## **Lewis Speaks Jan. 16 On MLK's Dream Of "The Beloved Community"**

The Committee on Community Diversity invites you to the opening convocation, Spring 2002, honoring the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. As we come together to embark on a new semester, we are reminded of Dr. King's powerful legacy, as described by his widow, Coretta Scott King: "We commemorate as well the timeless values he taught us through his example -- the values of courage, truth, justice, compassion, dignity, humility and service..." ([www.thekingcenter.com](http://www.thekingcenter.com)).

Dr. King's spirit continues to be inspiration to all. It is alive in the work of activists from across the political spectrum and social arenas. ASC is proud to welcome one such activist, Congressman John Lewis (Georgia's 5<sup>th</sup> District). Lewis' list of achievements is truly remarkable. For instance, "In 1961, Lewis volunteered to participate in the Freedom Riders, which were organized to challenge segregation at interstate bus terminals across the South. Lewis risked his life and was beaten severely by mobs for participating in the rides. During the height of the civil rights movement, from 1963 to 1966, Lewis was the chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), which he helped form. SNCC was largely responsible for the sit-ins and other activities of students in the struggle for civil rights.

Despite his youth, Lewis became a recognized leader in the civil rights movement. By 1963, he was recognized as one of the "Big Six" leaders of the Civil Rights Movement. (The other Big Six leaders were Whitney Young, A. Phillip Randolph, Martin Luther King Jr., James Farmer and Roy Wilkins.) Lewis, at the age of 23, was one of the planners and a keynote speaker at the historic "March on Washington" in August 1963." ([www.house.gov/johnlewis/](http://www.house.gov/johnlewis/)). Lewis was elected to the Congress in 1986 and currently is serving his eighth term in office.

President Mary Brown Bullock encourages all members of the Agnes Scott community to attend this important convocation. "This rich ceremonial occasion draws us together at the start of a new year, refreshed by the holidays and expectant for the teaching and learning that lies ahead," she notes. "In celebrating the legacy of Martin Luther King at this time we also reaffirm the importance of our unique community — faculty, staff and students of all races and all creeds, united in a common institutional mission. Martin Luther King's dream of a new American society speaks to us still, and we await Congressman John Lewis' talk with great anticipation. We have learned in recent months how important it is to draw together as a community, and how much strength we gain from each other. I look forward to seeing you at this convocation."

The Martin Luther King Jr. Convocation will take place Jan. 16, in Gaines Chapel during Community Hour, 10 a.m. Please join us for a reception and book signing immediately following the program in the Katharine Woltz Reception Room, Rebekah Scott Hall.

## President Mary Brown Bullock '66 Elected Chair of NAICU

At the annual meeting of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, Agnes Scott College President Mary Brown Bullock '66 began her one-year term as chair of the organization that represents nearly 1,000 institutions of higher education in the United States.

NAICU represents the range of private higher education, including liberal arts colleges, research universities, faith-related institutions and historically black and women's colleges. Members include Wellesley College, Harvard University, Carnegie-Mellon University, Princeton University, Yale University and Emory University. Bullock's election as chair was ratified Feb. 5.

As an advocate on Capitol Hill for college students and their families, NAICU targets policy issues such as financial aid, taxation and federal law affecting college communities. The organization also serves as a means to dispel perceptions that private institutions are elitist, expensive and less diverse than state institutions.

"One of our main objectives is to let the public know that independent colleges are affordable—a great bargain," Bullock said. "And that attaining a college degree is within the reach of most Americans."

Agnes Scott exemplifies that goal. It possesses a diverse student body (with about 30 percent minority representation), generous financial aid and a strong academic program that this year attracted students from 29 countries and 39 states.

"I can think of no other college president more qualified to lead private higher education through these times of important change than Mary Brown Bullock," said David L. Warren, NAICU president. "She's an articulate and dedicated advocate of private higher education who brings an unsurpassed mastery of national campus and policy issues to her new position. The respect that Mary commands from her peers, along with her commitment to educational opportunity and excellence, make her the ideal choice to lead the NAICU board of directors."

Bullock served as vice-chair last year and follows Loren J. Anderson, president of Pacific Lutheran University as chair. She has been president of Agnes Scott since 1995. A China scholar, she is former director of the Asia Program at The Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C.

## **Mary Daly To Speak March 5 For Women's History Month**



The Scotties swam well, breaking 13 school records. Lesley Conrad '04, Amy Zvonar '04 and Kate Thomason '05 were among 18 student-athletes named to the 2001 All-Atlantic States Team. Swimming coach Page Remillard was named Atlantic States Coach of the Year. The swim team finished 10-1, beating its mark of 5-5.

In tennis, Savannah College of Art and Design beat Agnes Scott 5-4 Feb. 16. The Scotties won two of three doubles matches but only won two of six singles matches. In another match Feb. 16, the Scotties beat Wesleyan 8-1. Doubles partners Patricia Brooks '04 and Mary Rae Phelps '02 and doubles partners Christie Oh '03 and Kelley Quann '05 remain undefeated. Brooks is also undefeated in singles. On Feb. 12, Agnes Scott College opened its season by beating Georgia Perimeter College 9-0.

In basketball, the Scotties lost 59-53 to Warren Wilson after being down 17 points in the final two minutes of the game. The Scotties put together a scoring run late by grabbing loose balls and getting to the free throw line. On Feb. 22, the Scotties didn't fare as well, losing 103-49 to Meredith. On Feb. 16, Huntingdon beat the Scotties 75-53.

In softball, the Scotties struggled offensively in their Feb. 15 doubleheader with Huntingdon, losing 8-0 and 9-1.

