ANNA JOSEPHINE BRIDGMAN AGNES SCOTT COLLEGE ALUMNA AND FORMER FACULTY MEMBER

(Decatur, GA) Decatur resident Anna Josephine Bridgman, born in Gainesville, Ga. in 1906, graduated from Agnes Scott College in 1927. She received her Ph.D. from the University of North Carolina (1947) and her M.A. from the University of Virginia (1935). Bridgman was professor of biology at Agnes Scott from 1949-74, where she served as chair of the Department of Biology. Prior to her tenure at Agnes Scott, Bridgman taught biology at Limestone College (1940-47) in Gaffney, S.C. and Flora MacDonald College (1935-40) in Red Springs, N.C.

Bridgman's extensive professional associations included Sigma Xi, Phi Beta Kappa, the American Society of Zoologists, the American Society of Protozoologists, the Georgia Academy of Sciences and the Association of Southeastern Biologists.

Admired and respected by her peers and alumnae at Agnes Scott for her distinguished work and success in building a strong biology department (which today remains a legacy of her efforts biology was the second most popular major for 1995-96 incoming first year students), the science library, including the facility and the book collection, was named in her honor on April 19, 1974.

During the 'hot' period, following WWII, when the subject of the effects of radiation on human and animal life was in high demand, Bridgman was asked to speak and write internationally as a result of her extensive research. A clear intellectual pioneer in her field, she widely addressed the deteriorating effects of radiation exposure in humans which often lead to death due to leukemia, lung and bone cancer all over the world. In a Nantucket, Mass. lecture given in 1957, Bridgman stated, "radiation is a most powerful tool—to be used for our destruction or our benefit. With an effort to understand it, we ought to be able to make the right choice."

Harvard Divinity School Associate Dean to speak at Agnes Scott

Many Americans say that the "increasing disorder to individual, family, and community life" are responsible for "the breakdown of moral values and social structure."

Dr. Constance Buchanan, who will be the featured speaker at Agnes Scott's James Ross McCain Faith and Learning Lecture, asserts that she has found part of the answer to America's moral dilemma. She will outline her vision in her lecture at Agnes Scott.

In her book, "Choosing to Lead: Women and the Crisis of American Values," Dr. Buchanan says that "women have the potential to play an important role in leading the nation out of its values crisis, and she explores the barriers – practical, historical, and especially moral – that women must overcome to do so.

Dr. Buchanan will be at Agnes Scott on March 7 and will speak at 10:25 a.m. The lecture will be held in Woltz Reception Room in Rebekah Scott Hall on the Agnes Scott Campus. The event is free and open to the public. After the lecture, Dr. Buchanan will meet with students and other interested persons for lunch in Agnes Scott's Evans Dining Hall. Cost for lunch is \$4.25.

Dr. Buchanan's book, published in 1996 by Beacon Press and in its second printing, focuses on why Americans do not look to women for leadership, especially for the public vision about the welfare of society as a whole. "Choosing to Lead" explains why women's leadership is vital to renewing the moral fabric of American life and reveals why this resource is still largely untapped. A historian, Dr. Buchanan traces the long religious history of the idea that women's authority extends only to the home and explores how this formulation continues in often unrecognized ways to shape modern "secular" values.

A resident of Cambridge, Mass., Dr. Buchanan is also the founding director of the Women's Studies in Religion Program at the divinity school.

Obituary for Bonnie Brown Johnson

Bonnie Brown Johnson, 48, who held high offices in development at three of Atlanta's leading institutions of higher education -- Emory University, Agnes Scott College, and Georgia Institute of Technology -- died Friday night of cancer at Emory Hospital.

Funeral services will be held on Monday, April 14, at 3:30 p.m. at Glenn Memorial United Methodist Church on the campus of Emory University.

Ms Johnson was named executive director of development and assistant dean of the Emory University School of Medicine in January, 1994. In this position she brought a level of experience to the School of Medicine that helped the school raise more than \$175 million, exceeding its goals in Emory University's \$400 million capital campaign ending in December 1995. She also oversaw alumni affairs for the School of Medicine.

