THREE FACULTY MEMBERS RECEIVE GRANTS FOR RESEARCH PROJECTS

Three grants were announced in the fall to Agnes Scott College professors. They are: "Virtue, Happiness and the Common Good in Plato's *Republic*," in Athens, Greece, from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), Project Director Richard Parry (the only Georgia NEH recipient); "Improving Introductory Economics," from the University of Southern Maine, Project Director Rosemary Cunningham; and, "The Role of Bioregulators in Metabolism of Anticancer Glucosinolates in *Broccoli callus* Cultures," from the Research Corporation, Project Director Linda Hodges.

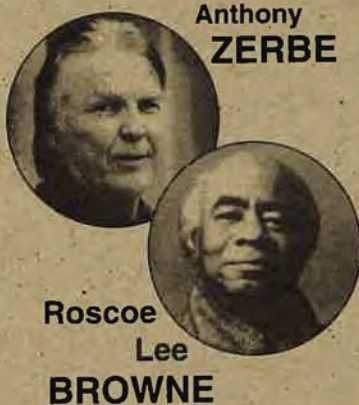

OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR USE OF WOODRUFF BUILDING DURING FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS

I. Eligibility:

1. Students and two guests
2. Faculty, faculty families and two guests per faculty member (emeriti and emeritae included)
3. Staff, staff families and two guests per staff member (retired staff included)
4. Alumnae, alumnae families and two guests per alumna
5. Trustees, trustee families and two guests per trustee
6. Community members — no guests

II. Priority Order for Use of Facilities:

1. All classes
2. College events (intercollegiate/intramural)
3. Students
4. Faculty/Staff
5. Alumnae/Trustees

III. Costs:

1. Students, faculty, staff, trustees and their families — no charge
2. Alumnae and their families — \$50 per school year includes Community Swim fall and spring sessions
3. Conference guests — part of conference fee
4. Passes for trustees and alumnae will be distributed and fees paid at the Department of Athletics located on the third floor of Woodruff Building.
5. Community Swim Program — pool only — \$125/family; \$100/couple; \$70/single adult per session.
6. Summer Swim Program is not included in this procedure

IV. Availability:

Open hours are posted in the building and can be changed. The building is closed when the College is not in session.

V. *Methods of Use: Everyone must sign in individually at the control booth.

1. Agnes Scott ID cards must be presented by College students, faculty and staff. IDs will be checked after class hours. Alumnae and trustees must present their pass and driver's license. Family members without the primary user must present their family pass and a driver's license. Community Swim members must present their pass and driver's license. No guests are allowed.

*Primary users are students, faculty, staff, alumnae and trustees. All primary users with the exception of alumnae and trustees will have the same color plastic pass. Alumnae, trustees and Community Swim members, who have no college ID, will have other types of passes for identification

VI. General Rules:

1. Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
2. If you do not have proper ID and/or pass, you will be refused admittance.
3. You must be 16 years of age or older to use or be in the weight room.
4. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
5. Proper dress is mandatory in order to use the facilities. Proper dress means gym shoes, shorts, shirt, sweats and warm-ups. Swim wear only for the pool.
6. Towels will not be distributed. Bring your own.
7. Lockers can only be used on a day to day basis. If you put a lock on a locker, please remove it when you leave. Otherwise, the lock will be removed for you.
8. No bare feet permitted anywhere other than the pool.

- The building is not open when the College is closed. This includes all holidays and vacation periods during the course of the academic year.

- The College reserves the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities in case of violation of regulations.

Appalachian Scholarship

— to assist Appalachian undergraduate students. Range of awards is \$100 to \$1,000 per academic year, renewal is possible. The deadline for filing application is July 1.

Native American Education Grant

— for Alaska Natives and Native Americans pursuing full-time, post-secondary education. Range of awards is \$200 to \$1,500 per academic year and renewal is possible. The deadline for filing application is June 1.

Samuel Robinson Award

— attention juniors and seniors! All full-time juniors and seniors are eligible to compete for the Samuel Robinson Award from the Presbyterian Church (USA). Approximately forty \$1,000 awards are available annually and last year, four Agnes Scott students were recipients. The competition includes learning the Westminster Shorter Catechism and writing a 2,000-word essay on an assigned topic. Please contact either the Chaplain or the financial aid office for the competition requirements, essay topics and bibliography of resource materials. The competition deadline is April 1.

Service Loan

— provides undergraduate students, who are in their second or third year of full-time study, an opportunity to pay a portion of their educational debt through service in various school, church or community projects. Applicants must be recommended by the campus chaplain of the college. The range of awards is \$1,500 and is not renewable. The deadline for filing application is April 1.

Undergraduate/Graduate Loans

— interest is currently 6.50% *per annum* (rate subject to change). No interest is charged while a student is enrolled full-time. Repayment of loan will begin six months after graduation or discontinuation of studies. The range of awards is \$200 to \$1,000 per academic year.

Additional information concerning the applicant requirements is available in the financial aid office and in Alston Center.

Polish mime artist Rajmund Klechot will be artist-in-residence in the theatre-dance department for two weeks, Feb. 5-17. During his stay, Klechot will set a mime piece to be performed several times on campus (schedule to be announced).

Klechot trained in Europe as a member of the Polish National Pantomime Theatre, working with master artists in both technical and theoretical areas on a daily basis. ASC'S TORNADO DRILL RESCHEDULED

As part of Severe Weather Awareness Week, Agnes Scott will participate in the statewide tornado drill. Due to a scheduling conflict, Agnes Scott's drill has been rescheduled to Feb. 28.

The signal to begin the drill is the sounding of the Early Warning System, a distinct, deep-ringing siren, reminiscent of the old civil defense siren, positioned on top of Rebekah. From either the building you are in or the building which is closest, follow the procedures below upon the sounding of the siren:

- (1) for those who are previously designated, bring a flashlight and radio;
- (2) move immediately to the lowest floor of the building (stay away from windows and doors);
- (3) remain at that lowest level until official notification that the tornado warning has been lifted and the drill is over.

Each building captain will assist in assuring everyone has properly followed procedures. Cooperation is essential to assure that the drill runs smoothly and everyone is secure.

FUZZ BUZZ: PUBLIC SAFETY

During a bad winter like this, it is especially important to take care regarding various weather issues. Wearing proper clothing outside means more than just throwing on a jacket. Exposed skin is very vulnerable to damage when wind chills are so low. Being well-prepared for any occurrence when outside or traveling is essential to securing health and safety.

Some items to carry in the vehicle year round are a blanket, jumper cables and a cellular phone if possible. When traveling in weather like this or worse, it is advisable to call the person at your destination to alert them of your travel route and estimated time of arrival. When driving, it is common to unknowingly come upon black ice in the roadway. This ice is rarely seen by drivers until it is too late to avoid skidding, possibly causing serious injury to the driver, passengers or pedestrians. Drive slowly, but if you do skid, do not apply brakes too fast and try to gently steer in the direction of the skid. If possible, avoid all driving during icy conditions.

Prolonged exposure to cold weather can cause hypothermia and/or frost bite. Following are steps to treat these conditions:

- 1) Call 911;
- 2) Make sure the victim has dry clothing on;
- 3) If possible, move the victim to a warm environment and cover the him/her with warm blankets;
- 4) Do not give the victim anything to eat or drink; and,
- 5) Monitor the victim's A, B and C's (airway, breathing and circulation) until help arrives. Want to learn more about this and other lifesaving techniques? Come to the American Red Cross Standard First-Aid Class from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday, March 2, in the Aerobics Room, Alston Center. GEORGIA LANDMARK AND HISTORIC TREE REGISTER DESIGNATES ASC TREES AS HISTORIC LANDMARKS

Announced by Boyd Leek of the Georgia Urban Forest Council and presented to President Mary Brown Bullock '66 and Victoria Lambert, manager of campus services in a Feb. 14 ASC Arbor Day celebration, the Georgia Landmark and Historic Tree Register has designated three trees as numbers 9, 10 and 11 on the state register. The trees awarded are the Mystery Incense-Cedar, Battle of Decatur White Ash and Professor Dieckmann's Magnolias. This designates these trees as precious and protected Georgia historic or landmark trees.

The Mystery Incense-Cedar has been dated back to 1833 and is recognized due to the rarity of finding a West coast species in this location. The Battle of Decatur White Ash was a sapling during the Battle of Decatur and although 9,000 men fell at that battle, this tree still survives. Professor Dieckmann's Magnolias were collected as saplings by then-Professor Christian Dieckmann in what had been woods behind the campus and planted in front of Rebekah.

As a state certified law enforcement agency since 1983, the ASC department of public safety reports campus crime statistics to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) (O.C.G.A. 35-3-36). The GBI sends the information to the FBI (O.C.G.A. 35-3-33) which uses it in the U.S. Department of Justice Uniform Crime Report for the nation.