## McCain Library Launches Easier Access To E-books, NetLibrary

E-books should be easier to find since the library has loaded the bibliographic records for more than 14,000 books in the NetLibrary into its on-line library catalog, SOPHIA.

When searching SOPHIA, e-book titles may appear. Identifying clues are in the phrase: "[computer file]" in the title, a location of "NetLibrary," a call number ending in the letters "eb" and a status of "EBOOK." Click on the link above the title ("An electronic book accessible through GALILEO; click here"), and that specific e-book in the NetLibrary database should appear.

Titles included in the NetLibrary were selected by SOLINET for the GALILEO project. Many are scholarly works from academic publishers. Some are trade books, such as computer and programming handbooks and other consumer topics. Contact a librarian for help finding, using or navigating within e-books.

## Pakistani Author to lead Writers' Festival

Bapsi Sidhwa, a writer *The New York Times* has called Pakistan's finest English-language novelist, will be keynote speaker at the annual Writers' Festival Wednesday, April 3, and Thursday, April 4. Other authors scheduled to appear are essayist Scott Sanders and poet Marilyn Nelson.

Sidhwa's novel, *Cracking India*, was the basis for the award-winning film *Earth*, released in 1999. It details the upheaval and splintering of cultures that occurred during India's partition in 1947. Told through the eyes of a young girl with polio, the book was praised not only for its vivid story-telling, but also for the lyric quality of the writing. The book was named a *Times'* notable book for 1991, and the later film was also well-reviewed in the United States and abroad.

Sidhwa moved to America in 1983 and obtained her citizenship in the early 1990s. The author of three other novels, she has been writer-in-residence and taught creative writing at universities in the United States and Europe.

Scott Russell Sanders, while primarily known as an essayist, has also written novels, short stories and children's books. His nonfiction has been published in *Audubon*, *Harper's* and the *Utne Reader*. He has served as literary editor of *The Cambridge Review*, and as columnist on new fiction for the *Chicago Sun-Times*. A contributing editor for *Audubon* and an editorial adviser for *Orion*, his work has been performed on National Public Radio. He has taught English at Indiana University since 1971.

Marilyn Nelson is poet laureate of Connecticut and formerly a military brat who is the daughter of a U.S. Air Force serviceman and a teacher. Nelson holds degrees from the University of California-Davis, the University of Pennsylvania and the University of Minnesota. Several of Nelson's books have been finalist for the National Book Award, including *The Fields of Praise* and *The Homeplace*. Her honors and awards include the Pushcart Prize, a Fulbright award and fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts. She teaches English at the University of Connecticut.

Why are some of the world's most famous brands finding themselves on the wrong end of a spray paint bottle or the targets of computer hackers and anti-corporate campaigns? And what does this tell us about the future of our communities and the world we live in?

In her presentation, "No Logo: Taking Aim at the Brand Bullies," author and activist Naomi Klein combines reporting with humorous personal anecdotes to chart the rise of anti-corporate activism and explain why this emerging global movement is a force to be reckoned with.

## Young Actors On Campus For '60s Drama Filming

A sea of teased hair, pumps and letterman jackets transformed a corner of Agnes Scott into a 1965 Baton Rouge, La., high school—for a series pilot in production with hopes of broadcast on The WB Network.

*In My Life* is a "coming-of-age drama that takes place during an extraordinary time in history," said line producer Stephen Lim, who's worked on films such as *The Insider*, *Ferris Bueller's Day Off* and *Wall Street*.

In addition to a small core of actors shooting in Atlanta for about 12 days, the scenes shot here required about 85 extras and gophers, including a few Agnes Scott students. (The shoot occurred during spring break.)

Three scenes were filmed on campus during the course of two days: an outdoor picnic shot on the terrace of Evans Hall and another sequence where Agnes Scott Hall doubled for a Louisiana convent. There, some male characters sneaking down the hallway encountered some very unhappy nuns. On the second day, the crew filmed near the Agnes Scott iron gate that faces Candler Street, for a scene where the boys sneak over the fence into the girls' dorm.

*In My Life* is being made purely on speculation. A decision on whether it will be picked up for broadcast will come in May after it is shown to studio executives, Lim said. Some of the cast and crew have worked with Tony, Emmy and Oscar-winning actors and directors.

The central character is played by Trevor Fehrman (Mac), who rubbed shoulders with some of Broadway's best-known stars—Nathan Lane, Glenn Headley and Joan Plowright during the short-lived TV series, *Encore, Encore*. (This was before Lane began that little musical, *The Producers*.)

Mac's "dream girl" is played by January Jones (Diana St. Croix), a South Dakotan gamely doing a tricky Louisiana accent. "We decided to go for subtle," she said, drinking a Coca-Cola during a five-minute break. Jones has also been attached to some fairly glamorous work, including the upcoming *Full Frontal* by director Steven Soderbergh, which stars among others, Julia Roberts and Blair Underwood.

The plot starts with 14-year-old Mac entering high school on the day it is integrated; armed National Guardsmen are watching over lunch. Max's world includes his ultra-jock brother, captain of the basketball team; his attorney father; and a mother, who's thinking of leaving the house and getting a job.

Director Lesli Glatter also brings some impressive credits, including feature films and acclaimed television dramas such as *NYPD Blue*, *ER*, *Freaks and Geeks* and more recently, the pilot for the critically-acclaimed *Gilmore Girls*, which has been picked up for another season.

On March 22, the Scotties lost a doubleheader to Judson College 7-2 and 9-0. On March 17, the Scotties lost both games of a doubleheader to Wesleyan, 14-1 and 10-1.

