Agnes Scott's Sustainability Program

Report for September 2007–April 2009

- Signed the American College & University Presidents Climate Commitment as a charter member and joined the Association for Advancement of Sustainability in Higher Education (AASHE)
- Completed the college's first greenhouse gas emissions inventory (our carbon footprint) and initiated the first Climate Action Plan which will include a date for reaching climate neutrality
- Joined in a sustainability partnership with the city of Decatur
- Involved more than 250 students, faculty, staff, trustees and alumnae in Agnes Scott's sustainability efforts
- Hired the college's first director of sustainability and first sustainability fellow, both ASC alumnae
- Engaged students in sustainability projects in the classroom through four courses, including an internship course
- Established an environmental and sustainability studies minor



- Converted to campus-wide "single stream" recycling and reduced waste stream by 30 percent
- Began recycling 100 percent of used cooking oil for bio-diesel by the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy
- Offered benefits to encourage alternative transportation use
- Updated inventory of campus "urban forest" (2,000 trees)
- Opened first project designed for LEED certification on campus – Anna I. Young Alumnae House renovation
- Received foundation funding for "green" renovations of Campbell Hall and Woodruff Physical Activities Building
- Established policy that all new construction and renovation follow LEED guidelines

Did You Know?

- Agnes Scott ranked among the 50 "Best Value" private colleges and universities for 2009 by The Princeton Review.
- Agnes Scott ranked #9 in the country among liberal arts colleges in "Schools to Watch," a new ranking by *U.S. News & World Report* of schools considered "tops for innovation." It was also the top-ranked college in the Southeast in the category "Great Schools, Great Prices," rising to 16th from 30th nationally.
- The virtual tour on the Web site was ranked #1 nationally in the October 2008 issue of *CASE Currents* magazine after college students in focus groups selected it as their top choice.
- Agnes Scott was named one of the seven top women's colleges in the country by About.com: College Admissions. It is the only college in the South on the list.
- The 2009 edition of Princeton Review's *The 368 Best Colleges*, based on surveys of 120,000 students, gave Agnes Scott five Top 20 honors: Town-Gown Relations are Great, Best Quality of Life, Best Classroom Experience, Stone-Cold Sober Schools, and Don't Inhale.
- ASC ranks #2 nationally in the percentage of graduates who earned Ph.D.s in economics from 1997 to 2003 according to a recent study published in the *Journal of Economics*.
- Agnes Scott is the only primarily baccalaureate-granting college to have a partnership agreement with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Eight students pursued research internships at the CDC during the 2008 summer.