According to the Campus Security Act of 1990, all institutions receiving federal funds have been required to compile, publish and distribute this information since Sept. 1, 1992. To comply with federal law, these statistics as well as appropriate policies and procedures are made available to students, employees and applicants for enrollment or employment. Phi Beta Kappa is a prestigious national organization dedicated to recognizing high academic achievement in the liberal arts.

Agnes Scott College Bradley Observatory, boasting one of Atlanta's most sophisticated telescopes and a premiere astrophysical research facility, resumes its monthly open house program featuring a lecture and slide show, "The Invisible Sky," by Director Alberto Sadun, and a planetarium show, "Heroes of the Sky," presented by Janelle Bailey '94. The show begins at 8 p.m. on Friday, April 5. Weather permitting, viewing through the College's telescopes will conclude the program. THE COMET OF THE CENTURY TO BRIGHTEN THE SKY STARTING MONDAY

In a fleeting glimpse, a brief moment in time, nothing else in the world will matter and this place in the universe will be illuminated by what experts are already professing to be the comet of the century – the brightest and closest to the earth in 100 years.

ASC Bradley Observatory Director Alberto Sadun believes that "this comet has the potential to be the most spectacular in our lifetime."

On Monday, March 25, from approximately 9 until 11 p.m., glance up at the Big Dipper (facing north, about 40 degrees from the horizon) to witness the Hyakutake Comet, also known as Comet 1996B2. (If too cloudy on Monday to view the comet, there is a window of several days following to still see it. However, Monday evening provides the best opportunity for viewing.) It is best to get away from the bright lights of the city and use binoculars if possible to make the view more brilliant. At that viewing, when the comet will be at its closest range, it will be only 9 million miles from the earth. The moon, for example, is a quarter of a million miles from the earth.

This comet contains matter from the oldest part of the solar system. When the solar system formed, comets, such as this one, froze into ice and set-off on paths distinct from larger bodies which became organized elements of the solar system. Traversing amazing distances, this comet travels past this corner of the system on March 25 to remind all those who witness it of the true relics of the past.

KASSEBAUM TO SPEAK AT COMMENCEMENT

President Mary Brown Bullock '66 announced today that U.S. Senator Nancy Landon Kassebaum (D.-Kan.) will be the speaker for commencement on May 18. Kassebaum will retire this year from the U.S. Senate, after serving 18 years. Kassebaum, for many years the only woman in the U.S. Senate, is now the chair of the Labor and Human Resources Committee. In addition to this role, she has had significant impact on foreign affairs and is chair of the African Affairs Subcommittee. She has also served on the East Asian and Pacific Affairs and European Affairs Sub-committees.

Kassebaum has been most influential in the fields of education, welfare, medical services and human resources activities. She also has been active in issues related to South Africa, the Middle East and Europe. She has the reputation of bringing her own independent thinking to both domestic and foreign policy issues.

ASC AWARDED \$150,000 GRANT

The Office of Development announced today that ASC has received a \$150,000 grant from the Jessie Ball duPont Fund for the College's "Program in Women, Leadership and Social Change: The Atlanta Semester," modeled after American University's 50-year-old "Washington Semester" and Fordham University's "New York Semester." The Atlanta Semester offers female students from all over the country the opportunity to benefit from the women's college experience at ASC, while tapping in to the unique resources available in Atlanta.

Jessie Ball duPont, who died in 1970, personally chose, during the period of January 1960 to December 1964, Agnes Scott as one of the select institutions to be the sole recipients of her continuing legacy. This fund has a long history of generously contributing to ASC, including a 1992 grant in the amount of \$69,000 to support Hispanic recruitment and enrollment.

U.S. SENATOR KASSEBAUM TO SPEAK AT COMMENCEMENT

U.S. Senator Nancy Landon Kassebaum, (R-Kan.) will speak at this year's Commencement, which begins at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 18, in Presser Quadrangle.

For many years the only woman in the U.S. Senate, Kassebaum is now chair of the Labor and Human Resources Committee. Besides this task, she has had significant impact on foreign affairs over the years having chaired the African Affairs subcommittee. In addition, she sits on the East Asian and Pacific Affairs, and European Affairs subcommittees.

Kassebaum has been most influential in the domestic fields of education, welfare, medical services and other human resources activities and internationally on issues related to South Africa, the Middle East and Europe. Widely regarded by observers in Washington, D.C. as being a moderate Republican, she has had the reputation over the years of bringing her own independent thinking to both domestic and foreign policy issues.

Kassebaum was first elected to the U.S. Senate in 1978. She was initially recognized only as the daughter of then Kansas Governor Alfred Landon, the 1936 Republican candidate for president. Eventually, Kassebaum's efforts in the Senate gave her prestige in her own right and her home state endorsed her efforts in office with overwhelming re-election victories in 1984, at 76 percent, and 1990, at 74 percent. She plans to retire in 1997.

KING TO SPEAK AT BACCALAUREATE VESPERS

The Rev. Barbara King, founder and minister of Hillside Chapel and Truth Center in Atlanta, a worshipping community with an overseas mission, will deliver the sermon, "The Race has Just Begun," at the Baccalaureate Vespers, 4:30 p.m., Friday, May 17, in Gaines Chapel. CLASS OF 2000 THE LARGEST IN 27 YEARS

With an enrollment of 240 for first-year students this semester, Agnes Scott College (ASC) has experienced a 92 percent increase over last year's enrollment, making the Class of 2000 the largest since 1969. According to President Mary Brown Bullock '66, "Agnes Scott has been planning for this kind of growth for several years." She adds that the College's plans for growth began in a 1991 strategic plan and she attributes the growth to several things. "First of all, our emphasis on academic excellence, our 8:1 student to faculty ratio and resource-rich environment make Agnes Scott a true 'best buy' among national liberal arts colleges." ASC expanded its recruitment efforts in 1995-96 beyond the traditionally strong southeast, traveling to some 25 states. According to Bullock, "We have seen quite an increase in our inquiries beyond the southeast, and as a result, are enrolling more students from states such as California, Oregon, Michigan, New York and Vermont this year."

The ASC Office of Admission continues the College's aggressive plan to grow and diversify the student body as it prepares to kickoff new international recruitment efforts in Latin America and the Far East in the months to come.

CAMPUS READY FOR NEW YEAR

The excitement and celebration of welcoming this new class and the returning students is accentuated by many changes evident on campus. There have been some previously planned changes, like new faculty additions, an orientation schedule that doubles last year's activities, a re-configured Scotland Yard (snack bar) and massive changes in the library, including transfer of the card catalog to electronic format. However, new changes have occurred to accommodate all the new people on campus.

In fact, President Mary Brown Bullock '66 created an Opening of School Committee, which met over the summer, to consider the impact of the larger class as well as develop plans to make the transitions smooth. Among the areas addressed were housing, classes, advising, food service, parking, student employment, faculty services and information technology services (ITS).

Many on campus over the summer noticed the network "downtime" which occurred. That downtime was necessary to allow a series of major ITS changes. According to ITS Director Tom Maier, because of "more network users and therefore, more traffic, more pressure on classrooms with technology due to the substantial increase in number of sections and, of course, more supplies like paper and laser toner cartridges," many enhancements and upgrades have been made. "We have been working on all three (areas): network upgrade, more classroom display systems and other media equipment. Of the three areas, I am most concerned about the technology-equipped classrooms, especially the fact that we have only one that is equipped with computers for all the students. We'll see how well we predicted the impact once everyone is here."

Neta Counts, ITS user services manager, added that the College "will have more computer installations in student rooms this semester and is

adding new systems to the student labs. We will also be having six sessions during orientation week, to get the first year students initially logged into the network, and a very brief overview of things I will be offering evening and weekend training."

Mary K. Jarboe, registrar, expects a busy registration session (see schedule, page two), but she is prepared. "We have doubled the number of computer terminals available for registration—for both new and returning students—and have extended the hours for registration for new students." Like last year's run on biology sections, "We are adding 20 new sections of courses in order to accommodate the larger numbers."

According to Sarah Blanshei, dean of the College, sections will be added in the obvious areas: biology, chemistry, English, foreign languages, psychology, physical education and education.

Nikki Costelloe, campus post office manager, ordered "additional mailboxes to hold not only all the new students but the additional faculty hired. The real trick was trying to find a place for the boxes in the Alston Center. They will be located in the elevator corridor. The challenges that we will face are dealing with the excess mail that will need to be sorted and then taken to the detached area to sort into boxes. This could even result in a later than usual start for Johnnie Mitchell (mail room assistant) to deliver the mail to the offices."

Janet Gould, director of human resources, has also made some minor adjustments to regular routine which includes having to process more student worker time sheets, therefore cut more paychecks.

Irma Floyd, the new campus bookstore manager, has expanded the inventory which includes a wide variety of major newspapers.

Patti Heyl, director of food service, has had to order new plates, trays, silverware and glasses to accommodate the increase in traffic at the dining hall. According to Heyl,

"The re-configured snack bar will help manage traffic control."

