Energy Conservation

Congratulations to our faculty, students and staff! Our energy conservation measures were effective during September such that our electrical demand was reduced by 9.1%. More transatically, our consumption was down 30.3% since September, 1982. We had expected that our demand would go down due to Inman being out of service and the energy efficient light fixtures we installed. Of the 9.1% reduction, seven (7) percentage points of it, or 77%, was due to Inman and light fixture changes.

Our savings due to conservation measures beyond Inman and lighting will net the College about \$2,000 during the year. Since our consumption was down significantly our effort was not wasted. To celebrate this fact, and to help keep us sensitive to this issue, the Vice President for Business Affairs will appoint a three member committee of a faculty representative, a staff representative and a student representative to solicit ideas and choose the best one on how to spend one-half of our current estimated savings. For this year, therefore, we will allocate \$1,000 to be spent in a fashion deemed by the Committee to be most appropriate. The range of ideas can be as diverse as a celebration party for the campus as a whole, or to fund some particularly meaningful project. The Committee will announce the winning idea(s) in the Weekly Calendar.