In tennis, the Scottie confidence grew March 24, as they won 9-0 for their second victory over the Wesleyan Pioneers this season. The doubles combo of Megan Cornwell '03 and Michelle Mathieson '05 fought hard to grab their sixth victory of the season. Scotties netters dominated their singles competition, winning 72 of 90 games. On March 23, the Scotties' doubles play continued to show improvement against LaGrange as the team easily defeated the Panthers 9-0. Mathieson stepped up her level of play by becoming more consistent in the execution of her shots.

## Johnnetta B. Cole To Speak At Commencement

Seeking to inspire the class of 2002 to continue flying toward the heights of its possibilities, Johnnetta B. Cole, president emerita of Spelman College, will speak May 11 at Agnes Scott College's 113th commencement.

About 188 seniors are expected to receive bachelor's degrees. Six are expected to receive a Master of Arts in Teaching Secondary English.

"I have had deeply meaningful, and I hope for the Agnes Scott community, helpful, conversations about diversity and inclusion issues," Cole said, adding the talks were held last fall at the request of President Mary Brown Bullock '66 and student leaders. "As a result, I have come to know and feel close to individuals in the class of 2002 and to know the class as a group of very special young sisters."

Cole, who retired from Spelman College in 1997, completed her undergraduate studies at Oberlin College and earned her doctorate in anthropology at Northwestern University. She made history in 1987 by becoming the first black woman to serve as president of Spelman College.

The baccalaureate speaker will be Laura Mendenhall, the first female president of the Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur. She has served as pastor of several Presbyterian churches in Texas and Florida. Mendenhall has also served as a missionary in Zaire, Africa.

Mendenhall earned her doctorate from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary and her master's from San Francisco Theological Seminary and Presbyterian School of Christian Education. She received her bachelor's from Austin College.

## Excitement Building for School Year

*Greetings from Atlanta!*

Excitement abounds on campus as we prepare for the new school year and the arrival of the class of 2006. The anticipated class of 245 students is one of the largest in Agnes Scott College history and includes seven Presidential Scholars, the most ever awarded. The number of international students has doubled. These students represent 11 countries, including Ghana, Bangladesh, Bulgaria and Jamaica. In addition to the first-years, about 20 Woodruff Scholars and 15 transfers will begin at Agnes Scott.

Accompanied by faculty members, 33 students traveled to Greece and Cuba through our Global Connections program this summer. Those who went to Cuba were so inspired by their travels they are working on a Web page to document their experiences. A recent graduate, Allison Butt '02, sent back amazing photographs of Greece. You may learn more about both trips on the Agnes Scott Web site.

On campus during the summer, work

has continued on the Byers Tennis Courts, which are nearing completion. Other facilities have undergone major renovation and repair work, including the baths in Main and Inman halls. We are going through the residence halls, including Winship and Walters, upgrading and repairing heating and cooling systems and hot water heaters.

We can't wait to begin a new era in the sciences at Agnes Scott. The new building, set to open in January, is designed to foster excellence in education and research. No longer will students and faculty members have to stop working on experiments when a class needs lab space. Housing psychology, physics, chemistry and biology, the building has state-of-the-art classrooms, informal study spaces, ample student/faculty research labs and a marvelous three-story atrium. It is designed for collaboration, presentations, discussions and problem-solving teamwork.

Once the science building is completed, all that will remain of Phase 1 of the

## Library Web Site Gets New Look

While the campus slowed down during summer break, the McCain Library staff worked on special projects and improvements, including updating Web sites and software.

The library Web site, [library.agnesscott.edu](http://library.agnesscott.edu), was modified to resemble the new College Web site, launched this spring, and to create better functionality. "During the year, we'll be examining other aspects of our Web site organization and planning for more substantial changes," said Ginny Moreland, director of library services.

GALILEO, Georgia's pioneering virtual library, has a new look and features. Databases are grouped into more specific categories, and key resources in each category are highlighted as "Try These First" databases, Moreland said.

In addition, you can now type in a database to go directly to a favorite resource from the GALILEO home page. You may bookmark favorite resources and go directly to them, according to Moreland.

The library staff also finished a major upgrade to the software that runs its automated system, including catalog and circulation. "While most of these changes will happen behind the scenes, users will see more advanced search capabilities and possibly changes to the way we do remote user verification," Moreland said.

### THINGS YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT THE LIBRARY

- You can read, study or surf the Web outdoors on the Reading Terrace.
- The library has movies on videotape and DVD that may be checked out for three days or viewed in media rooms on the ground floor.
- SOPHIA, the online catalog, shows what books, videos, music and periodicals the library has. It also describes and links to more than 14,000 e-books.
- GALILEO is a virtual library with more than 100 databases. Some contain indexes to periodical articles. Many include full text or images of articles. Beyond GALILEO, the library has other electronic resources linked to its Web pages. You can access most licensed electronic resources from residence halls, offices, labs or off campus.
- There are "fun reads" (popular fiction and nonfiction) in the Browsing Collection near the main entrance. They may be checked out.
- There are 10 wireless laptop computers that Agnes Scott students may use in the library. The library also has digital and video cameras that may be checked out for academic projects with a professor's authorization.
- You can renew books online if they are not overdue.
- Interlibrary Loan can get materials from down the street or across the globe. With an Interlibrary Use Card, you may check out books from other nearby college libraries.