However, Ninette Waters, manager of telecommunications, has experienced surprisingly little to no changes. "We were already prepared for an increase when the new system [previously] went in and we can accommodate up to 2,000 users [now]. Believe it or not, the increased number of incoming first year students will not cause any significant changes in any of our office procedures or routines. As far as phone lines (are concerned), dial tone is already there whether the room has two or three outlets, sometimes four if it is a suite. With downloaded information from our files, AT&T can easily create flyers and authorization codes for new users to the systems."

The thrill of the new class overshadows any anxiety about accommodating such an increase. In discussing the additions at the post office, Costelloe added, "I am not concerned with any surprises but expect the increase in students to be exciting!"

USPS CHANGES MAIL COLLECTION POLICIES

The U.S. Postal Service (USPS) announced changes in mail collection procedures that will increase security of commercial airlines carrying U.S. mail. These changes are effective immediately and effect packages mailed to international or domestic addresses deposited in mail collection boxes, such as the street mail box in front of Presser and the mailbox outside the ASC Post Office.

All packages 16 oz. or more, must be brought directly to the ASC Post Office window. Do not drop them in a USPS mail box. If a package is dropped in a mailbox it will be returned to you and if there is no return address, the USPS will search it and then send it by truck. This only effects stamped packages and not metered mail. If a package is being charged to a department, it will be metered and handled in the proper manner.

All packages (metered or stamped) going to APO, FPO and overseas addresses must have a detailed customs form filled out when it is brought to the post office. Simple descriptions like "printed matter," "candy" or "stuff" is not permissible. It must be as detailed as: 1 school catalog, 1 Hershey with almonds candy bar, 2 lipsticks, 1 package of chewing gum. ASC'S FOURTH CONSECUTIVE FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR LEAVES HOME TO STUDY IN GERMANY

For the fourth consecutive year, an ASC senior has been awarded a Fulbright grant. Ann Roberts '96 will continue her independent study of Kant philosophy at the University of Mainz in Germany from September through July 1997.

A German/philosophy double major, Roberts is also a recent inductee to Phi Beta Kappa, the United States' most prestigious scholastic organization, recognizing outstanding scholarly achievement of undergraduate and graduate students in the liberal arts. Roberts has traveled throughout Germany in student exchange programs and is fluent in German.

Roberts is one of approximately 1,600 U.S. grantees who will travel abroad for the 1996-97 academic year under the Fulbright Program. Individuals are selected on the basis of academic and professional qualifications, plus their ability and

willingness to share ideas and experiences with people of diverse cultures. Established under Congressional legislation introduced by former Senator J. William Fulbright of Arkansas, the program is designed to "increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries." Begun in 1946, this year marks the program's 50th anniversary. Approximately 210,000 "Fulbrighters"—about 77,000 from the United States and 133,000 from abroad—have participated in the program since it began.

Upon completion of her travel grant, Roberts will begin her graduate studies in modern philosophy at Vanderbilt University, where she has received a full scholarship. She plans to teach, research and write. Her advice to high school seniors, "Hard work can pay off; do your best from the start. Know what it is you want and why you want it, then figure out how to get there." A realist who has her feet firmly on the ground, Roberts credits her successes with a realization of both her strengths and weaknesses and states, "You can't get anywhere unless you try. I'm always going to be me... might as well be the best of me!"

Roberts follows Agnes Scott Fulbright scholars Katie Stromberg '95, who studied German art history in Halle, Germany; Jennifer Jenkins '94, who studied European politics in Frankfurt; and Laura Barlament '93, who studied German literature at the University of Constance.

ASC FACULTY BUSY WITH SUMMER ACTIVITY

- Harry Wistrand, professor of biology at ASC, participated in a teaching exchange program in Japan.
- While the athletic delegations of the world came to Atlanta to relive the ancient games of Olympia, Richard D. Parry, the Fuller E. Callaway Professor of Philosophy, lead a delegation of American teachers in Greece for competition in an intellectual arena. Parry, with a contingent of 15 middle and high school teachers from 12 states and the District of Columbia, lead a four-week seminar in Athens, Greece, entitled "Virtue, Happiness and the Common Good in Plato's *Republic*." Funded by a National Endowment for the Humanities (N.E.H.) grant of \$65,330, Parry and his group studied the classical work in its original settings of Athens, Olympia and Delphi. Parry, on the faculty of ASC since 1967, completed his own work, *Plato's Craft of Justice*, in 1993, which was published by the State University of New York Press in 1995.
- Ingrid Wieshofer, professor of German, is the director of the Language Across the Curriculum (L.A.C.) Program, which held its symposium at the end of the semester. Funded partly through a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (N.E.H.), the symposium included guest speakers Wendy Allen, professor of French at St. Olaf College and a nationally known expert on L.A.C., and Barbara Turlington, director of the international division of the American Council on Education (A.C.E.). The symposium attracted faculty from 40 colleges and universities throughout the southeast that also have strong liberal arts programs. ASC offers L.A.C. in French, German, Greek, Latin and Spanish in numerous courses including art history, anthropology, religion, literature, history, music, political science, sociology and women's studies.
- Karen Thompson, assistant professor of biology at ASC, continued her research with a \$90,000 grant from the National Science Foundation. According to Thompson, who hopes to discover the reasons for different sexual behavioral patterns in male and female grasshoppers, the significance of her research project is to understand "how animals of the same species produce difference characteristic behavior." In doing so, she plans to discover how the nervous system supports diverse behavior.

MCCAIN LIBRARY GETS AN INFO-FACELIFT

McCain Library, shedding its manual card catalog system completely, has gone on-line with SOPHIA (Scott On-line PHenomenal Information Access), offering 100 percent reference capability. Librarian Ginny Moreland has also coordinated on-line access with such electronic libraries as PROJECT MUSE of the Johns Hopkins University Press and GALILEO (Georgia Libraries and Learning On-line) of the University System of Georgia.

Thanks in part to a grant from the Woodruff Foundation, private colleges within the University Center are now a part of GALILEO. GALILEO provides on-line access to numerous electronic resources, including the full-text articles from several hundred current periodicals, indexing to the journal literature in many fields and core reference titles such as the *Encyclopedia Britannica*.

ASC is hosting an exhibit from Jordan's National Gallery of Fine Arts, through Oct. 16, in the Dalton Art Gallery, Dana Fine Arts Building.

The Right to Write: Calligraphic Works from the Jordan National Gallery of Fine Arts Collection features a unique and rarely viewed collection of paintings and sculpture produced by contemporary artists from Islamic and Arab cultures.

The exhibit was organized by and made possible through an agreement with Her Royal Highness Princess Wijdan Ali, founder of Jordan's Royal Society of Fine Arts and the Jordan

U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPORT RANKS ASC A NATIONAL "BEST VALUE"

In its yearly report on the "Best Colleges" released in the Sept. 16 issue, *U.S. News and World Report* has named Agnes Scott College (ASC) a "best value," with a 12th-place ranking in discount price and 26th in sticker price among national liberal arts colleges and universities. ASC was the only liberal arts college in Georgia to be awarded this distinction and has been consistently ranked by the report among the top ten women's colleges in the country.

According to *U.S. News*, "The rankings relate the cost of attending an institution to its quality. The best values are calculated in relation to both the stated or sticker price (tuition plus room, board and fees) and to the discounted price (tuition plus room, board, fees, books and estimated personal expenses, minus the average of need-based grants)."

Announced to the campus at the Sept. 6 Opening/Honors Convocation by ASC President Mary Brown Bullock '66, this ranking weighs in with ratings by other recently published reports. *Money* magazine names ASC a 1997 "best buy," ranking it third among women's colleges and in the top 20 among Southeastern colleges and universities. In *Princeton Review's* "The Best 310 Colleges: 1997 Edition," ASC placed first in the country for "dorms like palaces," 13th in overall "quality of life" and in the top 10 both in the quality of faculty (seventh) and their accessibility (fourth).

Upon *U.S. News'* announcement of ASC's new ranking, Bullock responded, "Naturally, we're delighted by this recognition of both the quality and value of an Agnes Scott education. It comes at a particularly exciting time as we welcome our largest first year class since 1969."

of the College. Included in the display are the award recipients with faculty members from last April's ceremony. The lists for dean's honor and honor recipients are posted at the end of each semester, also in Buttrick Hall.

To be included in the dean's honor list a student must complete a 12-hour semester with a quality point ratio of 3.7 and no grade below C in any academic course. Students eligible for the honor list must also complete the same requirements but with a 3.3.

Rehearsal for Senior Investiture will be held at 5 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 16, in Gaines Chapel. It is important that all seniors attend this rehearsal.

Class of 1997 Continues Proud ASC Campus Tradition

ASC is one of the few colleges in the United States continuing the tradition of investiture, a ceremony which originated centuries ago in English universities. One of ASC's most-cherished traditions, the investiture ceremony heralds spring commencement and formally recognizes seniors as the campus leaders who are singled-out as special members of the community. During the ceremony, seniors are capped with academic mortar boards as symbols of their well-earned status, privileges and responsibilities.

