BERNICE KING TO SPEAK AT MLK CONVOCATION

Opening convocation for spring semester will be at 10:25 a.m., Wednesday, Jan. 20, in Gaines Auditorium. Student attendance is required.

Held in celebration of the national Martin Luther King, Jr., holiday, the convocation is sponsored by the President's Committee on Community Diversity. It will feature the Rev. Bernice King, the youngest daughter of the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., as speaker. There will also be performances by Joyful Noise and ASC artist affiliate Sharon Willis.

A graduate of Spelman College and Emory University, King aims to integrate her legal, psychological and theological training by incorporating pastoral counseling into juvenile prison ministry. She is now working with Active Ministers Engaged in Nurturing (AMEN), which is an organization currently involved in the use of wholistic ministry to address the needs of juvenile delinquents.

The convocation marks the beginning of a semester-long emphasis on lives of conscience that will continue Jan. 27-29 with the Board of Trustees Faith and Learning Committee's symposium focusing on Dietrich Bonhoeffer. The symposium will include a biographical film on Bonhoeffer's life, a one-man play featuring Bonhoeffer's prison experiences, and a panel of students discussing their own lives and the call of conscience. The entire campus community is invited to all these events.

MAIER PROMOTED TO DIRECTOR OF COMPUTING SERVICES

Thomas L. Maier was promoted to director of computing services effective Dec. 31, 1992. Maier has served as acting director of the department since it was formed on Aug. 14, 1992, when the departments of academic computing and administrative computing were combined.

MAT PROGRAM RECEIVES ACCREDITATION

Agnes Scott College has been accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) to award the Master of Arts in Teaching Secondary English. The accreditation is retroactive to Jan. 1, 1992.

GLOBAL AWARENESS TO VISIT JAPAN AND RUSSIA IN 1993-1994

Plan now to enroll in one of the two exciting Global Awareness Programs to be offered during the next academic year. The countries to be studied during the fall and spring semesters and visited in January are Russia and Japan. Survival language skills will be taught. Detailed information and applications will be distributed in mid-March. Applications, which must be accompanied by a \$100 non-refundable application fee, will be accepted beginning April 1.

STEERING COMMITTEE ANNOUNCES ISSUES UNDER CONSIDERATION DURING SELF-STUDY

The Steering Committee for the Self-Study for Reaccreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools is pleased to report that the work of the principal committees, as well as that of the Steering Committee, is moving forward rapidly. Many issues have been identified and are being addressed by the committees. The Steering Committee is considering a number of important questions such as:

- Should the convocation hour be eliminated or changed?
- Should the distributional requirements for a degree be increased?
- Should there be periodic evaluation of the President and College officers by faculty, administrative staff and students?
- Should the College adopt a family leave policy for employees?
- Do the College's publications accurately reflect the College?
- Should the classroom furnishings be upgraded?

The Committee expects to make recommendations and suggestions on these and other issues and welcomes ideas and opinions.

Questionnaires have been developed by the Steering Committee for faculty, students and staff. The Committee is in the process of distributing these survey forms. All members of the Agnes Scott community are urged to participate in the Self-Study by completing a questionnaire.

The Steering Committee also invites the community to voice opinions, concerns and suggestions during an open hearing at 10:25 a.m., Jan. 22 at Scotland Yard. Written comments may be addressed to "Self-Study" and placed in the campus mail at any time.

"LIVES OF CONSCIENCE" EMPHASIS CONTINUES

Local audiences will have a unique chance to step back into history on Jan. 28 when *The End, The Beginning of Life: The Prison Experiences of Dietrich Bonhoeffer*, plays at 7:30 p.m. in Winter Theatre. This one-person play is part of the College's 1993 emphasis on "Lives of Conscience" which began with the MLK convocation Jan. 20.

Bonhoeffer was a distinguished German Protestant theologian who was martyred by the Nazis at a concentration camp in Flossburg, Germany, in April 1945. His many books, including *Letters and Papers in Prison*, have been an inspiration to Christians in Europe and around the world.

The performance will be followed by a discussion of the play by Shannon and playwright David W. Newton.

On the preceding night at 7:30 p.m., Jan. 27, in Buttrick, G-4, the College will show the film *The Life and Times of Dietrich Bonhoeffer*. Both presentations are free of charge.