## Revised Mission Statement Unveiled

Agnes Scott College unveiled its revised mission statement Aug. 28 during Opening Convocation 2002. Presented by task force chairs Peggy Thompson, Ellen Douglass Leyburn Professor of English, and Calvert Johnson, Charles A. Dana Professor of Music, and Yolanda Robinson '04, the statement was adopted by the Board of Trustees in August.

It states: "Agnes Scott College educates women to think deeply, live honorably and engage the intellectual and social challenges of their times."

"As a quick summary evaluation of this twenty-word mission statement," Thompson said, "I invite you to think of the world around you, both the public and private sectors, and ask yourselves how often you see glib, dishonorable and simplistic solutions to the challenges that we face, and then consider what an important mission Agnes Scott College has reaffirmed for itself and for you."

"This mission statement gives us a lot to live up to, a lot to aspire to, a lot to grow into," Johnson said. "Let's make this a college where the intellectual climate is a natural result of our discussions, and of the manner in which we undertake them."

President Mary Brown Bullock '66 introduced Harriet M. King '64, new Board chair, to students, faculty, staff and the campus community at the opening of the 113<sup>th</sup> year of the College.

"I doubt if we are going to match or surpass Wellesley this year or next in any national reputational rankings," King said, "but if in the next several years, we bring to building the academic program the same energy and commitment that we brought to improving the physical plant, the next chair of the Board will be able to lay legitimate claim to Agnes Scott's being in the very first ranks of liberal arts colleges."

King closed by challenging the campus community—"I want it. You want it. Let's do it."

## Architects Unveil Plan For Chapel

Preliminary architectural renderings and site plans for the new Julia Thompson Smith Chapel, presented to the campus Monday by the lead architect, show the building situated in a dell off the new science building quadrangle.

Planned for the sloping wooded site behind the President's home between Alston Campus Center and the new science building, the chapel will be designed as a building to serve all faiths of the Agnes Scott College community.

"We are still in the evolution of design—making all the components come together," said Markham Smith, principal architect for Smith Dalia Architects, LLC of Atlanta. Smith is not related to the building's namesake.

"We're thinking of the entire site as the College's chapel," Smith said as he described the chapel building, amphitheatre and terrace area planned for the site. "There will be a flow to the site—from the woods on the north side, to the terrace at the front of the chapel and on to the amphitheatre."

As plans stand now, the chapel will anchor the site, with access from the quadrangle by bridge. Visitors will walk into an entrance area offering views into the chapel and outside to the amphitheatre and terrace.

A stairway from this "prefunction" area will lead to the terrace, featuring a large outdoor fireplace at the base of the chapel and a fountain area positioned north of the fireplace. Opposite the rear wall of the exterior fireplace an interior ground-level hearth will warm visitors.

Designed to seat 125 people in chairs, the chapel's flexible interior design will accommodate many kinds of functions. The outdoor amphitheatre will seat more than 300, Smith said.

"We hope to break ground in late spring or early summer following approval by the Board of Trustees," he said. "Construction should take a year to complete."

Cost for the new building has not been finalized, but most of the money will come from a gift by the Hal and John Smith Foundation, organized by her husband and son, in honor of the late Julia Thompson Smith '31.

Agnes Scott College students with health problems that occur after regular Student Health Center hours should seek assistance from residence life staff in the residence halls.

Residence life staff members will contact the resident director on duty, who evaluates the situation to determine the next steps and calls the dean of students' pager if the situation is serious. ## Scottie Volleyball Team Beats Rival Wesleyan College

The Agnes Scott Volleyball team beat conference rival Wesleyan College (30-13, 30-14, 30-15) Sept. 5 for a conference record of 2-1 and overall record of 2-6. The Scotties totaled 13 defensive digs as well as 11 kills and two team blocks in the match.

The Scotties lost to LaGrange College (30-15, 30-17, 30-22) in their first game of The University of the South Invitational, Sept. 6-8. The Scotties lost to Randolph-Macon Woman's College (20-30, 30-25, 30-26, 30-28) and to tournament host Sewanee (30-20, 25-30, 30-21, 30-15).

In the Agnes Scott Invitational tournament Aug. 30-Sept. 2, the Scotties finished 1-3, winning against conference rival Wesleyan in three straight games (30-10, 30-11, 30-19). The Scotties lost to Oglethorpe University (30-14, 30-10, 30-12), tournament champions Methodist College (30-13, 27-30, 30-10, 30-16), and Piedmont College (30-22, 30-17, 30-20).

In soccer, the Scotties beat Converse College 1-0 Sept. 7 for their first win of the season, bringing their record to 1-3. Jill Massie '05 scored her first season goal in the 82nd minute with an assist by Jennifer Cook '06. Goalie Lesley Conrad '04 had five saves in 90 minutes to preserve the shutout.

On Sept. 8, the Scotties lost to Guilford College 1-0 in double overtime despite 11 saves by Conrad. The Scotties lost 5-0 to University of the South Sept. 1. They lost 3-1 to Rhodes College Aug. 30.

In cross country, Megan Morris '05 placed second with a time of 23:58 in the 5K Atlanta Metro Meet Sept 4. Karen Cleland '05 placed 17th with a time of 28:33. Morris also finished second (24:12) in the Scottie Invitational Aug. 30 against LaGrange and Oglethorpe. Cleland finished eighth (28:28) and Nicolette Lee '04 finished ninth (28:55).

Morris finished 70th (24:11) among more than 100 runners in the 5K during the University of South's Cross Country Invitational. Cleland and Lee finished at 26:26 and 26:46, respectively.