The formal investiture ceremony began at ASC in 1908, two years after the College granted its first bachelor of arts degree. It was in this year that the first seniors wore caps and gowns. The ceremony involves a full academic procession with the faculty in regalia. Following the formal address, each senior walks individually across the stage to be capped publicly.

It is believed that Mary Cady, professor of history from 1908-18, first suggested the practice of both capping seniors at investiture, as well as hooding them at commencement. Initially, the investiture ceremony was held privately in the study of the first ASC president, The Rev. Frank Henry Gaines. Seniors appeared in academic gowns and knelt before then dean of the College, Nannette Hopkins (who served at ASC for 49 years), who in turn capped them. Some alumnae may still remember the small "kneeling" stool used during the ceremony. The use of the stool began in 1932 when a student became ill and could not kneel to the floor. The custom took hold until 1970. Since then, each student has stood before the dean.

It was in 1913 that the investiture ceremony became a public occasion to avoid what had been termed "the traditional feud." Apparently, as the day of investiture approached, inter-class competition ensued, such as juniors trying to "steal" senior caps and gowns. In going public with the ceremony, such secretive pranks were discouraged and discredited.

Considered to be one of the highest compliments the students can bestow on a faculty or staff member, the seniors have for many years selected the investiture speaker.

The Sunday worship service following investiture became a formal portion of the weekend in 1943. For many years, the College president has hosted a reception or brunch for seniors and their families some time during the weekend.

Some people in similar circumstances, I have discovered, hold on to their world view with great tenacity, insisting that all of the others are wrong, peculiar, undeveloped, heathen or uncivilized. OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR USE OF WOODRUFF BUILDING DURING FALL AND SPRING SEMESTERS

I. Eligibility:

1. Students and two guests
2. Faculty, faculty families and two guests per faculty member (emeriti and emeritae included)
3. Staff, staff families and two guests per staff member (retired staff included)
4. Alumnae, alumnae families and two guests per alumna
5. Trustees, trustee families and two guests per trustee
6. Community members — no guests

II. Priority Order for Use of Facilities:

1. All classes
2. College events (intercollegiate/intramural)
3. Students
4. Faculty/Staff
5. Alumnae/Trustees

III. Costs:

1. Students, faculty, staff, trustees and their families — no charge
2. Alumnae and their families — \$50 per school year includes Community Swim fall and spring sessions
3. Conference guests — part of conference fee
4. Passes for trustees and alumnae will be distributed and fees paid at the Department of Athletics located on the third floor of Woodruff Building.
5. Community Swim Program — pool only — \$125/family; \$100/couple; \$70/single adult per session.
6. Summer Swim Program is not included in this procedure

IV. Availability:

Open hours are posted in the building and can be changed. The building is closed when the College is not in session.

V. *Methods of Use: Everyone must sign in individually at the control booth.

1. Agnes Scott ID cards must be presented by College students, faculty and staff. IDs will be checked after class hours. Alumnae and trustees must present their pass and driver's license. Family members without the primary user must present their family pass and a driver's license. Community Swim members must present their pass and driver's license. No guests are allowed.

*Primary users are students, faculty, staff, alumnae and trustees. All primary users with the exception of alumnae and trustees will have the same color plastic pass. Alumnae, trustees and Community Swim members, who have no college ID, will have other types of passes for identification

VI. General Rules:

1. Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
2. If you do not have proper ID and/or pass, you will be refused admittance.
3. You must be 16 years of age or older to use or be in the weight room.
4. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
5. Proper dress is mandatory in order to use the facilities. Proper dress means gym shoes, shorts, shirt, sweats and warm-ups. Swim wear only for the pool.
6. Towels will not be distributed. Bring your own.
7. Lockers can only be used on a day to day basis. If you put a lock on a locker, please remove it when you leave. Otherwise, the lock will be removed for you.
8. No bare feet permitted anywhere other than the pool.

- The building is not open when the College is closed. This includes all holidays and vacation periods during the course of the academic year.
- The College reserves the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities in case of violation of regulations.

FRENCH HORN, OBOE AND PIANO TRIO TO PLAY AT ASC

This two credit-hour study/travel component is a continuation of History 373, *England Under the Stuarts*. It is open to students registered next spring in History 373 and to students who have completed History 212, 213, 371 or 373 in prior semesters (or by special permission of the instructor). Students must be accepted into the program and must register for History 373G (2) during the spring semester. EIGHTY-ONE BLACK CATS LATER, THE TRADITION CONTINUES

Black Cat, the oldest remaining Agnes Scott College (ASC) on-going campus festival, returns this year in its 81st anniversary with a full schedule of anticipated pranks, events, games, costumes and, of course, the ritualistic song and skit competition and dance.

The first Black Cat in 1915 was masterminded by then College Physician and Professor of Hygiene Mary Frances Sweet who encouraged students to accept

this as a substitute to the sometimes ugly rivalry between the sophomore and incoming class during first-year hazing. Sweet suggested the two classes square-off with a competition of presentations, rather than a "hand-to-hand fight." The prize for the winning class was a bronze black cat, in honor of Sweet's own pet. Both the idea and the name stuck.

This competition between the sophomore and first-year class ended in 1950 when the entire campus adopted the event as a community celebration of welcome to new students. It was during the 50's that the song, as well as skits, came into the festivities. Later in the decade the dance became part of the tradition, which, with the junior skit, is the finale of what is now a week full of activity, rather than just one night.

Black Cat today marks the official closing of first-year orientation.

WHAT IS THE ATLANTA SEMESTER?

The Atlanta Semester, not unlike its counterparts the New York Semester (a semester at New York University in the Arts) and the Washington Semester (a semester at American University in politics), addresses issues unique to its city's experience, while studying women as essential leaders in the "international city" of Atlanta.

But what distinguishes the Atlanta Semester from its sister programs? The Agnes Scott College (ASC) program challenges its students from all over the country to examine specifically women's contributions to leadership and the dynamics of social change, while tapping into the remarkable resources found only in Atlanta. Combining academic and experiential learning through courses and internships, such as those at the Carter Center, The Centers for Disease Control (CDC), Turner Broadcasting System (TBS), with a wide array of speakers and many choices for independent research, students encounter the premier women's college experience and earn a full semester's credit.

This year's theme, "Making All the Difference: Rethinking Citizenship and the City of the Future," involves an interdisciplinary seminar and speakers' forums as the core of the program. Each student selects an internship and carries out independent research to bridge the academic and experiential components.

Through the Atlanta Semester, ASC continues its mission to prepare women leaders and citizens for tomorrow's global and technological world.

ASC ADOPTS NEW POLICIES FOR STANDARD MAIL

- The ASC Post Office must be notified two weeks before a mailing is scheduled to go out. (This includes mailings that are done through outside mailhouses)
- When a standard mailing is brought to the ASC Post Office, the following must be done:
 - a certified process must have been used to ensure the accuracy of the five-digit zip codes in the mailing (see below), and
 - a list of how many pieces are going to each zip code in the mailing must be included.

The following are changes that took effect with the Non-Profit Classification Reform on October 6.

- name change from "bulk mail" to "standard mail"
- supporting documentation must accompany any standard mailing to show the sortation levels of the zip codes
- a certified process must be used at least once a year to ensure accuracy of five-digit zip codes.

Certified processes:

- manual verification using the most recent Postal Service zip code directory
- survey of the addressees currently on the mailer's address list to inquire about changes to zip code information
- participation in the current manual list correction service (cost is \$.017 per address with \$5.50 minimum)
- use of a service provider to verify zip code information
- use of an electronic look-up service such as those available on the Postal Service Home Page (<http://www.usps.gov/ncsc/>)
- use of certified address matching software

- \$.132 for letter weighing 3.3407 oz. or less
- \$.195 for nonletter weighing 3.3407 oz. or less

