WOMEN'S COLLEGES LURE WOMEN PRESIDENTS

The announcement of Ellen Wood Hall as the next president of Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina, adds one more to the tally of female presidents of women's colleges. Hall is to become the sixth president of that college and the first female to hold that position.

Today, nearly 100 colleges in the United States carry on the tradition of solely educating women. Of those, 73 percent are led by women. That figure compares favorably to 8 percent for coeducational institutions.

In the South, twenty-one women's colleges are scattered in nine states. Women lead ten of those. Hall's appointment at Converse will bring the total of female presidents of southern colleges to over half.

In Georgia, Agnes Scott and Spelman have female presidents. Wesleyan and Brenau are led by males, as is Columbia College, the only other women's college in South Carolina. All five female institutions in Virginia - Hollins, Mary Baldwin, Randolph-Macon,



Southern Seminary Junior College, and Sweet Briar - have women presidents.

As both Converse and Agnes Scott celebrate the 100th

anniversary of their founding during 1989, the Centennial Years of both colleges will be highlighted by Hall's appointment: Converse by choosing its first female president and Agnes Scott by the announcement of its first graduate to become president of an institution. As the sister institutions begin their second century of educating women, they will each be led by a woman.

AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE ALUMNA NAMED FIRST WOMAN PRESIDENT OF CONVERSE COLLEGE

Ellen Wood Hall, Agnes Scott College Dean and alumna, has been named the sixth president of Converse College. The announcement came this morning as the Board of Trustees of the Spartanburg, South Carolina, women's college voted to accept the recommendation of the Presidential Search Committee.

Hall is the first Agnes Scott alumna to be named president of a college or university and the first female president of Converse College, a small, independent, women's college with an enrollment of over eleven hundred students.

Agnes Scott President Dr. Ruth Schmidt is especially proud of this appointment. "We are very proud that an Agnes Scott College graduate of Ellen Hall's abilities has been chosen to lead a sister institution. Personally, I also take pride in having brought Ellen back to her alma mater as Dean of the College, and now I wish her all the best as a presidential colleague. Converse is fortunate."

Ellen Hall has served as Dean of the College and an Associate Professor of French at her alma mater since July of 1984. While here,



she orchestrated the change from the quarter to the semester system and instituted a comprehensive, seven-point academic plan to enrich the educational experience by strengthening the fine arts, physical activities, women's science education, and other specific areas of academic life. More than \$500 thousand in faculty grant proposals for institutional and research projects were implemented under her leadership. Hall upgraded the academic computing services for students and faculty, which now include a satellite computer center in a residence hall and a computerized writing laboratory. In the summer of 1988 she directed a faculty development seminar grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities on "Teaching Values in the Western Tradition." She is currently directing the upcoming Centennial Symposium at Agnes Scott entitled "Values for Tomorrow: How Shall We Live?"

One of Hall's major accomplishments while an administrator at Agnes Scott was the implementation of the full-scale Global Awareness Program. The program, established in 1985, will give every Agnes Scott student, regardless of her academic interest or financial background, the opportunity to live and study in another culture as a part of her college education. Students have already had coursework in India, Europe, South America, and Taiwan under the direction of her office.

Prior to her work at Agnes Scott, Hall was an Assistant Professor of French at Westminster College in New Wilmington, Pennsylvania, where she was also a Presidential Associate for Corporate and Foundation Relationships. She has been included in <u>Who's Who in the</u> <u>East</u> and <u>Who's Who of American Women</u>. She received her master's and doctorate degrees in French Literature from Bryn Mawr College and has studied abroad: in 1968 through Bryn Mawr's Institut d'etudes

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francaises d'Avignon, and in 1974 and 1975 at the Bibliotheque Nationale in Paris.