Thomas J. Lawley, M.D., dean of the Emory University School of Medicine, said, "Bonnie was a very special person. Despite her first illness less than a year after she came to Emory, she was always strongly engaged in her work and with members of the Emory family. She helped set a positive tone for what the School was trying to accomplish, and she endeared herself to many of our faculty and staff. She will be greatly missed."

"Bonnie was highly respected in Georgia by her peers and her colleagues -- and a good friend to many at Emory and throughout Atlanta," according to Mendal Bouknight, associate vice president for Health Sciences Development. She was a very active member of the Georgia chapter of the National Society of Fund-Raising Executives, where she achieved the rank of certified fund-raising executive, and in the Council for Advancement and Support of Education, and other professional organizations.

Ms. Johnson was the first woman vice president for development and public affairs at Agnes Scott College (ASC), a position which she held between 1989 and 1993. During her tenure as vice president at Agnes Scott, "Bonnie served her alma mater with distinction," says Gué P. Hudson, ASC dean of students and a personal friend of Johnson's. "As vice president of development and public affairs, she was responsible for directing a successful \$36.5 million Centennial Campaign. Her leadership and vision in this endeavor were critical to its success and to increasing alumnae giving to a record high. Part of Bonnie's gift was in her ability to communicate and motivate a broad and diverse group of alumnae."

Johnson's personal generosity to the Agnes Scott is evidenced in the establishment of the Walter and Rita Brown Scholarship Fund in honor of her parents.

"Bonnie was a courageous woman who never lost her faith, generosity or humor," adds Hudson. "She was a respected professional, a giving friend and a wonderful mother and wife. We have lost a kind and gentle woman who is an example for us all."

Prior to joining the staff at Agnes Scott, Johnson served as director of special gifts at Georgia Institute of Technology from 1984 to 1989. From 1976 through 1984, Johnson held numerous positions of increasing responsibility at Agnes Scott, including director of financial aid and director of development.

Johnson was honored at the Atlanta YWCA Salute to Women of Achievement in May of 1996 and served as an elder at Emory Presbyterian Church.

A native of Baton Rouge, La., Ms. Johnson was in 1966 one of two Presidential Scholars from Louisiana, and she was a 1970 Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Agnes Scott with a degree in political science and history. She completed her M.B.A. from Emory University in 1986.

She is survived by her husband, David C. Johnson, a partner in the Atlanta architectural firm of Nix, Mann/Perkins & Will; a son David Jr. (age 9); her mother Rita Brown of Baton Rouge; and a sister Ann Arnold, brother-in-law Jack Arnold, and nephew Kyle Arnold, all of Rowlett, Texas.

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Anonymous 4 will perform at Agnes Scott College

Anonymous 4, renowned for its vocal blend and technical virtuosity in medieval chant and polyphony, will conclude Agnes Scott's College Event Series, "Crossing Boundaries," with its performance on April 19 in Gaines Auditorium of Presser Hall.

Anonymous 4's six recordings for the Harmonia Mundi USA label have sold 650,000 copies worldwide. Their first recording, "An English Ladymass," was named Classical Disc of the Year for 1993 by "CD Review" and spent much of 1993 and 1994 on "Billboard's" classic chart. "On Yoolis Night," the group's second recording received the prestigious French Daipason d'Or award.

Several of Anonymous 4's program have been broadcast nationally on National Public Radio's "Performance Today," and other concert have been recorded and broadcast by NPR stations around the country.

Originally formed in 1986 to experiment with the sound of medieval chant and polyphony as sung by higher voices, the four women of Anonymous 4 have found a niche with their astonishing vocal and technical virtuosity. Anonymous 4 combines musical, literary and historical scholarship with 20th-century performing intuition as they create innovative programs interweaving music with poetry and narrative.

The ensemble takes its name from the designation given by musicologists to an anonymous 13thcentury Englishman who, as a student in Paris, wrote about the vocal polyphony then being performed at the Cathedral of Notre Dame.

Anonymous 4 has toured extensively throughout the United States and this year's tour includes debuts in Japan, Australia and New Zealand.

Green named Agnes Scott Assistant Dean of Students

Agnes Scott College has announced the appointment of Karen Green, a Rochester area native, as its assistant dean of students.

Green is a 1986 Agnes Scott Return-to-College graduate and will finish her Master of Divinity this spring at Candler School of Theology at Emory University.

