received research and professional development awards. Karen Thompson, assistant professor of biology, received a grant of \$15,000 from the Whitehall Foundation, Inc., to support her research on grasshoppers. Richard Parry, professor of philosophy, has received funding for the fourth year from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), for "Virtue, Happiness, and the Common Good in Plato's Republic," a summer seminar for secondary school teachers. Cathy Scott, associate professor of political science, has been selected as one of twelve scholars by NEH to attend a seminar for college teachers June 13-August 5 titled "What is Enlightenment: Eighteenth-Century Answers and Twentieth-Century Questions," to be held at Boston University.
- 24. Six faculty members spent one week in Miami and one week in Puerto Rico during the inter-session studying Hispanic culture under the auspices of the Knight Grant for increasing the Hispanic presence at Agnes Scott.
- 25. A Nordson Corporation Foundation grant of \$3,650 was awarded to Agnes Scott College to support Futurescape, a program to encourage pre-college girls to study science and math. The program, held in conjunction with the Girls Scouts, brought 110 students and 48 parents to campus on February 19.

Previously, Gellerstedt served as the Associate Director of the Institute for Fund-Raising Leadership of Coxe and Associates.

SUMMER ARTS PROGRAM EXPANDS

Agnes Scott is again offering adult learners a unique opportunity to immerse themselves in the creative process through its Summer Studios. Week-long workshops July 18-22 and weekend workshops July 22-24 provide intensive and personal instruction in the arts for beginners and experienced artists.

Working under the guidance of accomplished and acclaimed artists/ reachers drawn from all over the country, students can explore topics in visual arts, music, theatre, creative writing, and art and music therapy.

AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE ALUMNAE HONOR LOCAL RETIRED PROFESSOR

As a tribute to her many years of service to Agnes Scott Collège, former students have established a fund in honor of former history professor Catherine Strateman Sims. The Catherine S. Sims Faculty Enrichment Fund will provide

OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR USE OF WOODRUFF BUILDING DURING FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS

I. Eligibility:

- 1. Students and two guests
- 2. Faculty, faculty families and two guests per faculty member

(emeriti and emeritae included)

- 3. Staff, staff families and two guests per staff member (retired staff included)
- 4. Alumnae, alumnae families and two guests per alumna
- 5. Trustees, trustee families and two guests per trustee
- 6. Community Members no guests

II. Priority Order for Use of Facilities:

- 1. All classes
- 2. College events (intercollegiate/intramural)
- 3. Students
- 4. Faculty/Staff
- 5. Alumnae/Trustees

III. Costs:

- 1. Students, faculty, staff, trustees and their families no charge
- 2. Alumnae and their families \$50 per school year includes Community Swim fall and spring sessions

Conference guests - part of conference fee

- 4. Passes for trustees and alumnae will be distributed and fees paid at the Department of Athletics located on 3rd floor of Woodruff Building.
- 5. Community Swim Program pool only \$125/family; \$100/couple; \$70/single adult per session.
- 6. Summer Swim Program is not included in this procedure.

IV. Availability:

Open hours are posted in the building and can be changed. The building is closed when the College is not in session.

- V. *Methods of Use: Everyone must sign in individually at the control booth.
 - Agnes Scott ID cards must be presented by College students, faculty and staff. IDswill be checked
 after class hours.
 - Alumnae and trustees must present their pass and driver's license.
 - 3. Family members without the primary user must present their family pass and a driver's license.
 - 4. Community Swim members must present their pass and driver's license. No guests are allowed.

*Primary users are students, faculty, staff, alumnae and trustees. All primary users with the exception of alumnae and trustees will have the same color plastic pass. Alumnae, trustees and Community Swim members, who have no college ID, will have other types of passes for identification.

VI. General Rules:

- 1. Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
- If you do not have proper ID and/or pass, you will be refused admittance.
- You must be 16 years or age or older to use or be in the weight room.
- Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
- 5. Proper dress is mandatory in order to use the facilities. Proper dress means gym shoes, shorts, shirt, sweats and warm-ups. Swim wear only for the pool.
- 6. Towels will not be distributed. Bring your own.
- Lockers can only be used on a day-to-day basis. If you put a lock on a locker, please remove it when
 you leave. Otherwise, the lock will be removed for you.
- 8. No bare feet permitted anywhere other than the pool.