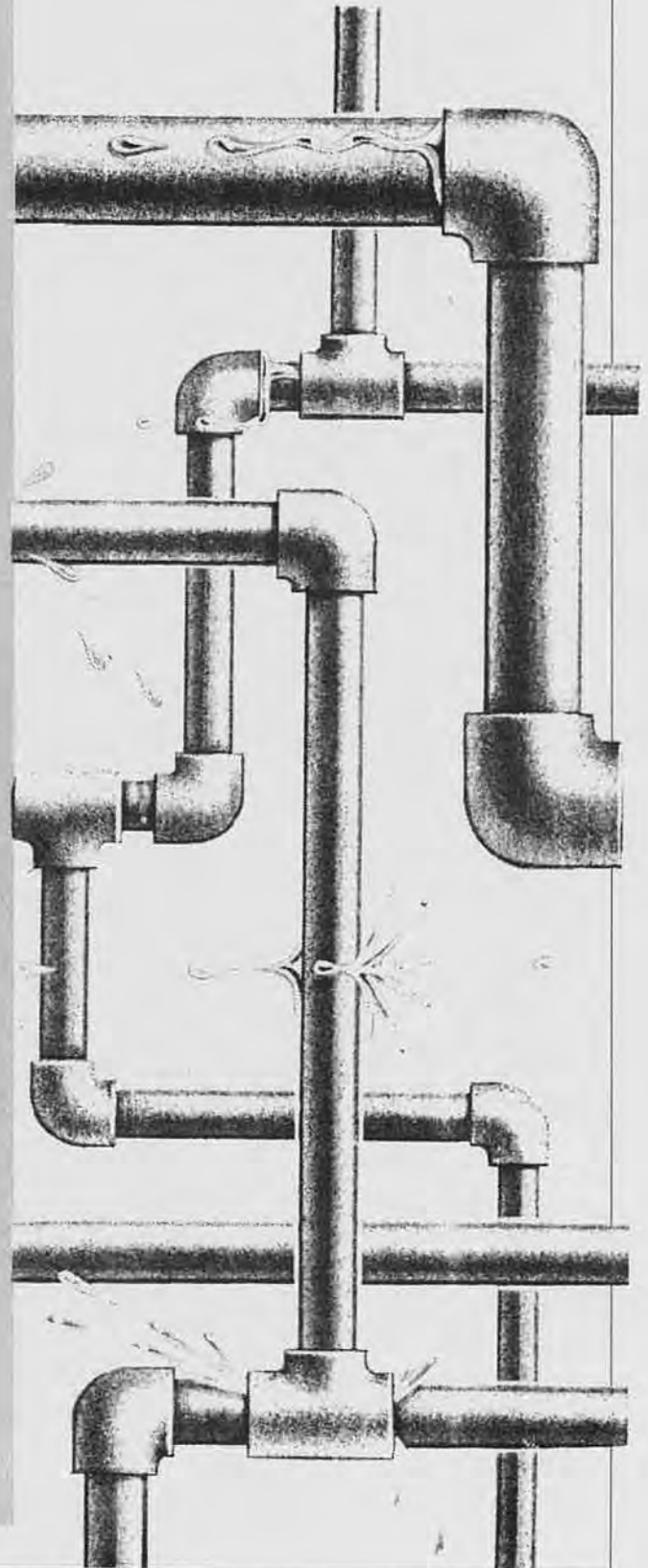

The Museum Fellows program was established to increase the number of trained minority museum professionals in the United States by preparing students to qualify for graduate study or work in the field. Allen, a native of Atlanta, is a history major with a minor in Africana studies. Byrd graduated from ASC with a double major in history and English.

The recipients receive a stipend of \$6,000 and academic credit. The program, which began in August, includes 12 months of study, training and travel to museums around the country, including the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

The Return to College (RTC) program held its first visitation day of the academic year on Wednesday, Oct. 16, attracting one of the largest groups for the program in recent record.

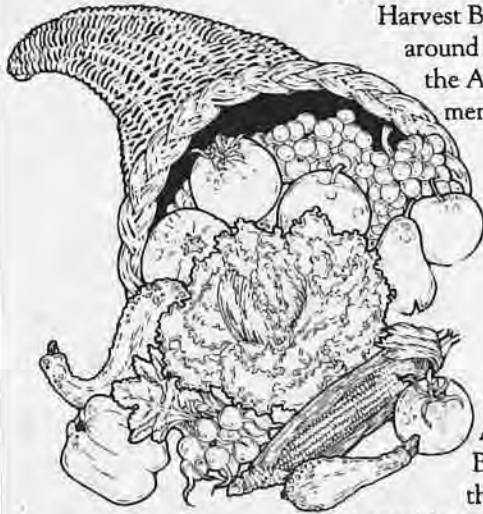

To renew your library materials, follow these steps: From the main menu of SOPHIA

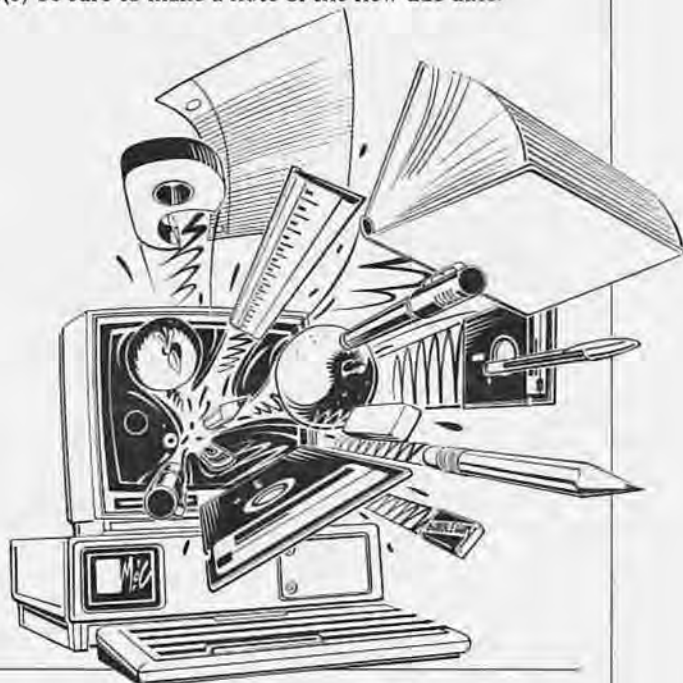

- Items cannot be renewed more than 3 times. The system will display this message: "Too Many Renewals";
- Items which are on hold for someone else may not be renewed;
- Items that have been billed or declared lost may not be renewed.

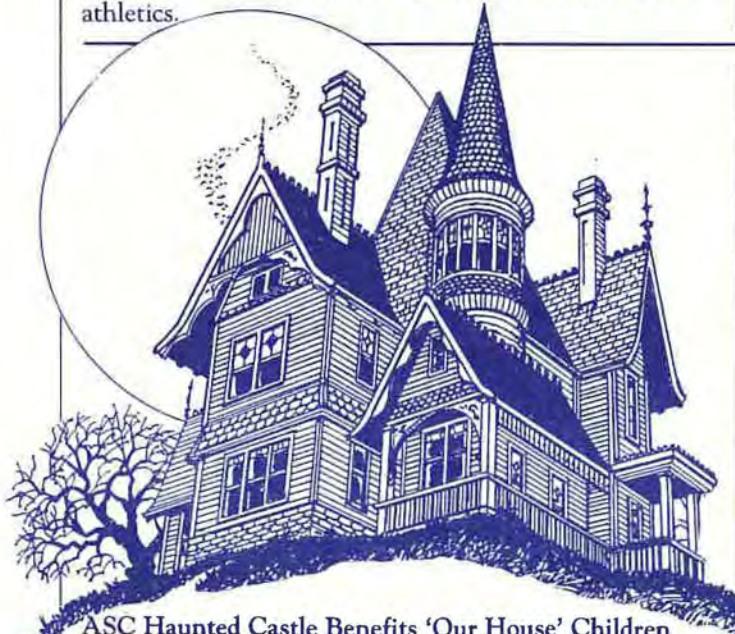

ASC CELEBRATES ALL SOULS' DAY, THE DAY OF THE DEAD

Celebrated all over the world to honor the departed, the Day of the Dead, in Mexico known as *El Dia de los Muertos*; in Germany as *Allerseelen* (All Souls' Day); in Colombia as *Dia de los Angelitos* (Day of the Little Angels); and, in Italy as *Giorno dei Morti* (Dead Day), is a day when graves are visited and cleaned and food is offered to the dead who are believed to return on this day to "visit" the living.

Leticia Seymour, ASC Spanish instructor, will offer a workshop on how to built an altar to celebrate the Day of the Dead, 4:30-6 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 4, in the Dana Gallery. Seymour has extensive experience creating these altars. She won second prize in a 1995 contest organized by the Mexican Center of Atlanta and the Atlanta History Center.

"The Day of the Dead is an incredible ceremony of both life and death," says Marta Montero, an anthropologist in Boston, Mass., who studied the tradition in Mexico for more than a decade.

The *calvera*, or "skull," is the predominant image of the day. Children eat skull-shaped bread and sugar candies, and play with skeleton-shaped toys called *calacas*.

Ceremoniously, money, candy or *cempazuchitl* (marigolds—the flower of the dead) are thrown in the offering.

Bring mementos of your dead (a photograph or his/her favorite possession) or marigolds or just plain flowers and join in the festivities.

The altar will remain for general viewing in Dana until Nov. 6 at 4 p.m. For more information, contact Seymour or Rafael Ocasio in the Spanish program.

Scholarships Available for Sophomores, Juniors

ASC sophomores or juniors interested in a career in mathematics, the natural sciences or engineering, are invited to apply to the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program.

Established by Congress in 1986, the Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Foundation operates an educational scholarship program designed to provide opportunities for outstanding U.S. students with excellent academic records and demonstrated interest in these fields.

In April 1997, the foundation will award scholarships to students who will be college juniors or seniors during the 1997-98 academic year. In order to be considered for an award, students must be nominated by their institution. The deadline for receipt of all 1997 nominations is Jan. 15, 1997.

To be eligible, current full-time, baccalaureate-pursuing sophomores or juniors must have a "B" average or equivalent, stand in the upper fourth of the class and be a U.S. citizen, resident alien or U.S. national who will pursue a career in mathematics, the natural sciences or engineering.