She has served as director of multicultural affairs at Hamilton College in New York (1990-94) and as director of student activities at Agnes Scott (1986-1990). Her primary responsibilities as assistant dean of students at Agnes Scott will include orientation, multicultural affairs, and supervision of student activities.

"I am happy to have someone of her talents and experience to be an active part of our community," said Agnes Scott Dean of Students Gué Hudson about Green's appointment as a dean. "She has been a wonderful catalyst for many changes in the past and I look forward to her leadership in the future."

Among the changes Green helped implement at Agnes Scott is the creation of a two-day weekend orientation program, which includes expanded activities and information sessions for parents.

Dean Hudson added that Green has been "very active in helping the institution address many of the issues that face a multicultural college. As one young alumna told me after hearing of Green's appointment, 'Karen embodies the very best of Agnes Scott,'" Hudson added.

Green is the recipient of Candler School of Theology's Claude H. Thompson Award (1996), presented to a student demonstrating his or her concern that the Gospel of Christ come to concrete expression in the lives of men and women through acts of justice. Green also won the John Rustin Award (1997), presented to the student who is deemed by the Candler faculty as a Propetic preacher. She also won the Agnes Scott College Human Relations Faculty/Staff Award and in 1989 was named a YWCA (Atlanta) Woman Of Achievement. Green is a 1990 graduate of Leadership DeKalb and 1997 member of Who's Who among Students in American Colleges and Universities.

McCain Library expansion is centerpiece of Agnes Scott campus plan

ATLANTA – Maintaining a legacy of cutting-edge technology, the master plan approved today by Agnes Scott's Board of Trustees calls for renovating and expanding McCain Library to support curriculum and research in an age of ever-increasing technology.

Built in 1935-36, Agnes Scott's McCain Library is recognized as one of the finest examples of Collegiate Gothic libraries built in the early 20th century. Among its Depression-era innovations were informal spaces, seminar rooms, an art gallery and film projection.

The new master plan includes technology upgrades and enhanced programs in the library to support more effectively the College's liberal arts curriculum and to meet student needs for study and scholarship.

McCain Library will, as it did in the 1930s, reflect new ways that students assimilate knowledge and connect and analyze information, especially by participating in collaborative learning environments. Among the plans for the library expansion include:

- creating more access to electronic resources;
- providing inviting, functional study spaces;
- improving media and microform facilities;
- building instruction, seminar and group rooms;
- renovating existing spaces;
- updating the College's archival facilities.

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Note: While concepts for the McCain Library expansion have been approved, no architectural renderings are available at this time.

Agnes Scott College Board of Trustees makes key decisions

ATLANTA – Agnes Scott College's Board of Trustees at its meeting that concluded today took the following action:

- Adopted a resolution stating again its commitment "to excellence in all dimensions of the mission of the College in order to prepare women for life and leadership in a global society." This commitment is dedicated to: the education of women; a liberal arts education of the highest standards; outstanding teaching and distinguished scholarship; a community of ethnic, international, religious and socio-economic diversity; a residential community with a culture of honor, trust, diversity and civility; and a community which fosters faith and learning as well as religious and interfaith dialogue, hallmarks of the College's Presbyterian heritage;
- Approved a 1997-98 budget of \$24 million which includes enhanced science and international programs and funding for additional faculty for these programs. The budget calls for a 3.5 percent tuition increase, among the smallest in five years.
- Approved a new campus master plan that provides a comprehensive and long-term plan for the College's physical facilities. It includes enhancement and expansion of academic facilities (including Campbell Science Hall, Bradley Observatory and McCain Library), construction of a new campus center, improvements to and new construction of residential space, and increased parking facilities.
- Granted tenure to Dr. Julie Weisberg and promoted her to Associate Professor of Education.
- Granted emerita status to Regine Reynolds-Cornell, retiring Adeline Arnold Loridans Professor of French.
- Approved the appointment of two new faculty members: Jane M. Arrington, assistant professor of chemistry, and David Rollo, Adeline Arnold Loridans Professor French.

- Elected Susan Coltrane Lowance, Agnes Scott class of 1955, as a new trustee. Lowance is director of the Sloan Fellows Program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

- Expressed gratitude to Nancy T. Hill, Agnes Scott class of 1956, and Martha W. Kessler, Agnes Scott class of 1969, as their terms as Board members conclude.