With a long list of appointments, honors, and presentations, Ellen Hall is a veteran of the leadership circles of higher education. She is the current chair of the Council of Academic Deans and Vice Presidents of the University Center in Georgia, an 18-institution consortium. She has served on several reaccreditation teams for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in addition to a number of review panels for the National Endowment for the Humanities. During her career, Hall has made presentations to numerous institutions and organizations, including Agnes Scott, Westminster College in Pennsylvania, Northeast Modern Language Association, and the Association for General and Liberal Studies.

The college Hall goes to is a four-year institution for the education of women and has a professional school of music. It began in 1889 at the insistence of Dexter Edgar Converse that there be a local institution for properly educating women; an insistence with a personal impetus as he had a daughter of college age at the time.

Today the 70-acre campus is home to over 1100 students, nearly 300 of whom are freshmen.

Ellen Hall will assume her duties at Converse on July 17.

SYMPOSIUM SCHEDULED AT AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE TO PRESENT THE LATEST DIALOGUES ON VALUES

An intensive look at the question of values in today's society and tomorrow's world is the focus of a three-day symposium at Agnes Scott College. "Values for Tomorrow: How Shall We Live?" will be explored February 22 through 24 by outstanding scholars and professionals on the cutting edge of their fields.

Rosalynn Carter, Martin Marty, Robert Coles, Barry Stein, Rosabeth Moss Kanter, and Michael Novak are just a few of the nationally-known guests that will consider values in a fresh context and offer their insights during the Centennial Values Symposium.

Agnes Scott College's Centennial Symposium is designed to bring to the surface the beliefs and ideals that lead our lives. The panel and roundtable discussions, keynote addresses, case studies, and the theatrical portrayals will enable participants to resolve questions such as, How do we come to hold values? How are they passed from generation to generation? What core values can be taught? and How can we work according to our values? The Values Symposium is organized



around a specific topic for each day.

Wednesday, February 22, will focus on "Yesterday's Values, Tomorrow's World: What is the link?," and will open

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the Symposium in a celebration of Agnes Scott's Founder's Day. Throughout the day, special programs will look at past values and explore how they can be passed on. Educators will take a special look at which values should be significant to women today. Dr. Martin Marty, the keynote speaker for the day, is a professor at the Divinity School of the University of Chicago, author of 40 books, and one of the country's most prominent theologians. This year he will begin a five-year comparative study of world fundamentalism. His address, "'Descript' Education in a Nondescript World" promises to be one of the highlights of the Symposium.

Also on schedule for the 22nd will be a panel discussion by a group of women's college presidents on values transmitted to women today. Personal reflections on that topic will come from former First Lady Rosalynn Carter. Alumnae and Agnes Scott friends will be especially interested in attending this day of the Symposium.

"Values in a Pluralistic Society: How Shall We Teach?" will be addressed in Thursday's session on February 23. Nationally-prominent educators will lead the sessions. Michael Novak, a leading social critic, author, and Director of Social and Political Studies at the American Enterprise Institute, will open the day's events, followed by a roundtable discussion with local and national educators. The evening lecture will be from Dr. Robert Coles, a prolific writer and professor at Harvard University, whose special interest lies in social psychiatry. He has been awarded a Pulitzer Prize for one in his series of books <u>Children of Crisis</u>. His most recent book, <u>The Moral Life of Children</u>, will serve as the focus of his address. Atlanta

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area educators will be most interested in Thursday's sessions.

The final day of the Centennial Values Symposium will address business ethics and is entitled "Values in the Marketplace: How Shall We Work?" Nancy Woodhull of Gannett New Media, and an original planner of <u>USA Today</u>, opens the day's session with "Business and Ethics: Are They Compatible?" She will be followed by a Business Ethics Case Study with Agnes Scott students and students from other colleges and the community. The session will be coordinated by Archie Carroll, Professor of Management at the University of Georgia.

The closing keynote session will be led by the husband-wife team of Barry Stein and Rosabeth Moss Kanter, co-founders of Goodmeasures Enterprises, a consulting firm which specializes in organizational adaptability to change. Their presentation will provide a stimulating conclusion for the entire Values Symposium and the question "How Shall We Live?"