The building is not open when the College is closed. This includes all holidays and vacation periods during the course of the academic year.

The College reserves the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities in case of violation of regulations.

"SOUTHERN ROOTS-WOMEN'S VOICES" DISPLAYED THROUGH OCT. 20

A small group of women artists with strong southern roots present diverse works in the first exhibition of the academic year in the Dalton Gallery. The works of Karen Graffeo, Mimi Holmes, and Deborah Muirhead are featured in "Southern Roots-Women's Voices," which is on exhibition through Oct. 20. The gallery is open to the public free of charge from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 2 to 4:30 p.m. on Sundays.

Karen Graffeo, from Birmingham, Ala., presents mysterious and intimate autobiographical photographs and photo-drawings on linen. Ms. Graffeo's work has been exhibited nationally since the late 1980s. Her most recent work includes a dual exhibition titled "Medical Revisions" at P.S. 122 in New York City and at the Delra Axis Contemporary Art Center in Memphis, Tenn. She will also be producing a performance installation called "Prodigal Daughters" this fall in Atlanta.

Mimi Holmes now resides in Minneapolis, Minn., but spent her early years in the South. In addition to being an alumna of Agnes Scott, she received her M.F.A. in 1984 at Florida State University. Her work in this exhibition is on loan from the McRae Gallery on Roswell Road in Atlanta. Holmes has exhibited widely throughout the U.S.

Deborah Muirhead is a professor at the University of Connecticut. Born in Bessemer, Ala., in 1949, Muirhead credits genealogy, family stories, African American history, literature and the southern landscape for shaping the content of her work for the last ten years. Her abstract paintings and work-on-paper have been exhibited widely and are included in numerous collections. Muirhead's work at Agnes Scott is a response to the discovery of 400 graves in a late 18th-century African American burial ground in midtown Manhattan and her attempts to locate the graves of her slave ancestors.

Please return all prints promptly after use. Return them directly to the archivist, who will check the records against all returned photos. Please forward a sample copy of the publication in which the photo(s) appears for the photo archive records.

A: Double-click on the icon that says "Library Connection." It will usually be found in the ASC Programs group. When you see the prompt "login:" just type the word "library." Next it will prompt you for terminal type; respond with "V" for vt100, and then "y" for yes, to confirm.

Yes, you can dial into the library from off campus. There are two ports that will allow direct dial-in connections. Please note, this is a direct connection only to the library catalog. It will not give you access to the campus network, other libraries, your e-mail, etc. The phone numbers to use are: 638-6127 or 638-6097. You need a modem and communications software. You do not need to be running windows The settings are: baud rate up to 9600; parity-none; data bits=8; stop bits=1; duplex=full. For most people, terminal emulation will be vt100.

This should put you directly into the first screen of the catalog. If you are prompted for a login, proceed as described for network access.

When you are done, please choose X>Disconnect from the main menu. If you need assistance with remote access, please call the library or Information Technology Services for further help.

CAMPUS SAFETY REPORT

The Agnes Scott College Department of Public Safety is a state authorized law enforcement agency. It is a service oriented organization with the primary function of protecting life and property on the Agnes Scott College campus and in the surrounding neighborhood (jurisdiction extends 500 yards beyond the college property, O.C.G.A. 20-8-2). Officers are state certified police officers, with powers of arrest, and have had experience in a variety of departments such as Decatur, Atlanta and DeKalb County.

Since becoming a state certified law enforcement agency in 1983 the department has reported campus crime statistics to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (O.C.G.A. 35-3-36). Data is sent to the FBI (O.C.G.A. 35-3-33) which publishes the statistics in the nation's Uniform Crime Report. According to the Campus Security Act of 1990, all institutions receiving federal funds were required to compile, publish and distribute these figures beginning Sept. 1, 1992. To comply with the federal law, the statistics, as well as appropriate policies and procedures, have been published twice during the academic year to the campus community in the college newsletter, the Campus Connection.


