# Actions of the Board of Trustees - January 17, 1986

The Board of Trustees, acting on a recommendation from President Schmidt who had consulted with representatives of the various constituencies of the College, confirmed the appointment of Acting Dean Gue P. Hudson as Dean of Students, effective January 17, 1986.

The Board adopted the following resolution:

That the Board of Trustees of Agnes Scott College is opposed to apartheid as practiced in South Africa and endorses the Sullivan Principles;

That the Board believes that the investment policy of the College must address not only South Africa but broader issues of social responsibility;

That the Board believes that the social responsibility of a company is reflected in the investment quality of a company so that the investment policy of the Board is in fact a policy which requires investment only in socially responsible companies;

That the Board commends the students of Agnes Scott College for their expression of concern about apartheid;

That the Board is concerned that the College community continues to evidence its commitment to moral values in every aspect of the life of the College and desires to maintain a dialogue within the community that will provide a high level of community consciousness of moral issues; and

That the Student Affairs Committee of the Board is hereby directed to meet with appropriate student representatives to communicate the contents of this resolution, to establish an appropriate vehicle to express the College's opposition to the apartheid of South Africa, and to explore ways in which to encourage continued consciousness of moral values in the Agnes Scott Community.

The Board of Trustees, acting on the report of the architects (Taylor Anderson) and the endorsement of that report by the Centennial Campus Committee and the Buildings and Grounds Committee of the Board, has authorized the construction of a new Physical Activities Center to be built near the new track and the renovation of the Infirmary and Gymnasium into a Campus Center.

The Physical Activities Center will include a 6 or 8 lane pool, regulation basketball court and stands, lockers for women and men, mechanical room, weight and training rooms, faculty and ticket offices, etc.

The Campus Center will house a snack bar, TV lounge and game room, chapel and chaplain's office, racquetball courts, mini gym/gymnastics, lockers, dance studio and offices, weight and training rooms, classrooms, etc.