During community hour on Friday, Jan. 29, a panel discussion on lives of conscience will be led by Malikah Berry, Tara Spuhler, Alianna Siddiqui and Jeanne Peters in Woltz Reception Room.

RENOWNED COMPOSER TO VISIT AGNES SCOTT

Michael J. Smith, national composer of Sweden, will be in residence at Agnes Scott College Jan. 25-29. A concert at 8:15 p.m., Wednesday, Jan. 27, in Gaines Auditorium will premier Smith's composition entitled *Myth and Reality - Study #4: An Homage to Woman* written for piano, Kurzweil and Proteus synthesizers and an IBM computer.

Smith is a world-recognized composer/performer who works with traditional and electronic instruments in both classical and jazz formats. There are over 43 recordings of his works already in existence and he recently performed in Kassel, Germany, to an audience of 60,000. In 1986 Smith entered into a research program with the IBM Corporation and the Roland Corporation of Scandinavia to compose realtime with computer composition software. In addition to the concert, Smith will give a public lecture on Tuesday, Jan. 26, and a master class on Thursday, Jan. 28.

WOMEN'S HOUSE PROJECT TO BEGIN THIS SPRING

Agnes Scott is part of a coalition of 10 women's organizations dedicated to building a Habitat for Humanity house this spring. The house will be built entirely by women working alongside the single mother who, in April, will move into the home with her children. Construction will take place on 10 Saturdays from Feb. 6 through April 17. Each Saturday, Agnes Scott will provide four volunteers to spend the day building with women from other organizations.

REP COUNCIL HOLDS MEETING ON CURRENT CROSS CONSTITUENCY PROCEDURES AND PROPOSED CHANGES

Rep Council is having an open forum at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 2, in Woltz Reception Room. This forum will address students' concerns about the existing cross constituency grievance procedure. Please try to attend. This concerns everyone in the ASC community. The following are the proposed changes from Rep Council:

WHEREAS: Students believe that the Cross Constituency procedure is inadequate in its existing form, and

WHEREAS: Due to lack of faith, students are unwilling to utilize the existing procedure to address personal issues of harassment and discrimination, and

WHEREAS: A trusted procedure is necessary to ensure a just environment in which students can function freely.

WHEREAS: Students believe the procedure is inconsistent in that the most powerful person in the process, namely the president, is exempt from its jurisdiction.

BE IT RESOLVED: that the Representative Council of the Student Government Association proposes the following changes to the Cross Constituency procedure:

1. If a student is appealing a grade or refuting an Honor Court accusation based on grounds of discrimination through both Academic Standards or Honor Court and Cross Constituency, the outcome of the grade appeals process and/or that of Honor Court must be postponed until the outcome of the Cross Constituency case is final. The final outcome will be allowed as evidence in either the grade appeals or the Honor Court case.

2. When four mediators are elected each year from each constituency, an additional person will also be elected from each constituency. This person's sole responsibility will be to work with the three other similarly elected persons to review the confidential log and look for harmful patterns of discrimination that may have developed during the year or over a series of years. If the panel deems it necessary, initiation of dismissal procedures will be recommended.

3. Those chosen to be on the formal panel will be required to go through training for this position. This training will include a workshop dealing with the definition and recognition of discrimination and the legal policies of Agnes Scott College as related to expected academic and professional conduct (i.e. dismissal policies, academic freedom, etc.)

4. In the process of choosing a third person for the formal panel, each party is permitted to a second strike from the remaining pool of four (after each party has chosen one panelist.) Afterward, the third person will not be chosen but randomly drawn from the remaining two. Furthermore, there is no need for this person to be given the title of "chair," as there are no responsibilities required of this person beyond those of the other two panel members.

5. All information recorded during the formal hearings will be destroyed at the end of the case with only an official log being kept on file. This log will contain the names of the panel members, the names of the accuser and the accused, the verdict, and the recommended sanctions. Furthermore, only the information contained within the log will be presented to the appropriate persons when further action is necessary. The responsibility of the panel regarding that particular case will terminate with the understanding that the information discussed during the hearing will remain confidential. The involved panel members are not to be questioned further about the case.

6. The President will be relieved of her duties as the final judge of the entire procedure. In her place, we recommend that the proposed Director of Multi-Cultural Affairs assume this responsibility.