With a cast of nine playing over fifty roles, the Agnes Scott College Blackfriars present <u>The Dining Room</u> next month. The play opens February 9 and runs through February 11, playing again February 16 through 18.

AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE NAMES FIRST WOMAN BOARD CHAIR

In an historical moment for Agnes Scott College, the College has today named its first woman Chair of the Board of Trustees. Swanna Elizabeth (Betty) Henderson Cameron was unanimously voted into office by members of the Agnes Scott Board of Trustees this morning. Cameron, an Agnes Scott psychology and English major from the class of 1943, becomes the first alumna and also the first non-Atlantan elected as Chair of the Board. She has served on the Board since May 1982, and will assume her new position on July 1.

The new Board Chair is a member of the Executive Committee and serves as Secretary of the Board of the University of North Carolina in Wilmington, and was a member of the New Hanover County (N.C.) Human Relations Commission and the Association of Junior Leagues. Cameron has served as a board member of the Presbyterian Personal and Family Life Center and was member of the YMCA Interracial Dialogue Group. In the late 60's and 70's she was

president of Women in Action for the Prevention of Violence and Its Causes. She and her husband, Daniel D. Cameron, live in Wilmington, North Carolina, and are the (more)



parents of five children, including daughter Swanna who is also a graduate of Agnes Scott.

Cameron will succeed Lawrence Gellerstedt, Jr., as Chair of the Board. Gellerstedt is retiring as Chair after nine years in that capacity and six years as Vice-Chair. Agnes Scott President Dr. Ruth Schmidt spoke with delight at this most recent appointment, stressing the fine record of previous Chairs. "Agnes Scott College was guided throughout its first hundred years by caring and dedicated leaders on the Board of Trustees. Larry Gellerstedt is a superb leader whose dedication to Agnes Scott College has made possible the phenomenal improvements of recent years in both the financial entity of the College, as well as the physical facility. Knowing Betty Cameron since my arrival in Georgia, I have total confidence that we have another outstanding person to chair the Board and I look forward to working with her."

A new Vice-Chair was also elected this morning; Edward P. Gould will succeed Susan Phillips. He has been a member of the Board since May of 1979, and serves on the Audit and Development Committees. Gould serves on the boards of many business, professional, and civic groups, including the Business Council of Georgia, the United Way of Metropolitan Atlanta, the Georgia Council of Economic Education and the USO Council for Greater Atlanta, Inc. He is Vice-Chairman of Trust Company of Georgia, and served as president of that firm from 1977 to 1985. He and his wife, Nancy, have two daughters.

NEXT WAVE DANCE COMES TO ATLANTA WITH NINA WIENER DANCE COMPANY

Agnes Scott College and Dancers' Collective are proud to sponsor the Atlanta debut of the Nina Wiener Dance Company on Thursday, March 9. The concert is scheduled for 8:15 in Gaines Auditorium of Presser Hall on the Agnes Scott campus. The Company's concert will feature two works that were commissioned by or premiered at the Brooklyn Academy of Music (B.A.M.) Next Wave Festival, along with other new dances.

The Atlanta program includes "Wind Devil," with music by Sergio Cervetti. "Wind Devil" received a "Bessie" award for choreography at the B.A.M. performances. Other selections include "TransAtlantic Light," commissioned by and premiered at the Holland Festival. The program also includes "Kemo Sabe," a hand-clapping, foot-stomping tribute to the Old West's universal tool and flag - the bandanna. "Gonna Wanna Land," set to Nigerian folk music, is a new solo work created for the Company's award-winning dancer, Erin Thompson.

Nina Wiener is no newcomer to the dance world, even though her work has not been seen in Atlanta. Ms. Wiener was raised in Arizona, then moved to New York City where she has performed with Twyla Tharp and studied with Paul Taylor, Merce

COLLEGE Decatur, Georgia 30030 Cunningham, Alvin Ailey, and Martha Graham. The <u>San Francisco</u> <u>Chronicle</u> said Nina Wiener is "quite possibly the most gifted modern dance choreographer to come along since Paul Taylor."