Agnes Scott College Board of Trustees approves master plan

ATLANTA – The Agnes Scott College Board of Trustees affirmed today "its commitment to excellence in all dimensions" of the College and approved in concept the most comprehensive master plan undertaken at any one time in the College's 108-year history.

Specifically, the Board of Trustees' commitment to excellence is dedicated to:

- the education of women;
- a liberal arts education of the highest standards;
- outstanding teaching and distinguished scholarship;
- a community of ethnic, international, religious and socio-economic diversity;
- a residential community with a culture of honor, trust, diversity and civility; and
- a community that fosters faith and learning as well as religious and interfaith dialogue, hallmarks of the College's Presbyterian heritage.

Announcing these decisions, Board chair Joseph R. Gladden, Jr., said: "We have been working toward these plans for several years. The master plan is the physical representation of our commitment to a high quality liberal arts education for the women who will assume the leadership of the next generation."

President Mary Brown Bullock, expressing appreciation for the Board's decision, noted that "I know of no other liberal arts college that enjoys the strategic location, institutional resources and sense of mission that enables us to embark up such a bold program."

The master plan approved by the Board of Trustees is a document holistic in its planning, a process in which College officials and planners heard input from neighbors as well as from constituencies on campus.

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Agnes Scott College Board of Trustees approves master plan add one

By approving both of these measures, the Board of Trustees took the next step as the women's college further enhances and expands its academic programs. Currently, Agnes Scott is ranked among the top ten women's colleges in America (U.S. News and World Report, Fall 1996).

As part of its approval of the campus plan, which is designed to support the six directives, the Board of Trustees renewed its renewed commitment to the College's academic vitality. Several goals reflect the overall intent of the master plan; it must:

- be complete;
- respect the historical context and unique sense of place that exists on the Agnes Scott campus;
- embody the vision of a dynamic and growing institution;
- involve both the College and off-campus community; and
- be pragmatic in the short range and visionary in the long range.

To ensure academic vitality, the campus plan calls for enhancing and expanding academic facilities, addition of new residential space and improving and updating the College's campus center. As part of its approval of the concepts of the master plan, the Board of Trustees instructed the College to continue refining the integrated plan. A dozen projects are slated for attention within the next five years:

- expansion and renovation of McCain Library;
- a new campus center;
- a new 100-bed residence hall located at the corner of South Candler Street and East Dougherty Street along with a two-tier parking structure;
- expanding and renovating Campbell Hall to accommodate state-of-the-art laboratories and an increasing interest in the sciences;
- a building adjacent to Rebekah Scott Hall to include new theater and dance facilities, conference and meeting rooms, and administrative offices;
- improvements to the College's amphitheater;
- a parking structure to be located in the block bounded by West College Avenue and South McDonough Street. This parking structure will be surrounded by townhouses and will also be the new home of Agnes Scott's public safety department;

- renovation and expansion of Bradley Observatory in preparation for the return of Agnes Scott's Beck Telescope, which has been housed at Hard Labor Creek State Park. The telescope, which will celebrate 50 years of service to science in 1999, will be utilized for the study of atmospheric pollution with Georgia Tech Research Institute;
- an extension to the Woodruff Physical Activities Center to accommodate racquetball courts and additional physical fitness facilities;
- relocating the College's tennis courts behind existing physical plant buildings;
- renovation of the Anna Young Alumnae House;
- constructing office space (between Hopkins Hall and the Anna Young Alumnae House) for the College's offices of alumnae affairs and development;
- building new physical plant facilities on land at the southernmost end of campus with a road in the interior of campus boundaries College traffic.

Other improvements to the 100-acre-plus campus may include, in the future, a new 50-bed addition to Hopkins Hall, a new academic building south of Presser Hall, and construction of townhomes in the vicinity of the Bradley Observatory.

While final cost estimates are not yet available, total cost of the long-term project could range between \$75 million and \$125 million. The project will be funded through a combination of sources, including issuing bonds, fundraising, and using existing College resources. Tuition will not be a source for funding the plan.

About the planning process

Board approval of the campus plan concept follows nearly a year of comprehensive and integrated strategic planning. Wallace, Roberts and Todd provided overall project leadership.