## Looking for Signs? Check Out Problem of the Week

## Office of Facilities Energy Conservation and Safety Tips

- **ENERGY:** Dripping faucets overwork the water heater, erode valve seals and often cause ugly sink stains. Completely shut off water after each use.
- **SAFETY:** Hydroplaning occurs when water builds up in front of your tires faster than your car's weight can push it away. The water gets between your tires and the road so it feels like your car is gliding and possibly out-of-control. When hydroplaning, do not slam on the brakes. Take your foot off the pedal and let the car slow down. This allows your tires to reconnect to the pavement gradually and keeps the car from skidding.

### Brady '04 Named Pickering Fellow

Ashley Lorraine Brady '04 has been selected to pursue a career path with U.S. Department of State as a Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellow. Brady is an international relations major.

"This represents a remarkable achievement for Ashley," President Mary Brown Bullock '66 said. "Only 20 students in the nation are selected annually for this program. Ashley has demonstrated an outstanding record of achievement, and this accomplishment really expands that account."

The fellowship is named for Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering, a career diplomat and former U.S. undersecretary of state, who retired in January 2001. Students named to the Pickering Fellowship are prepared academically and professionally to enter the Foreign Service with the State Department.

The Pickering fellowship provides tuition for the junior and senior years of undergraduate studies and for the first year of graduate school, a living stipend, mandatory fees related to studies, reimbursement for books, round-trip travel between home and school once each year and significant training for her U.S. Foreign Service career. Students attend graduate schools affiliated with the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, which administers the Pickering Fellowship. The graduate school provides financial assistance for the student to complete her second year of graduate studies.

"I received the call that I was a finalist during finals week last semester, and had to fly to Washington to do the interviews," Brady said. "That was tough to be away at such a critical time, but apparently, the interviews went well."

"When I received the message, all I heard was 'Congratulations,' and I hung up the phone and started calling my family," she said. "But from the time I applied, I prayed about it a lot. Once I got the fellowship, I immediately realized it was a tremendous blessing."

As part of her career development training, Brady will participate in annual orientations in Washington, D.C., complete two paid internships with the Department of State and receive guidance from a Foreign Service officer mentor during her graduate studies. When she completes her graduate degree, Brady will enter the Foreign Service for a minimum commitment of four years.

## Do The Diet Math: Count Grams of Fat in Evans Hall

One of Patty's favorite reasons for choosing Agnes Scott College is the wonderful food served in Evans Hall. Best of all is that most of the fine foods served come with nutritional information. In particular, information on calories, sodium and fat are given.

For some reason, Patty put herself on a special diet where, at lunch, she must consume at least 100 grams of fat, 440 milligrams of cholesterol, and 3,289 milligrams of sodium. ("If having a lot of fats in your diet weren't important," she reasoned, "then they wouldn't be at the top of the food pyramid.")

Today, Patty has to pick a meal consisting of fried chicken, which has 20 grams of fat, 136 milligrams of cholesterol and 439 milligrams of sodium per serving, and hamburger pizza, which has 10 grams of fat, 28 milligrams of cholesterol and 493 milligrams of sodium per serving. How many servings of each should Patty consume to achieve her fat, cholesterol, and sodium allotments while minimizing calories? (Keep in mind that it is possible to have fractional servings in your answer, though Pete Miller, food services director, does insist you eat what you take.)

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## Living Wage Teach-In Draws Hundreds

Students and faculty working with the Living Wage Campaign staged a teach-in Sept. 16 to raise awareness and garner support for establishing a \$10.50 an hour base for Agnes Scott College workers.

More than a movement to raise the federal minimum wage, the campaign encourages employers to pay all employees enough to support themselves and their families working no more than 40 hours a week.

Several hundred students, faculty and staff members attended the daylong teach-in.

Presentations included the purpose of the campaign, what other colleges are doing and the economic affects of implementing a living wage. Panelists included Julia Lentini '02, Sarah Gillooly '03, who have conducted research on living wage issues, Emory University and Morehouse College students, Columbia Theological Seminary representatives and Atlanta 9 to 5 representatives.

### Precision Results in Chaos In *The Memorandum*

When an organization institutes the use of a scientifically created synthetic language to make office communications more precise, anything but precision occurs.

Chaos and hilarity become the order of the day in Vaclav Havel's *The Memorandum*, presented as part of the ASC Cultural Events Series "Journeys."

Watch for surprise performances around campus as the Blackfriars preview the opening of their 87<sup>th</sup> season with scenes from the play, an offering that is both timely and timeless. Performances of *The Memorandum* are scheduled for Oct. 25-27 and Nov. 1-3.

In an era of economic uncertainty and corporate scandal, *The Memorandum* offers a particularly appropriate look at the glaring inefficiencies and misplaced priorities to often evident in the workplace. The struggles for power, position and prestige—not to mention sanity—create a series of situations that range from farcical to poignant. Simultaneously, the play has applications for many situations. Although Havel (now president of the Czech Republic) wrote the play as a satire on governmental bureaucracies in the former Czechoslovakia, his work resonates as an exploration of the downside of organizational communication.

Anyone who has ever worked for a bitter boss, fought for change, dealt with office politics or had trouble navigating layers of administration will find something familiar in this play.

### Keightley Lecture Set for Oct. 30

David N. Keightley, professor emeritus of Chinese history from the University of California-Berkeley, will lecture on "Death and the Birth of Civilizations: Ancestors, Art and Culture in Early China and Early Greece" at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Oct. 30, in Evans Hall, Conference Rooms A and B.

"The talk provides a comparative discussion of the ways in which ancestors and death were represented, both artistically and theologically in two of the world's great classical civilizations," said Keightley. "It explores some of the ways in which certain stylistic choices involving death and religion may be linked to the general development of civilization in early China and early Greece."