The scholarship award covers eligible expenses up to a maximum of \$7,000 per year. Junior scholarship recipients can expect to receive a maximum of two years of support. Senior recipients are eligible for a maximum of one year of support. DEPREE RECEIVES TWO RESEARCH GRANTS

Chris DePree, assistant professor of physics (part-time), has recently been awarded two grants to conduct astronomical research.

DePree is co-investigator on a grant funded and administered by NASA for the Hubble Space Telescope (HST) Cycle 6 General Observer project entitled, "The Helical Jet/ISM Interaction in NGC 4258." This grant awarded him \$9,500 which goes toward a partial salary and equipment purchase. The research objective is to study the interaction between the jet of high-energy particles emanating from the center of a galaxy, which is believed to harbor a black hole, with the surrounding interstellar medium.

A \$3,500 American Astronomical Society (AAS) Small Research Grant entitled, "Massive Star Formation and the Lifetime Paradox," was awarded to DePree on July 29. Funded by NASA and administered by the AAS, the grant will be used for the purchase of computing equipment and publication costs. In this grant, DePree's research objective is to study the formation of massive stars (those with at least five times the mass of sun) using observational data from the Very Large Array (VLA), the world's largest radio telescope, in Socorro, N.M. Radio telescopes, like the VLA, are sensitive to large wavelengths, as opposed to optical telescopes, which track much smaller wave lengths. The advantage, other than the ability to more clearly track such events as the formation of stars, is that radio observations in conjunction with optical observations provide a more complete picture of astronomical activity.

An opportunity to meet and speak to DePree will happen when he will lecture on the topic of astronomy at the VLA for the December observatory open house program.

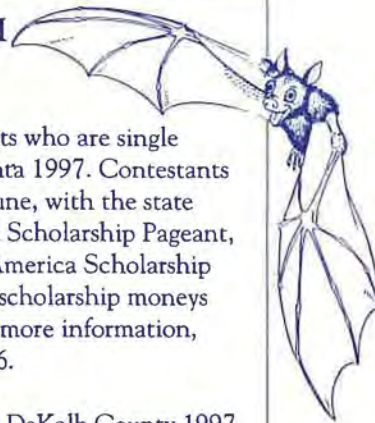
LOOSE KNIT OPENS THE 1996-97 SEASON

NEW COMPUTERS, BOOKS SHARE CENTER STAGE IN MCCAIN

Last week two notable additions were made to the McCain Library. In the spot where the card catalog used to be, four new high-speed computer systems and a laser printer have been installed. These computers were funded by a University Center in Georgia Woodruff Grant and are especially configured to provide the best access to the electronic resources of the GALILEO project.

At almost the same time, the library was processing a long-awaited addition to the realm of massive scholarly reference works.

In contrast to previous encyclopedias of art, this work attempts to provide "comprehensive coverage of the history of all the visual arts worldwide, from prehistory to the present." (Film-making is the one visual art form largely excluded.) The full set includes approximately 25 million words, while the index volume alone contains 750,000 entries and cross-references.

The modestly titled *Dictionary of Art*, edited by Jane Turner, has just been published by Macmillan and Grove's Dictionaries Inc. The 34-volume set, which is destined for the reference collection, is currently displayed on top of the new books/browsing bookcase, across from the circulation desk. If you'd like some reassurance that the book is *not* dead, just come marvel at this set. Fourteen years in the making, the *Dictionary of Art* contains 45,000 entries written by more than 6,700 scholars from over 120 countries. (At least one, that is known, is a

current ASC faculty member. Guess who?) In contrast to previous encyclopedias of art, this work attempts to provide "comprehensive coverage of the history of all the visual arts worldwide, from prehistory to the present." (Film-making is the one visual art form largely excluded.) The full set includes approximately 25 million words, while the index volume alone contains 750,000 entries and cross-references. The *Dictionary of Art* is richly illustrated with numerous high-quality black and white reproductions and a smaller number of color plates. Feast your eyes and your mind on these volumes!

A senior associate justice to the Supreme Court of South Carolina since 1988 and a 1965 graduate of Agnes Scott, Toal received her J.D. degree from the University of South Carolina and served as a member of the South Carolina House of Representatives from Richland County for 13 years. She practiced law for 20 years prior to her election to the state

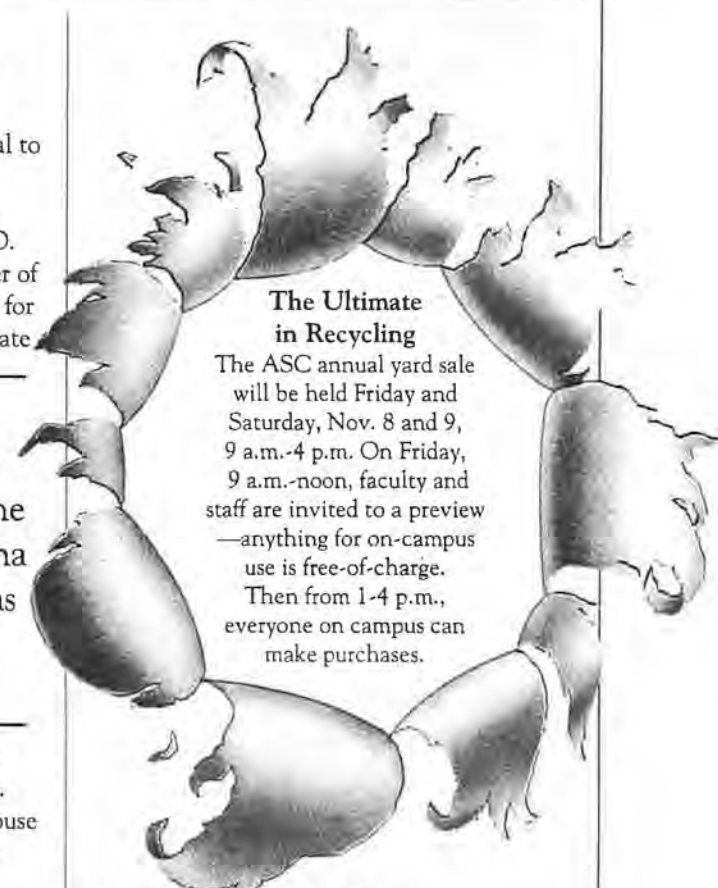

Toal has received numerous awards and honorary degrees, including Portrait Honoree (South Carolina Trial Lawyers), Outstanding Alumna (Agnes Scott College), Algernon Sidney Sullivan Award (University of South Carolina) and University of Notre Dame Award. Toal and her husband William, a founding partner of the law firm Johnson, Toal and Battiste, P.A., reside with their daughter, Lilla, in Columbia, S.C.

The ASC Web Site, "Biographies of Women Mathematicians," was named as one of the "Ten Cool Sites" of November by the Exploratorium organization. Every month, the Exploratorium's Learning Studio (http://www.exploratorium.edu/learning_studio/) picks the best in science, art and education. Sites are submitted by visitors to the Exploratorium Home Pages or are suggested by Exploratorium staff. The Exploratorium has been posting the "Ten Cool Sites" since June of 1995. Sites are selected based upon their content, their design and the overall experience of visiting them.

The site, a previous winner of other awards and one of the most visited aspects of the ASC Web Site, was created by Larry Riddle, ASC professor of mathematics, and his students. It

contains 24 biographies (some with photos/illustrations) of historical women in mathematics. This site is part of an on-going project by students in mathematics classes at ASC to illustrate the numerous achievements of women in the field of mathematics.

Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health

In July 1996, the first-ever *Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health* was presented to the American public. The significance of this work is "on par with the Surgeon General's historic first report on smoking and health published in 1964," according to Health and Human Services Secretary Donna E. Shalala.

The key finding of the report is that almost without exception, people of all ages can improve the quality of their lives by incorporating 30-45 minutes of moderate exercise into their daily routines on most, if not all, days.

Moderate physical activity can substantially reduce the risk of developing or dying from heart disease, diabetes, colon cancer and high blood pressure. In addition, the report notes that regular physical activity can reduce symptoms of depression and anxiety, improve mood as well as the ability to perform daily tasks.

- Do not use red, bright pink or dark colors when designing postcards or envelopes. The ASC post office meters all department mail with red ink and the postmark will not show up on these colors;

- The USPS offers "Priority Mail" envelopes and boxes for free. If you are planning to mail any item "First Class" and it weighs over 11 ounces, the envelopes and boxes are free to use. The price for "Priority Mail" starts at \$3 for up to two pounds. Contact the ASC post office to request these supplies to be delivered to your office via campus mail;

- Instead of having Federal Express pick up packages directly from your office, take the items to the ASC post office by 4 p.m. and save \$2.50 per item;

- Separate campus mail from outgoing off-campus mail;

- Make sure all foreign mail is separated and marked "Air Mail." All foreign mail over five ounces must include a completed customs form;

Surgeon General's Report on Physical

A college professor once told me that exercise is like brushing teeth. You learn to appreciate the benefits so much that you do not consider not doing it. An active lifestyle can become a matter of habit, perhaps even a "positive addiction" (a phrase coined by Dr. William Glasser). The most difficult part is finding a way to begin.