At the onset of the campus plan project, the College identified those constituencies key to its success. These include students, faculty, staff, community and civic leaders and members of the neighborhoods surrounding the College. Each of these constituencies has been instrumental in the planning process and has made significant contributions that have helped chart its direction.

As a part of this process, Agnes Scott held a series of meetings with neighbors seeking input about the plan. Consequently, the College made incremental changes to the plan, including a decision not to close the portion of East Dougherty Street that runs through the campus, building townhouses around the parking structure to be in the block bounded by East College Avenue and South McDonough Street and incorporating a second parking garage to be located on East Dougherty Street.

Alice Walker, author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning "The Color Purple" (1983), will be the speaker at Agnes Scott College's commencement exercises today.

At the commencement, approximately 140 students will receive bachelor of arts degrees, and 23 students will receive their Master of Arts in Teaching Secondary English (MAT) degrees.

Walker's most recent book, "The Same River Twice: Honoring the Difficult," appeared this winter. She is the author of five novels, including "The Third Life of Grange Copeland," "Meridian," "The Temple of My Familiar" and "Possessing the Secret of Joy." Her other work includes two collections of short stories ("In Love and Trouble" and "You Can't Keep a Good Woman Down"); two collections of essays ("In Search of Our Mothers' Gardens" and "Living By the Word") and five volumes of poetry ("Once," "Revolutionary Petunias," "Goodnight, Willie Lee, I'll See You in the Morning," "Horses Make a Landscape Look More Beautiful" and "Her Blue Body, Everything We Know.")

"The Color Purple" was on the New York Times Bestsellers list for more than a year and was made into a film directed by Steven Spielberg. In all, her books have sold nearly 10 million copies and have been translated into more than two dozen languages.

Her many awards and honors include a Guggenheim Fellowship, the Rosenthal award for fiction from the National Institute of Arts and Letters, The Lillian Smith Award and the Radcliffe Medal. Her book "Revolutionary Petunias & Other Poems" was nominated for a National Book Award.

Obituary for Chloe Malone Steel

Chloe Malone Steel, 90, of Decatur, former professor and first Loridans Chair of the French department at Agnes Scott College, died early morning Friday, May 23, of natural causes. Born June 25, 1906 in Obion County, Tenn., Miss Steel received her bachelor of arts degree from Randolph Macon Woman's College and her Ph.D. from the University of Chicago with emphasis on Proust. She taught at Agnes Scott from 1955-1976.

Adele Dieckmann McKee of Decatur, a long-time friend, said Miss Steel was a person of great religious faith and a woman who believed firmly in the importance of education for women. McKee also said Miss Steel remained dedicated to the study of French literature and "wore out half a dozen copies" of "Beckett," starring Richard Burton, over the last three years.

Frances Clark Calder of Avondale Estates, a 1951 Agnes Scott graduate who was later a colleague of Miss Steel's, called her "a master teacher, fine scholar, and able chair of the department." Calder continues, "She was totally committed to teaching. Her work was her life. I enjoyed working with her and under her supervision."

Ellen Wood Hall, who graduated from Agnes Scott in 1967 with a degree in French and who is now Dean of the College at Wells College in New York, recalls vividly Miss Steel's "booming, business-like but kind voice."

"In every class, I was always a little intimidated but knew that if I came prepared, she was prepared to teach me everything," Hall adds. "I knew I was in the presence of a teacher who was inspired by genius and who knew how to imbue her students with her own sense of the greatness of literature. Miss Steel helped me see every word, every phrase, every nuance as a tendril which would attach my mind to an ever-more profound understanding of the novel (especially Proust) and its context."

She is survived by nieces and nephews.

Agnes Scott Department of Religious Studies receives Templeton grant

ATLANTA -- The John Templeton Foundation has awarded Agnes Scott's Department of Religious Studies a \$10,000 grant to develop a class examining the relationship between science and religion. Agnes Scott is one of 97 institutions receiving one of the \$10,000 grants, and this year's winners represent academic institutions in 36 states and 10 countries worldwide.