After working in New York City as a free-lance writer, Keightley decided he wanted to be "on one of the frontiers of our time," and be a free-lance writer about China. To do this he needed to learn Chinese, so he earned his doctorate in Chinese history from Columbia University.

President Mary Brown Bullock '66 has called him "one of the nation's foremost authorities on Chinese archeology, early Chinese history and comparative ancient history." Bullock worked with Keightley during the 1980s.

He has written several articles and reviews on China and three books, including *Sources of Shang History: The Oracle-Bone Inscriptions of Bronze Age China* and *The Ancestral Landscape: Time, Space, and Community In Late Shang China (ca. 1200-1045 B.C.)*. Keightley was named a fellow to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

His wife, Vannie Traylor Keightley, graduated in 1956 from Agnes Scott College with a bachelor's degree in history and is excited to return to campus. "After over 40 years, I expect to see changes in the school and in me," she said.

Moving out of his campus office after retirement, Keightley donated his collection of 855 English language books on China to Agnes Scott. "I knew she [Bullock] was hoping to develop the study of China at the College," Keightley said of his gift to McCain Library. "It sounded as if the books would be used if they went to Agnes Scott. I wanted them to find a good home."

The collection, which includes *The Future of China: After Mao* by Ross Terrill and *Conflict and Control in Late Imperial China* edited by Frederic Wakeman Jr. and Carolyn Grant, has been integrated into the library. "Since I am teaching on China this year, I have been browsing the stacks and see how useful his collection is," Bullock said.

## Century Club Kicks Off Exercise Program for Campus Community

The Century Club is an exercise encouragement program for students, faculty and staff. To join, all you need to do is sign up and record your aerobic exercise miles weekly on one of the tracking sheets.

The miles are calculated on a weekly basis with an equivalency adjustment system. One mile of walking, running, rowing, treadmill, elliptical trainer or stair master equals one mile. One mile of swimming (1,500 meters) equals five miles. Four miles of biking (road or stationary bike) equals one mile. There is no minimum mileage requirement.




## Go Territorial with Math Problem of the Week

Consider the map of six territories shown at right. Suppose you want to color the map in such a way that whenever two territories share a border their colors are different. (Territories do not share a boundary if they only share one point—for example Colorado and Arizona.) It can be shown that you




need to use four colors to do this—one way is shown at left.

In fact, it can be shown that *any* map or globe with connected political boundaries (not like Michigan, for example) can be colored in this way using four colors. Because of this we say the rectangle and the sphere are four-colorable.



Ants have colonized the surface of a plain doughnut. The Carpenter Ants, Army Ants, Fire Ants, Formica Ants and Thief Ants each have formed their own (connected) state. Show that, depending on the location of boundaries, the ant-infested doughnut might not be four-colorable.

## Symposium on Kashmir Set for Nov. 7-8

*Agar Firdaus ba-ru-e-zamin ast, hamin ast o, hamin ast o, hamin ast.*

*If there is a Paradise on earth, it is here, it is here, it is here.*—Jehangir

The Indo-Pakistan Subcontinent is one of the more politically troubled areas of the world. With the long-standing dispute over Kashmir between India and Pakistan and their recently acquired nuclear capability, the recurrent cycles of military engagement and political crisis acquire only a more foreboding aspect.

Indeed, the two countries have fought two full-fledged wars for control of the region and one more limited in scope. The dispute continues to taint their relationship and unravels all attempts at developing cooperative ventures in social, economic and cultural spheres on a long-term basis.

Religious extremism thrives on both sides of the border. Against this background, only a few months ago the state of high military alert and the massing of troops by the two countries on the Kashmir front presented an intimidating specter of a nuclear conflagration that shook nations of the world to a sudden state of consciousness of the potential fallout.

This last detail underscores the interdependency and interconnectedness of all regions and peoples of the world. And there is a real threat that the violence that is restricted at this time to critical flashpoints of regional conflicts may escalate and expand to cause even more widespread damage.

The world needs, therefore, to pay attention to it and help in the process of peaceful resolution. It is a sign of Agnes Scott's commitment to moral and academic excellence that it is providing a symposium on Kashmir for the community that constitutes and supports the College to learn more about one of these critical flashpoints. The symposium is part of the Global Perspectives: Lectures on Issues Surrounding Globalization series and Cultural Events Series.

Three top scholars in the field, professors Sumit Ganguly, Ayesha Jalal and Robert Wirsing, along with a Jammu and Kashmir Liberation Front activist, Usman Ahmad, will meet at Agnes Scott for two days, Thursday, Nov. 7, and Friday, Nov. 8, to present their individual appraisal of the situation as it exists today in Kashmir: the nature of the dispute, the possibility of a resolution of disagreements and options and avenues of development for the future.

They will then engage in a serious dialogue over their varying perceptions in a panel discussion that will showcase not only their disagreements but also their readiness and resilience in trying to resolve them. Apart from its educative value, which, with the presence of scholars of such stature cannot at all be underestimated, it is this willingness of ideologically and politically differentiated parties to engage in a conversation over disputes that distinguishes the event, and it is the latter that needs to be supported wholeheartedly rather than the building up of walls of silence, mistrust and hatred.

The epigraph at the head of this piece reproduces a famous couplet from the 17th century Moghul Emperor Jehangir. Quotations from travelers, visitors and romantically inclined members of invading hordes from all parts of the world attesting to this simple fact can be found aplenty in the annals of Kashmir. But this beautiful land has seldom, if ever, been a paradise for its inhabitants, who have suffered great misery and injury at the hands of local as well as foreign rulers over the last two thousand years or so.