Based on the *Surgeon General's Report*, it is evident that the health benefits associated with physical activity are achievable, even for those who have previously been discouraged with their attempts to begin and adhere to a regular program of exercise.

Emphasizing the amount of exercise, rather than the intensity, is significant according to the report. This is thought to provide people with more options for incorporating activity into their daily lives. Also, the recommended daily, or almost daily, 30-45 minutes of moderate exercise does not need to occur in the same exercise session.

Look for Part 3 next week on ideas to incorporate moderate activity into your daily routine.

To the College Community from Librarian Ginny Moreland:

Thanks to an increase in acquisitions funding in the revised budget for 1996-97, the library is prepared to consider the addition of a select number of new periodical titles. While there are some pending requests on file, we want to be sure every academic program is aware of this possibility.

If you wish to recommend a periodical to add to our subscription list, please send the information listed below to ASC Librarian Ginny Moreland. **Nominations must be received by Dec. 13** in order to review the titles, make decisions and get subscriptions initiated in a timely manner for 1997. (If you are lacking some of the data, just leave the lines blank.) Please reproduce the form as needed.

PROCESS: Suggestions for new titles are especially requested from the faculty, but also are welcome from students and staff. Library staff will also identify titles for which there seems a heavy demand as evidenced by Inter-Library Loan (ILL) requests, Inter-Library Use (ILU) activity and reference questions. The librarian will consult with library staff, the Library Advisory Group and the dean of the College regarding how much of the budget can be allocated for new periodicals and in the selection of titles to be added. If a title is available in a reliable and affordable electronic format, we will consider acquisition of the electronic format only.

TRADE-OFFS: As programs develop, faculty retire, and new faculty join, there is a natural evolution in the scholarly interests of a discipline. It will certainly support the case for adding new titles if a program can identify existing titles which are genuinely no longer so relevant to the collection and might be canceled. (This is not a guarantee of dollar-for-dollar substitution, but a promise of serious consideration!) Since periodical titles often have cross-disciplinary impact, we will review any possible cancellations with the entire faculty before making final decisions.

WHAT DO WE HAVE? Although the periodicals budget is not allocated to departments, we can generate lists of titles which are coded as being primarily of interest to a particular discipline. Please contact Resa Harney, technical services librarian, at ext. 6141, if you would like such a list to review.

PHYSICAL FITNESS

PART THREE IN A SIX-PART SERIES

Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health

The *Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health* defines moderate physical activity as activity that uses 150 calories per day. The following are some sample activities that meet the daily recommendation:

- 30 minutes walking as if you are in a bit of a hurry
- 30 minutes swimming with a kick board
- 20 minutes swimming laps
- 20 minutes using an exercise bike or a stairmaster
- 45 minutes raking leaves, waxing your car or vacuuming your carpets

The list, as you can imagine, is practically endless; feel free to use your imagination.

Would any of the following scenarios work with your schedule?

- A) 8 a.m., arrive at the gym and warm-up with gentle range of motion stretches;
8:10-8:30 a.m., exercise on a stationary bike, stairmaster, treadmill, rowing machine or cross-country ski machine (do not forget to bring the morning paper);
8:30-8:40 a.m., cool-down and do flexibility exercises;
8:40-9 a.m., shower and go!
- B) 11:30 a.m.-noon, walk two times around the ASC square mile block. Take a friend or Walkman radio. You could learn conversational Spanish with lessons on tape. You could have your friends and relatives invest in your exercise commitment by purchasing holiday gifts such as earmuffs or a colorful wind breaker.
- C) After a stressful day at work, take a plunge into the warm and beautiful ASC pool for a 20 minute lap swim or 30 minutes swimming with a kickboard.

PHYSICAL FITNESS

PART FOUR IN A SIX-PART SERIES

Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health

The Surgeon General's Report is based primarily on the plethora of research addressing the physiological effects of aerobic exercise; i.e. exercise that is continuous and rhythmic like walking, jogging, swimming, rope jumping, cross country skiing, bicycling, etc. Even though there are some promising findings on the benefits of resistance exercise (such as weight training) presented in the report, a comprehensive study has yet to be conducted from the Surgeon General's office. Also deserving more research and attention are the effects of exercise on women who are pregnant and the effects of exercise on people who live with physical challenges.

Several individuals from the ASC community have shown an interest in weight training (I'm not making this up, it's true). So, even though the Surgeon General's office has yet to produce applicable research, I would like to pass on some of what exercise physiologists have discovered in recent years.

When we humans ask our muscles to do more than they can comfortably do and when we do this "asking" three times per week on alternate days, our muscles respond by strengthening. Whether you make your muscles tired by lifting light weight many times or by lifting heavy weight few times, the key is the asking part. I usually help the very busy ASC people to develop a weight training regime that will get them in and out of the weight room in 30 minutes.

Finally, here is the answer to the "why bother" question. Strong muscles help us maintain an upright posture; strong muscles help prevent low back pain and joint pain in general; and, as stated in the Surgeon General's Report, resistance training with older adults results in an increased ability for independent living.

In *The Bishop's Wife*, Loretta Young plays the disaffected wife of an Episcopal bishop played by David Niven. Cary Grant plays an angel named Dudley, who is sent from heaven to revitalize their marriage and their faith. The three principals are sparkling and the dialogue is witty and moving (Charles Brackett and Billy Wilder of *Sunset Boulevard* fame contributed to the screenplay). The film is also wonderfully evocative of Christmas in New York. It's an unusual film in the often banal history of Hollywood treatments of Christmas and angels. Beautifully filmed by Gregg Toland, the cinematographer of *Citizen Kane*, the movie was nominated for best picture, best director, best music and best editing. My recommendation: rent it this holiday and watch it with your family; it offers a delightful antidote to the "more is more" formula of holiday blockbusters.

The remake opens Friday, Dec. 13, and stars Denzel Washington as Dudley and Whitney Houston as the wife of preacher Courtney Vance. And, yes, Houston does get to sing—she leads the church choir. *The Preacher's Wife* is directed by Penny Marshall, whose directing credits include *Big*, *A League of their Own* and *Awakenings*.

GALILEO ASSISTS IN DISCOVERY AND LEARNING

Are your term papers due soon? Are you frantically trying to do research? If so, Georgia Library Learning Online (GALILEO) may be the answer for you!

GALILEO is a statewide project to enhance library services, initiated last year throughout the University System in Georgia. This year, Agnes Scott and eight other private academic libraries in Atlanta have joined GALILEO. Funding for the first three years is provided by a grant from the Woodruff foundation to the University Center in Georgia.

What can GALILEO do for the me?

GALILEO contains periodical indexes for a wide variety of disciplines ranging from the arts and humanities to the sciences. You can find citations to journal and magazine articles as well as many full text articles. Some of the most popular databases are Periodical Abstracts, Business Dateline, ABI Inform (a business database), Current Contents and MLA Bibliography (literature and languages). GALILEO also contains Newspaper Abstracts to 29 major daily newspapers and the full text of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Other resources available on GALILEO include access to the University System of Georgia library catalogs, state of Georgia government documents and Internet Resources such as connections to the Library of Congress, Smithsonian Institution Libraries, U.S. Department of Education Resources and a virtual tour of the White House! Electronic access to the full text of all of the journals published by Academic Press is available. Psychology students may be happy to know that the *Journal of Adolescence* is published by Academic Press!

Where is GALILEO?

Although GALILEO can be accessed from your office, dorm room or computer lab, the four computers located in the center of the main computer cluster in the library perform searches, display results and print faster than most terminals on campus. If you have any questions about which database to use or whether or not your favorite database is available on GALILEO, click on the SCOPE button at the top of the GALILEO Databases page.

Christmas in Academe

Surgeon General's Report on Physical Activity and Health

What do Oprah Winfrey, President Bill Clinton and President Mary Brown Bullock '66 have in common?

- They all are leaders and role models;
- The work that they do requires that they have energy and enthusiasm in abundant supply;
- They all schedule physical fitness activities into their daily lives.

Adhering to a sensible program of physical activity is for many, integral to their maintaining balance, focus and effectiveness in their work and in their lives. Unfortunately, as the *Surgeon General's Report* discloses, physical inactivity prevails in many segments of today's society. Quoting from the report, "Sedentary living is more prevalent among women than men, among blacks and Hispanics than whites, among older than younger adults and among the less affluent than the more affluent."

Some interventions have been successful in increasing physical fitness opportunities for people in various settings. However, communities, worksites, schools, healthcare settings and the homes of America are encouraged to consider further implementation of programs designed to educate and support people as they work to improve or maintain personal physical fitness.

