TALLIS SCHOLARS TO VISIT AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE

Agnes Scott College is proud to sponsor a performance by the Tallis Scholars on Tuesday, December 5. This choir, which specializes in Renaissance music, will perform at 8:15 p.m. in Gaines Auditorium of Presser Hall on the Agnes Scott campus in Decatur.

Peter Phillips, the group's director, founded the choir in 1978. Since that time, they have toured throughout Great Britain, Australia, the United States, Canada, Switzerland, Holland, Belgium, Italy, and France, where they were the subject of a television documentary.

The determination of Peter Phillips and the Tallis Scholars to make recordings of Renaissance vocal music of the very highest quality available to the public reflects their deep commitment to musical excellence in all their endeavors. Their dedication and energy also guide them annually through a twelve-month worldwide touring schedule. According to the Washington Post, "Vigor and polish, both implicit in the music, are abundantly supplied in the performances. The Tallis Scholars blend their voices not

only as skilled specialists but as enthusiasts."

The group was named after a 16th century English composer, Thomas Tallis, and for the choral scholars of (more)



Oxford and Cambridge who were the original members of the choir.

From the beginning, Mr. Phillips has had a very definite ideal for the group's sound. "By limiting ourselves to two singers to a part, we can concentrate on tuning and blend in a way that a cathedral choir with six or 12 boys on a part cannot possibly do. I decided on two per part because if you just have one singer on a part, like the Hilliard Ensemble, you can no longer call youself a choir. Of course, we will switch to a solo singer when the score calls for it," stated Mr. Phillips in an April 1989 Atlanta Journal/Constitution interview.

The ideal works. In 1987 the Tallis Scholars' recording of Missa Pange lingua and Missa La sol fa re mi of Josquin Desprez won Gramophone's Record of the Year award—the first early music recording ever to win that distinction.

In random testing by the Public Relations Office on Thursday and Friday, November 9 and 10, the students of Agnes Scott College were asked to identify several countries across the globe. The results of this National Geographic Society test showed Agnes Scott students correctly answering twice as many as the national American average for young adults ages 18 to 24.

Americans age 18 to 24 correctly identified 6.9 places on the global test. Agnes Scott students correctly answered 14.4 of the sixteen questions, or approximately 90 percent. The United States average was 8.6. All of the Agnes Scott students polled were able to correctly identify the USSR, Canada, France, Mexico, the United Kingdom, and the United States. Approximately six out of ten students correctly located the Persian Gulf, compared to 2.5 of all Americans polled last year. Two of three Americans could not find Vietnam on the map but only 22 percent of Agnes Scott students failed to locate it. Of the 106 Agnes Scott students taking the test, published in Thursday's Atlanta Constitution, 35 students, or 33 percent, answered all questions correctly.





This poll was given to young people and older adults in ten countries across the world this year with startling results. RENATA SCOTTO TO PERFORM AT AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE

Opera soprano Renata Scotto performs "An Evening of Opera Arias" on Tuesday, January 30, 1990, at Agnes Scott College. The concert is at 8:15 p.m. in Gaines Auditorium of Presser Hall on the Agnes Scott College campus in Decatur.

Since her debut, Renata Scotto has been acclaimed by audiences, colleagues and critics as one of the greatest singing actresses of the day. During her career which began when she was a teenager, Ms. Scotto has sung more than 70 operatic roles and performed in virtually every major opera house from Moscow to New York, and, except for Australia, on every continent of the world. Her discography of more than 100 recordings is one of the largest of any active vocalist. Included in this list is the first CBS Masterworks digital recording (II Segretto di Susanna, conducted by John Pritchard). She has appeared in more "Live from the Met" telecasts than any other singer and was the first woman in the history of Met to both direct and star in an opera (Madama Butterfly).



Ms. Scotto lives in New York, where she continues to devote a considerable amount of her time to performances at the Metropolitan Opera. In her 20-year (more)

career at the Met, she has sung 25 different roles, ranging from Vitellia in Mozart's <u>La celemenza di Tito</u> to Puccini's <u>Tosca</u>, which she sang for an audience of 200,000 in Central Park.

Ms. Scotto began singing as a child in Italy during World War II. Her first "concerts" were sung from the window of the family's apartment. Her first "fees" were gifts of candy from the villagers.

She was 12 when she saw her first opera on Christmas Eve in her hometown of Savona, Italy. Delighted by what she saw, Ms. Scotto decided that night to become a singer. Six years later to the very day, she returned to the same theater, this time as the prima donna.

A few months later, as the result of winning a prestigious Italian vocal competition, she made her Milan debut in the same role. The great Italian soprano Mafaldo Favero, who had seen that performance, told a newspaper interviewer, "In this young woman, art is second nature."

Her autobiography, Renata Scotto: More Than a Diva, written with Octavio Roca, was published by Doubleday in 1984. In the book, she is asked by her collaborator how she hopes to be remembered among the other great divas of the day. She replies, "History will remember Birgit Nilsson, for her unparalleled vocal power; Joan Sutherland and Marilyn Horne for their ravishing virtuosity; and perhaps Renata Scotto, for revealing the drama of opera within the tension of words and music."