The symposium on Kashmir will perhaps help us to register this ironic play of history and appreciate at the same time the rich diversity, creative spirit and courage of its people in the face of their unmitigated suffering over the ages. —Waqas Khwaja, assistant professor of English

## President Receives Visionary Leadership Award

President Mary Brown Bullock '66 received one of the first Elisabeth Luce Moore Visionary Leadership Awards at an October event to benefit the China Institute.

"I am pleased and honored to be invited to be among the first group of women to receive this award," Bullock said. "Elisabeth Luce Moore's life always has been an inspiration to me."

Two other women, Lulu Wang, philanthropist and chair of Tupelo Capital Management, and Mimi Gardner Gates, director of the Seattle Art Museum also accepted the awards.

Established in 1926, the China Institute in America is a nonprofit, nonpartisan educational and cultural institution promoting the understanding, appreciation and enjoyment of traditional and contemporary Chinese civilization, culture and heritage and provides a cultural and historical context for understanding contemporary China.

Early in her career, Moore served as an editor at *Time* and *Fortune* magazines, both founded by her brother, Henry R. Luce. She was also a founding member of the New York Women's Foundation, a chair of the national board of the YWCA and was the first woman appointed as chair of the State University of New York. Moore died Feb. 9, at age 98.

"I first met Beth around 1980, about the time of her first trip back to China," Bullock said. "Over the years, our joint membership on the United Board (for Christian Education in Asia) led me to appreciate her insight into both higher education and the Christian enterprise in Asia."

Both Bullock and Moore were the daughters of Presbyterian missionaries in Asia. A 1966 Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Agnes Scott, Bullock received her master's degree in 1968 and her doctorate in 1973—both in Chinese history from Stanford University.

From 1988 to 1995, Bullock served as director of the Asia Program at The Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington, D.C., and was a professorial lecturer at The Johns Hopkins University School for Advanced International Studies (SAIS). From 1977 to 1988, she was director, and from 1973 to 1977, professional associate of the Committee on Scholarly Communication with the People's Republic of China, an organization sponsored by the American Council of Learned Societies, Social Science Research Council and National Academy of Sciences.

## ALTAN to Perform Saturday Evening

From fast and furious reels and jigs to the most touching old Irish songs and ballads, ALTAN's award-winning recordings encompass the breadth of Irish music. The group will perform at 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 16, in Presser Hall, Gaines Chapel.

Since its last visit to Agnes Scott, ALTAN has released *The Blue Idol*, an album attesting to the band's belief that Irish traditional music is really modern music.

"On *The Blue Idol*," said Michael Simmons, editorial reviewer for Amazon.com, "Irish music superstars ALTAN have come up with an elegant solution to the problem of how to play music that satisfies both the traditional purist and the fan, who wants a contemporary edge in his or her music."

In 1996, ALTAN, named after a deep and mysterious lake behind Errigal Mountain in County Donegal, Ireland, became the first Irish band of its kind to join a major label when it signed with Virgin Records. Although the band has garnered commercial success from its international tours and 10 albums, ALTAN remains committed to its original ideals to bring the power and beauty of Irish traditional music to audiences worldwide.

"ALTAN is a highly accomplished traditional band that somehow manages to have a hauntingly modern sound," said Christine Cozzens, associate professor of English. "Once you hear them play, you'll know their distinctive sound anywhere. You'll find yourself leaping to your feet to dance and sing along, as did the sellout audience in Gaines on their last visit to the College."

The new album features renditions of "Daily Growing," "The Pretty Young Girl," "Comb Your Hair and Curl It," and the reel "Gweebarra Bridge." The Billboard review called *The Blue Idol*, which debuted at No. 15 on the world music chart when released in February, "a work of genius. Everything that's appealing, powerful and musically special about Irish music is contained in these 13 tracks."

## Komungo Master to Show Artistry on Ancient Instrument

Jin Hi Kim demonstrates her mastery of the komungo, a large six-string instrument dating from fourth-century Korea, through exploration of ancient and contemporary themes during a concert at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 20, in Presser Hall, Maclean Auditorium.

Kim will give an audio-visual presentation on Korean court and folk music at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 19, in Presser Hall, Maclean Auditorium.

Critics credit Kim with increasing accessibility to a musical instrument traditionally performed by male Confucian scholars for their meditation and in the courts of early Korean royalty. The only music other than Kim's composed for the komungo is *Sanjo*, a long folk-style virtuoso piece based on six rhythmic cycles moving from slow to fast.

"As a master performer, Jin Hi Kim creates a completely new context for the komungo," said Tracey Laird, assistant professor of music. "And Ms. Kim's compositions, which have won her international acclaim, create new musical spaces where ancient and modern, Eastern and Western aesthetics come together successfully."

Kim's compositions during the past 20 years represent an evolution of the komungo into the 21st century. She has created a wide array of solo compositions, has collaborated with Western contemporary classical and jazz musicians and has worked with computer experts to develop the world's only electric komungo.

The Jin Hi Kim lecture and concert are made possible through support from the Decatur-based James and Ella Rather Kirk Fund and the Korea Society based in New York City.


Her house is exactly 50 feet north of Insanely Straight River, which runs west to east. She is 100 feet north of the river, and there is 200 feet of riverbed between her and her

## Woodruff Scholar First Woman to Cross Finish Line in Marathon

Running in the Atlanta Marathon Thanksgiving Day was not her idea. But that didn't stop Woodruff Scholar Phyllis Hines Tuggle '05 from being the first woman to cross the finish line in 2 hours, 59 minutes and 44 seconds.