Several individuals in the Agnes Scott College (ASC) community participate in a personal fitness program called Century Club. This involves logging-in exercise miles working toward a 100-mile goal. 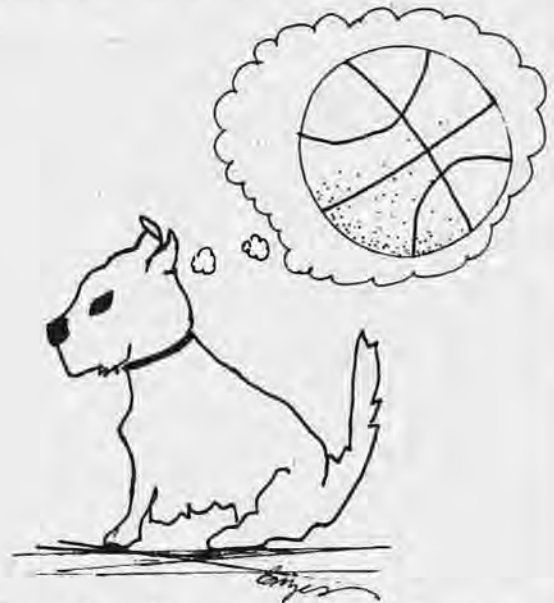
Woodruff Building: CORRECTION: Woodruff Pool will close for this semester on Dec. 15 at 8 p.m.

SCOTTIES HIT SCORING DROUGHT

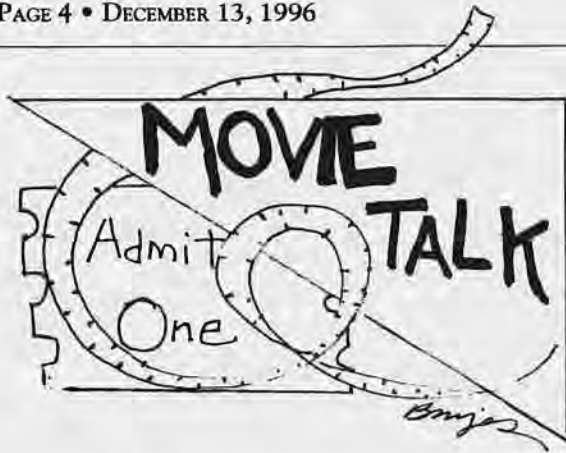

The intrepid ASC basketball team was on a roller coaster for its three games over the past week. Tuesday, Dec. 3, the dauntless Scotties hosted Toccoa Falls College in what was the most exciting game of their season. Although ASC lost by an eyelash, 60-59, they came back from 12 points down with eight minutes left in the second half to nearly take Toccoa Falls to overtime. Tight defensive play by ASC shut down the opposition's offense to give the Scotties a chance at a comeback. With two seconds left on the clock, and ASC down 60-57, the sophomore playmaking guard, Sandy Miller, drove the lane to score and was fouled. But she missed her free throw for a three-point play, and the clock ran out. High scores for ASC were Miller with 19 and Debbie Cheaves '97 with 12.



The powerhouse University of the South-Sewanee came to ASC Thursday, Dec. 5, and they left with their reputation intact as they drowned the Scotties, 74-25, in a game that was never close. Led by their twin towers, six-footers Brandi Poole and Newnan's Kim Fauls, the team from Tennessee dominated at both ends of the court. The shorter Scotties usually got just one shot at the basket, if they were able to break the suffocating Sewanee full court press. Miller led ASC with 12 hard-earned points against a bigger, stronger and faster team.

The Scotties closed out their week losing to Oglethorpe 67-27. Absences cut the squad to seven players and they were an exhausted crew by the end of the game. Oglethorpe's mostly freshman team featured three talented six-footers and they controlled the rebounding as the tired Scotties had only four players scoring, led by Cheaves with 12 and junior Jessica McKenzie with 8. Sylvie Bogui '98 came off the bench to add some spark by getting five steals and playing a scrappy game in a losing cause.

Last week I talked about Christmas season remakes. This year, on Christmas Day, there will open a remake of one of the most re-made films of all: Shakespeare's *Hamlet*. My sources list 34 international film versions of Shakespeare's most famous play (including 13 silent). The best-known is Lawrence Olivier's 1948 adaptation, which won Oscars for best picture and best actor. This year's *Hamlet* is directed by and stars Kenneth Branagh, who made the transition from stage to screen with a stunning version of *Henry V* (also an Olivier vehicle).

Grandiose and elegant appear to be the qualities that will distinguish this four-hour *Hamlet*. The cast includes a wide assortment of stage and screen actors. Derek Jacobi, who played Hamlet in the BBC version, portrays Claudius here. Julie Christie is Gertrude; Kate Winslet plays Ophelia; Richard Briers plays Polonius. Oddly, the bigger names are in the smaller parts: Billy Crystal plays a gravedigger, Robin Williams plays Osric and Gerald Depardieu plays Reynaldo. Jack Lemmon, John Gielgud, Charlton Heston and director Richard Attenborough play tiny roles.

Branagh has set the film in 19th century Denmark, and a great deal of the modest budget appears to have gone for elaborate sets. The interior of Elsinore Castle now constitutes the largest single set in England. The State Hall has a floor of 7,500 marbled tiles and the walls are made entirely of mirrors (specially hinged so that they could be manipulated to avoid showing the cameras in reflection). The exterior shots of the castle use England's famous Blenheim Palace, home to the Duke of Marlborough (who appears in the film in a non-speaking role). For certain shots, the crew trucked in over 20 tons of artificial snow—"more than in any other film before, even *Dr. Zhivago*," boasts the studio publicity.

I can't predict the film's quality, but these advance murmurs have me nervous. Branagh's done good work before; let's hope he hasn't gone off the deep end with this one.

To the College Community from Librarian Ginny Moreland:

Thanks to an increase in acquisitions funding in the revised budget for 1996-97, the library is prepared to consider the addition of a select number of new periodical titles. While there are some pending requests on file, we want to be sure every academic program is aware of this possibility.

If you wish to recommend a periodical to add to our subscription list, please send the information listed below to ASC Librarian Ginny Moreland. **Nominations must be received by Dec. 20** in order to review the titles, make decisions and get subscriptions initiated in a timely manner for 1997. (If you are lacking some of the data, just leave the lines blank.) Please reproduce the form as needed.

PROCESS: Suggestions for new titles are especially requested from the faculty, but also are welcome from students and staff. Library staff will also identify titles for which there seems a heavy demand as evidenced by Inter-Library Loan (ILL) requests, Inter-Library Use (ILU) activity and reference questions. The librarian will consult with library staff, the Library Advisory Group and the dean of the College regarding how much of the budget can be allocated for new periodicals and in the selection of titles to be added. If a title is available in a reliable and affordable electronic format, we will consider acquisition of the electronic format only.

TRADE-OFFS: As programs develop, faculty retire, and new faculty join, there is a natural evolution in the scholarly interests of a discipline. It will certainly support the case for adding new titles if a program can identify existing titles which are genuinely no longer so relevant to the collection and might be canceled. (This is not a guarantee of dollar-for-dollar substitution, but a promise of serious consideration!) Since periodical titles often have cross-disciplinary impact, we will review any possible cancellations with the entire faculty before making final decisions.

WHAT DO WE HAVE? Although the periodicals budget is not allocated to departments, we can generate lists of titles which are coded as being primarily of interest to a particular discipline. Please contact Resa Harney, technical services librarian, at ext. 6141, if you would like such a list to review.

CLIP AND RETURN TO THE LIBRARY

READERSHIP SURVEY RESULTS:

The 1996-97 *Campus Connection* Readership Survey provided the public relations office with beneficial information to provide an internal communication vehicle that most appropriately serves the ASC community.

The following illustrates the breakdown of respondents:

Salaried staff members	41 percent
Traditional-aged students	32 percent
RTC students	14 percent
MAT students	5 percent
Faculty members	4 percent
Hourly staff members	4 percent
Year-5 students	0 percent

Seventy-three percent of those surveyed indicated that they read the entire newsletter each week. For those who did not read everything each week, the most popular section included the calendar and "Coming Attractions" sections, with "Campus Announcements" and "CP&C" sections also quite popular.

Most surveyed discard the *Campus Connection* either immediately following reading it or at the end of the week it covered. A surprising 27 percent indicated that they never discarded it, keeping it for future reference.

Regarding how respondents use *Campus Connection*, 60 percent use it as a primary source of information with 32 percent using it as a reminder of deadlines.

Whether or not the *Campus Connection* is, overall, considered a successful medium for internal communication, 9 percent felt it was not (an RTC student commented, "I need dates a week in advance, especially those on the Friday I pick it up.") Of the other 91 percent, comments ranged from, "readily available to everyone," to "thorough and informative," to "the only combined" and "dependable source of information on campus."

Generally, respondents felt that for those who do not read *Campus Connection*, the reason is that they do not have the time. However, a few commented that the increased length of the newsletter and the additional information included over this past year was possibly another factor for any loss of readership.

Seventy-two percent would prefer the weekly to remain in its present paper form, with 18 percent who wish to read it electronically only and 9 percent electing to have *Campus Connection* produced both in paper and electronic format.