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF A TORNADO

Once again the tornado season (February-June) has arrived in Georgia. The Department of Public Safety monitors the National Weather Service on police communications system. Once the department receives information from the National Weather Service about either a tornado watch or tornado warning the following steps will be taken:

1. When metro Atlanta is identified as a "watch" area, the Department of Public Safety will notify the dean of students and begin notifying residence halls by the way of senior residents, resident directors and hostesses, if on duty. During normal business hours, administrative offices will be advised of the "watch" and asked to pass the information on.
2. If DeKalb County is placed in a "warning" status, the Department of Public Safety will activate the emergency call list to appropriate areas. One officer will circulate campus in a patrol car with the siren activated. Other officers will move throughout the buildings, advising persons to move to the lowest level and to stay away from windows.
3. When the "warning" has been lifted for this area officers will begin building to building notification, since it is very likely that the power will be out due to the storm. Please do not leave an area until there is official notification by either television, radio or an officer that the "warning" has lifted.

In preparation for severe weather, the Department of Public Safety encourages each office area to keep a flashlight and a battery-operated portable radio on-hand (both with fresh batteries).

There has been much in the news recently about the sexual and physical abuse of women in Georgia's prisons. Two hundred accusations of abuse have been made by current or recent female inmates against prison staff members.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY UPDATES CAMPUS CRIME STATISTICS

The Agnes Scott College Department of Public Safety is a state-authorized law enforcement agency. The department is a service-oriented organization with the primary function of protecting life and property on the Agnes Scott College campus and in the surrounding neighborhood (jurisdiction extends 500 yards beyond the boundaries of the college, O.C.G.A. 20-8-2). Officers are state-certified and have had experience in a variety of other departments such as Decatur, Atlanta and DeKalb County.

Since becoming a state certified law enforcement agency in 1983, the ASC Department of Public Safety has reported campus crime statistics to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) (O.C.G.A. 35-3-36). The GBI sends this information to the FBI (O.C.G.A. 35-3-33) which uses it in the U.S. Department of Justice Uniform Crime Report for the nation. According to the Campus Security Act of 1990, all institutions receiving federal funds will be required to compile, publish and distribute this information beginning September 1, 1992. To comply with federal law, the statistics, as well as appropriate policies and procedures, have been published twice during the academic year to the campus community in the College newsletter, *Campus Connection*. DNA LECTURE GIVEN BY UGA PROFESSOR

The department of biology will sponsor a talk by Professor Wyatt Anderson of the department of genetics, University of Georgia, on "DNA Fingerprinting." 

AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE RECEIVES TWO BEQUESTS

Agnes Scott College has received over \$300,000 in funds from the estates of two alumnae, Dr. Marion Mathews '34 and Julia Mulliss Wyer '29.

Dr. Mathews died on Jan. 4, 1992, leaving Agnes Scott College \$103,845. While at Agnes Scott, she was named a member of Phi Beta Kappa and graduated with a degree in chemistry. She received her M.S. from Emory in 1935 and her M.D. from the Medical College of Georgia in 1940. She became an assistant professor of medicine at the Medical College of Georgia in 1945. In 1952, she became an instructor in the University of Maryland's Department of Psychiatry. By 1966, she had a private practice in psychiatry in Baltimore.

Julia Mullis Wyer died in January 1992 leaving the College nearly \$229,000. She graduated from Agnes Scott College with a degree in English and was married to William Wyer, secretary and treasurer of the Missouri Pacific Railroad Company. Mrs. Wyer was a retired secretary.

From Covington, Ga., comes Susan Molinaro, whose mother and grandmother graduated in the classes of 1964 and 1934, respectively. Molinaro's great-grandmother was also educated at Agnes Scott Institute prior to 1906 when the institution was accredited as a college.

POLITICAL SATIRIST MARK RUSSELL PERFORMS SEPT. 25 IN GAINES

With a plethora of material and wit, Mark Russell, a political satirist, parodies current political headlines on Sept. 25. Russell's performance, titled "The Laughter and Song of Politics," begins at 8:15 p.m. in Gaines Auditorium.

Nearing 20 years as a political satirist on PBS, Russell began as a piano-playing jokester in the smoke-filled bars of Washington, D.C., singing his songs to sailors on leave. When he got a job at a Capitol Hill bar where Congressmen go to drink, the first thing he thought was "I've started at the bottom but I've managed to work my way down."