"It's my brother-in-law's fault," said Tuggle, who is also the most celebrated female cyclist in Georgia. "We've run marathons in the past. It sounded like a good idea at the time. Then he claimed to have a foot injury though there was no limping that I could see.

"My husband couldn't train as much as he needed to so he ran the half marathon," said Tuggle, a silver and bronze medalist at the cycling World Championships. "I've run faster in marathons years ago, but I was in the ballpark time-wise for a tough course."

The Atlanta course is a difficult one, especially when considering the last five miles are literally uphill, Tuggle said. "I slowed down dramatically at that point. I lost about 45 seconds a mile."

Tuggle said she didn't see another woman the whole race. "I tried to chat with a guy at one point, but I think he was more into the race than I was."

Fortunately for Tuggle, her husband's family pitched in and helped with Thanksgiving dinner so all she had to do after the race was put her dressing and family bird in the oven and head upstairs for a nap.

A religious studies and German major, Tuggle returned to school because not finishing had bothered her since she left Vanderbilt University in 1982. She also wanted to be able to prove education is important to her children, Paden, 5, and Helen, 8.

"I didn't want my children to say 'if education is so important, why didn't you finish college,'" Tuggle said. "I am so happy here. I love it. I look forward to it on the days I come to school." —*Wendy Cromwell*

## Elizabeth Wilson, Constance Curry '55 to Speak at Martin Luther King Jr. Convocation

Elizabeth Wilson, mayor emerita of Decatur, and Constance Curry '55, author, historian and civil rights activist, will be the speakers during the Martin Luther King Jr. Convocation at 10 a.m., Friday, Jan. 24 in Presser Hall.

In November 1984, Wilson became the first African-American to serve on the City Commission of Decatur. In October 1993, she became the first African-American to serve as Decatur's mayor.

When she stepped down after five years of service, new Mayor Bill Floyd said, "Elizabeth, this city owes you a debt of gratitude it can never repay. This city is a better place and we are better because our paths have crossed... You gave it your heart."

In 2000, Wilson was inducted into the Municipal Government Hall of Fame, which honors municipal officers who exemplify the best in public service and who, throughout their careers, made extraordinary contributions to their communities and Georgia's cities. She has received more than 25 community service awards.

In May 2000, a bronze statute titled *Celebration* was purchased by the citizens of Decatur and dedicated to Wilson in honor of her service to the city.

During her college years in the 1950s, Curry became involved in the National Student Association and its work for integration. After studying abroad as a Fulbright scholar and at Columbia University Graduate School, she returned to Atlanta in 1960 to work for the NSA in human relations and was the first white woman appointed to the executive committee of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

From 1964 until 1975, as a Southern field representative for the American Friends Service Committee, Curry worked with black families on school desegregation and with community groups on voter registration and economic development. She earned her law degree in 1984 from Woodrow Wilson College of Law and served as director of human services for the City of Atlanta from 1975-1990.

She has written an award-winning book about the Civil Rights Movement, *Silver Rights* (1995), in addition to *The Fire Ever Burning* (2000). She edited and wrote a chapter in *Deep in Our Hearts: Nine White Women in the Freedom Movement* (2000) and helped Winson Hudson on her autobiography, *Mississippi Harmony*. —Kristin Kallaber '04

## Jack Kent Cooke Scholarships Nominations Needed

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Scholarship program is seeking applicants for the 2003-04 academic year.

In order to be considered for the scholarships, students must be nominated by their college. The deadline for applications to the foundation is Feb. 1.

The scholarship provides funding for tuition, room and board, fees and books for the remainder of the scholar's undergraduate degree. Award amounts vary for each recipient based on his or her institution. Awards cannot exceed \$30,000 annually. Scholarship money not used during the academic year is not transferrable to the next year. Scholarships are renewable if the student continues to excel academically and to meet the program's requirements.

To be eligible, a student must be enrolled in an accredited four-year college in the United States, be a junior during the fall 2003 term and have a 3.0 cumulative GPA or higher. ## Public Safety Steps Up Parking Enforcement on Campus

Since Dec. 2, the Department of Public Safety has begun increasing the level of parking enforcement on campus because of repeated infractions and numerous vehicles on campus without required parking decals.

The stricter enforcement of parking regulations will include parking tickets in all areas for infractions and the towing of vehicles for multiple violations when compliance with regulations is not met.

"Ignorance of campus regulations is not an excuse considering all vehicles should be registered and are issued parking regulations upon purchase of a decal," said Henry Hope, director of public safety.

Fines include \$10 for the first citation. The second offense is \$25, and the third offense is \$50. Anyone who receives a

ticket has 10 working days to appeal in writing to the Parking Appeals committee via the Department of Public Safety or 30 days in which to pay the fine to the Office of Accounting.

Anyone failing to pay the fine or appeal it will be restricted from parking on campus until the fine is paid. The vehicle is subject to impoundment at the registrant's expense any time the vehicle is on campus. Any vehicle receiving three or more citations in a given academic year will be impounded.

Students with unpaid fines will not be permitted to register for the next term or receive a diploma, transcript of record or official grades.

Copies of the regulations are available through the Department of Public Safety.

## Department of Public Safety Changes Temporary Card Policy

The Department of Public Safety issues a temporary ID card for 72 hours for students, faculty and staff. This card must be brought back during office hours to purchase a replacement ID card. Those who do not return the card within five days of issuance will be charged a \$15 replacement fee for the temporary card.