This introductory course open to all students is designed to support Agnes Scott's strategic initiative to support a women's science center with interdisciplinary study and to provide "a conversation space" for religious studies minors who are majoring in the sciences, says Tina Pippin, associate professor of religious studies.

Specifically, the course will link life experiences of women scientists with the feminist science debate and will study issues such as ecofeminism, technology and ethics.

"The program seeks to foster a network of scholars and researchers, promote theories and methodologies supporting the relationships between science and religion and encourage frontier thinking on critical issues in science, philosophy and theology," says Dr. Robert Hermann, Templeton Foundation 1997 Science and Religion course program director.

Pippin adds that interest in the course has been much greater than the department projected. Expecting 10 students (just more than Agnes Scott's average student-faculty ratio of 8:1), 25 students have registered. "We have definitely hit a need," Pippin says.

International investment manager John Marks Templeton established the foundation in 1987 to encourage the discovery and use of scientific evidence to reveal knowledge about God and the natural laws that govern the universe.

With only a second remaining and 15 points behind, Agnes Scott College senior Karen Gearreald didn't blink an eye to offer the correct answer to a College Bowl question – an answer which catapulted Agnes Scott ahead of Princeton for a five-point win that has become legend at the women's college just outside Atlanta.

Gearreald didn't blink an eye because she couldn't see the clock or scorebord, not because of where she was seated but because she's blind.

This past Saturday, Gearreald was honored by her alma mater as an outstanding alumna for her distinguished career.

While at Agnes Scott, Gearreald, the College's first totally blind student, earned honors as a Stukes Scholar (an award granted to the student with the highest grade point average) and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. After graduating, she went on to Harvard's Graduate School of Arts and Sciences where she earned an M.A. in English literature in 1967 and a Ph.D. in English linquistics and literature in 1969. She received her juris doctorate from Duke Law School in 1976.

In August 1996, she took early retirement from the civil service of the U.S. Navy after 20 years as a lawyer specializing in government contracts. During her years with the civil service, she received a host of awards, including the Navy Civilian Distinguished Service Award.

Since 1988, she has been an instructor for the Hadley School for the Blind in Winnetka, Ill. Today, she is a full-time teacher at Hadley, responsible for 10 courses (business law, music appreciation, speech, Braille reading, two Latin courses and four Bible courses). From her home in Norfolk, Va., Gearreald instructs a cadre of 200 with individualized attention, thanks to the modern technology that's the backbone of distance learning.

Agnes Scott College student researches Philrye "Pilley" Kim Choi

ATLANTA -- Hee Ryu, who is originally from Seoul, Korea, says she had not adjusted completely to life at Agnes Scott until she was handed a copy of a untranslated Korean biography about Philrye "Pilley" Kim Choi (1891-1983), one of Korea's most respected women leaders and ASC alumna (1925-26). Since then, Ryu has incorporated her interest in Choi into her course of study, including ongoing research for the College.

Then, she began to uncover several parallels between her life and that of a countrywoman whom she had respected since childhood:

- Ryu attended Chungshin Girls Middle School in Seoul, where Choi had served as principal from 1947-61.
- Choi helped found Seoul Women's University, in Ryu's hometown. Choi's experience at Agnes Scott became the model for the university as well as for other schools she helped create.
- While at Agnes Scott, Choi studied history, which is also Ryu's major.

The convergence of harmonious events does not end there. This summer, Agnes Scott President Mary Brown Bullock, who is the daughter of Presbyterian missionaries and lived many years in Korea, visited Seoul Women's University with a group of Agnes Scott faculty as part of a factfinding trip to Korea and China. The group focused on women's issues, especially in education. Next week, a delegation from Seoul Women's University will reciprocate when they come for a visit to Agnes Scott.

Choi was not only a leader in Korean women's education. She also helped found the first and many other chapters of the Korean YWCA and received multiple awards honoring her lifetime of achievement, including a 50th anniversary award from the Korean YWCA and a Korean government award for work in women's education.

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Agnes Scott College, founded by Presbyterians in 1889, is an independent, national liberal arts college for women dedicated to providing a learning environment with rigorous academic standards and a social culture based on honor and integrity. Agnes Scott College files application to amend Decatur's Land Use Plan, Zoning Map Officials committed to ongoing dialogue with neighborhood

ATLANTA -- Agnes Scott College (ASC) filed with city of Decatur officials on Friday, Sept. 5, documents requesting an amendment to the city's Comprehensive Land Use Plan and an amendment to its Zoning Map.