IV. Availability:

EXHIBIT OF POLISH WORKS ON DISPLAY IN DANA

An exhibit of the graphic works of Bronislaw Bak and prints from various Polish artists will be exhibited through Oct. 3 in the Dalton Gallery. "Bronislaw Bak" and "Prints from Cracow: An Exhibition of Polish Printmakers" is the first exhibit of the year in Dalton Gallery.

Born in Poland, Bak moved his wife and family to America in 1952 after seven years as a prisoner of war in Germany. He opened Studio 22 in Chicago in the late 60s then taught printmaking at what is now Georgia Southern University in Statesboro, Ga., until his death in 1981. Bak's work has been described as ranging from mild to stinging, yet he has attacked social ills while revealing universally engaging art. This traveling exhibition includes over 50 drawings, etchings, woodcuts and lithographs completed between 1949 and 1979. The exhibit is organized and sponsored by the Chattahoochee Valley Art Museum.

"Prints from Cracow" spans 20 years of printmaking by students and faculty associated with the Academy of Fine Art in Cracow, Poland. ASC RANKS ALONG WITH THE BEST IN A "U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT" STUDY

The annual ranking by "U.S. News & World Report" of colleges and universities was released last week. Agnes Scott was again listed in Quartile Two of the national liberal arts colleges under the Best of the Rest category.

"U.S. News" basically classifies institutions as research universities or liberal arts colleges, categories which are then subdivided into national (broader reputations, better financial resources, more selective) and regional (less selective). These categories are based on the Carnegie Foundation's classification of institutions, the established and generally accepted standards in the country.

While Agnes Scott was not listed as one of the top 25 national liberal arts colleges, it was and has been in the last few years placed in the second quartile of the 140 total institutions classified as having national standing. This is a considerable achievement. Agnes Scott does not compete for a place in the rankings with those liberal arts colleges considered "regional," such as Presbyterian, Spelman, Wesleyan and Berry Colleges, nor does it compete with regional or national research universities. Rather, it competes with the likes of Amherst, Williams, Swarthmore, Wellesley and Smith Colleges, which were among the top ten national liberal arts colleges.

There are several Southern colleges and universities listed as national liberal arts colleges, including Davidson and University of the South at Sewanee, but Agnes Scott and Oglethorpe University are the only two in Georgia. While Agnes Scott is in Quartile Two, Oglethorpe moved up from the fourth to the third quartile this year.

CAMPUS SAFETY REPORT

The Agnes Scott College Department of Public Safety is a state authorized law enforcement agency. We are a service-oriented organization whose primary function is to protect life and property on the Agnes Scott College campus and in the surrounding neighborhood (our jurisdiction extends 500 yards beyond the boundaries of the college, O.C.G.A. 20-8-2). Our officers are state certified, giving them powers of arrest, and have had experience in a variety of other departments such as Decatur, Atlanta and DeKalb County.

Since becoming a state certified law enforcement agency in 1983, we have reported campus crime statistics to the Georgia Bureau of Investigation (O.C.G.A. 35-3-36). They then send this data to the FBI (O.C.G.A. 35-3-33) who publishes these statistics in the nation's Uniform Crime Report. According to the Campus Security Act of 1990, all institutions receiving federal funds were required to compile, publish and distribute these figures beginning September 1, 1992. To comply with the federal law, the statistics, as well as appropriate policies and procedures, are published and distributed twice during the academic year to the campus community in the college newsletter, the *Campus Connection*.

OPERATING PROCEDURES FOR USE OF WOODRUFF BUILDING

I. Eligibility:

1. Students and two guests
2. Faculty, faculty families and two guests per faculty member (emeriti and emeritae included)
3. Staff, staff families and two guests per staff member (retired staff included)
4. Alumnae, alumnae families and two guests per alumna
5. Trustees, trustee families and two guests per trustee
6. Community members - no guests

II. Priority Order for Use of the Facilities:

1. All classes
2. College events (intercollegiate/intramural)
3. Students
4. Faculty/Staff
5. Alumnae/Trustees

III. Costs:

1. Students, faculty, staff, trustees and their families - no charge
2. Alumnae and their families - \$50 per school year includes Community Swim (fall and spring sessions)
3. Conference guests - part of conference fee
4. Passes for trustees and alumnae will be distributed and fees paid at the Department of Athletics located on third floor of Woodruff Building
5. Community Swim Program - pool only - \$125/family; \$100/couple and \$70/single adult per session
6. Summer Swim Program is *not* included in this procedure.

