AGNES SCOTT WELCOMES NEW FACULTY MEMBERS

Agnes Scott is pleased to announce the addition of six new faculty members: Juan A. Allende, assistant professor of political science; Josephine B. Bradley, instructor of sociology/anthropology; Brenda Ann Hoke, assistant professor of sociology/anthropology; Gisela Norat, assistant professor of Spanish; N. J. Stanley, assistant professor of theatre and dance; and Darlene E. York, visiting assistant professor of education.

Juan A. Allende received his B.S. degree in history and international studies from Iowa State University. He received his M.A. degree in political science and his Ph.D. in comparative politics/Latin America from the University of North Carolina. Allende will add to his academic credentials with a Master of Divinity from Emory in the spring of '94. He was the recipient of the Federico Gil Award for Best Master's Thesis on Latin America from the University of North Carolina in 1981. He is a member of Phi Kappa Phi and the International Society of Theta Phi. He taught at the University of Tennessee and completed field research in Gainesville, Georgia, Santiago, Chile, and

Caracas, Venezuela. He is also professionally affiliated with the Latin American Studies Association and the South Eastern Council on Latin American Studies.

Josephine B. Bradley earned a B.A. in political science from North Carolina Central University, a M.S.W from Michigan State University, a M.A. in liberal studies from Emory University, and expects to receive her Ph.D. from Emory in liberal studies with a concentration in African-American studies in spring of '94. Bradley's dissertation traces the impact of Brown vs. Board of Education on the school system of Greensboro, North Carolina, and her experience as the first African-American student to desegregate the local high school. Bradley has received a graduate fellowship, a graduate assistantship and teaching assistantship from Emory University and she was recognized by Who's Who Among American Women in 1988 and Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities in 1991. She has also taught at Emory University and Tusculum College.

Brenda Ann Hoke received her B.A. in sociology from North Carolina Central University, a M.A. in sociology from Atlanta University, and a M.A. and Ph.D. in sociology from State University of New York at Stony Brook. Hoke received a research grant from the National Science Foundation for 1991-93. She has held positions as an associate research professor at the Center for Research on Women at Memphis State University, assistant professor in social sciences at Michigan Technological University, and instructor at the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

Gisela Norat completed her B.A. in Spanish from

Norat received a university fellowship and a dissertation fellowship from Washington University. She taught and directed at Central Michigan University, Indiana University, and Florida State University before coming to Agnes Scott.