Dancers' Collective President and dancer Terri Kruzan said the Company's dancing is "a combination of rigorous form and no-nonsense delivery that tests the limits of balance at every turn. Its sensuous appeal and witty movement are found exciting, fascinating, and enjoyable entertainment by all audiences." Joanne McGhee, Artistic Director of Dancers' Collective, said those who have seen Nina Wiener's work are "fascinated by the ways she uses the body. Movement patterns of legs are transferred to arms and vice-versa. Review after review, performance after performance, new work after new work, this lady creates some of the greatest dance of the 80s."

Marylin Darling, Associate Professor of Physical Education and Instructor of Dance at Agnes Scott College, calls the performance and co-sponsorship "a milestone in contemporary dance presentations in the Atlanta area. We're ready for it. We've been told that Atlanta is big enough for the High Museum, and if that's true, it's big enough and ready for major contemporary dance, too." As a part of its College Events Series, Agnes Scott College has most recently hosted Pilobolus, Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble, Royal Winnipeg Ballet, and the Joffrey II Dancers.

In addition to the Company's performance at Agnes Scott, Nina Wiener will conduct a lecture/demonstration at Georgia State University. The presentation will be made on Monday, March 13, at 4:30 in the Alumni Memorial Theatre, and is free and open to the public.

Dancers' Collective presents a five-event dance series in Atlanta and is a primary sponsor on the National Performance Network Circuit, which operates out of New York City's Dance Theatre Workshop The group has brought a host of cutting-edge, modern dance companies to Atlanta since it began presenting programs in 1984.

Public support is important to Dancers' Collective. It receives joint support from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Georgia Council for the Arts, the Fulton County Arts Council, the Atlanta Bureau of Cultural Affairs, and the National Performance Network. Special Awards to be Presented at Agnes Scott College Agnes Scott College will present its first Award of Distinction, established as part of the College's Centennial Celebration, during Founder's Day festivities on Wednesday, February 22, 1989. The award honors well-known individuals, other than alumnae, who have contributed significantly to society and the world, and who embody the ideals of Agnes Scott College. The first recipients are Rosalynn Carter and Martin E. Marty.

Former First Lady Rosalyn Carter has been honored with the National Mental Health Association's Volunteer of the Decade Award, the Southeastern Association of Volunteer Services' Volunteer of the Year Award, and a Presidential Citation from the American Psychological Association. Holder of five honorary degrees, Mrs. Carter is currently on the board of directors of The Friendship Force, Gannett Company, Inc., and Crested Butte Physically Challenged Ski Program. She also serves on the board of advisors for Habitat for Humanity and on the the board of trustees of The Menninger Foundation. Author of the autobiography *First Lady From Plains*, Mrs. Carter also co-authored *Everything to Gain: Making the* Most of the Rest of Your Life with her husband Jimmy Carter.

Martin E. Marty, Fairfax M. Cone Distinguished Service Professor of the History of Modern Christianity at the University of Chicago, is president of the Park Ridge Center, an institute for the study of health, faith and ethics, and past president of the American Academy of Relition. Author of 40 books and holder of 29 honorary doctorates, Dr. Marty is the senior editor of *The Christian Century*, editor of the newsletter *Context*, and co-editor of the quarterly *Church History*. A member of numerous boards including the National Humanities Center and the Carter Presidential Center, Dr. Marty embarks on a five-year comparative study of world Fundamentalism this year.

The presentation of the Awards will be made during a special Founder's Day convocation on the birthday of the founder of the College, Colonel George Washington Scott. In honor of the College's Centennial,

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representatives from other women's colleges will be marching in academic procession, and members of the Scott family will be special guests for the day's events. Dr. Marty will present the convocation address entitled "'Descript' Education in a Nondescript World."