The amendments request that city officials rezone property just to the west of campus from R-60 and RM-60 (residential) to I (Institutional) to enable the College to construct a parking structure on the site. The property is located in the block bounded by West College Avenue and South McDonough, Ansley and Adams streets.

As proposed, the parking structure will be a three-story/four-tier facility that will accommodate 540 vehicles. The College chose this site because:

- it meets the College's needs for concentrated parking near public areas and near the core of College activities;
- it will keep traffic primarily on East/West College Avenue, minimizing traffic within the neighborhood;
- it has the topographical characteristics of slope, size and tree-cover to minimize visual impact;
- it replaces three smaller parking lots (approximately 200 spaces) which are designated building sites and are located along South McDonough Street;
- the block is fronted on 3 1/2 sides by property which is zoned institutional; and
- it is cost effective.

Agnes Scott has consulted with traffic engineers, city planners and architects about the location of the parking structure and its impact on the neighborhood. These professionals indicate that consolidating parking for the west side of campus into one structure will not significantly change current neighborhood traffic patterns. Student and faculty traffic occurs at non-peak hours

because of varying class schedules and represents at least one-half of the volume associated with the parking structure. Also, these cars are present on campus only during the academic year (7 1/2 months), and faculty and staff generally travel in the opposite direction of rush-hour traffic.

Other proposed plans for the block include:

- relocating the Public Safety Department next to the proposed parking structure fronting on South McDonough to contribute to safety;
- maintaining as residences all College-owned homes on Adams Street and constructing single family dwellings on vacant lots where space permits;
- renovating several of the houses, if feasible, on West College Avenue; and
- considering the addition of several single family homes, as space permits, to Ansley Street.

Ingress and egress to the structure will be on West College Avenue and on South McDonough Street with no access from either Ansley Street or Adams Street. It will be situated centrally in the block and will allow for wide setbacks from existing residential structures. The topography of the property from the high-ground of West College Avenue as it slopes towards the south and Ansley Street presents a site unique in its ability to obscure the structure from view. Agnes Scott plans to take advantage of existing heavily wooded areas both to benefit the environment and to minimize view of the parking structure. Also, preliminary design concepts provide for hiding the structure with a berm built as the land slopes to its lowest points and for installing additional trees and other landscaping around the perimeter.

Prior to filing its application, the College conducted approximately 20 informational meetings with the adjacent residential community to share future plans for Agnes Scott, to receive the neighborhood's input and to allow for dialogue on ways that the College and the neighborhood can work together to achieve mutual goals.

Following a public meeting on Wednesday, July 23, a committee from the College has been meeting with an elected committee of the Leila Ross Wilburn Neighborhood Coalition and the McDonough, Adams and Kings Highway (MAK) Neighborhood Association. The discussions between the groups have provided a conduit for dialogue that the College hopes will continue after filing.

In addition to these discussions, Agnes Scott is working with local public school authorities, especially at Renfroe Middle School and Decatur High School, on pedestrian improvements to the College Avenue/South McDonough Street intersection.

ATLANTA -- Carmen Agra Deedy, storyteller and author, will headline the Agnes Scott College Events Series this Saturday night at 8 p.m. in Gaines Auditorium of Presser Hall. General admission tickets are \$12 and \$8 for senior citizens and students.

In 1963, Deedy emigrated with her family to Decatur, Ga., to escape the aftermath of the Cuban revolution. This history has left Deedy with a rich combination of Latin American and Southern heritage from which she draws her stories. As an art form, storytelling is once again gaining popularity, and Deedy, a master storyteller and children's author, recounts many episodes from her "new life" growing up in the South.

Other events scheduled as part of the series are:

- Marietta Simpson, Nov. 8 (held in conjunction with Agnes Scott's symposium, "Creative Women during the Chicago Renaissance, c. 1930-50"). Simpson, mezzosoprano, will sing art songs by featured women of the Chicago Renaissance as well as those of their predecessors and successors. This symposium will also feature a reading by poet Gwendolyn Brooks, the first African-American to win the Pulitzer Prize for poetry.