IV. Availability:

1. Open hours are posted in the building and are subject to change. The building is closed when the College is not in session.

V. Method of Use*: *Everyone must sign in at the control booth.*

1. Agnes Scott ID cards must be presented by College students, faculty and staff. ID's *will be checked* after class hours.
2. Alumnae and trustees must present their pass and driver's license.
3. Family members without the primary user present must present their family pass and a driver's license.
4. Community Swim members must present their pass and a driver's license. No guests are allowed.

* Primary users are students, faculty, staff, alumnae and trustees. All primary users with the exception of alumnae and trustees will have the same color plastic pass. Alumnae, trustees and Community Swim members, who have no College ID, will have other types of passes for identification.

VI. General Rules:

1. Guests must be accompanied by the primary user or a family member of the primary user who is 16 years of age or older.
2. If proper ID and/or pass is not presented, admittance will be refused.
3. Those using facilities must be 16 years of age or older to use or be in the weight room.
4. Children under 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult when using the pool and gym areas.
5. Proper dress is mandatory in order to use the facilities. Proper dress means gym shoes, shorts, shirt, sweats and warm-ups. Swim wear only for the pool.
6. Towels will not be distributed.
7. Lockers can only be used on a day-to-day basis. If a lock is put on a locker, please remove it when leaving. Otherwise, the lock will be removed.
8. No bare feet permitted anywhere other than the pool.

- The building is not open when the College is closed. This includes all holidays and vacation periods during the course of the academic year.
- The College reserves the right to revoke the privilege of using the facilities in case of a violation of regulations.

STATEMENT OF ACADEMIC RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

The following Statement of Academic Rights and Responsibilities has recently been passed by both the faculty and the Representative Council of Agnes Scott College. On Wednesday, Feb. 9, 1994, SGA will sponsor a signing of this document for all students and faculty during community hour. By pledging one's name to this document, a student or faculty member will signify his or her belief in its importance and will pledge to try to follow the principles and practices listed.

Statement of Academic Rights and Responsibilities

All members of the academic community at Agnes Scott College have a responsibility to promote an environment conducive to learning based on principles of respect, open communication, freedom of inquiry and non-discrimination. These principles and practices are affirmed by the students, faculty and administrators of the College.

Principles

1. All members of the Agnes Scott community have the responsibility to treat each other with respect and be fair and even-handed in their treatment of others.
2. The students and faculty of Agnes Scott College are entitled to an atmosphere conducive to learning.
3. Students, faculty and administrators have the right to express divergent opinions, interpretations and beliefs without fear of reprisal. Variety of interpretation includes, but is not limited to, interpretations based on race, gender, class, age, national origin, sexual orientation, religion and disability.
4. Students and faculty should strive to create a classroom environment free of discrimination on the basis of race, gender, class, age, national origin, sexual orientation, religion or disability.
5. Student performance should be evaluated solely on an academic basis, not on opinions or conduct in matters related to academic standards.
6. Information about student views, beliefs, practices and associations which administrators and professors acquire in the course of their work should be protected against improper disclosure.

Practices

1. Students and faculty have a responsibility to be present and prepared for all class meetings. Faculty are responsible for managing class time to maximize learning.
2. Faculty are responsible for providing a clear syllabus that sets forth class policies and goals. The syllabus must also include faculty office hours, absence policy and procedures, and an explanation of the grading system. Faculty are also responsible for giving timely notice to students of any substantial deviation from the syllabus during the course of the semester.
3. Students are responsible for completing assignments on time, and faculty are responsible for returning written work in a timely manner. Professors have the responsibility to read work carefully and to be available to discuss a student's work and its evaluation.
4. Students may see their final examinations upon requests and review them with their professors through the end of the next academic semester.
5. Students shall have an opportunity to evaluate their courses.
6. Students have the responsibility to follow the Honor Code in all academic endeavors, including take-home tests, examinations, and collaborative and pledged work. Faculty have the responsibility to refer cases of academic dishonesty, including plagiarism and cheating, to Honor Court.