The Award of Distinction was designed by artist Robert Hild of Decatur, and executed by Tiffany's of New York. The Award is actually two pieces, an etched crystal pyramid resting on an ebony base. A silver plate, engraved with the recipient's name, is affixed to the base. The etched crystal pyramid is a rendering of the College's gazebo, which was restored and moved to the Woodruff Quadrangle as part of the recent campus rennovation.

THREE LOCAL COLLEGES TO BENEFIT FROM NATIONAL GRANT

Agnes Scott College has been awarded a \$25 thousand grant to encourage students from DeKalb College and Atlanta Metropolitan College to seek a four-year degree, providing them with a residential, liberal arts, collegiate experience. The award is one of five matching grants given nation-wide and was sponsored by Vassar College and the Association of American Colleges (AAC).

The grant was announced Friday, March 3, in New York City at a luncheon sponsored by AT&T. AT&T, the Ford Foundation, and Chase Manhattan Bank funded the project to encourage collaboration between public two-year schools and four-year liberal arts colleges.

Funds will be used to help up to 25 community college students in Atlanta from DeKalb College and Atlanta Metropolitan College attend a five-week residential program from June 16 to July 21, 1990, on the Agnes Scott College campus. Both men and women are to be enrolled in the summer program at Agnes Scott.

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Decatur, Georgia 30030 (404) 371-6000 Vassar College and AAC sponsored the national competition to support and adapt Vassar's Exploring Transfer program on five campuses across the nation.

Exploring Transfer, a collaborative project that Vassar established with LaGuardia Community College, is a program that encourages community college students to continue their education toward a bachelor's degree. Begun on Vassar's campus during the summer of 1985 with a grant from AAC, the program introduces students to the academic challenges and residential character of the liberal arts college.

The competition for funds to adapt Exploring Transfer at leading liberal arts colleges throughout the country was launched in October during a two-day conference at Vassar that attracted 120 representatives, including presidents and other top academic officers from nearly 50 liberal arts colleges and universitites.

Decatur, Georgia 30030 (404) 371-6000 James Dickey will be the special guest of the annual Agnes Scott Writers' Festival April 6 and 7. Dickey will be one of three distinguished writers to lead the two-day festival.

The Agnes Scott Writers' Festival is a yearly event designed to bring together students of composition for interaction with and critical review by accomplished artists. An annual contest, judged by the panel of artists assembled for the festival, produces a fiction and poetry winner from the entries of college students from around the state.

Dickey, a poet, novelist, critic, and professor of English at the University of South Carolina, has been awarded the National Book Award, the Vachel Lindsay Prize, and the Melville Cane Award. His works include Into the Stone. . (1960), Poems 1957-1967 (1967), Deliverance (1970), Falling, May Day Sermon and Other Poems (1982), and Wayfarer (1988).

He follows in a long line of distinguished writers who have anchored the Agnes Scott Writers' Festival that includes Robert Penn Warren, Eudora Welty, and a twentyyear stint by Robert Frost. Dickey will be joined by Elizabeth Bartlett, a poet, story writer, and editor. She has published sixteen books of her poetry, has served as poetry editor for <u>Crosscurrents</u>, and has served as co-editor for an international anthology for the 1988 Olympics. Memye Curtis Tucker, Agnes Scott alumna, poet, and teacher, will be on the program for the Writers' Festival as well. She is the recipient of <u>The Chattahoochee Review</u>'s Prize for Poetry and of a 1988 Artist-Initiated Grant from the Georgia Council for the Arts.

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

SHIRLEY CHISHOLM TO SPEAK AT AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE

Former Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm (D-N.Y.), the first woman to run for the United States presidency, will be the 1988 Founder's Day speaker at Agnes Scott College on Wednesday, February 24. Ms. Chisholm will speak at 10:25 a.m. in the College's Presser Hall at the corner of South McDonough Street and Buttrick Drive in Decatur. The event is free and open to the public.

In 1968, Chisholm became the first black woman elected to Congress and rapidly became a major voice for civil rights. She actively sought the Democratic Party's nomination for president in 1972, becoming the first woman and first Black American ever to seek that office. She resigned from Congress in 1981 saying that the conservative atmosphere in Washington prevented progress in issues on her agenda. She is a favorite among students on the lecture circuit, and she continues to write and consult with political leaders.

A <u>cum laude</u> graduate of Brooklyn College, Chisholm received her master's degree from Columbia University in 1952. As a student, she was active in the Urban League and the NAACP. She served in the New York State Assembly from 1964 to 1968, when she ran for Congress against James Farmer, founder of the Congress of Racial Equality.

Chisholm's voting record in Congress was consistently liberal -- pro-women's rights, anti-war -- and at odds with the Nixon administration. In 1971, she was among a group of prominent women leaders that formed the National Women's Political Caucus. Also in 1971, Chisholm and Ronald Dellums (D-Ca.) held hearings to investigate charges of racism in the United States Army. In December 1971, she began her campaign for the presidency, entering nearly all of the state primaries. She went to the Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach with 152 delegates. During the convention, she withdrew and threw her support behind George McGovern (D-S.D.), who became the party nominee.

ATLANTA -- Colleges and universities are and undoubtedly always will be overwhelmingly co-educational. Schools that chose to follow a different path must continually strive for progress in all areas to provide a level of education that will distinguish them from the majority.

Today, as in 1889, Agnes Scott continues to meet the challenge by encouraging young women to reach the highest levels of academic expression and achievement, providing a solid foundation for professional careers, and molding women for leadership such fields as medicine, politics, academics, or law.

In fact, College administrators believe the College's unchanged credo remains as practical and workable today as it did the year Col. George Washington Scott watched the first of the College's Victorian buildings take shape.

"Women's colleges have a superb track record in providing an education that works for women," said Dr. Ruth Schmidt, Agnes Scott College President. Over the years we have equipped generations of women with the confidence and experience to take on leadership roles in business, the arts, science, politics, government, the law and other areas. For example, statistics show that graduates of women's colleges have better records for getting into medical and other professional schools than do female graduates of coeducational colleges. And students in women's colleges are several times more likely to major in subjects such as math and the sciences than are women students elsewhere."

Dr. Schmidt, who chairs the national Women's College Coalition, observes that women's colleges are more than holding their own with private sector colleges, despite recent decisions by several women's colleges to begin admitting men. She expects Agnes Scott to continue growing both numerically and academically.

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"At Agnes Scott, we anticipate an increase in mean SAT scores of 35 to 40 points for this fall's freshman class," said Dr. Schmidt. "But this growth does not come effortlessly."

Students who seek education at women's colleges do not choose to attend out of idealistic reasoning or a desire to remain protected from the harsh realities of the "co-ed" world, Dr. Schmidt emphasizes. On the contrary, evidence suggests that the experience and quality of education at women's colleges gives students a strong foundation to allow them to excel after graduation. As one Agnes Scott professor stated, "Our students don't just learn; they learn how to learn. And that's a tool that will be used throughout their lives."

Backing up this assertion is the fact that Agnes Scott women are regularly admitted to the finest graduate and professional schools, including Harvard, Yale, Emory, Princeton, Vanderbilt and Stanford. 15 percent of the College's most recent graduates are studying at the graduate level, and nearly 85 percent of the College's most recent graduated are employed in positions ranging from systems analyst to television journalist to teacher to legislative assistant.

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Agnes Scott and many of the nation's 100 women's colleges have risen to prominence in the realm of higher education through the blending of traditional values and progressive thought. Blackboards are complemented by computers. Dress codes and restrictive visiting hours have long since yielded to student-defined, consensual rules. With a low student/faculty ratio of seven to one, a first-rate faculty -- 87 percent of whom hold doctorates -and an atmosphere that encourages individual initiative, Agnes Scott, like many women's colleges, offers the best of the old and the new. A rigorous modern curriculum is complimented by an ethical tone set by the College's founders and perpetuated by each generation of students, administrators, and faculty.

In keeping with a century-old tradition that does not bow to trend, Agnes Scott continues to stress the rigor and quality of its academic programs and its value to women who seek an alternative to co-educational college programs.

"Students privileged to attend women's colleges enjoy the traditional advantages of full opportunity for campus leadership and affirmation of their abilities," said Dr. Schmidt.

DORIS BLACK RESIGNS AS CLARION'S WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COACH

Doris Black, who has been the Women's Basketball Coach at Clarion University for the past five seasons and has been responsible for leading the Golden Eagles to two straight PSAC-Western Division regular season titles, has announced her resignation effective August 15th, it was announced today by President Dr. Thomas A. Bond.-Black has accepted the position of Athletic Director at Agnes Scott College, located in Decatur, Georgia. An all female school, Black will become the school's first Athletic Director beginning in August and will be assembling the initial women's basketball program in the school's history, which will start in the 1989-90 season. A search for her succesor will begin in the near future.

"Doris has done a tremendous job with our women's program in her five years here and we are sad to see her leave," noted Clarion A.D. Frank Lignelli. "She has an outstanding opportunity at Agnes Scott College and we certainly wish her well in her new position."

Black came to Clarion in the 1983-84 season, inheriting a team that compiled a 3-17 record in 1982-83 and a two year mark of 5-35. By her third season at Clarion, Black saw the Eagles improve to an 11-15 regular season mark, then follow in 1986-87 with the school's first PSAC-West Title with an 8-2 conference slate and a 16-9 overall record. Last season Clarion won its second straight PSAC-Western Division Title with an 11-1 West mark and an overall rcord of 18-9. In her five-year career Black finished with an overall mark of 53-71 at Clarion, but will be remembered most for taking a women's program that had not won in its history and led the Golden Eagles to two straight championships.

"I'd certainly like to take this opportunity to thank everyone at Clarion for all their support during my five years here," stated Black. "It really was a difficult decision because I have really enjoyed my days here both coaching and teaching, but I had make the choice that would help me continue to grow and further my career and that will definitely be the case at Agnes Scott College. I will have the opportunity there to start and mold my own athletic program and that is a big challenge that I am ready to accept. I would also like to give a great deal of credit to, and thank

the players who played here over the past five seasons. Without their dedication, none of our success-would have been possible."

Black came to Clarion from Central State University, where she also turned a losing Marauder program into a winner in only four seasons. Her 46-46 record there from 1979-83 ended with the Marauders gaining the NAIA Playoffs. Prior to that, she coached at Colonel White High in Dayton, Ohio leading the boys team to a 16-5 record in 1979 and their first ever City League Championship. She coached the girls team at Colonel White for six seasons (1973-78) and registered a 54-9 record, while winning three City League Titles and a District Championship.

A graduate of Dayton Roosevelt High School in 1966, she attended Central State University from 1966-70. Black captained the Central State basketball squad her junior and senior season and was voted outstanding athlete at Central State her senior year.-After graduating in 1970, she attended Xavier University and attained her Master's Degree in 1973, before taking her first coaching position at Dayton's Colonel White High.

Only last Fall Black was honored by Central State University by being inducted into the inaugural CSU Sports Hall of Fame, for her athletic prowess at Central State and her achievements in contributing to the university's image.



Her presentations addressed the SAT, financial aid and Congressional Methodology, testing issues concerned with gender bias and coaching for tests, parental involvement in the college selection process, and early awareness strategies for at-risk students.

Agnes Scott College was founded 100 years ago by members of the Decatur Presbyterian Church. During the last 100 years, the College has educated over 10,000 women in the liberal arts tradition and continues its heritage of quality education for women into its next century.
